In my last *Rose* letter I presented a historical review of Sacred Heart Parish in recognition of their 125th Anniversary. I now want to honor another venerable Melrose Park institution, Our Lady of Mount Carmel Parish, which is celebrating the 125th Anniversary of the Feast of Our

the history of Our Lady of Mount Carmel Parish using information found on the Internet and the Mount Carmel website.



Grateful for the recovery of her husband from a serious illness, after invoking the aid of Our Lady of Mount Carmel, Emmanuela Di Stefano solicited funds to produce the statue. The sculpture still resides in the church's interior and serves as the centerpiece of the Feast of Our Lady of Mount Carmel procession.

Around 1880, Chicago's rapidly growing population saw Italian immigrant families settle in the new village of Melrose Park. In 1895, the aforementioned Emmanuela Di Stefano and others gave thought to building a chapel. The difficulties in erecting a new chapel were formidable because a Catholic church was already serving the village and the bishop did not wish to grant permission establishing other churches in Melrose

Ignoring the bishop, Emmanuela proceeded with the construction of a small frame church on two lots she owned on 24th Avenue near Lake Street. For several years, this chapel did not have regular services – a few times a year the Servite Fathers came to celebrate the Divine Mysteries at the request of a society organized to commemorate the Feast of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel.

In 1901, the bishop ordered the local Feast Society to cede title of the chapel to the Archdiocese of Chicago. In this crisis, it appeared that the Blessed Mother herself made the decision to stay in this rural village as demonstrated by the following occurrence.

After the bishop's threat, Emmanuela Di Stefano decided to have a getaway car remove the image of the Madonna. The village's Italian population decided to oppose the bishop's act with force. When Emmanuela entered the church to take away the statue, the church bell sounded the alarm. In an instant, men, women and even children were shouting and threatening whoever would dare to touch the Madonna. It might have been a night of bloodshed if the Virgin Mary herself had not intervened by turning a clear night into a fearful storm that dispersed the furious crowd, thus preventing a riot and removal of her image.

The church title eventually passed on to the Catholic bishop and continued to be administered from time to time by the Servite Fathers. Only after Archbishop James Edward Quigley was appointed to the Archdiocese of Chicago in 1903, was a full time priest, Reverend Antonio Pettillo, sent to the church. He remained until July of 1905.

It was at this time Father Benjamin Franch, an Italian immigrant, requested permission to come on Sundays to celebrate Mass. Father Franch would remain associated with Mount Carmel for nearly a half a century, most of it as the pastor.

Within two years of Father Franch's arrival (1907), the small church building was moved to the spacious property where the present church stands. Serious difficulties had to be overcome in the relocation of the church because the neighbors wanted, at all costs and by all means, to keep it in its original location. Having relocated the church, he built a rectory, which cost \$4,000 and was only completed because the priest ceded all he possessed to pay interest on the indebtedness.

After 1908, the inadequacy of the chapel became apparent and even though there was no money and little encouragement from the people, it was decided with the consent of the bishop, to build a new church at a cost of \$12,000. The first Sunday Mass was attended by 12 people and that the Offertory collection amounted to 75 cents.

By 1913, a parochial school had been added and by 1914 a convent for the sisters and a parish auditorium. Throughout the construction, the fine masonry work bore the evidence of the supervision of Father Franch, who was a stone mason before entering the seminary.

Growth of the village resulted in a demand for more parochial facilities and in 1950 permission was granted to construct four new classrooms and a gymnasium. In 1952, the convent was renovated and enlarged to accommodate 14 nuns.

Father Benjamin Franch was called to his reward on May 27, 1954. Rev. Salvatore De Vita, who had seen service as pastor of Our Lady of Pompei Church in Chicago, was appointed pastor to succeed him. Father De Vita began a program of repairs and renovation. Properties were acquired for parking facilities and future expansion.

The school built in 1913, although well-maintained, had become obsolete and no longer conformed with safety regulations. It had also become quite apparent that a new church would be needed. Rather than undertake a program of repair and remodeling, which was prohibitive in cost, a long-range program of complete renewal was adopted. In 1961, a new fire resistive 12-classroom school was constructed on the corner of 22nd Avenue and Augusta. The parish responded generously and within a few years the debt incurred to construct the new school was retired. Unfortunately, the grammar school closed in 2002 due to financial reasons and declining enrollment.

Rev. Salvatore De Vita's term as pastor expired and Rev. Adam A. Torresan was appointed as pastor to succeed him in 1964.

Father Adam announced shortly after he arrived that the parish should immediately undertake the construction of a new church. The Chancery Office, however, had adopted a program of curtailing new construction and permission was withheld until such a time as a substantial portion of the cost of a new church was actually collected.

Finally in 1965, permission was granted and a date was set for razing of the old church. Amid nostalgic sighs, parishioners came by invitation to take home statuary, bits of the altar and other souvenirs of the old church. It was the last vestige of an old, sometimes hectic era marked by faith, zeal and heroism.

Ground for the new church was broken on Feb. 26, 1967. The cornerstone was laid on Sept. 24 1967. The beautiful modern style church seating 850 was completed in 1968.

Over the years the parish has been a source of refuge and hope for immigrants of all backgrounds and their descendants. The fine pastoral work continues today under the leadership of Pastor Father Giovanni Bizzotto and associate pastors, Father Augusto Feccia and Father Yosef A. Sadipun.



As a graduate of Our Lady of Mount Carmel Grade School, I want to say thank you for being not only an important part of my life but for being an integral part of what makes Melrose Park a great place to live, work, play and worship.

Mark your calendar: Sacred Heart's 125th Anniversary Mass will be said by Cardinal Blasé Cupich on June 30 at 4 p.m. followed by a reception at the Drake Oak Brook. Our Lady of Mount Carmel's 50th Anniversary of the Consecration of the Church is on June 10 at 1:30 p.m. with the Mass presided by Auxiliary Bishop John Manz followed by a reception. The 125th Anniversary of the Feast and Veneration of Our Lady of Mount Carmel occurs between July 12-15. The Solemn Celebration is on July 15 at 9 a.m. with Mass presided over by Cardinal Blasé Cupich in the church. The traditional outdoor Mass with procession is at noon.

The village of Melrose Park is providing residents with a new option to manage their water bill. You can now visit www.melrosepark.org to: view your current water bill; review all your present and past bills as far back as 2012; run a water use consumption analysis; view your account history for bills paid and any bill adjustments; and enroll for an eBill statement which will notify you by email that your bill can be viewed online, which avoids any Post Office problems. Important: you still need to pay your water bill by mail, in person, or by clicking on the Pay Water Bill tab found on the right side of the Melrose Park website homepage under the rotating pictures.

Clicking on images at www.melrosepark.org as directed will take you to the new online Water Account page. You will need your water account number and the full name of the person listed on the water bill to utilize this new feature. The Village of Melrose Park Dial a Ride Program was initiated in 2000 to provide residents of our community with a new transportation resource to any location in the Melrose Park boundaries. Residents are encouraged to use

the program to do their everyday needs such as grocery shopping, doctor appointments, etc. We are also handicapped accessible.

This service is available to residents Monday thru Friday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. To make a reservation, please call (708) 343-7047. You can make appointments from the hours of 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday thru Friday. We are closed on Saturdays and

Sundays and all major holidays. To book an appointment or make a cancellation, you must call at least 24 hours in advance.

Policies and Procedures

Only one reservation per rider per day. NO EXCEPTIONS!

Only two appointments a week can be made for miscellaneous use such as grocery shopping etc. Anyone using the van for doctor appointments, etc., may use the van up to three times a week.

You must stay at your destination you are going to for a minimum of an hour. Any residents of Victory Centre MUST go with the group provided at their center for grocery shopping, etc. Any doctor appointment can be made with us.

Only three shopping bags per rider. Forgotten items in the van will be returned at the next pickup date. Please note that our service is getting more popular every day so we will try to accommodate your needs to the best of our ability.

No construction or alteration activities shall be carried on between the nighttime hours of 7 p.m. and 7 a.m. on

Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday,

Thursday or Friday. On Saturday, no construction or alteration activities shall be carried on between the nighttime hours of 5 p.m. and 8 a.m. On Sunday and federal holidays, no construction or alteration activities shall be carried on between the nighttime hours of 5 p.m. and 10

a.m. Construction and alteration activities on

Sundays and federal holidays shall not be accompanied by loud or annoying noises except in the case of an emergency. Emergency operations necessitating deviation from this section shall not be initiated until special permission is obtained from the director of Public Works. Construction or alteration activities with regard to public improvements and public service utilities, shall be exempt from this section.

Any person violating this section shall be fined not less that fifty dollars (\$50), nor more than seven hundred fifty dollars (\$750), for each offense, and each day's violation of the same shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

Melrose Park Partners with Animal Care League to Help Lost Animals

Melrose Park Police Department Contracts with Animal Care League for Animal Holding Services


On March 1, 2018, the Melrose Park Police Department signed a one-year contract with Animal Care League, a no-kill animal shelter and spay/neuter clinic in Oak Park. The new contract means that animals lost/found in Melrose Park will be taken to Animal Care League for shelter and care while the owners are located. After the stray hold period, animals who are not reunited with their owners will be evaluated and placed for adoption through the shelter's adoption program. Once the initial contract expires, a longer term partnership will be discussed.

The village of Melrose Park identified a need to improve animal services in their community in early 2018 and was looking to work with a no-kill shelter that would offer residents peace of mind if by chance their animal was lost, or needed to be impounded. Animal Care League holds five other stray holding contracts including the village of Oak Park. The new partnership will ensure that over 100 lost, abandoned or impounded animals each year have a safe place to go, access to medical care if needed, and that residents will have a central location to search for lost pets. Since the contract start, 12 Melrose Park animals have been brought to Animal Care League, five of which have been reunited with their families and the other seven either adopted or are currently waiting to find forever homes.

Animal Care League's Executive Director Kira Robson had this to say about the new partnership and contract, "Animal Care League is excited to be working with the village of Melrose Park to best serve the animals and the residents who love them. We will work to ensure that animals coming to us from the village of Melrose Park will have the best chance at finding their owners, or if unclaimed, at being adopted. We look forward to being a resource for the residents of Melrose Park and hope to hold some community events in the near future."

Animal Care League is a 501(c)3 non-profit organization located in Oak Park that provides shelter for lost, abandoned, abused and neglected animals; offers low-cost spay/neuter services; and acts as a resource for surrounding communities. From the Desk of Philip C. Schwartz, Chief of Public Safety — Homeland Security

Lightning: What You Need to Know

- No place outside is safe when thunderstorms are in the area!
- If you hear thunder, lightning is close enough to strike you.
- When you hear thunder, immediately move to safe shelter: a substantial building with electricity or plumbing or an enclosed, metal-topped vehicle with windows up.
- Stay in safe shelter at least 30 minutes after you hear the last sound of thunder.

Indoor Lightning Safety

- Stay off corded phones, computers and other electrical equipment that put you in direct contact with electricity.
- Avoid plumbing, including sinks, baths and faucets.
- Stay away from windows and doors, and stay off porches.
- Do not lie on concrete floors, and do not lean against concrete walls.

Last Resort Outdoor Risk Reduction Tips

If you are caught outside with no safe shelter anywhere nearby the following actions may reduce your risk:

- Immediately get off elevated areas such as hills, mountain ridges or peaks.
- Never lie flat on the ground.
- Never shelter under an isolated tree.
- Never use a cliff or rocky overhang for shelter.
- Immediately get out and away from ponds, lakes and other bodies of water.
- Stay away from objects that conduct electricity (barbed wire fences, power lines, windmills, etc.).

Lightning Safety Myths and Facts

Myth: Lightning never strikes the same place twice.

Fact: Lightning often strikes the same place repeatedly, especially if it's a tall, pointy, isolated object. The Empire State Building is hit nearly 100 times a year.

Myth: If it's not raining or there aren't clouds overhead, you're safe from lightning.

Fact: Lightning often strikes more than three miles from the center of the thunderstorm, far outside the rain or thunderstorm cloud. "Bolts from the blue" can strike 10-15 miles from the thunderstorm.

Myth: Rubber tires on a car protect you from lightning by insulating you from the ground.

Fact: Most cars are safe from lightning, but it is the metal roof and metal sides that protect you, not the rubber tires. Remember, convertibles, motorcycles, bicycles, open-shelled outdoor recreational vehicles and cars with fiberglass shells offer no protection from lightning. When lightning strikes a vehicle, it goes through the metal frame into the ground. Don't lean on doors during a thunderstorm.

Myth: A lightning victim is electrified. If you touch them, you'll be electrocuted.

Fact: The human body does not store electricity. It is perfectly safe to touch a lightning victim to give them first aid. This is the most chilling of lightning Myths. Imagine if someone died because people were afraid to give CPR!

Myth: If outside in a thunderstorm, you should seek shelter under a tree to stay dry.

Fact: Being underneath a tree is the second leading cause of lightning casualties. Better to get wet than fried!

Myth: If you are in a house, you are 100 percent safe from lightning.

Fact: A house is a safe place to be during a thunderstorm as long as you avoid anything that conducts electricity. This means staying off corded phones, electrical appliances, wires, TV cables, computers, plumbing, metal doors and windows. Windows are hazardous for two reasons: wind generated during a thunderstorm can blow objects into the window, breaking it and causing glass to shatter and second, in older homes, in rare instances, lightning can come in cracks in the sides of windows.

Myth: If thunderstorms threaten while you are outside playing a game, it is okay to finish it before seeking shelter.

Fact: Many lightning casualties occur because people do not seek shelter soon enough. No game is worth death or lifelong injuries. Seek proper shelter immediately if you hear thunder. Adults are responsible for the safety of children.

Myth: Structures with metal, or metal on the body (jewelry, cell phones, Mp3 players, watches, etc.), attract lightning.

Fact: Height, pointy shape and isolation are the dominant factors controlling where a lightning bolt will strike. The presence of metal makes absolutely no difference on where lightning strikes. Mountains are made of stone but get struck by lightning many times a year. When lightning threatens, take proper protective action immediately by seeking a safe shelter – don't waste time removing metal. While metal does not attract lightning, it does conduct it so stay away from metal fences, railings, bleachers, etc.

Myth: If trapped outside and lightning is about to strike, I should lie flat on the ground.

Fact: Lying flat increases your chance of being affected by potentially deadly ground current. If you are caught outside in a thunderstorm, you keep moving toward a safe shelter.

Tornados

Before a Tornado

Know the terms used to describe tornado threats.

Tornado Watch – Tornados are possible. Watch the sky and listen to the radio or television for more information. Be prepared to take shelter. If you see any rotating funnel-shaped clouds, report them immediately by telephone to your local law enforcement agency. If you live in a mobile home, this is the time to move to a more substantial structure.

Tornado Warning – A tornado has been sighted or indicated by weather radar. Take shelter. Turn on a battery-operated radio or television and wait for the "all clear" announcement by authorities. Determine the best location in your home and office to seek shelter when threatened by a tornado. A basement or cellar will usually afford the best protection. If an underground shelter is not available, identify an interior room or hall-way on the lowest level. Conduct periodic tornado safety drills with your family.

During a Tornado – Take the following actions when a Tornado Warning has been issued by the National Weather Service, when sirens have been activated or when a tornado has been sighted near your area.

At Home – Go at once to your predetermined shelter (storm cellar, basement or the lowest level of the building). In a basement, go under the stairs, under a heavy piece of furniture or a workbench. Stay there until the danger has passed. If there is no basement, go to an inner hallway or a small inner room without windows, such as a bathroom or closet. Stay away from windows, doors and outside walls.

Go to the center of the room. Outside windows and walls may be penetrated by high speed, wind-borne missiles.

Get under a piece of sturdy furniture, such as a workbench or heavy table, and hold onto it.

Use pillows, mattresses or cushions to protect your head and neck.

If in a mobile home, get out and seek shelter elsewhere. A mobile home can overturn very easily even if precautions have been taken to tie down the unit. If there isn't a substantial shelter nearby, seek shelter in a low-lying area. Shield your head with your hands.

In a School, Nursing Home, Hospital, Shopping Center or at Work – Go to the designated storm shelter, basement or to an inside hallway on the lowest level.

Avoid places with wide-span roofs, such as auditoriums, cafeterias, gymnasiums and large hallways. Stay away from windows and open spaces.

Get under a piece of sturdy furniture, such as a workbench or heavy table or desk and hold onto it. If sturdy furniture is not available, make yourself the smallest target possible. Squat low to the ground. Put your head down and cover your head and neck with your hands.

If in a high-rise building, go to small, interior rooms or hallways on the lowest level possible and seek protection as detailed above. Stay away from windows and outside walls.

Learn how to shut off the utilities to your home. Decide how and where your family will reunite.

If you live in a mobile home, identify a safe shelter outside of your mobile home such as a community park shelter, a neighbor or friend's house, or a nearby public building.

In a mobile home, consider installation of an underground shelter that is large enough to accommodate you, your family or several other nearby mobile home residents.

Consider retrofitting your house with special fasteners, connectors and reinforcing bands to strengthen the structural integrity. Also, consider installing a reinforced concrete and steel "safe room" as a small room within your house, or excavated and installed beneath your garage floor.

In a Vehicle – Never try to outrun a tornado in a vehicle. Heavy rain, hail and traffic may impede your movement. Tornados can change directions quickly and can easily lift up a vehicle and toss it through the air.

Get out of the vehicle immediately and try to take shelter in a nearby building. Do not park under a bridge or underpass.

If there isn't time to get indoors, get out of the vehicle and lie in a ditch, culvert or low-lying area away from the vehicle.

Garage Sale Notice

The rules on garage sales held in the village of Melrose Park are as follows:

Garage sales will be held on the third weekend only during the months of May, June, July, August and September. Sales are to be conducted on Thursday, Friday and Saturday of the designated weekends. No sales are allowed on Sundays.

The dates for 2018 are May 17-19, June 14-16, July 19-21, Aug. 16-18 and Sept. 20-22.

Garage sales shall be conducted only during the hours of 9 a.m.-5 p.m.

No permit is needed for garage sales, however the following rules must be followed:

- No garage sales may be conducted in apartment buildings.
- No garage sales in the frontyard, i.e. on the grass.
- All garage sales to be conducted in backyard, garage or driveway.
- All sale items to be displayed on tables not on the ground.
- No sale items shall be located and no sale activity shall be conducted in the frontyard area on the premises of any public sidewalk, parkway area or other public property.
- No sale signs, handbills or other advertising material shall be located or posted upon public parkway or on public property, signs, poles or light poles within the village of Melrose Park.
- Signs advertising the sales shall not exceed 3-by-5 feet and may be located only in the frontyard (private property) of the address having the garage sale and must be removed immediately after the sale.
- The sale will be conducted without the use of outdoor loud speakers, amplification equipment or illuminated advertising devices.

Any person violating these rules shall be subject to a fine not to exceed \$500. A copy of the garage sale rules is available at the Village Hall.

Triton Men's Basketball Wins NJCAA Division II National Championship



The Triton College men's basketball team won its first-ever national championship in program history, winning the NJCAA Division II championship in a thrilling 89-85 victory over Pima Community College (Ariz.) recently in Danville, III.

The Trojans under head coach Steve Christiansen, who was named NJCAA Division II National Coach of the Year, finished the season with a 33-4 record. Sophomore Deonta Terrell was named

tournament Most Valuable Player. Terrell in his final game in a Triton uniform had 15 points and seven rebounds. Najee Brown-Henderson and Alondes Williams were All-tournament Team selections. Brown-Henderson scored 16 points and was 8-of-10 from the free throw line. Williams led the Trojans in scoring with 22 points, seven rebounds and three steals.

"It's too good to be true," said Christiansen on WRRG Radio. "This is unbelievable. A night like tonight is what you dream about as a coach and as a player. It doesn't get any better than this and with this group of coaches and players, it's special. The feeling is surreal. This championship is for everyone at Triton."

Triton enjoyed a 39-26 lead at halftime. However, the Aztecs from Tuscon quickly erased the deficit and tied the game at 42 five minutes into the second with a 16-3 run. From that point the lead would switch hands 11 times before the Trojans went on the run that secured them the title.

Williams sparked a Triton 11-0 run down the stretch with six of the Trojans points during that spurt, including a steal and layup as Triton rallied from five down to a take a 73-71 lead. The Trojans lead grew to 10 at 84-74 as the Triton defense held Pima (31-5) with out a field goal during a five-minute span.

The Trojans were able to make enough free throws late to hold off a furious Aztec rally and the celebration began at the Mary Miller Gymnasium.

Martrell Barnes played a huge role in Triton's success at nationals. The freshman from North Lawndale provided critical minutes off the bench to end up with 11 points and eight rebounds. Freshman Devin Blake made some key plays as well to finish with 13 points and 11 rebounds.

The Trojans were 26-of-39 from the charity stripe, with 35 of those attempts coming in the second half.


