## **A Message From Mayor Ronald M. Serpico** Sacred Heart Church – Here's A Little History About This Cherished 125-Year-Old Melrose Park Institution

Dear Neighbors,

During the recent snowstorm I drove around town witnessing some residents blowing snow from their property onto recently plowed streets. In the future,



please direct blowers to send snow onto your front lawn area. When people send snow into the street it forces our street cleaning crew to make another pass with the plows and adds to our overtime costs. Worse yet, it can cause a vehicle to slide as it hits this icy patch.

In 2018, Our Lady of Mount Carmel will celebrate the 125th year of hosting the longest running religious festival in the Chicago area – The Feast of Our Lady of Mount Carmel. Simultaneously, they will also celebrate the 50th anniversary of the dedication of their present church. I will write about their anniversaries in my next *Rose* letter.

However, I want to devote the rest of this letter to the 125th Anniversary of Sacred Heart Church, which holds a special place in my heart since this is where my wife Donna and I took our wedding vows on July 11, 1975. Using Sacred Heart's website as a source, I want to present a little history about this cherished 125-year-old Melrose Park institution.

Sacred Heart traces it roots back to 1891 when Mary Dunnebecke and Emanuella De Stefano traveled the newly completed trolley and railway system to Chicago to find a priest. The dynamic pair convinced a Jesuit priest, Father Paul Panzigloni, to hold

religious services in the village on a monthly basis, which only lasted a year.

The women persevered and they achieved a more lasting success with the generous help of a foundation set up by the Countess Maria Stadison Van Thannhausen when property for a church was purchased and a Resurrectionist priest, Father Theophile, agreed to visit Melrose Park on a regular basis.

Sacred Heart Parish's charter was granted on July 7, 1893. Services were held in a small chapel and private home. In 1894, parishioners erected a white frame building of their own on a lot at 21st Avenue and Iowa Street that seated 125 people. Within a year, the resident priest resigned and the parish remained without a priest until Father Joseph Stumpe, the first resident pastor arrived in 1895. His stay lasted two years, after which Sacred Heart became a mission church of St. Luke's in River Forest.

Mission status lasted until 1900 when the parishioners appealed for "a resident pastor of their own." In anticipation of the new pastor, a rectory was rented at what is now 16th and Augusta. Within a month of his arrival in late June, the new pastor, Father Burelbach, announced plans for a new school and the purchase of the block of property (the present site) to serve the 151 Catholic families residing in the area. That September, a school was established, staffed by the Poor Handmaids of the Lord. There were 10 students and classes were held in a rented twostory store building at 14th and Superior Street. The following month, approval was obtained for construction of a large two-story brick combination building on the new property. The first Mass was said there on Sept. 22, 1901. The church seated 325 worshipers and occupied the first floor of the building. The second floor had schoolrooms in the front and a small convent for the nuns at the back.

Over the next few years, many improvements were made to the property. There were gardens, one for the rectory, the other for the convent, and a softball lot. There was even an outdoor bowling alley.

Then tragedy struck, on Palm Sunday, March 28, 1920, a tornado hit with devastating force. The parish buildings were left in near ruins (see picture at right). Fortunately there were no fatalities. Of the 86 families in the parish, 18 were left homeless. The parish had a debt of \$21,000 and there was no insurance.

Plans for rebuilding started immediately. To pay for the rebuilding, the parish made various appeals and held an annual carnival. The pastor at that time, Father Knur, personally raised more than \$25,000 in donations through appeals at different parishes in the city. In 1927, Father Lieblang replaced Father Knur.

In 1934, Father Lieblang invited the Sisters of Saint Francis at Dubuque to take charge of the school. They have been a primary influence on thousands of our kids since the first six Franciscan nuns arrived.



Father Lieblang died in 1949, after 22 years as pastor. His legacy was a parish not only free of debt but one with a sizeable building fund. That fund would soon provide critical help in the explosive growth that was just around the corner.

Father Augustine Freeman became the sixth resident pastor of Sacred Heart Church and three months after his arrival, architectural plans for a new church, school and convent buildings were a reality. The Primary Grade Building was built and it was ready to receive its first pupils in September 1951.

Over the next six years, a year rarely passed without another major construction project at the parish. Since building plans for the new church were indefinite, the old church was completely refurbished – new pews, terrazzo flooring, stain glass windows, a new organ to replace the foot-pumped original and "real confessionals." In short, the old building was almost completely rebuilt.

In the spring of 1954, amid a major pledge drive to reduce parish debt, the new church took shape. It was built over the baseball diamond used by generations of school children. When completed in October, it was furnished with many of the things bought for the recent remodeling of the old church. The old church was renovated that very year to provide needed rooms for the school.

In the years that followed, school growth continued on an upward spiral. In 1957, the student body consisted of 759 students. By 1959, there were over 1,000 and in the peak year of 1965, the school exceeded 1,200 students.

The costs of building and subsequently maintaining such a large parish plant were enormous. Nevertheless, by the time Father Freeman was granted retirement in 1966, parish debt had been reduced from a high of \$1,350,000 to \$525,000.

Father Kniewel arrived in 1967, the year before the parish celebrated its 75th jubilee year and two years after Pope John XXIII presided over the closing of Vatican II. Parish life was facing major changes.

Sacred Heart School became one of the best in the area – it was the pride of the parish – and Father Kniewel worked tirelessly in its support. When Bingo was legalized, the Monday night games became a major source of school funding. In 1972, *Cabaret*, a showcase for parishioner talent, took over the school and Marian Hall under the direction of a young assistant named Father Militello, who would also establish the Fall Drive, an annual appeal that, to this day, remains a major source of parish funding.

When Father Kniewel retired Father Cosmo Militello came back to Sacred Heart as pastor on Jan. 1, 1981. Under his guidance the church debt was paid off, an event in 1984 that the parish celebrated with its biggest dinner dance.

As pastor, Father Cos revitalized the Women's Club and Holy Name Society, and actively

involved the parishioners in the school board, and parents in the P.T.O. New activities included the occasional St. Joseph's Table, annual fashion show lunch, a corned beef and cabbage dinner, and the many other functions that encourage an active participation in parish life.

Today, Sacred Heart under Pastor Farther Francisco Ortega's inspired leadership, remains true to its mission of 125 years ago of nourishing the parish family through the ministries of Evangelization, Education, Sacramental Worship and Christian Service.

On behalf of all the residents of Melrose Park, thank you Sacred Heart for being a beacon of light, hope and stability in our community.

Equipment managers are also responsible for setting up and maintaining the voting equipment. Due to the additional responsibility, equipment managers receive more training and get higher pay. Election judges earn \$190, equipment managers earn \$340.

# **Congratulations Lt. Rodriguez, Melrose Park is Proud of You!** Lt. Raul Rodriguez Graduates from the FBI National Academy

The Melrose Park Police Department is proud to announce the graduation of Lt. Raul Rodriguez from the FBI National Academy Program at Quantico, Va., on Dec. 15, 2017. Lt. Rodriguez successfully completed the 11-week advanced training program as a member of the 270th session of the Academy.

Lt. Rodriguez was one of 222 law enforcement officers, from 49 U.S. states, 20 countries, four federal agencies and three branches of the U.S. military that graduated. Internationally known for its academic excellence, the National Academy Program, held at the FBI Academy, offers 11 weeks of advanced investigative, management and fitness

training for select officers having proven records as professionals within their agencies.

Training for the program is provided by the FBI Academy instructional staff, special agents and other staff members holding advanced degrees, many of whom are recognized internationally in their fields of expertise. Since 1972, National Academy students have been able to earn undergraduate and graduate credits from the University of Virginia due to the accreditation by the university of the many courses offered.

Less than one percent of law enforcement officers in the nation are selected to attend the program. Lt. Rodriguez is the first Melrose Park Police Department member who has attended and graduated from the National Academy Program.

Upon his return from the academy, Lt. Rodriguez will resume command of the Department's Tactical Unit which is responsible for gang and narcotics investigations. In addition Lt. Rodriguez will utilize what he learned at the academy to strengthen the community policing mission of the Melrose Park Police Department.

## **Village of Melrose Park Flood Protection Information**

.

The village of Melrose presents this information as part of an ongoing federal program to reduce flood insurance premiums. The National Flood Insurance Program offers the opportunity for policy holders to receive coverage at a reduced premium if the community complies with Federal criteria to lessen the impact of a flood event and educate the public on flooding dangers.

#### You can help to reduce flooding, here's how:

• **Stream Maintenance** – Do not dump or throw anything into ditches or creeks. Dumping in our ditches and creeks is a violation of the village of Melrose Park's ordinance. Every piece of trash can contribute to flooding. Even grass clippings and branches can accumulate and plug channels. If your property is next to a ditch or creek, please do your part and keep the banks clear of brush and debris. The village has a creek maintenance program. Contact the Building Department at (708) 343-4000 to report downed trees and other major blockages.

• **Construction Requirements** – Always check with the Building Department before you alter, re-grade, or fill your property. A permit is needed to ensure that projects do not cause drainage problems on other properties.

• **Flood-Proofing** – There are several different ways to protect a building from flood damage – retrofitting (altering a building to eliminate or reduce flood damage) measures include:

- Elevation This involves raising the house so that the lowest floor is above the flood protection level.
- Relocation Moving a building out of the flood area is the surest way to protect it from a flood.
- Floodwalls They work to keep water from reaching your home by constructing barriers out of fill or concrete between the building and the flood water.
- Dry Flood-Proofing Makes the building walls and floor watertight so water does not enter.
- Wet Flood-Proofing Modifies the structure and relocates the contents so that when flood water enters the building there is little or no damage.

Important notice: Any alteration to a building or land requires a permit from the Building Department. Even re-grading or filling in the floodplain requires a permit.

#### **Flood Protection Assistance**

If you have concerns or issues with flooding or drainage concerns call the Village of Melrose Park Sewer Department (708) 531-5347 or the plumbing inspector (708) 343-4000. We will provide you with information, make inspections, give professional opinions, and guide you through the proper steps to help resolve your issue, without negatively affecting your neighbors.

You can also call the Building Department (708) 343-4000. We may be able to provide information to help people find and deal with flood-proofing contractors.

#### **Sand Bags**

During a rain/flood event, sandbags are available for pickup at the Melrose Public Works Department located at 1002 N. 27th Ave.

The Public Works Department also drops off sandbags throughout the hardest hit flood areas.

#### **Flood Event Suggestions**

Please keep in mind, during a flood the less water pumped into the village's storm sewer system the better. Please avoid excessive water use such as washing clothes, showering, washing dishes and toilet flushing. This provides time for the sewer system to stabilize and catch up to the large influx of water, thus, lowering the probability of a sewer backup in a building.

#### **Be Prepared!**

Have your plumber inspect your sump pumps regularly!

If you experience flooding or drainage issues on your property, village staff may be able to assist you.

Televise and clean sewer laterals (the part of the sewer going from your house to the street) to prevent sewer backups.

#### Leaf Removal, Street Sweeping, Storm Sewers and Swales

Leaves should be placed in approved containers and placed at the curb on the day of each residents scheduled garbage pickup for removal.

Mulching leaves by way of mowing them into small pieces is an excellent alternative to manual raking. Mulching of leaves during the fall also provides needed nutrients back into the turf grass plant for the next season's growing needs.

The Public Works Department needs your help in collecting leaves. The village has many streets with curb storm sewer catch basins, culverts and storm sewer pipes that are prone to trouble in rains when they are blocked by leaves and grass clippings. The street sweeper that the village owns is not effective in removing large quantities of leaves from the village's streets and curbed areas. When the streets are wet or wet leaves have been allowed to collect in great quantities during the fall, the street sweeper is ineffective in their removal as well. The street sweeper the village operates is intended to remove road debris such as gravel, dirt and trash from the road surface by way of water and scrubbing brushes.

Public Works asks that each resident do their part in keeping the storm sewer grate, culvert pipe or swale in front of there residence free of leaves during the fall. This will greatly decrease the need for storm sewer cleaning as well as eliminating street and inlet flooding due to leaves clogging the designed drainage path.

## **NOAA Weather (Radio All Hazards)**

NOAA Weather Radio All Hazards (NWR) is a nationwide network of radio stations broadcasting continuous weather information from the nearest

National Weather Service office. NWR broadcasts official warnings, watches, forecasts and other hazard information 24 hours



a day, seven days a week.

Working with the Federal Communication Commission's Emergency Alert System, NWR is an all hazards radio network, making it your single source for comprehensive weather and emergency information.

In conjunction with emergency managers and other public officials, NWR broadcasts warning and post-event information for all types of hazards including natural events such as earthquakes and avalanches, environmental accidents such as chemical releases or oil spills, and public safety issues such as a child abduction or 911 telephone outage. Research NWR Specific Area Message Encoding (SAME) for Event Codes Known as the "Voice of NOAA's National Weather Service." NWR is provided as a public service by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, part of the Department of Commerce. NWR numbers 1000 transmitters, covering all 50 states, adjacent coastal waters, Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands, and the U.S. Pacific Territories. NWR requires a special radio receiver or scanner capable of picking up the signal. Broadcasts are found in the VHF public service band at these seven frequencies (MHz) listed below.

NWS suggests listeners change the batteries in their receivers in the spring and fall when Daylight Savings Time begins and ends.

#### Public Alert<sup>™</sup> Devices and NWR All Hazards Logo

We cannot recommend one brand of receiver over another, but we do recommend users look for receivers with the Public Alert and/or the NOAA Weather Radio (NWR) All Hazards logo. The Public Alert Standard (CEA-2009-A) was developed by the Consumer Electronics Association in conjunction with NWS. Devices carrying the Public Alert logo meet certain technical standards and come with many, if not all, of the features mentioned in this article. NWS has evaluated devices carrying the NOAA Weather Radio All Hazards logo for user friendliness and performance capabilities.



#### **Residential Grade Radios and Features**

Prices vary from \$20 and up, depending on the model. Many receivers have an alarm feature, but some may not. Among the more useful features in a receiver are:

• Tone alarm: NWS will send a 1050 Hz tone alarm before broadcasting most warnings and many watch messages. The alarm will activate all the receivers equipped to receive it, even if the audio is turned off. This is especially useful for warnings during the night. (Public Alert<sup>™</sup> – required)

 SAME technology: SAME, or Specific Alert Message Encoding allows you to specify the particular area for which you wish to receive alerts. Most warnings and watches broadcast over NOAA Weather Radio are county-based or independent city-based (parish-based in Louisiana), although in a few areas of the country the alerts are issued for portions of counties. Since most NWR transmitters are broadcasting for a number of counties, SAME receivers will respond only to alerts issued for the area (or areas) you have selected. This minimizes the number of "false alarms" for events which might be a few counties away from where you live. (Public Alert<sup>™</sup> – required)

• Selectable alerting of events: While SAME allows you to specify a particular area of interest, some receivers allow you to turn off alarms for certain events which might not be important to you. For example, if you live in a coastal county, but not right at the beach, you might not care about Coastal Flood Warnings. This feature may also be called "Event Blocking" or "Defeat Siren." (Public Alert™ – optional)

• Battery backup: Since power outages often occur during storms, having a receiver with battery backup can be crucial. However, unless you have a portable unit which you will use away from other power sources, an AC power connection is recommended to preserve battery life. (Public Alert ™ – required for radios, optional for other devices.)

• External antenna jack: While most receivers come with a whip antenna you usually can extend to improve reception, depending on your location you also may need an external antenna. Some receivers come with an external antenna jack so you can connect to a larger antenna indoors or outdoors. You can often buy these antennas where you bought your receiver or from most stores with an electronics department. NWR broadcasts are in the Public Service VHF frequencies, just above FM radio and between the current TV channels 6 and 7. An antenna designed for analog VHF televisions or FM radios should work.

# Melrose Park Keeps Citizens Safe with Updated Everbridge Citizen Alerts System

## **Citizens and Businesses Can Sign Up to Receive Critical Alerts During Emergencies**

The village of Melrose Park is using our newly Updated Citizen Alerts System from Everbridge the leading emergency notification system provider, to communicate with thousands of businesses and residents in minutes in an emergency.

The village is able to alert residents about severe weather, fires, floods, toxic environmental issues and other emergencies using Everbridge. Messages can be sent to residents on any communication path desired – cell phone, home phone, email, text messaging, fax, pager, PDA and more – ensuring that residents and village staff receive life-saving emergency information and important public service announcements in minutes. Citizens listed in the village's 9-1-1 database have been automatically subscribed to alerts by phone, though all citizens should self-register, to provide additional contact information and chose the alerts they would like to receive. In addition, the village plans to use the Everbridge system to notify residents about other important activities, such as weather emergencies, road closures and water utility maintenance.

Fires. Road closures. Gas leaks. How will you find out about citywide emergencies and disasters? Your safety is our top concern. Early warning helps save lives and property. That's why Melrose Park wants to make sure you know about emergencies, severe weather and disasters as they happen.

The village of Melrose Park will use the New Everbridge SmartGIS System With Severe Weather Alerts to let you know about issues that may affect your safety. The Everbridge system will allow the village of Melrose Park to contact thousands of residents in seconds so you find out about an emergency right away.

**Receive important messages from the village on your phone, email and more.** Everbridge SmartGIS System can deliver messages to you any way you want – on your home phone, cell phone, email and more. This way, we can reach you in any emergency. We may also use the system in non-emergency situations to let you know about weather alerts, important village-related events, such as meetings, parade closures or street cleaning changes.

How does it work? The process begins when the village or National Weather Service issues an alert or message about a potential safety hazard or concern. Messages will be sent to all standard voice and text communication devices, including listed land line phones, cell phones, email, and more. If you don't confirm receipt of the message, the system will try to reach your second contact number or email. The system will continue trying to contact you until it receives a confirmation from you.

What is Everbridge? Everbridge is a mass notification system which will notify you of severe weather or other emergency situations in your area.

What areas are covered? Everbridge allows you to choose multiple locations such as your home, work or child's school.

How will I be notified? You can choose to be notified by text, email phone call or all of them.

Your help by is critical. The success of this service relies on YOU.

Having your latest contact information is the only way to ensure that we can contact you in an emergency. Please update your contact information as soon as possible. Updating is easy and only takes a few minutes, just go to our village website at www.melrosepark.org and click on the link.

# Melrose Park Resident Fulfilling His Lifelong Dream

Marvin Gomez, a recent graduate from Lewis University and member of the National Association Hispanic Journalist Chicago chapter left Entravision WVEN-TV Univision in Orlando to join AccuWeather's Global Headquarters as a bilingual weather broadcaster this year.

Soon after graduating, Gomez joined Univision Orlando as a news reporter. Gomez was also in charge of the weather segment for 2017's hurricane season, including Hurricane Irma, Maria and the Tropical Storm Emily.

"Tornado warnings were issued as Irma's devastating eye approached Central Florida. Nothing is more gratifying and rewarding than knowing you're saving someone's life by telling them to take cover" said Gomez as he recalls over eight hours of live hurricane coverage for Orlando and Tampa, Fla.

As a bilingual weather broadcaster for AccuWeather, Gomez will work at their Global Headquarters in State College, Pa., and he will be responsible for creating on-air weather presentations for multiple cities around the United States, Mexico, South America and the Caribbean.

"We feel it is an important company initiative to employ weather broadcasters who fluently speak the language. The business is growing and AccuWeather is expanding its staff to match the growth," said Thomas R. Loebig, the vice president of Digital Media Content and Operations for AccuWeather.

Founded in 1962, AccuWeather provides written and video content in various languages and around the world.

"It is a dream come true to work with a team of highly talented meteorologist and professionals at AccuWeather," said Gomez, a Guatemala native. "I am grateful with those who have positively made attributions to my career, especially my NAHJ family in Chicago who has supported my journey in media from the very beginning since I was a student at Lewis University."

After arriving from Guatemala at the age of 9, Gomez learned English as his second language while living in Melrose Park. He attended Stevenson Elementary School and Proviso Mathematics and Science Academy. He was a recipient of the Hispanofest Scholarship. He graduated with a BA in mass communications in 2016. # Triton College

## Collaboration is Key in Triton's New iLaunch Math Readiness Program

An innovative new program at Triton College is addressing the issue of col-

lege readiness in the subject that incoming students struggle with more than any other – mathematics. Triton College's iLaunch Lab opened at the start of the spring 2018 semester, allowing students who place into developmental math courses to move away from the traditional lecturebased classroom and



into a collaborative learning environment.

Instructors and tutors are available in the iLaunch Lab to provide one-onone help to students, helping them to master specific topics. This program will prepare students to accelerate quickly into higher level math courses at multiple points during the semester. That means they'll be ready for credit courses sooner, saving them time and money in the process.

The lab, located in the M Building on the west side of Triton's campus, features a comfortable and attractive environment that allows students to collaborate with one another as well as instructors while they learn.

The technology utilized is central to the program, containing diagnostic features that allow for individualized teaching and learning. Instructors are able to assess the progress of each student in real time and tailor assistance based on their strengths, weaknesses, needs and goals.

In addition to helping students improve the math skills required to succeed in college-level courses, the iLaunch Lab setting also allows instructors to help prepare students for academic success in other ways, including providing a lot of non-cognitive skills training, which is the hallmark of this program, discussions regarding what a work ethic is for a college student and study habits as well as career goals.

The iLaunch Program was created thanks to institutional support and a \$1 million grant from the U.S. Department of Education. The grant is designed to allow Hispanic-serving institutions to provide extensive academic support, particularly in mathematics, to Hispanic and low-income students that major in STEM fields of study.

The funds are part of a \$5.6 million multi-year grant received in partnership with Northeastern Illinois University to form the Exit on Time in STEM Project. The partnership between Triton and NEIU includes an articulation process that aligns introductory courses taught at both campuses that will be replicable across Northeastern's appropriate STEM majors. The project is expected to increase the number of Hispanic and low-income students who transfer into STEM fields of study and increase completion rates.
