The new overpass promises residents the benefit of economic development, quicker emergency vehicle response times and safer traffic flow. - 6) The long Christmas shopping season tradition began in America when relatives were encouraged to mail gifts early to soldiers posted overseas in World War II.
- 7) Contrary to popular belief, the Friday and Saturday before Christmas are the busiest shopping days of the year, not the Friday after Thanksgiving.
- 8) At \$285 million, *Home Alone* is the number one grossing Christmas movie of all time.
- 9) To visit every child on Christmas Eve, Santa would have to travel at 3000 times the speed of sound, visiting over 800 homes per second!

A Message for **Melrose Park Residents** from Nicor Gas

Melrose Park is one of 656 communities served by Nicor and we value your partnership and cooperation in ensuring the safety and security of our

customers and employees While it is often Nicor Gas easy to identify Nicor Gas workers at a construction or work site, you may also see meter

readers, leak surveyors and other employees in your neighborhood as part of their normal course of business.

During the month of December, Nicor Gas meter readers will be in your area visiting homes or businesses to inspect natural gas meters and obtain accurate readings of natural gas used for billing purposes.

This manual meter reading practice ensures customers are paying for the actual amount of natural gas used. If we are unable to read the meter, we may leave a note on a customer's door to schedule a reading at a later date.

Unfortunately, there is concern that scammers are impersonating meter readers and using this as a way to gain entry into customer homes and businesses. Whenever a Nicor Gas employee or contractor visits a customer's home or business, they will provide Nicor Gas identification. With utility scams on the rise, customer's personal safety and financial security are important to us. 
Winter Safety Tips

Please follow these guidelines for a safe winter season:

- 1. Have your heating system checked by authorized service personnel annually.
- 2. Change your furnace filter regularly.
- 3. Keep areas around the furnace and hot water heater clear at all times.
- 4. Do not use space heaters with frayed or damaged cords or plugs. Keep space heaters at least 12 inches away from walls, furniture, clothing or flammable items.
- 5. Do not leave the clothes dryer on when going to bed or when leaving the house.
- 6. Install smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. Change the batteries when you change your clocks during spring and autumn.
- 7. When going outside, wear layered clothing and keep skin covered to avoid frostbite and hypothermia.
- 8. Keep walkways and steps clear of ice and snow.
- 9. Keep cell phones charged so they will be functioning in case of emergencies.
- 10. Keep your car's gas tank full, make certain tires are in good condition and perform other automobile maintenance to avoid being involved in an accident or becoming stranded.
- 11. Stock your vehicle(s) with these items in case you do become stranded:
 - a. Non-perishable snacks.
 - b. Water.
 - c. A flashlight and extra batteries.
 - d. A shovel.
 - e. Blankets or extra winter clothing.
- 12. Stock up on non-perishable groceries and other staples in order to avoid frequent shopping trips across snow-covered or icy roads.
- 13. Check on neighbors especially the elderly or infirmed.

Buried Fire Hydrants Can Pose Danger

Living in the Chicago Metropolitan area, we always expect a snowy winter. However, residents never know for certain how much snow will blanket the area. Hopefully, this winter will not result in the massive snowfall we experienced last year. Melrose Park residents know only too well the obvious difficulties and hazards that accompany a hard winter. However, many do not realize the dangers and difficulties that can result when fire hydrants are buried in snow. Such conditions make it difficult, if not impossible, for firefighters to locate and uncover hydrants in their efforts to extinguish fires. Fire Chief Rick Beltrame hopes that residents will help firefighters by clearing nearby fire hydrants when they shovel or plow their sidewalks and driveways. The cooperation of all neighbors will go a long way toward keeping Melrose Park's residents safe this winter.

Village of Melrose Park Dial A Ride for Residents

The Village of Melrose Park Dial a Ride Program was initiated in 2000 to provide residents of our community with a new transportation resource to any location in the Melrose Park boundaries. Residents are encouraged to use the program to do their everyday needs such as grocery shopping, doctor appointments, etc. We are also handicapped accessible.

This service is available to residents Monday thru Friday from 8:15 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. To make a reservation, please call (708) 343-7047. You can make appointments from the hours of 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday thru Friday. We are closed on Saturdays and Sundays and all major holidays. To book an appointment or make a cancellation, you must call at least 24 hours in advance.

Policies and Procedures

Only one reservation per rider per day. NO EXCEPTIONS! Only two appointments a week can be made for miscellaneous use such as grocery shopping etc. Anyone using the van for doctor appointments, etc., may use the van up to three times a week.

You must stay at your destination you are going to for a minimum of an hour. Any residents of Victory Centre MUST go with the group provided at their center for grocery shopping, etc. Any doctor appointment can be made with us.

Only three shopping bags per rider. Forgotten items in the van will be returned at the next pickup date. Please note that our service is getting more popular every day so we will try to accommodate your needs to the best of our ability.

HOLIDAY SAFETY TIPS

The holidays are a special time of the year. Unfortunately, many people forget to be careful about their property and personal safety, leaving them especially vulnerable to theft and other crime. The Melrose Park Police Department provides tips to help keep your holiday safe:

SHOP SAFELY:

- Avoid carrying large amounts of cash; instead pay with credit cards or a check.
- Watch your credit card during transaction to make sure it is used to print only one transaction. Make sure the cashier returns it to you.
- Keep your wallet in your front pants pocket or coat breast pocket.
- Keep purses close to your body, in front of you where it can be seen, and cover the clasp or flap with your hand. Keep the purse closed, snapped or zippered until you need to enter it.
- Never flaunt your money, expensive jewelry or clothing.
- Walk confidently and be alert. Be especially mindful of pickpockets in crowded areas such as stores, bus stops or trains.
- Never overload yourself with packages; being overburdened may make it difficult for you to keep track of your purse or wallet or to respond to a personal threat.
- Park in a well-lit space and always lock your doors and windows.
- Hide shopping bags and gifts in the trunk.
- Never leave children or pets unattended in your vehicle for any length of time while shopping.
- Teach children that if they get separated from you, they should go to a security officer or store clerk and say they are lost.
- Tell them NEVER to leave the store or go to the parking lot to look for you.

WATCH OUT FOR CON GAMES AND FRAUDS:

- Give only to charities that are familiar to you.
- Ask to see official identification when someone asks for a donation on the street or at your home.
- Ask for written documentation on how your donation is going to be used and if it is tax deductible.
- Be suspicious of charities that only accept cash.
- Only make checks out to the organizations, not the individuals.
- Never give your credit card information over the telephone. For telemarketing solicitations, offer to mail your donation.

PROTECT YOUR HOME:

- Never display gifts where they can be seen from a window or doorway.
- Always lock doors, windows and garage doors when you leave the house, even if you will only be away a short time.
- Always ask for official identification when someone comes to your home asking for donations or claiming to be delivering a package. Never let anyone into the house who cannot provide this information.
- Call the Melrose Park Police at (708) 344-8409 and place your house on the Vacation Watch if you will be away for the holiday.

The Chicago Hispanic Community for Peace is a nonprofit organization that promotes




PARKING REGULATIONS HAVE CHANGED EFFECTIVE DECEMBER 1



Village of Melrose Park Construction Notice Construction Hours

No construction or alteration activities shall be carried on between the nighttime hours of 7 p.m. and 7 a.m. on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday or Friday. On Saturday, no construction or alteration activities shall be carried on between the nighttime hours of 5 p.m. and 8 a.m. On Sunday and federal holidays, no construction or alteration activities shall be carried on between the nighttime hours of 5 p.m. and 10 a.m. Construction and alteration activities on Sundays and federal holidays shall not be accompanied by loud or

annoying noises except in the case of an emergency. Emergency operations necessitating deviation from this section shall not be initiated until special permission is obtained from the director of Public Works. Construction or alteration activities with regard to public improvements and public service utilities, shall be exempt from this section.

Any person violating this section shall be fined not less that fifty dollars (\$50), nor more than seven hundred fifty dollars (\$750), for each offense, and each day's violation of the same shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

A Note to All Melrose Park Residents Regarding Property Flood Protection, Flood Insurance, Village Assistance

As of Oct. 1, 2015, the Village of Melrose Park has earned a Class 8 Rating through the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) Community Rating System (CRS); for this reason, flood insurance policies issued or

renewed in the Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA) qualify for a 10 percent discount off the premium cost.

Flood Protection Information

The Village of Melrose Park strongly encourages these flood protection tips to be used:

• Stream Maintenance – Per the Clean Water Act and village ordinance, dumping into our ditches, creeks and sewers is strictly prohibited. This regulation helps prevent contamination to our water supply and lessens the chance of flooding. Grass clippings, leaves and branches can also cause problems as they can accumulate and plug the storm sewer channels. If your property is next to a ditch or creek, please do your part and keep the banks clear of brush and debris. Please feel free to contact the Public Works Department for information regarding the Village's Creek Maintenance Program or reporting downed tree and other major blockages.

• Construction Requirements – Always check with the Building Department before you alter, re-grade or fill your property. A permit is needed to ensure that projects do not cause drainage problems to other properties and to ensure the general public welfare.

• Flood-Proofing – There are several different ways to protect a building from flood damage – retrofitting (altering a building to eliminate or reduce flood damage) measures include:

- Elevations This involves raising the house so that the lowest floor is above protection level.
- Relocation Moving a building out of the flood zone is the surest way to protect it from a flood.
- Floodwalls These work to keep water from reaching your home by constructing barriers out of fill or concrete between the building and the flood water.
- Dry Flood-Proofing Makes the building's walls and floors watertight so water does not enter.
- Wet Flood-Proofing Modifies the structure and relocates the contents so that when flood water enters the building there is little to no damage.

Important notice: Any alteration to a building or land requires a permit from the Building Department. Even re-grading or filling in the floodplain requires a permit.

Flood Protection Assistance

If you have any concerns or issues with flooding or drainage, please call the Village of Melrose Park Sewer Department at (708) 531-5347 or the Building Department at (708) 343-4000. The Building Department can provide information, professional input and problem-solving measures without negatively affecting nearby neighbors. The Building Department can also provide a list of flood proofing contractors and conduct inspections.

Sand Bags

During a rainstorm or flood, sand bags are readily available for pickup at the Melrose Park Public Works Building located at 1002 N. 27th Ave. The Public Works Department also drops off sand bags throughout the village's high impact flood areas.

Flood Event Suggestions

Please keep in mind, during a flood the less water pumped into the village's storm sewer system the better. Please avoid excessive water use such as washing clothes, showering, washing dishes and toilet flushing. This provides time for the sewer system to stabilize and catch up to the large influx of water, thus, lowering the probability of a sewer backup in a building.

Be Prepared!

Have a plumber inspect sump pumps regularly!

If you experience flooding or drainage issues on your property, the village's staff may be able to help. Remember to televise and clean sewer laterals to prevent sewer backups.

Leaf Removal, Street Sweeping, Storm Sewers and Swales

It is a violation of village code and the Clean Water Act to directly or indirectly discharge illicit substances into a storm sewer. The village strongly encourages that all grass clippings, leaves and yard waste be placed in approved containers and placed at the designated location for garbage pickup on scheduled pickup days.

Community Effort

The Public Works Department kindly requests your help. Throughout the village's corporate boundaries there are many streets with curbside storm sewer catch basins, culverts and storm sewer pipes that are prone to trouble in heavy rains when they are blocked by leaves and grass clippings. The village street sweeping vehicle is not effective in removing large quantities of wet or dry leaves off the streets and curbed areas. The street sweeper's intended use is to remove road debris such as gravel, dirt and trash from the road surface by way of water and scrubbing brushes.

The Public Works Department respectfully asks that every village resident do their part in keeping our storm sewer grates, culvert pipe and swales in front of their property free from leaves and debris throughout the year. By doing this, this will greatly diminish the need for storm sewer cleanups, as well as, eliminating street inlet flooding due to leaves clogging the designed drainage path.

Flood Insurance

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Homeowner's insurance policies do not cover damage from floods. The village strongly encourages property owners to invest in flood insurance. This insurance is backed by the federal government and is available to everyone, even properties that have been flooded. In some cases, flood insurance is required by a bank when people purchase a property and get a mortgage or home improvement loan. These policies typically only cover the building's structure and not its contents. During the types of flooding that occur in your area, there is usually more damage to the furniture and personal items than there is to the structure. Be sure you have contents coverage! Don't wait for the next flood to buy insurance protection! In most cases, there is a 30-day waiting period before NFIP coverage takes effect. Contact your insurance agent for more information on rates and coverage.

Winter Storms... The Deceptive Killers

Winter storms can range from a moderate snow over a few hours to a blizzard with blinding, wind-driven snow that lasts for several days. Some winter storms are large enough to affect several states, while others affect only a single community. Many winter storms are accompanied by dangerously low temperatures and sometimes by strong winds, icing, sleet and freezing rain.

Regardless of the severity of a winter storm, you should be prepared in order to remain safe during these events.

Know the Difference

Winter Storm Outlook – Winter storm conditions are possible in the next two to five days.

Winter Weather Advisory – Winter weather conditions are expected to cause significant inconveniences and may be hazardous. When caution is used, these situations should not be life threatening.
Winter Storm Watch – Winter storm conditions are possible within the next 36 to 48 hours. People in a watch area should review their winter storm plans and stay informed about weather conditions.
Winter Storm Warning – Life-threatening, severe winter conditions have begun or will begin within 24 hours. People in a warning area should take precautions immediately.

How to Prepare for a Winter Storm

- Winterize your vehicle and keep the gas tank full. A full tank will keep the fuel line from freezing.
- Insulate your home by installing storm windows or covering windows with plastic from the inside to keep cold air out.
- Maintain heating equipment and chimneys by having them cleaned and inspected every year.
 - If you will be going away during cold weather, leave the heat on in your home, set to a temperature no lower than 55° F.

Put Together a Supply Kit

- Water at least a three-day supply; one gallon per person per day.
- Food at least a three-day supply of non-perishable, easy-to-prepare food.
- Flashlight.
- Battery-powered or hand-crank radio (NOAA Weather Radio, if possible).
- Extra batteries.
- First aid kit.
- Medications (seven-day supply) and medical items (hearing aids with extra batteries, glasses, contact lenses, syringes, etc.).
- Multipurpose tool.
- Sanitation and personal hygiene items.
- Copies of personal documents (medication list and pertinent medical information, proof of address, deed/lease to home, passports, birth certificates, insurance policies).
- Cell phone with chargers.
- Family and emergency contact information.
- Extra cash.
- Baby supplies (bottles, formula, baby food, diapers).
- Pet supplies (collar, leash, ID, food, carrier, bowl).
- Tools/supplies for securing your home.
- Sand, rock salt or non-clumping kitty litter to make walkways and steps less slippery.
- Warm coats, gloves or mittens, hats, boots, and extra blankets and warm clothing for all household members.
- Ample alternate heating methods such as fireplaces or wood- or coal-burning stoves.

Winter's Impact Storms with Strong Winds

Sometimes winter storms are accompanied by strong winds creating blizzard conditions with blinding wind-driven snow, severe drifting and dangerous wind chill. Strong winds with these intense storms and cold fronts can knock down trees, utility poles and power lines. Storms near the coast can cause coastal flooding and beach erosion as well as sink ships at sea. In the west and Alaska, winds descending off the mountains can gust to 100 mph or more damaging roofs and other structures.

Extreme Cold

Extreme cold often accompanies a winter storm or is left in its wake. Prolonged exposure to the cold can cause frostbite or hypothermia and become life-threatening. Infants and elderly people are most susceptible. What constitutes extreme cold and its effect varies across different areas of the United States. In areas unaccustomed to winter weather, near freezing temperatures are considered "extreme cold." Freezing temperatures can cause severe damage to citrus fruit crops and other vegetation. Pipes may freeze and burst in homes that are poorly insulated or without heat. In the north, below zero temperatures may be considered as "extreme cold." Long cold spells can cause rivers to freeze, disrupting shipping. Ice jams may form and lead to flooding.

Ice Storms

Heavy accumulations of ice can bring down trees, electrical wires, telephone poles and lines, and communication towers. Communications and power can be disrupted for days while utility companies work to repair the extensive damage. Even small accumulations of ice may cause extreme hazards to motorists and pedestrians.

Heavy Snow Storms

Heavy snow can immobilize a region and paralyze a city, stranding commuters, stopping the flow of supplies and disrupting emergency and medical services. Accumulations of snow can collapse buildings and knock down trees and power lines. In rural areas, homes and farms may be isolated for days, and unprotected livestock may be lost. In the mountains, heavy snow can lead to avalanches. The cost of snow removal, repairing damages and loss of business can have large economic impacts on cities and towns.

Winter Precipitation

Snow

- FLURRIES Light snow falling for short durations. No accumulation or light dusting is all that is expected.
- SHOWERS Snow falling at varying intensities for brief periods of time. Some accumulation is possible.
- SQUALLS Brief, intense snow showers accompanied by strong, gusty winds. Accumulation may be significant. Snow squalls are best known in the Great Lakes region.
- BLOWING SNOW Wind-driven snow that reduces visibility and causes significant drifting. Blowing snow may be snow that is falling and/or loose snow on the ground picked up by the wind.
- BLIZZARD Winds over 35 mph with snow and blowing snow reducing visibility to near zero.

Sleet

Raindrops that freeze into ice pellets before reaching the ground. Sleet usually bounces when hitting a surface and does not stick to objects. However, it can accumulate like snow and cause a hazard to motorists.

Freezing Rain

Rain that falls onto a surface with a temperature below freezing. This causes it to freeze to surfaces, such as trees, cars, and roads, forming a coating or glaze of ice. Even small accumulations of ice can cause a significant hazard.

Cold Air


Below freezing temperatures in the clouds and near the ground are necessary to make snow and/or ice.

Moisture

To form clouds and precipitation. Air blowing across a body of water, such as a large lake or the ocean, is an excellent source of moisture.

Lift

something to raise the moist air to form the clouds and cause precipitation. An example of lift is warm air colliding with cold air and being forced to rise over the cold dome. The boundary between the warm and cold air masses is called a front. Another example of lift is air flowing up a mountain side.

A Message from Kathleen Willis Illinois State Representative • 77th District Willis Stands Up for Disabled Residents Who Rely on Home Care

To ensure home care recipients are receiving the quality services they deserve, state Rep. Kathleen Willis, D-Addison, supported legislation that

would give them the ability to select their providers. "Home care allows seniors and disabled residents to comfortably live in their homes and remain members of their communities," said Willis. "These vital services are critical to the health and wellbeing of our most vulnerable and our home care system should be conducive to their needs."



The Willis-backed Senate Bill 261 is an effort by the Service Employees International Union (SEIU) to allow home care recipients the ability to select who they want as their home care provider. The

measure would also allow recipients to determine the schedule of their providers to reflect their specific needs. Earlier this year the Governor's Office set in place a policy that limited the services of home care providers with a 40 hour a week cap. If passed into law, Senate Bill 261 would take effect Jan. 1, 2017. The bill recently passed out of the General Assembly and is awaiting the governor's approval.

"Those who are disabled rely on home care services for some of their most basic needs and they should have a voice in who they want as providers," said Willis. "The health of our most vulnerable depends on quality home care services and our policies should allow accessibility to those services, not limit them."





When Ross Gillogly of San Diego, Calif., got a phone call from Lincoln Tech thanking him for the gift from his late mother's estate, he was initially surprised. "I didn't know much about Lincoln and I didn't know she'd left something to the school," he says. But it quickly made sense. "My brother and I were always working on cars, rebuilding and maintaining them. My mother allowed us full reign in our garage –

she could attest to our love for cars, plus the messes we made. She rarely complained, though!"

Ross, his brother Bruce and their mother Irene – an adventurous local legend who once provided manicure services to Al Capone, flew under the piloting of the Wright Brothers and sang with Lawrence Welk's orchestra – lived in the Chicago suburb of Melrose Park for many years. Eventually Ross and Bruce moved out of state (Ross to California and Bruce to Michigan, where he worked at General Motors until his passing), but Irene became a lifelong resident. When she passed away in early 2016 at the incredible age of 105, she left a generous financial gift to Lincoln Tech to support young men and women with the same love for cars as her sons and late husband.

With the \$10,000 left to the school, Irene's legacy will allow more students to pursue automotive technology careers who might not have been able to otherwise.

"It's a wonderful feeling, knowing that students who might be

financially strapped can now come to Lincoln Tech and train to work on cars," Ross says. "I hope it shows them that there are opportunities to get ahead, to build skills and find jobs in a field they really enjoy."

Campus Event Celebrates Irene's Life and Spotlights Students

On Oct. 12 – what would have been Irene's 106th birthday – the campus held a ceremony to honor Irene Gillogly and to award scholarships in her name to nine deserving students. Ross was part of the panel who interviewed finalists for the awards in his mother's name and Melrose Park graduate John Fakhoury was also a member of the panel.

One of the recipients was automotive technology student John Smith. "Being a veteran the last 13 years, hopelessness had been a way of life," John says. "But being awarded the Gillogly Scholarship has really made a positive impact on my life."

Ross enjoyed getting to see the Melrose Park campus up close. "I loved it," he says. "It was more than I expected – very clean, very professional and everyone there – students, faculty, staff – treated one another like family."

While on campus, Ross was able to meet students and instructors and relate his own stories about growing up in a house where the garage became a favorite hangout for the brothers and their friends. "I remember we bought three wrecked 'Vettes and rebuilt them into one complete car between 1961-62," he says. "We rebuilt more than a few Chevys and Oldsmobiles, too – we were GM enthusiasts."

Ross, Bruce and their friends not only rebuilt cars – they raced them, too. As for the hands-on work in the garage, Ross says his mother always supported her sons' passion for auto mechanics and technology. "I believe she realized it kept us busy and out of trouble," he says.

Then he pauses before adding with a laugh, "Well, most trouble."

The Lincoln Tech family thanks the late Irene Gillogly for her gift to the Melrose Park campus, and we are especially grateful to Ross for sharing his mother's story with our school and our students!

PCC Community Wellness Center Provides Uninsured Women with Access to Free Screening and Diagnostic Tests for Breast and Cervical Cancer

PCC Community Wellness Center (PCC), a lead agency for the Illinois Breast and Cervical Cancer Program (IBCCP) by the state of Illinois is continuing to provide access to free screening and diagnostic tests for breast and cervical cancer to eligible patients at all PCC locations.

PCC was pleased to receive another year of IBCCP funding from the Illinois Department of Public Health in the amount of \$205,177. Funds will support free mammograms, pelvic exams, and cervical cancer screenings for uninsured women who qualify for the program.

"This is a lifesaving program for our community because it provides free screening

services to uninsured women who may not have access to these services," said Fernando Salgado, manager of PCC's IBCCP Program.

The IBCCP Program made Illinois the first state in the nation to provide access for screening or diagnostic tests for breast and cervical cancer to all uninsured women. Uninsured women between the ages of 40 and 64 qualify for mammograms and breast exams, and uninsured women between 35 and 64 qualify for pelvic exams and Pap tests. On a case-by-case basis, younger, symptomatic women who meet the guidelines are considered for the program and could receive screenings free of charge. Mammography services will be referred to the Center for Breast Care, located in River Forest.

Patients who are enrolled in IBCCP are never expected to pay a co-pay when they are seen for an IBCCP visit. When eligible, they are also enrolled in the sliding scale in order to receive any non-IBCCP services at a discounted price.



Early Morning Indoor Walking Space at St. Paul Lutheran Church

Earlier this year, St. Paul Lutheran Church, 1025 Lake St., in Melrose Park, received a grant from Westlake Hospital Foundation focused on church and community health and wellness for Proviso Township. St Paul engaged Mark

Schoepp, recently retired from Wheat Ridge Ministries and a health and wellness educator, to administer the grant. Mark began work on Aug. 1, 2016.

Prior to engaging Mark Schoepp, the congregation had done a health needs survey among its members and the results matched closely what other health organizations in the area have identified as critical areas – exercise, heart health, general nutrition, diet and weight loss, and diabetes. Other issues that surfaced were Alzheimer's disease and dementia, depression, caring for aging parents and single parenting.

The need identified highest on the needs survey was 'exercise' so Mark initiated a "Walk Proviso" program for eight weeks. We tallied the daily and weekly totals of people who joined the challenge and encouraged both current exercisers and those who were not yet regular to join the challenge. A total of 51 people joined for a total of 1038 miles per week. We closed the eight weeks with a 'Celebration of Exercise' on Oct. 30 and had Karen Sue Murdy in as a special speaker. Karen is a professional certified exercise physiologist who encouraged us in our ongoing exercise and walking with research proven tips and suggestions. We hope to repeat the challenge in the spring and to extend the challenge to the wider community.

In order to keep the exercise momentum going, St. Paul opens their doors early Monday through Friday, from 6-8 a.m., for anyone who does not have a good place to walk indoors during the winter. There are other good, very inexpensive indoor walking options starting at 8 a.m. (Veterans Park District building on 17th Avenue in Melrose Park), but Mark wanted to give an earlier morning free option for those who wanted to exercise before work.

Early morning walking at St. Paul Lutheran, 1025 Lake St., Melrose Park:

- Now through March 31, 2017.
- 6-8 a.m., Monday-Friday.
- Enter and sign in by the main doors to the church facing Lake Street.
- Anyone can come and walk.
- Please bring different shoes than you wear outside.
- The 'track' will be in the main sanctuary/worship space 12.5 laps equals 1 mile.
- Come and join us!

Mark will be leading various classes in the Proviso Township area as well.

- He is scheduled for two classes at the Bellwood Library. One is on Wednesday, Jan. 4, 6:30-7:30 p.m., focused on what brain research tells us about staying healthy, and how exercise and diet can both boost academic performance and reduce negative behaviors. The second is on Wednesday, Feb. 1, 6:30-7:30 p.m., focused on "The Importance of Play" for staying healthy and performing well academically.
- He is the scheduled speaker at Lincoln School (Chicago and Ninth avenues, Maywood) for the "Coffee with the Principal" event on Thursday Feb. 16, at 9 a.m.
- Mark continues to negotiate with other libraries, schools and organizations for speaking engagements.


