# A Message From Mayor Ronald M. Serpico

## Election Day is the One Day Where Every Citizen Has an Equal Say ... On This Day, We are One in the Same!

Dear Neighbors,

The ballot box does not discriminate. Election Day is the one day where every citizen has an equal say, whether smart or uneducated, poor or rich, liberal or conservative, well-dressed or barefoot, CEO or assembly line worker. On this one day, we are one in the same.

Many people ask, what difference does one vote make? In 2000, Al Gore narrowly lost the Electoral College vote to George W. Bush. The final election outcome came down to a recount in Florida, where Bush eventually won by 537 votes out of nearly 6 million votes cast. If one more Gore vote would have been cast in 600 of the 5,400 Florida polling locations or one less Bush vote cast, Al Gore would have been elected president.

In 1960, Richard Nixon, not John F. Kennedy, would have become president if one additional person from each precinct had voted for Nixon. In 2008, an Alaskan congressional race was decided by a single vote out of 10,035 cast. In 1982, the Illinois governor's race between Jim Thompson and Adlai Stevenson was decided by less than one vote per precinct. All in all, the past elections where one vote could have made a difference is too numerous to list here.

People say that voting doesn't change anything. My answer is, let us look at the history of the African American vote. In 1870, the 15th Amendment to the Constitution gave African American males the right to vote. However, in the decades that followed, many states used poll taxes and literacy tests to deliberately reduce the African American vote. This lack of voting power resulted in American states enforcing segregation through Jim Crow laws that forbade intermarriage and ordered business owners and public institutions, like schools, to keep blacks and whites separated.

Then in 1965 the Voting Rights Act was passed, which discouraged state and local officials from erecting barriers to inhibit voting. This act enabled African Americans to vote in large numbers, which in turn impacted the decision making of elected officials of all races. Although we still have a long way to go, the initial walls of discrimination began to crumble as the African American voting bloc grew.

Example two of how voting can be an impetus of change is the passage of the 19th Amendment that gave women the right to vote. Until enactment of the 19th Amendment, women had no power over public policy which resulted in state laws prohibiting women from owning and inheriting property, signing contracts, applying for credit, serving on juries and running for elective office. Job opportunities for women who worked outside the home were limited to low-paying menial jobs.

After women gained the right to vote, candidates began to cater to this vital voting bloc in an effort to get elected and women took advantage. With their new power, women were able to get laws passed that allowed them the right to inherit and own property, access to decent paying jobs, the military service, credit, female health care, favorable divorce laws and much more.

Over 1 million servicemen and servicewomen have died, thousands of civil rights advocates were beaten and many suffragettes were jailed in fighting for the right to vote. For their sacrifices, and more important, for your family's future, please vote on election day. To quote suffragette Susan B. Anthony, "Someone struggled for your right to vote. Use it."



# From the Desk of Chief Phil Schwartz Melrose Park Departments of Homeland Security — Public Safety

## A Mask is Like a Seatbelt, If You Don't Wear It, It Won't Work

To reduce the spread of COVID-19, the CDC recommends that people wear masks in public settings when around people outside of their household, especially when other social distancing measures are difficult to maintain. Masks should not be placed on young children under age 2, anyone who has trouble breathing or is unconscious, incapacitated or otherwise unable to remove the mask without assistance.

Limiting face-to-face contact with others is one of the best ways to reduce the spread of coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19). If you need to go

out, please stay at least 6 feet away from others. Practice social and physical distancing. Do not gather in groups. Stay out of crowded places and avoid mass gatherings. Please stay at least 6 feet (2 meters) from other people.

Cover your mouth and nose with a mask when around others. You could spread COVID-19 to others even if you do not feel sick. The mask is meant to protect other people in case you are infected. Continue to keep about 6 feet between yourself and



people in case you are infected. Continue to keep about 6 feet between yourself and others. A mask is not a substitute for social distancing.

#### **Practice Hand Hygiene**

- Before entering and after exiting stores or markets, use a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60 percent alcohol. Wash your hands often with soap and water. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-based hand rub.
- Wash your hands before touching your eyes, nose or mouth because that's how germs can enter our bodies. Wash your hands after you have been in a public place and touched an item or surface that may be frequently touched by other people, such as door handles, tables, gas pumps, shopping carts or electronic cashier registers/screens, etc.

#### Follow Five Steps to Wash Your Hands the Right Way

Washing your hands is easy, and it's one of the most effective ways to prevent the spread of germs. Clean hands can stop germs from spreading from one person to another and throughout an entire community – from your home and workplace to childcare facilities and hospitals.

- Follow these five steps every time:
  - 1. Wet your hands with clean, running water (warm or cold), turn off the tap and apply soap.
  - 2. Lather your hands by rubbing them together with the soap. Lather the backs of your hands, between your fingers and under your nails.
  - 3. Scrub your hands for at least 20 seconds. Need a timer? Hum the *Happy Birthday* song from beginning to end twice.
  - 4. Rinse your hands well under clean, running water.
  - 5. Dry your hands using a clean towel or air dry them.

#### Important Village of Melrose Park Notice Regarding Use of Face Masks ...

On April 27, the village board passed Ordinances 2317 and 2318, which require the use of face masks or other facial coverings at all village facilities and at essential businesses. Village employees and visitors will be required to wear face coverings while at village facilities. Essential businesses, such as grocery stores, pharmacies and gas stations, will also require all visitors and employees to wear masks or face coverings while on premises. Other social distancing practices, like maintaining a 6-foot distance between people at these locations, will also be required under the ordinances. The village board took these measures based on CDC recommendations as ways to slow the spread of COVID-19.

#### **Protect Yourself While You are Out**

- Wear a mask in public settings and when you are around people who don't live in your household, especially when social is distancing is difficult.
- When you do have to visit in person, go during hours when fewer people will be there (for example, early morning or late night).
- If you are at higher risk for severe illness, find out if stores have special hours for people at higher risk. If they do, try to shop during those hours.
- When shopping disinfect the shopping cart, use disinfecting wipes if available.
- Do not touch your eyes, nose or mouth with unwashed hands.
- Stay at least 6 feet away from others while shopping and in lines.
- Use marked entry or exit points and follow any directional signs or floor markings designed to keep people at least 6 feet apart.
- Only touch products that you plan to purchase, if possible.
- If possible, use touchless payment (pay without touching money, a card or a keypad). If you must handle money, a card, or use a keypad, use hand sanitizer right after paying.

# Melrose Park Fire Department Fall Safety Tips

Fall is a wonderful time of year with trees showing off their best colors while Halloween parties and harvest festivals add an air of celebration to the season. However, safety always is a concern.

Following these tips will help make the season a safe and enjoyable one.

• Keep space heaters away from curtains, other fabric furnishings and combustibles. Make certain the heaters are in well-ventilated areas and that cords are not frayed or damaged. Use only K-1

kerosene in a kerosene heater.

- Keep heaters on firm, stable surfaces where they will not be knocked over easily.
- Change furnace filters and keep boxes and debris away from the furnace and hot water heater.



- Do not leave the clothes dryer running when leaving the house or going to bed.
- Install smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. Change batteries every six months.
- Keep candles on a flat, stable surface and away from curtains, fabrics or paper. Make certain to extinguish candles before leaving the house or going to bed.
- Consider using artificial, battery-operated candles instead of real candles.
- Keep fireplaces and chimneys clean. Always use a protective screen for your fireplace and outdoor fire pits.
- Never leave children unattended around candles, fireplaces, fire pits, heaters, washers and dryers or furnaces.
- Make certain all door locks can be unlocked from the inside without a key.
- Have a fire evacuation plan for your family and designate a safe place to meet after evacuating.
- Have gutters cleared of leaves and debris. Clogged gutters can result in damage to the roof and spillage that causes slippery pavement.
- Clear fallen leaves. Fallen leaves that become wet can cause severe slip-and-fall injuries and auto accidents.

#### PROGRAM OVERVIEW

Pets are proven to reduce stress and anxiety, provide companionship, encourage daily exercise and give a sense of purpose to those caring for them making the human/animal bond more important than ever during these challenging times. This program's mission will be to ensure that pets and people can stay together and that financial hardship or lack of access to food or resources will not be the determining factor in people needing to make a decision to rehome their beloved pets.

Pet food and supply packages are available by request to those in need. Packages will include food and supplies for both pet and person! In addition to the care packages, Animal Care League will work with people in need of other support services (veterinary care, pet fees, grooming, training services, etc.) and offer subsidized or free service as funds are available.

#### WHO CAN QUALIFY TO RECEIVE PET FOOD & SUPPLY PACKAGES\*?

Senior Citizens (Age 60+) who reside within the coverage area (see below)

Those experiencing financial hardship who reside within our coverage area (see below)

\*to participate pets must be spayed or neutered. If pets are not spayed/neutered at the time of request, client must agree to sterilize in the future to continue to receive assistance

#### **COVERAGE AREA**

Care Packages/Supplies as well as assistance in other areas will be available for those within Cook County with a focus on the communities within a 10 mile radius of Oak Park. Since ACL works with Oak Park, River Forest, Forest Park, North Riverside, Northlake, Melrose Park & Elmwood Park, special priority will be given to requests coming from those communities.

\*Please note that social service agencies or other animal welfare organizations who have a client in need outside of the coverage area may request assistance via a referral through their organization. #### HOW DO I RECEIVE MY SUPPLY PACKAGE?

Supply packages will need to be picked up from Animal Care League's training center at 1003 Garfield in Oak Park on designated pick up days. Once a request is submitted, a volunteer will contact the requestor in 24-48 hours to give them a pick up date and time

Contactless delivery is available for seniors, those who do not have transportation/are homebound, or those at a high risk for COVID-19. Please note that delivery is needed on the request form and a volunteer will contact you to set up a delivery day/time.





Republic Services is contracted to pick up your regular, everyday garbage and household items, such as couches, tables, mattresses, box springs, desks and chairs, etc.

Yard waste is collected on Friday from April through November and must be placed in a 33 gallon refuse can or biodegradable paper bags. Plastic bags will not be accepted.

All items are to be put out the night before or morning of scheduled garbage pickup.

Winston Park Area and West Melrose – Once garbage has been picked up, garbage container is to be removed from curb line and placed back on resident's property.

Any other garbage items are not be left out and are to be put out for the next scheduled pickup.



# Village of Melrose Park Building Dept. Report

From the Desk of Ralph Sorce, Building Commissioner

## A Note to All Melrose Park Residents Regarding Property Flood Protection, Flood Insurance, Village Assistance

As of Oct. 1, 2015, the Village of Melrose Park has earned a Class 8 Rating through the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) Community Rating System (CRS); for this reason, flood insurance policies issued or renewed in the Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA) qualify for a 10 percent discount off the premium cost.

#### **Flood Protection Information**

The Village of Melrose Park strongly encourages these flood protection tips to be used:

- Stream Maintenance Per the Clean Water Act and village ordinance, dumping into our ditches, creeks and sewers is strictly prohibited. This regulation helps prevent contamination to our water supply and lessens the chance of flooding. Grass clippings, leaves and branches can also cause problems as they can accumulate and plug the storm sewer channels. If your property is next to a ditch or creek, please do your part and keep the banks clear of brush and debris. Please feel free to contact the Public Works Department for information regarding the Village's Creek Maintenance Program or reporting downed tree and other major blockages.
- Construction Requirements Always check with the Building Department before you alter, re-grade or fill your property. A permit is needed to ensure that projects do not cause drainage problems to other properties and to ensure the general public welfare.
- Flood-Proofing There are several different ways to protect a building from flood damage retrofitting (altering a building to eliminate or reduce flood damage) measures include:
  - Elevations This involves raising the house so that the lowest floor is above protection level.
  - Relocation Moving a building out of the flood zone is the surest way to protect it from a flood.
  - Floodwalls These work to keep water from reaching your home by constructing barriers out of fill or concrete between the building and the flood water.
  - Dry Flood-Proofing Makes the building's walls and floors watertight so water does not enter.
  - Wet Flood-Proofing Modifies the structure and relocates the contents so that when flood water enters the building there is little to no damage.

Important notice: Any alteration to a building or land requires a permit from the Building Department. Even re-grading or filling in the floodplain requires a permit.

#### **Flood Protection Assistance**

If you have any concerns or issues with flooding or drainage, please call the Village of Melrose Park Sewer Department at (708) 531-5347 or the Building Department at (708) 343-4000. The Building Department can provide information, professional input and problem-solving measures without negatively affecting nearby neighbors. The Building Department can also provide a list of flood proofing contractors and conduct inspections.

#### **Sand Bags**

During a rainstorm or flood, sand bags are readily available for pickup at the Melrose Park Public Works Building located at 1002 N. 27th Ave. The Public Works Department also drops off sand bags throughout the village's high impact flood areas.

#### **Flood Event Suggestions**

Please keep in mind, during a flood the less water pumped into the village's storm sewer system the better. Please avoid excessive water use such as washing clothes, showering, washing dishes and toilet flushing. This provides time for the sewer system to stabilize and catch up to the large influx of water, thus, lowering the probability of a sewer backup in a building.

#### **Be Prepared!**

Have a plumber inspect sump pumps regularly!

If you experience flooding or drainage issues on your property, the village's staff may be able to help. Remember to televise and clean sewer laterals to prevent sewer backups.

#### **Leaf Removal, Street Sweeping, Storm Sewers and Swales**

It is a violation of village code and the Clean Water Act to directly or indirectly discharge illicit substances into a storm sewer. The village strongly encourages that all grass clippings, leaves and yard waste be placed in approved containers and placed at the designated location for garbage pickup on scheduled pickup days.

#### **Community Effort**

The Public Works Department kindly requests your help. Throughout the village's corporate boundaries there are many streets with curbside storm sewer catch basins, culverts and storm sewer pipes that are prone to trouble in heavy rains when they are blocked by leaves and grass clippings. The village street sweeping vehicle is not effective in removing large quantities of wet or dry leaves off the streets and curbed areas. The street sweeper's intended use is to remove road debris such as gravel, dirt and trash from the road surface by way of water and scrubbing brushes.

The Public Works Department respectfully asks that every village resident do their part in keeping our storm sewer grates, culvert pipe and swales in front of their property free from leaves and debris throughout the year. By doing this, this will greatly diminish the need for storm sewer cleanups, as well as, eliminating street inlet flooding due to leaves clogging the designed drainage path.

#### **Flood Insurance**

Homeowner's insurance policies do not cover damage from floods. The village strongly encourages property owners to invest in flood insurance. This insurance is backed by the federal government and is available to everyone, even properties that have been flooded. In some cases, flood insurance is required by a bank when people purchase a property and get a mortgage or home improvement loan. These policies typically only cover the building's structure and not its contents. During the types of flooding that occur in your area, there is usually more damage to the furniture and personal items than there is to the structure. Be sure you have contents coverage! Don't wait for the next flood to buy insurance protection! In most cases, there is a 30-day waiting period before NFIP coverage takes effect. Contact your insurance agent for more information on rates and coverage.

General contractors are responsible to assure that all their sub-contractors are licensed in Melrose Park. Failure to do so may result in citations, fines and work stoppage on site.

The Village Zoning Map is available on the home page of the Village of Melrose Park website www.melrosepark.org.

#### **MP Construction Hours Policy**

No construction or alteration activities shall be carried on between the nighttime hours of 7 p.m. and 7 a.m. on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday or Friday. On Saturday, no construction or alteration activities shall be carried on between the nighttime hours of 5 p.m. and 8 a.m. On Sunday and federal holidays, no construction or alteration activities shall be carried on

between the nighttime hours of 5 p.m. and 10 a.m. Construction and alteration activities on Sundays and federal holidays shall not be accompanied by loud or annoying noises except in the case of an emergency. Emergency operations necessitating deviation from this section shall not be initiated until special permission is obtained from the director of Public Works. Construction or alteration activities with regard to public improvements and public service utilities, shall be exempt from this section.

Any person violating this section shall be fined not less that fifty dollars (\$50), nor more than seven hundred fifty dollars (\$750), for each offense, and each day's violation of the same shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.





# Village of Melrose Park Building Department Requirements for Residential Fence Installation

- 1. A building permit and a plat of survey are required for the erection of any fence.
- 2. All fence contractors who install fences must be licensed in Melrose Park.
- 3. A plat of survey must be presented for a building permit for the installation of a fence. This assures that the fence will be erected on your personal property and not any public right-of-way or on another lot.
- 4. Postholes must be at a minimum of 36" to 42" deep. A posthole inspection is required prior to posts being placed.
- 5. All fences adjacent to a public sidewalk, alley or right-of-way must be 1 foot away from that sidewalk or alley and on your personal property.
- 6. No sharp points are permitted on any fence, regardless of the material used or its location on the property.
- 7. All fences at the front of a property may not exceed 4 feet in height. The material must be metal of a see-through type. No wood, vinyl or chain link allowed.
- 8. No homes in the Winston Park subdivision may have a fence at the front of their property.
- 9. No fence cannot go over the property line and may not exceed 6 feet in height.
- 10. All fences at the side or sides of the building may not extend beyond the end of the front building line.
- 11. No solid fences may be erected at intersections of streets, alleys or driveways where they can block the view of traffic.
- 12. The finished side of the fence must face out toward the neighboring property.
- 13. No barbed wire on any residential fence. Only exceptions are in industrial or light manufacturing zoned areas and in extremely hazardous or dangerous locations. This can only be done with the express permission of the building commissioner.

# Are You Prepared for Winter Weather?

Winter weather too often catches people unprepared. Researchers say that 70 percent of the fatalities related to ice and snow occur in automobiles and about 25 percent of all winter related fatalities are people that are caught off guard, out in the storm. What winter weather preparations are being made in your area and what are the appropriate steps to take that will ensure your winter weather safety? Help your readers, viewers and listeners make sure their homes and cars are ready for the worst winter has to offer.

#### Winter Weather Watches, Warnings and Advisories — What Do They all Mean?

The National Weather Service uses specific winter weather terms to ensure that people know what to expect in the coming days and hours. A Winter Storm Watch means that severe winter conditions, such as heavy snow and/or ice, may affect your area, but its occurrence, location and timing are still uncertain. A Winter Storm Watch is issued to provide 12 to 36 hours notice of the possibility of severe winter weather. A Winter Storm Watch is intended

to provide enough lead time so those who need to set plans in motion can do so. A watch is upgraded to a Winter Storm Warning when 4 or more inches of snow or sleet is expected in the next 12 hours, or 6 or more inches in 24 hours, or 1/4 inch or more of ice accretion is expected. Winter weather advisories inform you that winter weather conditions are expected to cause significant inconveniences that may be hazardous. If caution is exercised, advisory situations should not become life-threatening. A Blizzard Warning means that snow and strong winds will combine to produce a blinding snow (near zero visibility), deep drifts and life-threatening windchill. Be sure to listen carefully to the radio, television and NOAA Weather Radio for the latest winter storm watches, warnings and advisories.

#### Why is Predicting the Exact Amount of Snowfall So Challenging?

Snow forecasts continue to improve, but they remain a challenging task for meteorologists. Heavy snow often falls in small bands that are hard to discern on larger resolution computer models. In addition, extremely small temperature differences define the boundary line between rain and snow.

#### **What is Wind Chill?**

One of the gravest dangers of winter weather is windchill. The windchill is based on the rate of heat loss from exposed skin by combined effects of wind and cold. As the wind increases, heat is carried away from the body at an accelerated rate, driving down the body temperature. Animals are also effected by windchill.

## **About Winter Storms ...**

Winter storms can range from a moderate snow over a few hours to a blizzard with blinding, wind-driven snow that lasts for several days. Some winter storms are large enough to affect several states, while others affect only a single community. Many winter storms are accompanied by dangerously low temperatures and sometimes by strong winds, icing, sleet and freezing rain.

Regardless of the severity of a winter storm, you should be prepared in order to remain safe during these events.

#### **Know the Difference**

Winter Storm Outlook – Winter storm conditions are possible in the next two to five days.

**Winter Weather Advisory** – Winter weather conditions are expected to cause significant inconveniences and may be hazardous. When caution is used, these situations should not be life threatening.

**Winter Storm Watch** – Winter storm conditions are possible within the next 36 to 48 hours. People in a watch area should review their winter storm plans and stay informed about weather conditions.

Winter Storm Warning – Life-threatening, severe winter conditions have begun or will begin within 24 hours. People in a warning area should take precautions immediately.

#### **How to Prepare for a Winter Storm**

- Winterize your vehicle and keep the gas tank full. A full tank will keep the fuel line from freezing.
- Insulate your home by installing storm windows or covering windows with plastic from the inside to keep cold air out.
- Maintain heating equipment and chimneys by having them cleaned and inspected every year.
- If you will be going away during cold weather, leave the heat on in your home, set to a temperature no lower than 55° F.

#### **Put Together a Supply Kit**

- Water at least a three-day supply; one gallon per person per day.
- Food at least a three-day supply of non-perishable, easy-to-prepare food.
- Flashlight.
- Battery-powered or hand-crank radio (NOAA Weather Radio, if possible).
- Extra batteries.
- First aid kit.
- Medications (seven-day supply) and medical items (hearing aids with extra batteries, glasses, contact lenses, syringes, etc.).
- Multipurpose tool.
- Sanitation and personal hygiene items.
- Copies of personal documents (medication list and pertinent medical information, proof of address, deed/lease to home, passports, birth certificates, insurance policies).
- Cell phone with chargers.
- Family and emergency contact information.
- Extra cash.
- Baby supplies (bottles, formula, baby food, diapers).
- Pet supplies (collar, leash, ID, food, carrier, bowl).
- Tools/supplies for securing your home.
- Sand, rock salt or non-clumping kitty litter to make walkways and steps less slippery.
- Warm coats, gloves or mittens, hats, boots, and extra blankets and warm clothing for all household members.
- Ample alternate heating methods such as fireplaces or wood- or coal-burning stoves.

# **Protect Your Pets During Snowstorms**

#### **Make Sure Your Pets are Prepared for Winter Weather**

Winter weather can be hard on all of us. It can be particularly difficult on our pets that rely on us for their well-being, especially for outdoor dogs and cats. To help keep your entire family safe and warm, the American Red Cross has winter safety reminders for both you and your pets.

#### **Pet Safety in the Winter**

- If possible, bring your pets inside during cold winter weather. Move other animals or livestock to sheltered areas and make sure they have access to non-frozen drinking water.
- If the animals are outside, make sure their access to food and water is not blocked by snow drifts, ice or other obstacles.

#### The following tips on winter pet safety are provided by the Humane Society of the United States:

- If pets cannot come indoors, make sure they are protected by a dry, draft-free enclosure large enough to allow them to sit and lie down, but small enough to hold in the pet's body heat. Raise the floor a few inches off the ground and cover it with cedar shavings or straw. Turn the enclosure away from the wind and cover the doorway with waterproof burlap or heavy plastic.
- Salt and other chemicals used to melt snow and ice can irritate a pet's paws. Wipe their paws with a damp towel before your pet licks them and irritates their mouth.
- Antifreeze is a deadly poison. Wipe up spills and store antifreeze out of reach.

## Do You Have a Disaster Supplies Kit?

A disaster supplies kit is simply a collection of basic items your household may need in the event of an emergency.

Try to assemble your kit well in advance of an emergency. You may have to evacuate at a moment's notice and take essentials with you. You will probably not have time to search for the supplies you need or shop for them.

You may need to survive on your own after an emergency. This means having your own food, water and other supplies in sufficient quantity to last for at least 72 hours. Local officials and relief workers will be on the scene after a disaster but they cannot reach everyone immediately. You could get help in hours or it might take days.

Additionally, basic services such as electricity, gas, water, sewage treatment and telephones may be cut off for days or even a week, or longer. Your supplies kit should contain items to help you manage during these outages.

#### **Maintaining Your Kit**

Just as important as putting your supplies together is maintaining them so they are safe to use when needed. Here are some tips to keep your supplies ready and in good condition:

- Keep canned food in a cool, dry place.
- Store boxed food in tightly closed plastic or metal containers to protect from pests and to extend its shelf life.
- Throw out any canned good that becomes swollen, dented or corroded.
- Use foods before they go bad and replace them with fresh supplies.
- Place new items at the back of the storage area and older ones in the front.
- Change stored food and water supplies every six months. Be sure to write the date you store it on all containers.
- Re-think your needs every year and update your kit as your family's needs change.
- Keep items in airtight plastic bags and put your entire disaster supplies kit in one or two easy-to-carry containers, such as an unused trash can, camping backpack or duffel bag.

## Village of Melrose Park Auxiliary Emergency Communications — K9VMP

Calling All Stations, CQ

The call "CQ" tells all amateur radio operators that someone is calling all stations. CQ is called three times with a nice steady rhythm followed by their call sign, location and CQ three more times. We also use the phonetic alphabet to help those listening to help decipher our call sign.

The Village of Melrose Park Departments of Homeland Security and Public Safety sponsor the Auxcomm and ARES Net (Auxiliary Communications and Amateur Radio Emergency Services Net). This Auxcomm/ARES Net takes place on Wednesday evenings at 7 p.m., on 147.360 Mhz, -.6 Mhz offset and PL 136.5. If you're licensed as an amateur radio operator, please check in and hear what's going on with amateur radio in Melrose Park and the surrounding communities.

We are currently looking for volunteer amateur radio operators for our program. If you would like more information, please call (708) 649-8085. Our group is also looking for licensed general or above operators to help provide emergency communications for our area hospitals in times of emergency or mass casualties.

Here in the village of Melrose Park, the call sign used at the Departments of Homeland Security and Public Safety as well as special events and area networks is K9VMP. If our amateur radio operators are looking for a station to return our call, we say CQ CQ CQ, Kilo, Niner, Victor, Mike PaPa, K9VMP Melrose Park, IL, CQ CQ CQ. If we're returning someone else's CQ we respond as K9VMP or Kilo, Niner, Victor, Mike, PaPa.

The amateur radio phonetic alphabet gives a recognized word for each letter.

A =Alpha, B=Bravo, C=Charlie, D=Delta, E=Echo, F=Fox, G=Golf, H=Hotel, I=India, J=Juliet, K=Kilo, L=Lima, M=Mike, N=Nora, O=Oscar, P=PaPa, Q=Quebec, R=Romeo, S=Sierra, T=Tango, U=Uniform, V=Victor, W=Whiskey, X=X-Ray, Y=Yankee, Z=Zebra.

The numbers of 0 to 9 are zero, one, two, three, four, five, six, seven, eight, niner. The zero differentiates the letter O from the number zero and the number 9 as "Niner" makes it very clear it's a 9.

Besides talking on a two-way radio, amateur radio operators use available frequencies in many ways including flying model planes, drones, sending pictures and information via slow scan also known as sstv, radio telegraph, Morse Code and many digital modes.

Here in the United States, we are licensed by the Federal Communications Commission otherwise known as the FCC. Although the FCC is the licensing body, the exams are conducted by local ham radio clubs who get their authorization to conduct exams by a volunteer exam coordinator, which is a larger organization that supports local clubs examiners.

The three classes of licensed hams are technician, general and amateur extra. With each license earned come more privileges to operate on additional wireless bands. Just like you may listen to the AM or FM bands on your car or home radio, licensed amateur radio operators can scan to listen or transmit to talk to a wider frequency of bands in the Kilohertz; kHz, Megahertz; MHz, and Gigahertz; GHz frequencies. The higher the license earned allows greater use of the bands. With the 11-year sun cycle continuing to improve, we are expecting the peak in clear communications in the year 2025. What a great opportunity to become trained in amateur radio.



- You use airplanes as a mode of domestic transportation; or
- You visit military bases; or
- You visit secure federal facilities.



The federal government requires REAL ID applicants to provide documentation confirming identity, Social Security number, residency and signature.

### You DO NOT NEED a REAL ID if:

- You have a valid U.S. passport or passport card;
- You do not use airplanes as a mode of domestic transportation;
- You do not visit military bases; or
- You do not visit secure federal facilities.



If you have a valid U.S. passport, you are NOT required to have a REAL ID to fly.

### Register and Enroll Early for Spring Courses – Don't Delay!

This updated report card includes clearly defined reporting standards aligned to balanced assessments that will provide us with relevant information we will utilize to increase student learning and it is part of our multi-year district goal to become a Standards-Based Grading district for school year 2021-2022.





### American Heart Association Recognizes MacNeal Hospital for Advanced Care for Stroke and Type 2 Diabetes

MacNeal Hospital has received a 2020 Get With The Guidelines®-Stroke GOLD Plus Award from the American Heart Association (AHA). MacNeal, part of Loyola Medicine, was also named to the AHA's Type 2 Diabetes Honor Roll.

The Stroke GOLD Plus Award recognizes hospitals for adherence to the AHA's in-hospital program for improving stroke care, based on "the latest scientific treatment guidelines." The Type 2 Diabetes Honor Roll distinction honors hospitals "engaging in advanced care for patients with heart failure and/or stroke and type 2 diabetes."

"MacNeal has long been recognized as a top regional hospital for cardiovascular care and we are honored to receive these distinctions from the American Heart Association," said MacNeal Hospital President Mary Elizabeth (M.E.) Cleary.

MacNeal received the AHA Stroke GOLD Plus honor in 2018, 2016 and 2015. Earlier this year, MacNeal was named a Top 50 Cardiovascular Hospital by IBM Watson Health. MacNeal is also recognized as a Blue Cross Blue Shield of Illinois Blue Distinction Center for Cardiac Care. # MacNeal Hospital Launches First Clinical Trial in Illinois of Novel Monitoring Device for Congestive Heart Failure Patients

MacNeal Hospital is the first hospital in Illinois to participate in a national, randomized clinical trial using daily vital signs and lung pressure measurement to manage patients with congestive heart failure (CHF). The PROACTIVE-HF trial utilizes a new monitoring system, coupled with a pressure sensor, implanted directly into a blood vessel in the lung. This system provides information that is recorded and transmitted over a cellular or Wi-Fi connection to a patient's provider, allowing for medication changes, if necessary, to prevent further health deterioration or hospitalization.

Cardiologists Gregory Macaluso, MD, and James Sur, MD, performed the first implant of the new CordellaÔ Heart Failure System in Illinois (the fourth in the U.S.) at MacNeal's recently renovated, state-of-the-art Cardiac Catherization Lab.

"The increase in lung pressure is the earliest signal that the heart is straining or decompensating," said Dr. Macaluso of Heart Care Centers of Illinois. "This device can detect changes in a patient's heart before most symptoms can occur."

The sensor is implanted into a lung blood vessel using a common outpatient cardiac procedure. Lung pressures are then recorded daily and transmitted via a small hand-held reader to a secure website that is accessible to providers. In addition, providers may be alerted if pressures fall outside of a pre-specified range. "This allows more proactive, closer monitoring of the patient and an opportunity to fine-tune helpful, guideline-directed medication," said Dr. Macaluso. "Ultimately, it reduces the likelihood of admission to the hospital, which can be associated with worse health outcomes."

Additionally, the device is coupled with a monitoring system that measures blood pressure, weight, oxygen levels and symptoms, providing a comprehensive overview of a patient's health. Most importantly, patients do not need to leave their home to transmit this health data.

"This is a huge benefit as we move into the future of remote monitoring of patients and in light of the COVID-19 pandemic," said Dr. Macaluso. Cardiovascular disease is the leading cause of death in the United Sates and patients diagnosed with cardiovascular disease are at higher risk for severe COVID-19 complications.

"As one of the region's top cardiovascular hospitals, MacNeal is pleased to participate in this innovative clinical trial that has the potential to substantially improve care and treatment for patients living with heart disease," said Charles J. Bareis, MD, chief medical officer at MacNeal. MacNeal was recently named to the 2020 IBM Watson Health® 50 Top Cardiovascular Hospitals list for the second consecutive year.





### **More Than \$4 Million Remain in COVID-19 Bill Payment Assistance Program**

### **Resources and Assistance Options Available, Customers Do Not Have to Wait for Disconnect Notice**



Nicor Gas is reminding its residential customers that more than \$4 million remains available to assist those who may be affected by the ongoing pandemic remains available to assist those who may be affected by the origoning pand and have a past due balance. More than 20,000 Nicor Gas customers with accounts that were in arrears have been recipients of the one-time grant of accounts that were in arrears have been recipients of the one-time grant of up to \$300 as part of the COVID-19 Bill Payment Assistance Program.

"As the seasons change, it is important our customers and communities know we're here to help keep their homes warm and families safe," said John O. Hudson III, president and CEO of Nicor Gas. "The pandemic continues to evolve and so do the resources we are making available to our customers to ensure they receive the safe, clean, reliable and affordable natural gas they deserve."

To qualify for the COVID-19 Bill Payment Program, customers must first enroll in LIHEAP or the Nicor Gas Sharing Program. Customers with account balances do not need to wait for a shut-off notice to apply. Once customers are qualified for either one of the programs and funds applied to their account, the COVID-19 Bill Payment Assistance Program Grant will be automatically applied to a customer's outstanding balance, up to \$300.

Income guidelines are on a sliding scale based on family size. LIHEAP registration is currently underway and available to households with income up to 200 percent of the federal poverty guideline or about \$52,400 annually for a family of four. For single member households, the maximum gross monthly income to qualify is only \$2,127.

The Nicor Gas Sharing Program provides annual grants up to \$400 depending on income and family size. Residential customers with a Nicor Gas bill may qualify if their gross monthly income is below 300 percent of the federal poverty guideline or \$6.550 per month for a family of four - that's \$78,600 annually. The Sharing Program is administered by The Salvation Army and funded through direct contributions from Nicor Gas customers and employees.

"We have seen an unprecedented increase in the number of individuals seeking help with making ends meet," said Harold Rice, Jr., CEO and president of CEDA, one of the largest community action agencies in the country that serves Cook County, Illinois residents. "We recognize the urgent, critical need our neighbors have as they are struggling to pay utility bills and we remain committed to ensuring every family has peace of mind during these challenging times."

a point where it is hard to recover."

ComEd worked with the Illinois Attorney General's Office, the staff of the Illinois Commerce Commission and a broad group of stakeholders in June to offer the following customer-assistance options that are available for a limited time:

- Bill Assistance for Eligible Low-Income Customers To help customers who are past due on their ComEd accounts, ComEd provides additional bill assistance up to \$500 for eligible, low-income households earning 200 percent or less of the federal poverty level.
- More Flexible Payment Arrangements For a limited time, ComEd offers payment plans of up to 18 installment payments with a 25 percent down payment for eligible residential customers. Low-income residential customers and those facing financial hardship can spread amounts they owe over 24 installment payments with no down payment.

These customer assistance options supplement the extensive relief that ComEd already offers customers in need, including:

- Flexible Payment Options These include budget billing, which averages payments over a 12-month period to help customers manage their monthly energy bills.
- CARE Financial Assistance Grants For customers who struggle to cover energy expenses, ComEd offers a wide range of financial assistance programs.
- Supplemental Arrearage Assistance Recognizing that customers facing economic hardship may be challenged to quickly pay off debt accrued during a period of nonpayment, ComEd also offers arrearage assistance through its Supplemental Arrearage Protection Program (SARP).
