Dear Mayor Serpico ...

I want to bring to your attention some of the proactive work that Lt. Anthony Greco has been doing for the benefit of your community in the village of Melrose Park.

In February, the 911 Cell Phone Bank sent out postcards letting property and evidence rooms across the nation know about our service. Lt. Anthony Greco followed up on that postcard with an inquiry for more details. He learned that our mission is to clear donated phones of all data and return as many to the community as possible as 911 phones, all free of charge. He inquired how the data is cleared and found that:

- All working smartphones, tablets, laptops, thumb drives and SD cards are data erased according to the DOD NIST 800-88 Rev. 1 guidelines using third-party hardware/software solutions. Any older working cellphones (non-iOS or Android) are reset according to manufacturer's guidelines.
- Devices that are too old to be reused or cannot be erased because of a failure are disassembled for parts and sent to our certified EPA R2 recycler to reclaim precious metals. The recycler picks up the devices at our back door, so chain of custody is not broken.

Greco learned that the department would be further protected from any data breach liability by our E&O insurance policy. He further learned that the department has the option to request 911 phones for use in the community at anytime.

Proactive leadership is a real blessing in the times that we live in. Not only has Lt. Greco taken action to provide 911 phones to the community and to protect the data of the individual who lost the device, but also to help save the environment by recycling these units and keeping them out of landfills. It has been a real pleasure to work with him!


Dear Director of Fire Department Rick Beltrame ...

Get On Board! Help Stop the Spread of COVID-19 ... Protect Yourself and Others, Get Vaccinated and Follow the Guidelines Set by Medical Professionals Masks Make a Difference

As of the writing of this article certain counties and the city of Chicago have mandated all residents age 2 and older, regardless of a person's COVID vaccination status, will be required to wear a face covering while indoors. When traveling outside of your home it is a good practice to carry a mask and be prepared as rules are different in many areas as no statewide policy is currently in place.

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention uses two measures to group counties into the four levels of community transmission: the number of new cases per 100,000 residents and the percent of COVID-19 tests that are positive over the past week.

If a county has reported 50 to 100 cases per 100,000 residents over a seven-day period or has a positivity rate of 8 percent to 10 percent, it falls into the "substantial transmission" tier, while those reporting 100 cases or more per 100,000 or have a positivity rate of at least 10 percent are labeled as "high transmission." Those are the two groups for which the CDC recommends mask-wearing.

Illinois will continue to recommend face coverings for unvaccinated persons, as well as all individuals on planes, buses, trains and other forms of public transportation; in transportation hubs, such as airports and train and bus stations; in congregate facilities such as correctional facilities, veterans' homes, and long-term care facilities, group homes and residential facilities; and in healthcare settings. Businesses and venues should continue to allow for social distancing to the extent possible, especially indoors. Businesses and venues may also continue to put in place additional public health mitigations as they deem appropriate, including requiring face coverings.

COVID-19 Vaccine

A safe and effective COVID-19 vaccine is a critical component of the U.S. strategy to reduce COVID-19-related illnesses, hospitalizations and deaths. Easy access to COVID-19 vaccines is equally important. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) is working with public health departments, health care providers and other partners to make sure people can easily get a COVID-19 vaccine and that cost is not a barrier.

A Closer Look at How COVID-19 mRNA Vaccines Work

COVID-19 mRNA vaccines give instructions for our cells to make a harmless piece of what is called the "spike protein." The spike protein is found on the surface of the virus that causes COVID-19.

- 1. **First**, COVID-19 mRNA vaccines are given in the upper arm muscle. Once the instructions (mRNA) are inside the muscle cells, the cells use them to make the protein piece. After the protein piece is made, the cell breaks down the instructions and gets rid of them.
- 2. **Next**, the cell displays the protein piece on its surface. Our immune systems recognize that the protein doesn't belong there and begin building an immune response and making antibodies, like what happens in natural infection against COVID-19.
- 3. **At the end of the process,** our bodies have learned how to protect against future infection. The benefit of mRNA vaccines, like all vaccines, is those vaccinated gain this protection without ever having to risk the serious consequences of getting sick with COVID-19.

What You Need to Know

The benefit of mRNA vaccines, like all vaccines, is those vaccinated gain protection without ever having to risk the serious consequences of getting sick with COVID-19.

mRNA vaccines are a new type of vaccine to protect against infectious diseases. mRNA vaccines teach our cells how to make a protein – or even just a piece of a protein – that triggers an immune response inside our bodies.

They cannot give someone COVID-19. mRNA vaccines do not use the live virus that causes COVID-19.

They do not affect or interact with our DNA in any way. mRNA never enters the nucleus of the cell, which is where our DNA (genetic material) is kept. The cell breaks down and gets rid of the mRNA soon after it is finished using the instructions.

mRNA Vaccines Are New, But Not Unknown

Researchers have been studying and working with mRNA vaccines for decades. Interest has grown in these vaccines because they can be developed in a laboratory using readily available materials. This means the process can be standardized and scaled up, making vaccine development faster than tradi-

tional methods of making vaccines.

mRNA vaccines have been studied before for flu, Zika, rabies and cytomegalovirus (CMV). As soon as the necessary information about the virus that causes COVID-19 was available, scientists began designing the mRNA instructions for cells to build the unique spike protein into an mRNA vaccine.

Future mRNA vaccine technology may allow for one vaccine to provide protection for multiple diseases, thus decreasing the number of shots needed for protection against common vaccinepreventable diseases.



CRIME TIPS – Common Citizen Scams

Imposter Burglary

- Suspect(s) will pretend to be legitimate worker(s) and approach senior citizen homeowners at their residences with a seemingly legitimate ruse. Their real purpose is to divert the homeowner while their accomplices search for currency and jewelry.
- Some of the more frequently used ploys by the suspects are indicating they are from the local gas/electric company, posing as a water department employee to inspect the water pipes and/or to replace the water meter, a request to use the bathroom, a cable TV company employee, roofing/gutter repair and paving company contractor, city inspector(s), surveyor(s) and tree trimmer(s), or government personnel from a social service agency.
- Many of the impostor burglars now have bogus photo identification cards, legitimate looking work uniforms, and vehicles made to look like government or company vehicles. They may also communicate with handheld radios or cell phones.
- Women and children may also accompany male suspects and participate in the diversion of the homeowner.
- The suspects may offer a partial rebate by giving the victim a \$100 bill and a request for change. This allows the suspect(s) to determine where the victim keeps their money. The victim is distracted either inside the house by turning a light switch on and off, knocking on water pipes, etc., or showing the victim damage outside of the home, determining property lines, etc. Once the victim is distracted, the unseen suspects enter the home, and remove the money and jewelry. In some cases, the suspects have also removed safes from the home.

Violence

While many of these offenses are only distraction theft/burglaries, an increasing pattern of violence is emerging. Most of the violence occurs when the victim becomes aware of the distraction and tries to prevent the criminals from taking his/her valuables. In these cases, the victim is overpowered with force by the suspects; the offense then turns into an assault and robbery. In the last few years, an increasing number of offenders have begun using violence in lieu of distraction as their method of operation.

Home Repair Fraud

Nationwide, billions of dollars are lost every year due to home repair frauds targeted against senior citizens; however, anyone – not just senior citizens – can be the victim of a home repair fraud.

A common scenario includes:

- Senior citizens are approached by individuals offering to perform various home repair jobs, such as asphalt paving, driveway repair, roof or gutter repair, chimney cleaning, tree trimming, etc.
- The perpetrators claim to have materials left over from other jobs, can offer significant discounts or they were sent by a close relative or friend.
- Once the job is completed, however, the cost of the work is several times more than the first quote and payment is demanded in cash. To ensure payment in cash, the con artist may accompany the victim to the bank.
- If the opportunity is available, these home repair con artists may also commit a burglary.

The work is usually shoddy (inferior) and/or incomplete. Other types of repair/inspection frauds can involve furnaces, chimneys, water heaters, water pressure, electrical wiring, window repair and cement repair.

Home Invasion Burglary

- The burglary team usually consists of two to four people. In many cases, a male will drive three females to the targeted area. The male driver either cruises the neighborhood or parks away from the targeted area.
- The female suspects will roam the neighborhood looking to approach senior citizens while working in their yards.
- One suspect will distract the homeowner by asking any number of questions. The second suspect will then go into the unlocked residence and steal cash and/or jewelry.
- Suspects will sometimes knock or ring the door bell. The suspects will pretend to be ill, ask for a drink of water, ask if the house is for sale, ask about previous owner(s), pretend to be looking for a lost pet or any excuse to get inside the home.
- If confronted by the homeowner, the burglary team will use any type of simple distraction, e.g., need a drink of water, use of phone or bathroom, looking for a lost pet or rental property and sale of tablecloths, etc.
- Theft of cash, jewelry or silver occurs with no ransacking. Several days or weeks can pass before the homeowner realizes she/he has been the victim of a burglary. The suspects are careful to put everything back in its place.

Travel Trailer Sale Scam

- Initially, the suspect purchases a low grade of travel trailer(s) direct from a manufacturer.
- The suspect sells the travel trailer to the victim using documents which misrepresent the value of the trailer.
- The suspect fails to register the trailer, which is still titled to the manufacturer, so it can be sold as "new."

Handkerchief Switch Scam

- The victim is approached by the first suspect, who pretends to be from out of the country and is unfamiliar with United States banking procedures, with a large sum of money.
- After the second suspect arrives, the victim is persuaded to make a bank withdrawal to show the first suspect how the bank works.
- The victim is induced to believe control of all the money will be retained by the victim, right after, the suspects will indicate they need to leave for a short time.
- All of the money is then placed into an envelope, but a switch occurs before the victim takes control of the envelope.
- Afterward, the victim opens the envelope which only contains cut-up paper.

Landscaping Scams

- The suspect approaches the property owner/victim and offers to prune trees.
- The property owner/victim is charged per limb, it is not per tree as initially implied by the suspect.
- The cuttings are "balled" with soil and quickly sold to the property owner/victim as seedlings.

Badge Come Back Scam

- The Badge Come Back Scam can be used after almost any criminal activity, but it is primarily seen after the Handkerchief Switch and Pigeon Drop Scams
- The intended victim of the Handkerchief Switch is approached by the suspect who is posing as a "police officer".
- The victim is told the "police" are aware of the crime and a corrupt bank official was involved.
- The victim is then persuaded to make a bank withdrawal believing it will help catch the corrupt official and recover the lost money.
- In many cases, the victim fails to report the initial scam to the real police.
- If you are a victim of this type of scam, remember to report both scams to the police.

Motor Vehicle Repair and Sales Scams

- The suspect does a poor quality of curb side repairs to the vehicle, a high payment is also extorted from the victim.
- The suspect sells the used vehicle after doing an odometer "rollback."
- The suspect sells the victim a vehicle which has an "open title."

Fortune Telling — Monetary Gain

Many high school students and young adults visit fortune tellers for entertainment, however, most high school students do not possess the financial holdings a criminal fortune teller is looking for. Working professionals and senior citizens are more opportune targets. Criminal fortune tellers know most individual problems concern health, wealth or love. According to experienced investigators, initial contact with some victims is made at fairs, carnivals, newspaper ads and hand flyers. If the victim is in a vulnerable emotional state, the criminal fortune teller attempts to work a curse removal scheme or bujo (boo-joo). The following is a fictional example of how a bujo progresses.

Jane Doe is a middle-aged, well educated and professional. Her husband of 25 years dies, she has recently been diagnosed with a serious illness. Every day on her way home from the office, Jane passes "Mrs. XYZ's Psychic Readings." Jane decides to stop one afternoon for the \$5 special. After an initial tarot (pronounced ta-roe) card reading or maybe a little palm reading, the "psychic" informs Jane there is indeed some "dark evil" surrounding her life, which needs to be removed.

After several visits, Jane is told the "dark evil" surrounding her life is being caused by her late husband's insurance money. The "psychic" rubs an egg around Jane's body to absorb some of the evil. When the egg is cracked open, an ugly, disgusting mass (usually made up of hair, bread, and maybe a small plastic devil's head) is discovered inside the egg.

The "psychic" tells Jane she must bury the insurance money in the graveyard. Jane is understandably reluctant to perform such an act. The "psychic," pretending to be a compassionate person, volunteers to bury the money for Jane (the psychic buries the money right into her own pocket).

Jane's curse removal therapy continues for the next year. After several thousand dollars of her money has been "cleansed," the "psychic" suddenly disappears, probably to another state. The bujo is now complete.

How do criminal fortune tellers convince their customers of their supernatural ability to predict the future?

They rely on a technique called "cold reading." By using a series of generalized statements, vague enough to fit anyone, the victim is convinced the statements are specific to their life. When a "cold reader" combines a gimmick such as tarot cards, tea leaves, a crystal ball or palm reading with generalized personality statements, the illusion of psychic ability created.

Theft by deception is illegal. It is the responsibility of law enforcement to protect those who cannot protect themselves. Aggressive prosecution and public education are two key factors in reducing potential victims from these con artists.


Don't let embarrassment prevent you from reporting criminal activity. The con artist relies on their victims being reluctant to admit they have been scammed.

If you have been a victim or know someone who has been victimized by a criminal fortune teller, please report the incident to your nearest law enforcement agency.

These scams are just a few of the numerous frauds perpetrated annually. Each year thousands of victims lose millions of dollars from these scams. The deception list continues to grow each year, making scams, their victims and the exact dollar amount almost impossible to track. Anyone can become the victim. People of all ages, educational levels and incomes fall victim to scams daily.

Gathering and sharing of information is vital, especially when you are dealing with these transient, criminal suspects and the thefts, scams, and frauds they perpetrate.


Silver Creek Restoration Project Phase Four and Phase Five

Under the direction of Mayor Ronald M. Serpico, the Village of Melrose Park Public Works employees are constructing at the Silver Creek Eagles Nest Park. This is a natural preserve that will include a walking path and a pavilion/gazebo, along with a canoe/kayak launch.

Phase Four of the Silver Creek Eagle's Nest Park will be completed this year.

This restoration project restores the natural balance of the creek by restor-

ing the embankment, and bringing back native landscape and shrubbery along with aquatic habitat. This is an invaluable stream system that provides storm water runoff, flood management and many other benefits for the residents of Melrose Park.

Silver Creek Stabilization Project - Phase Five

Phase Five of the Silver Creek Stabilization and Concrete Removal Project (area on the west side of Winston Plaza up to 15th Avenue) is underway. In the past, bank erosion was impacting the roadway and guard rails along Winston Plaza. Streambank erosion along residential areas was also occurring. The plans include to improve water quality by protecting the banks with rock toe, re-grading the banks to a stable slope and installing desirable deep-rooted native vegetation. Funding for this project was provided, in part, to the village of Melrose Park by the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency through Section 319 of the Clean Water Act. The project is required in order to stabilize steeply eroding banks in a narrow corridor. Removal of shallow-rooted and invasive shrubs and trees is required in part because they prevent regrading of the banks to a stable and slope, they form dense shade that prevents native deep-rooted vegetation from holding the steep bank slopes and soils in place. The proposed project will be similar in appearance to past phases of work to stabilization Silver Creek extending between Elsie Drive and First Avenue.





Village of Melrose Park Designated as Class 7 Through FEMA National Flood Insurance Program

Rating Results in 15 Percent Discount for MP Residents

Attention Melrose Park Residents!

The FEMA National Flood Insurance Program's Community Rating System is a voluntary incentive program that encourages community flood plain management activities that exceed the minimum NFIP requirements. Going above and beyond the minimum requirements result in discounted flood insurance premium rates based on reduced flood risk resulting from the community actions meeting the three goals of the CRS:

- 1. Reduce flood damage to insurable property.
- 2. Strengthen and support the insurance aspects of the NFIP.
- 3. Encourage a comprehensive approach to floodplain management.

A community accrues points to improve its CRS Class rating and receive increasingly higher discounts. Points are awarded for engaging in any of 19 creditable activities, organized under four categories:

- Public information. Mapping and regulations.
- Flood damage reduction. Warning and response.

In the summer of 2012, the Illinois Department of Natural Resources

conducted a community assistance visit with the village of Melrose Park. It was found that the village was in full compliance with the NFIP National Flood Insurance Program and OWR (Office of Water Resources) floodplain management requirements, and became eligible to apply for the CRS program.


After years of continuous hard work with the leadership of Mayor Ronald M. Serpico, the village of Melrose Park was able to achieve a class 7 rating through the National Flood Insurance Program resulting in a 15 percent discount on flood insurance premiums for residents.




MPCCCD Hosted Job Fair on July 9



Indoor Golf Simulator at Cimbalo Fitness Center

VPD has installed a full swing golf simulator at Cimbalo Fitness Center. This advanced golf simulator uses computer vision-based camera systems that use high-speed cameras to track both the club and the golf ball after the golfer hits the ball. Projectors display the golf shot on a large screen displaying either a photorealistic or computer-generated golf course image in front of the player. The golfer stands in a 12' x 16' bay that has a very large movie-type screen in the back. Golfers use real clubs and golf balls. The ball hits the screen, drops to the floor and the virtual portion begins. Based on the information rendered from the camera and dual tracking sensors, a virtual ball continues into the virtual golf course on the screen, landing the ball exactly where it would land if playing on the real course.

Rentals are based per the hour. It might take one golfer at least one hour per 18-hole game. A foursome with a few warm-up swings could take about four hours. The E6 Software has 84 courses to choose from. You can play a full 18-hole game, a nine-hole game, or play challenge games to compete for the "Closest to the Pin," "Longest Drive," "Demolition Golf" or "Skills Challenge Course." The simulators are rented in sessions. If it's your first time, you will receive a quick tutorial on the simulator software. You can practice on the practice range or you can choose from over 84 courses to play. If you choose to play a full course, please be aware that it takes about one hour for one person to play 18 holes. We highly suggest booking at least one hour per player to allow time for practice swings and choosing a course. Golfers bring your own clubs, but please do not wear golf shoes. VPD will provide the golf balls. Clubs are required to be clean.

Cook County Launches Project Rainbow

New Initiative Seeks to Address Learning Loss Magnified by COVID-19 with Creation of Free Early Childhood and Family Programming through the County TV Station and a New Mobile App

Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle was recently joined by community leaders, tech innovators, cultural institutions, museums, non-profits, and other partners to announce Project Rainbow: a new county-created, family-focused recovery initiative designed to address the education barriers and learning loss exacerbated by the pandemic.

Through this initiative, Cook County and its Project Rainbow partners will produce new video content, or repurpose existing informative and educational content, to be used by children and families. To broaden the scope of the initiative's possibilities, future Cook County initiatives and programming involving children, families, or the arts will now be recognized by the county as Project Rainbow initiatives.

"I am proud to introduce Project Rainbow and look forward to the educational opportunities it will provide to young children and families in Cook County and beyond," said President Preckwinkle. "We know there has been a tremendous learning loss for our children throughout our county, state and nation. Project Rainbow is a unique and creative way in which government and our partners can provide enriching, diverse programming for our children to supplement their education."

As the content library builds over time, Project Rainbow programming will appear on Cook County's cable channel (channel 22/900 on Comcast) at 10 a.m. and repeats at 4 p.m., Monday through Friday. The broadcasts began Thursday, Aug. 12.

The concept for Project Rainbow was created by Nick Shields, Director of Communications and Public Affairs for the Office of the President and was made possible with the support of the partners contributing to this initiative.

Through the generous support of the University of Chicago and Microsoft, all Project Rainbow content will also be available on-demand through a newly developed mobile app. Developed by the University of Chicago TechTeam and advised by app experts at Microsoft, the free Project Rainbow app will be available on the Google Play store as well as the Apple Store.

A portion of Project Rainbow content will draw on the partnership and expertise of Golden Apple's award-winning teachers who are also state-certified teacher evaluators. Through this partnership, Project Rainbow will provide literacy enrichment videos for early childhood learners, geared specifically for 3- to 6-year-olds. Developed by Golden Apple's mentors, the curriculum is aligned to the Common Core State Standards, Illinois Learning Standards, and Creative Curriculum. Each lesson is designed to have a predictable structure, integrated content areas, a home connection for parents and the adults in children's lives, and accessibility for diverse learners including special education and dual language learners.

The curriculum will be visually imagined by the award-winning Chicago Children's Theatre team led by Jacqueline Russell, Co-Founder and Artistic Director at the Chicago Children's Theatre and award-winning bilingual actor, educator and storyteller and Jasmin Cardenas, who will serve as the curriculum's teacher.

For a child home during the day with a caretaker, children of parents who are working from home and in need of high-quality programming on an iPad, or children coming home from school and seeking an educational alternative to afternoon TV time, Project Rainbow is intended to be a resource for residents and families in a flexible way that suits their needs.

"I'm immensely grateful to all of the partners who have rallied around our call to provide opportunity and educational resources for children and families through this unique and positive initiative," Cook County Board President Preckwinkle said.

Cook County Weather Safety Tips for Pets

Cook County Animal and Rabies Control urges pet owners to take special precautions to protect the health and welfare of their pets during heat advisory days. The department offers tips for pet owners to keep in mind:

Do not leave your pet in a hot car: Even with the windows rolled down, studies have shown that the temperature inside the car can increase 15 degrees above the outside temperature. The law requires that any time the ambient temperature is above 78 degrees, you cannot leave your dog in a car.

Keep your pets cool when outside: All dogs should be provided with cool water and shade, and monitored when outside. Short-coated animals and animals with white or tan fur are susceptible to sunburn, especially on their noses.

Consider a haircut: If your dog has a thick coat, consider a haircut for summer. One inch is a good length to keep your dog comfortable while avoiding sunburn.

Take care of your dog's paws: Remember that asphalt and sidewalks are hotter than grass and dogs' paw pads are highly sensitive to heat. Whenever possible, walk your dog on grass, dirt or gravel, and avoid asphalt and concrete during a heat wave.

Keep inside temperatures cool: Make sure your indoor pets have water and are comfortable when in the home. And don't be alarmed if you see your cat sleeping somewhere odd, like the bathtub or the closet. Cats look for the coolest spot in the home.

Ensure window screens are secure: Before opening any windows in your home this summer, make sure there is a screen installed. Keep windows without screens closed and ensure adjustable screens are tightly secured. Cats are curious by nature and an open window without a screen could pose as a safety risk.

Signs of heat stroke: Know the warning signs of heat stroke especially if your pet has been exposed to hot weather for a substantial amount of time. Symptoms include fatigue, excessive panting, disorientation, lethargy, discomfort, seizures and collapse. If your pet is experiencing any of these symptoms, seek veterinary help immediately.

If you see an animal in distress, call your local police department for assistance.

Better Business Bureau and ComEd Team Up to Warn Customers of Door-to-Door Energy-Related Scams

Imposters Returning to Tactics that Target Customers at Their Homes Following Lifting of Pandemic Restrictions

With the gradual lifting of COVID-19 safety restrictions, ComEd and the Better Business Bureau (BBB) of Chicago and Northern Illinois remind customers to be on the lookout for utility-company imposters approaching homes and businesses to steal information and valuables.

"ComEd takes seriously its responsibility to help our customers protect themselves," said Nichole Owens, ComEd vice president of Customer Channels. "As residents become more comfortable talking with people outside their household, you can bet that imposters will take advantage of this opportunity to approach people at home in an attempt to steal their personal information, financial information and even their belongings."



"With summer officially underway and the arrival of warm weather, we get the most reports of scams, including home repair, tree trimming, driveway and, of course, utility scams," said Steve Bernas, president and CEO of BBB Chicago and Northern Illinois. "We urge consumers to be extremely leery of anyone who knocks at your door or contacts you unsolicited by flyer, phone call or email. We also encour-

age consumers to do research on businesses and get references before you buy. A great place to start is BBB.org for free reviews and ratings."

In-person, Energy-related Scams

Utility scams consumers have reported to ComEd and the BBB include incidents of scammers who approach homes or small businesses posing as an employee from ComEd, another utility or a tree service company. They attempt to lure the resident or business owner outside to discuss work that the imposter claims needs to be completed. While the individual is outside, an accomplice will enter the home or business to steal valuables and documents containing the individual's personal or financial information.

ComEd and the BBB have also learned of individuals visiting home and business owners, then asking for a copy of their utility bill or other personal documents to steal identities or switch the owner's energy supplier without permission.

Scammers will sometimes call homes and small businesses using a number that appears to be a ComEd phone number. Offenders will also impersonate the names of ComEd and other trusted organizations by creating email addresses or websites that look like the real sites.

Tips to help identify scams

- 1. ComEd will never come to a customer's home or business to:
 - Demand a payment.
 - Ask for immediate payment with a prepaid cash card, cryptocurrency or third-party banking app.
 - Ask for your ComEd account number or other personal information, such as a driver's license number.
- 2. ComEd will never call a customer to:
 - Ask for their account number.
 - Ask for personal information such as their Social Security number or bank information.
 - Ask them to make a direct payment with a prepaid cash card, cryptocurrency or third-party banking app.
- 3. To identify an actual ComEd employee or communication, remember:
 - All ComEd field employees wear a uniform with the ComEd logo, including shirt and safety vest.
 - ComEd employees visibly display a company ID badge with the ComEd logo and employee's name.
 - Check the name on email or websites and make sure they match the name and address of the company you do business with. Look for misspellings or slight alterations.
 - Make a call to verify the suspected email or website is from a trusted source. Use a phone number from your personal business records or the company's official website and not the number provided in the email.

Nicor Gas Receives Approval for Renewable Natural Gas Pilot Program

Interconnection Pilot Set to Help Create Economic, Environmental Benefits

Nicor Gas' Renewable Gas Interconnection Pilot received approval July 8 from the Illinois Commerce Commission. The pilot aims to encourage the development of renewable natural gas (RNG) production facilities within Nicor Gas' service territory, and allows the company to determine how RNG can be efficiently integrated into its natural gas distribution system as a safe, reliable and clean energy source for customers.

"Nicor Gas is committed to helping our communities thrive and to bettering our environment. This program seeks to do that by bringing sustainable, clean RNG to the marketplace, while creating clean energy jobs and new revenue streams for Illinois businesses," said John O. Hudson III, president and CEO of Nicor Gas. "We look forward to working with RNG producers and consumers during the pilot program while helping our state lead in the progress toward a clean energy future."

As a part of the pilot, Nicor Gas will enable the interconnection of new RNG facilities, which create a pathway for lower carbon fuels to be available to customers by displacing traditional, geologic natural gas. With an investment capped at \$16 million, the pilot marks the first time an Illinois gas utility has a tariff that allows its distribution system to interconnect renewable fuel production systems, creating a sustainable and clean energy solution for Illinois.

RNG is a sustainable and reliable non-fossil fuel produced from sources such as food and animal waste, wastewater plants and landfill gas. As these organic waste sources decompose, methane is produced. RNG projects, like those eligible to enroll in Nicor Gas' Renewable Gas Interconnection Pilot, capture the methane and convert it into RNG that is an interchangeable substitute for geologic natural gas. Converting waste to clean RNG and integrating it into Nicor Gas' distribution system reduces greenhouse gas emissions while creating new jobs and business opportunities in the community.

According to an Illinois economic impact study by EcoEngineers, just one RNG project could create up to 229 part-time jobs during construction, 46 fulltime jobs during operations and \$478 million in total economic output over the 20-year project life.
