Dear Neighbors,

It's October and at long last I have decided to write about something other than COVID-19, which is that wonderful holiday we identify with autumn – Halloween.

Like many people, I believed that Halloween started here, but our spooky holiday got its start 2000 years ago with the Celtic festival of Samhain (pronounced sow-in), which was celebrated on Oct. 31. This day marked the end of summer and the beginning of winter.

The Celts, and later medieval Europeans, believed on Oct. 31 ghosts came back from the dead to walk the earthly world. People were afraid that if they left their homes after dark they would encounter the ghosts, so to avoid being recognized as a living soul, people were masks to trick the ghosts into thinking they were fellow spirits. Thus, the tradition of wearing Halloween costumes was born.

By the ninth century, the influence of Christianity had spread into Celtic lands, where it gradually supplanted Celtic rites. In 1000

A.D., the church made Nov. 2 All Souls' Day to honor the dead. All Souls' Day was celebrated similarly to the Celts' Samhain Day, with big bonfires, parades, and dressing up in costumes as saints, angels and devils. All Saints' Day was called Hallowmas and the night before began to be called All Hallows Eve and eventually Halloween.

By the time Halloween made it to America, it became quite pared-down due to the colonial Protestant belief systems held by most New Englanders. However, as different European ethnic groups began to bring their customs to our country, a distinctly American version of Halloween began to emerge. The first celebrations included "play parties" to celebrate the harvest. Neighbors would share stories of the dead, tell each other's fortunes, dance and sing.

Later in the 1800s, there was a move in America to mold Halloween into a holiday more about neighborly get-togethers than about ghosts and witchcraft. At the turn of the century, Halloween parties for both children and adults became the most common way to celebrate the day.

By the 1920s, Americans had begun our country's version of trick-or-treating, which really dates to England's early All Souls' Day parades where the poor would beg for food and the wealthy would give them pastries called "soul cakes" in return for their promise to pray for their dead relatives.

By the 1950s, Halloween was in full swing. Before this decade trick-or-treaters collected coins, apples or small trinkets in their bags, but in the 1950s candy makers promoted candy instead as the ideal Halloween treat. Today, Halloween has grown so popular that Americans spend an estimated \$6 billion annually to celebrate it, making it the country's second largest commercial holiday after Christmas.

This year Melrose Park's trick-or-treat hours will be between 2 p.m. and 5 p.m., on Oct. 31. Please keep an eye out for all the little ghosts and witches who will be haunting your neighborhood!

### **Halloween Safety Tips**

### **Tips for Trick-or-Treaters**

- Carry a flashlight with you for visibility.
- Always stay in a group with an adult!
- Never enter a stranger's house or car for a treat!
- Always walk on the sidewalk. If there is no sidewalk, walk on the grass away from the street.
- Look both ways before crossing the street and if you are wearing a mask, take it off.
- Wait until an adult can check your candy before you eat any of it.
- Only accept treats from neighbors or friends you know!

### **Tips for Parents**

- Plan costumes that are bright and reflective! Consider adding more reflective tape to costumes and trick-or-treat bags. Always carry flashlights.
- Masks can limit or block eyesight, consider makeup or cut the mask eyeholes bigger so they can see. Remind children to remove their masks to cross the street!
- We recommend that children do not use props like guns, knives or swords. However, if they are used, make sure they don't look real!
- Clear hazards from your property. Remove obstacles such as flower pots and garden hoses, so children won't trip on them rushing from house to house.
- Remind your children not to eat the candy until an adult has checked their treats!
- Your child's school may be having a Halloween party. Call the school and ask.
- Please explain to children the difference between tricks and vandalism.

### **Tips for Businesses and Motorists**

- Heighten your awareness and be cautious of purchases that may have the potential to cause personal injury or property damage, such as paint ball guns or large quantities of eggs.
- Drive slowly and cautiously through your neighborhoods. Remember children may not look before crossing the street.

### Melrose Park Police Department Acquires "Barnacle"

The Barnacle is a new way for Melrose Park Police Department parking patrols to immobilize vehicles. Instead of using a boot to keep a wheel from moving, officers can apply a Barnacle across the windshield, suction it to the glass and arm it with a keypad.

The Barnacle is a bright yellow 20-pound piece of plastic that sticks to the windshield with 750 pounds of force. The officer then sets the alarm and tracking system using the keypad built into the device. The Barnacle obstructs the driver's view out the windshield. If you try to drive away with the Barnacle attached, a high-pitched alarm will sound.

The Barnacle is equipped with a GPS and tamper-proof system. Once the GPS is active, it can be tracked if someone decides to move.

It's a lot faster for officers to use and it easier to immobilize your car, but it also makes it easier to get back on the road. There's a number to call if you choose to pay your tickets immediately. They'll give you a code to unlock the Barnacle and remove it from your car. Otherwise, once your fees are paid, you can have an officer come to the location to remove the Barnacle.

Just like the boot, the Barnacle isn't something you'll find on your car when your meter runs out one day. It is something you could find if you have more than 10 outstanding parking, standing or compliance tickets.



### A Message from Rick Beltrame, Director of Fire Department

With the cooler months fast approaching,

the Melrose Park Fire Department and Director of Fire Department Rick Beltrame want to ensure the safety of our residents by providing these heating safety tips on behalf of the National Fire Protection Association.

Please follow these guidelines to keep your fall and winter seasons warm and safe!



There is something about the winter months and curling up with a good book by the fireplace. But did you know that heating equipment is one of the leading causes of home fire deaths? With a few simple safety tips and precautions you can prevent most heating fires from happening.

#### **BE WARM AND SAFE THIS WINTER!**

- Keep anything that can burn at least three-feet (one metre) away from heating equipment, like the furnace, fireplace, wood stove, or portable space heater.
- R!
- Have a three-foot (one metre) "kid-free zone" around open fires and space heaters.
- Never use your oven to heat your home.
- Have a qualified professional install stationary space heating equipment, water heaters or central heating equipment according to the local codes and manufacturer's instructions.
- Have heating equipment and chimneys cleaned and inspected every year by a qualified professional.
- Remember to turn portable heaters off when leaving the room or going to bed.
- Always use the right kind of fuel, specified by the manufacturer, for fuel burning space heaters.
- Make sure the fireplace has a sturdy screen to stop sparks from flying into the room. Ashes should be cool before putting them in a metal container. Keep the container a safe distance away from your home.
- Test smoke alarms at least once a month.

### Heating Equipment Smarts

Install wood burning stoves following manufacturer's instructions or have a professional do the installation. All fuel-burning equipment should be vented to the outside to avoid carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning.


Install and maintain CO alarms to avoid the risk of CO poisoning. If you smell gas in your gas heater, do not light the appliance. Leave the home immediately and call your local fire department or gas company.



### Get On Board! Please Get Vaccinated Why You Should ...

The COVID-19 vaccines are a critical part of ending this pandemic. Growing availability of vaccines means we can help protect ourselves, slow the spread of the virus and save as many lives as possible.

Protection vaccines go through rigorous testing to prove their protection, and all three authorized vaccines were 100 percent effective at preventing death and hospitalization from COVID-19.

End-the-pandemic vaccines are how we end this pandemic. Once enough of us have been vaccinated and build immunity, we can get back to our pre-COVID routines.

The COVID-19 vaccines are effective tools to protect you from the virus and help end this pandemic. The most important benefit of vaccination is to help prevent you from getting sick with COVID-19.

### **How to Make an Appointment**

Vaccines are currently available by appointment only at more than 900 locations across the state. Find a provider and more information at coronavirus.illinois.gov. To make an appointment by phone, call our toll-free hotline at (833) 621-1284.

### **Important Reminders**

Vaccines are proven to protect you from getting sick. The vaccines help your body build protection, which will help it fight against COVID-19 if you are exposed to it.

Getting the vaccine will help bring us back to our daily lives. Once enough of us have been vaccinated and build immunity, we can get back to our pre-COVID routines and end this pandemic.

Your insurance or state government may be billed a vaccine administration fee, but there are no out-of-pocket costs.

You may experience side effects, and that's normal. They show your body has recognized the vaccine and is building protection, which means the vaccine is working. Just like the flu shot, they should go away in a day or two.

### **COVID-19 Vaccine**

A safe and effective COVID-19 vaccine is a critical component of the U.S. strategy to reduce COVID-19-related illnesses, hospitalizations and deaths. Easy access to COVID-19 vaccines is equally important. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) is working with public health departments, health care providers and other partners to make sure people can easily get a COVID-19 vaccine and that cost is not a barrier.

### A Closer Look at How COVID-19 mRNA Vaccines Work

COVID-19 mRNA vaccines give instructions for our cells to make a harmless piece of what is called the "spike protein." The spike protein is found on the surface of the virus that causes COVID-19.

- 1. **First**, COVID-19 mRNA vaccines are given in the upper arm muscle. Once the instructions (mRNA) are inside the muscle cells, the cells use them to make the protein piece. After the protein piece is made, the cell breaks down the instructions and gets rid of them.
- 2. **Next**, the cell displays the protein piece on its surface. Our immune systems recognize that the protein doesn't belong there and begin building an immune response and making antibodies, like what happens in natural infection against COVID-19.
- 3. **At the end of the process,** our bodies have learned how to protect against future infection. The benefit of mRNA vaccines, like all vaccines, is those vaccinated gain this protection without ever having to risk the serious consequences of getting sick with COVID-19.

### **What You Need to Know**

The benefit of mRNA vaccines, like all vaccines, is those vaccinated gain protection without ever having to risk the serious consequences of getting sick with COVID-19.

mRNA vaccines are a new type of vaccine to protect against infectious diseases. mRNA vaccines teach our cells how to make a protein – or even just a piece of a protein – that triggers an immune response inside our bodies.

They cannot give someone COVID-19. mRNA vaccines do not use the live virus that causes COVID-19.

They do not affect or interact with our DNA in any way. mRNA never enters the nucleus of the cell, which is where our DNA (genetic material) is kept. The cell breaks down and gets rid of the mRNA soon after it is finished using the instructions.

### mRNA Vaccines Are New, But Not Unknown

Researchers have been studying and working with mRNA vaccines for decades. Interest has grown in these vaccines because they can be developed in a laboratory using readily available materials. This means the process can be standardized and scaled up, making vaccine development faster than tradi-

tional methods of making vaccines.

mRNA vaccines have been studied before for flu, Zika, rabies and cytomegalovirus (CMV). As soon as the necessary information about the virus that causes COVID-19 was available, scientists began designing the mRNA instructions for cells to build the unique spike protein into an mRNA vaccine.

Future mRNA vaccine technology may allow for one vaccine to provide protection for multiple diseases, thus decreasing the number of shots needed for protection against common vaccinepreventable diseases.

### Are You Prepared for Winter Weather?

Winter weather too often catches people unprepared. Researchers say that 70 percent of the fatalities related to ice and snow occur in automobiles and about 25 percent of all winter related fatalities are people that are caught off guard, out in the storm. What winter weather preparations are being made in your area and what are the appropriate steps to take that will ensure your winter weather safety? Help your readers, viewers and listeners make sure their homes and cars are ready for the worst winter has to offer.

### Winter Weather Watches, Warnings and Advisories — What Do They all Mean?

The National Weather Service uses specific winter weather terms to ensure that people know what to expect in the coming days and hours. A Winter Storm Watch means that severe winter conditions, such as heavy snow and/or ice, may affect your area, but its occurrence, location and timing are still uncertain. A Winter Storm Watch is issued to provide 12 to 36 hours notice of the possibility of severe winter weather. A Winter Storm Watch is intended

to provide enough lead time so those who need to set plans in motion can do so. A watch is upgraded to a Winter Storm Warning when 4 or more inches of snow or sleet is expected in the next 12 hours, or 6 or more inches in 24 hours, or 1/4 inch or more of ice accretion is expected. Winter weather advisories inform you that winter weather conditions are expected to cause significant inconveniences that may be hazardous. If caution is exercised, advisory situations should not become life-threatening. A Blizzard Warning means that snow and strong winds will combine to produce a blinding snow (near zero visibility), deep drifts and life-threatening windchill. Be sure to listen carefully to the radio, television and NOAA Weather Radio for the latest winter storm watches, warnings and advisories.

### Why is Predicting the Exact Amount of Snowfall So Challenging?

Snow forecasts continue to improve, but they remain a challenging task for meteorologists. Heavy snow often falls in small bands that are hard to discern on larger resolution computer models. In addition, extremely small temperature differences define the boundary line between rain and snow.

#### **What is Wind Chill?**

One of the gravest dangers of winter weather is windchill. The windchill is based on the rate of heat loss from exposed skin by combined effects of wind and cold. As the wind increases, heat is carried away from the body at an accelerated rate, driving down the body temperature. Animals are also effected by windchill.

### About Winter Storms ...

Winter storms can range from a moderate snow over a few hours to a blizzard with blinding, wind-driven snow that lasts for several days. Some winter storms are large enough to affect several states, while others affect only a single community. Many winter storms are accompanied by dangerously low temperatures and sometimes by strong winds, icing, sleet and freezing rain.

Regardless of the severity of a winter storm, you should be prepared in order to remain safe during these events.

#### **Know the Difference**

Winter Storm Outlook – Winter storm conditions are possible in the next two to five days.

**Winter Weather Advisory** – Winter weather conditions are expected to cause significant inconveniences and may be hazardous. When caution is used, these situations should not be life threatening.

**Winter Storm Watch** – Winter storm conditions are possible within the next 36 to 48 hours. People in a watch area should review their winter storm plans and stay informed about weather conditions.

**Winter Storm Warning** – Life-threatening, severe winter conditions have begun or will begin within 24 hours. People in a warning area should take precautions immediately.

#### **How to Prepare for a Winter Storm**

- Winterize your vehicle and keep the gas tank full. A full tank will keep the fuel line from freezing.
- Insulate your home by installing storm windows or covering windows with plastic from the inside to keep cold air out.
- Maintain heating equipment and chimneys by having them cleaned and inspected every year.
- If you will be going away during cold weather, leave the heat on in your home, set to a temperature no lower than 55° F.

### **Put Together a Supply Kit**

- Water at least a three-day supply; one gallon per person per day.
- Food at least a three-day supply of non-perishable, easy-to-prepare food.
- Flashlight.
- Battery-powered or hand-crank radio (NOAA Weather Radio, if possible).
- Extra batteries.
- First aid kit.
- Medications (seven-day supply) and medical items (hearing aids with extra batteries, glasses, contact lenses, syringes, etc.).
- Multipurpose tool.
- Sanitation and personal hygiene items.
- Copies of personal documents (medication list and pertinent medical information, proof of address, deed/lease to home, passports, birth certificates, insurance policies).
- Cell phone with chargers.
- Family and emergency contact information.
- Extra cash.
- Baby supplies (bottles, formula, baby food, diapers).
- Pet supplies (collar, leash, ID, food, carrier, bowl).
- Tools/supplies for securing your home.
- Sand, rock salt or non-clumping kitty litter to make walkways and steps less slippery.
- Warm coats, gloves or mittens, hats, boots, and extra blankets and warm clothing for all household members.
- Ample alternate heating methods such as fireplaces or wood- or coal-burning stoves.

### **Protect Your Pets During Snowstorms**

### **Make Sure Your Pets are Prepared for Winter Weather**

Winter weather can be hard on all of us. It can be particularly difficult on our pets that rely on us for their well-being, especially for outdoor dogs and cats. To help keep your entire family safe and warm, the American Red Cross has winter safety reminders for both you and your pets.

### **Pet Safety in the Winter**

- If possible, bring your pets inside during cold winter weather. Move other animals or livestock to sheltered areas and make sure they have access to non-frozen drinking water.
- If the animals are outside, make sure their access to food and water is not blocked by snow drifts, ice or other obstacles.

#### The following tips on winter pet safety are provided by the Humane Society of the United States:

- If pets cannot come indoors, make sure they are protected by a dry, draft-free enclosure large enough to allow them to sit and lie down, but small enough to hold in the pet's body heat. Raise the floor a few inches off the ground and cover it with cedar shavings or straw. Turn the enclosure away from the wind and cover the doorway with waterproof burlap or heavy plastic.
- Salt and other chemicals used to melt snow and ice can irritate a pet's paws. Wipe their paws with a damp towel before your pet licks them and irritates their mouth.
- Antifreeze is a deadly poison. Wipe up spills and store antifreeze out of reach.

### Do You Have a Disaster Supplies Kit?

A disaster supplies kit is simply a collection of basic items your household may need in the event of an emergency.

Try to assemble your kit well in advance of an emergency. You may have to evacuate at a moment's notice and take essentials with you. You will probably not have time to search for the supplies you need or shop for them.

You may need to survive on your own after an emergency. This means having your own food, water and other supplies in sufficient quantity to last for at least 72 hours. Local officials and relief workers will be on the scene after a disaster but they cannot reach everyone immediately. You could get help in hours or it might take days.

Additionally, basic services such as electricity, gas, water, sewage treatment and telephones may be cut off for days or even a week, or longer. Your supplies kit should contain items to help you manage during these outages.

### **Maintaining Your Kit**

Just as important as putting your supplies together is maintaining them so they are safe to use when needed. Here are some tips to keep your supplies ready and in good condition:


- Keep canned food in a cool, dry place.
- Store boxed food in tightly closed plastic or metal containers to protect from pests and to extend its shelf life.
- Throw out any canned good that becomes swollen, dented or corroded.
- Use foods before they go bad and replace them with fresh supplies.
- Place new items at the back of the storage area and older ones in the front.
- Change stored food and water supplies every six months. Be sure to write the date you store it on all containers.
- Re-think your needs every year and update your kit as your family's needs change.
- Keep items in airtight plastic bags and put your entire disaster supplies kit in one or two easy-to-carry containers, such as an unused trash can, camping backpack or duffel bag.




### **Melrose Park Dog Park**

### **Silver Creek Stabilization Project — Phase Five**

Phase Five of the Silver Creek Stabilization and Concrete Removal Project (area on the west side of Winston Plaza up to 15th Avenue) is underway. In the past, bank erosion was impacting the roadway and guard rails along Winston Plaza. Streambank erosion along residential areas was also occurring. The plans include to improve water quality by protecting the banks with rock toe, re-grading the banks to a stable slope and installing desirable deep-rooted native vegetation. Funding for this project was provided, in part, to the village of Melrose Park by the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency through Section 319 of the Clean Water Act. The project is required in order to stabilize steeply eroding banks in a narrow corridor. Removal of shallow-rooted and invasive shrubs and trees is required in part because they prevent regrading of the banks to a stable and slope, they form dense shade that prevents native deep-rooted vegetation from holding the steep bank slopes and soils in place. The proposed project will be similar in appearance to past phases of work to stabilization Silver Creek extending between Elsie Drive and First Avenue.

As winter months approach, lower temperatures mean thermostats tend to go up and some household budgets might not be able to keep up with the demands of winter heating costs. #### Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle Announces \$75M for Additional Round of Emergency Rental and Utility Assistance

## **ERA 2 will Provide Assistance with Rent, Utilities and Other Housing Expenses for Residents in Suburban Cook County**

On Friday, Oct. 1, Cook County Board President Preckwinkle, County Board Commissioners Donna Miller, Brandon Johnson and Frank J. Aguilar, the Cook County Bureau of Economic Development and the Housing Authority of Cook County (HACC) announced another round of Emergency Rental Assistance (ERA 2) to support residents of suburban Cook County who are at risk of experiencing homelessness or housing instability due to the pandemic.

The program will dedicate an additional \$75M, funded through the American Rescue Plan, to provide emergency rental assistance to both tenants and landlords, with prioritization preference given to suburban Cook County's most vulnerable residents. The program began accepting applications on Monday, Oct. 4 and will remain open until Friday, Oct. 29.



"This is a crucial extension of our Emergency Rental Assistance Program, which has provided aid to nearly 8,000 tenants and landlords during this difficult time. It was top priority for the county to continue this program and make critical improvements, such as covering relocation, security deposits and other housing-related expenses that our residents so desperately need," said Cook County Board President Preckwinkle.

Designed to prevent and relieve housing instability for suburban Cook County renters and landlords who have experienced financial hardships due to the COVID-19 pandemic, ERA 2 can help with up to 18 months of rental assistance. The program will cover past and current utility expenses or other related housing expenses, including relocation costs, security deposits, processing fees and temporary housing solutions. In addition, under ERA 2, public housing residents and families with housing choice vouchers are eligible to apply for assistance with their portion of rent.

"Because the COVID-19 pandemic has had a disproportionate impact on our most vulnerable residents, ERA 2 allows residents and landlords who have received rental assistance from Cook County's ERA 1 Program to apply for an additional three months of assistance," states Xochitl Flores, bureau chief of Economic Development of Cook County. "This program has been instrumental in providing direct rental assistance, preventing evictions and helping ensure our residents can maintain a stable home, even in the face of unprecedented financial hardships caused by the pandemic."

To qualify for assistance under ERA 2, applicants must live in suburban Cook County and rent their place of residence. They must have a current or future obligation to pay rent, utilities, and/or other housing-related expenses and have a household annual income at or below established requirements (ranging from \$52,200 for single-person households up to \$98,450 for eight-person households). Additionally, applicants must have proof of financial hardship during the COVID-19 pandemic such as losing income, working fewer hours, being furloughed, needing to stay home because of risk of infection or to care for a child, or incurring significant costs during COVID-19.

"Stable housing is the cornerstone to health and safety, so keeping our residents in their homes has been paramount during the past 18 months of hardship," said Richard Monocchio, executive director of the Housing Authority of Cook County. "Cook County urges landlords to consider their options before filing for an eviction. We want to help landlords and tenants work out solutions to keep families in their homes while they wait on these crucial financial resources, which is why we are also spreading the word about our county-wide initiative to provide free legal assistance and mediation."

Beyond meeting the eligibility requirements, priority will be given to eligible households that have received an eviction notice, households where at least one member has been unemployed for 90 days prior to applying, households where an individual pays more than 50 percent of income on rent and households that are considered overcrowded. Priority applications will be processed before non-priority applications.

"I would not have been able to see clearly and stand tall if it wasn't for the financial help I received from the Emergency Rental Assistance," said Melanie Marshall, a past ERA participant. "I would like to personally thank those who have been working through these tough times in the office, on the front lines, for they too have struggles that require support. We must remember together we stand."

Landlords and tenants in suburban Cook Country who wish to apply for ERA 2 funding can do so by visiting www.cookcountyil.gov/rent-help. All applications opened Oct. 4 and will be accepted until Oct. 29, 2021. For additional information, visit the Cook County Bureau of Economic Development or call (833) 221-9821. Help is available in multiple languages.

Eligible individuals can receive their booster shot at least six months after they completed their Pfizer COVID-19 primary vaccine series. In addition, moderately to severely immunocompromised individuals who are already eligible to receive an additional dose of a Pfizer or Moderna COVID-19 vaccine can also receive a booster dose at least six months following their additional dose.

• Flu and COVID-19 Vaccine Co-administration – Based on CDC guidelines, patients are able to receive their COVID-19 and flu or other vaccinations on the same day. Patients are encouraged to get their initial COVID-19 vaccination series or booster along with their flu shot during the same visit, saving time and providing protection against both viruses.

While COVID-19 boosters are not widely available to the general population, the CDC recommends nearly everyone receive a flu shot to reduce illness and prevent flu-related hospitalizations and deaths. Patients may also choose to get their flu shot while getting up-to-date on other routine immunizations like shingles, pneumonia, whooping cough, meningitis, measles, tetanus, typhoid, polio and others. 
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
