Inflation is causing havoc everywhere! Filling up your car's tank with gasoline is starting to equal a monthly auto payment. Americans are beginning to feel the inflationary pinch.

Dear Neighbors,

Wow, inflation is causing havoc everywhere! Filling up your car's tank with gasoline is starting to equal a monthly auto payment. Credit card interest fees are rising, mortgage rates have nearly doubled from a few months ago and food prices are almost 9 percent higher than last year. Most Americans are really beginning to feel the inflationary pinch.

And it is this rise in food prices that leads me to write about the Taste of Melrose Park. Over the past 24 years our vendors never sold a food item for more than \$3. This allowed us to proudly advertise our festival as the most affordable food festival in all of Illinois. Unfortunately, this year our food purveyors are also experiencing the high costs of inflation. Several informed us that it would be impossible for them to take part if forced to hold their prices to \$3, claiming the increased cost of ingredients and the escalated cost of paying help would actually incur a great loss to them if they participated. As a result, 2022 Taste of Melrose Park food items will now sell for \$4 or less. I do wish to point out that other food festivals are experiencing the same inflationary pressures and will also be forced to raise their prices as well, which in turn will allow us to keep boasting that our food festival is still the most affordable in the state.

I am happy to report that the Feast of Our Lady of Mount Carmel will once again return with a full schedule of events after a two-Mayor year absence. This year will mark the Feast's 129th celebration. The dates of the Feast are July 8 through July 17. The Feast has become so synonymous with our community that when Chicago area residents think of Melrose Park, they immediately think of this sacred festival. Once again, on Sunday there will be families marching behind the statue of Our Lady of Mount Carmel as it is reverently paraded down several streets. Residents seeking permission to park any visitor, construction or family emergency vehicles on streets with overnight parking restrictions can visit the Melrose Park Police Department website at mppd.com, download the Melrose Park Police Department Parking Permission Form (under forms), complete all details and then submit it to the MP Police Department Front Desk.

After review, a Police
Department supervisor will
contact the requestor to notify them of approval or disapproval. The form can only be
used for three days per
month and is not valid until a
supervisor signs off on it.

If approved, the permission
will not allow the violation of
village ordinances or parking
laws. All violators will be ticketed.



Village Vehicle Stickers Expired Dec. 31, 2021. New Stickers Can be Purchased at the Village Hall.

Sticker Fee for Passenger Vehicles is \$40 for Two Years (2022-2023).

Truck Fees Vary Based on the Type of Class/Plate and Are Good for One Year Only (2022).

Seniors Over 65 Years of Age are Free.

One free two-year sticker for a passenger vehicle or one free one-year sticker for a B-Truck vehicle registered to a person over 65 years in age. Limit one free sticker per household. If there is a second passenger or B-Truck vehicle registered to a senior in the household, a second senior sticker will be sold for half price (\$15).

Acceptable proof for a senior sticker is a valid driver's license or state ID card.




A Message from Rick Beltrame, Director of Fire Department



FIREWORKS are often used to mark special events and holidays. The only safe way to view fireworks is to attend a professional show. With many professional firework shows being canceled this year, it is important to know that **fireworks are not safe in the hands of consumers**. Fireworks cause thousands of injuries each year.

A few ideas to get into the patriotic spirit, without fireworks:

- Use glow sticks, they glow in the dark and are a safe alternative to a sparkler. Fun for all ages.
- 2. Loud and proud. Noise makers are sure to make a statement. They can be found at local party supply stores or make your own.
- Outdoor movie night. Set up a screen and projector. Don't forget the bugspray!
- 4. Red, white and blue silly string...fun for all ages.
- 5. Make a patriotic craft with the family.
- 6. Throw a birthday party for the USA, and don't forget the cake.



FACTS

- More than 19,500 reported fires are started by fireworks annually.
- ! Burns account for 44% of the 9,100 injuries treated in emergency rooms seen in the month around July 4.
- ! Half of the fireworks injuries seen at emergency rooms were extremities: hand, finger, or leg. One-third were to the eye or other parts of the head.
- ! Children ages 10–14 had the highest rate of fireworks injury, with more than one-third (36%) of the victims of fireworks injuries under age 15.
- Sparklers account for roughly one-quarter of emergency room fireworks injuries.

Phase Five and Six of the Silver Creek Restoration Project will be completed this year.

This restoration project restores the natural balance of the creek by restoring the embankment, and bringing back native landscape and shrubbery

along with aquatic habitat. This is an invaluable stream system that provides storm water runoff, flood management and many other benefits for the residents of Melrose Park.







Know Your Risk When Severe Weather Occurs

Being prepared means learning about summer weather and water hazards such as hurricanes, heat, lightning, rip currents, air quality, tsunamis and wildfires.

Here's what you need to know:

- Since 2003, more than 40 states within the continental United States have come under a tornado watch; more than 45 states have come under severe thunderstorm watches; and lightning strikes have occured in every state.
- Heat waves are common across the country during the summer. They are dangerous because the human body cannot cool itself properly when exposed to an extreme combination of heat and humidity.
- In 2015, there were 26 lightning fatalities.
- Flash flooding is the number one killer associated with severe weather.
- Air pollution can make it harder for people with asthma and other respiratory diseases to breathe. Children and teens may be more sensitive than adults to the health effects caused by air pollution. According to the EPA, poor air quality is responsible in the U.S. for an estimated 60,000 premature deaths each year.



Take Action

While the weather may be wild, you are not powerless. This summer, prepare for hazards with these simple steps:

- You may have only minutes to find shelter before a tornado strikes. Practice a family tornado drill at least once a year.
- Protect yourself from extreme heat by rescheduling outdoor activities to earlier in the day.
- There is no safe place outside when lightning is in the area. If you hear thunder, you are likely within striking distance of the storm. Just remember, When Thunder Roars, Go Indoors.
- Whether on foot or in a car, if you encounter flood waters, Turn Around Don't Drown!
- Make sure to check the Air Quality Index for your area at http://airnow.gov. If the air quality is poor, avoid prolonged or extreme exertion outdoors.

Be a Force of Nature

Your action can inspire others. Be a force of nature and share how you're working to stay safe from weather and water hazards this summer.

- Write a post on Facebook. Share with your friends and family the preparedness steps you're taking to stay safe this summer.
- Tweet that you're prepared with #SummerSafety. Tell us what you're doing to be prepared for summer hazards.
- Create a Family Communication Plan so that your loved ones know how to get in touch during an emergency. And let your friends know that they should create a plan also.
- Look for ways to help your town prepare, such as volunteering. Register for America's PrepareAthon! to learn how to stay safe during disasters.

With these steps, you'll be doing more than just protecting yourself – you'll help NOAA build a Weather-Ready Nation.

Garage Sale Notice

Garage Sales are Back ... It's Time to Sell All Those Treasures

The rules on garage sales held in the village of Melrose Park are as follows:

Garage sales will be held on the third weekend only during the months of May, June,

July, August and September. Sales are to be conducted on Thursday, Friday and Saturday of the designated weekends. No sales are allowed on Sundays.

The dates for 2022 are June 16-18, July 21-23, Aug. 18-20 and Sept. 15-17.

Garage sales shall be conducted only during the hours of 9 a.m.-5 p.m.

No permit is needed for garage sales, however the following rules must be followed:

- No garage sales may be conducted in apartment buildings.
- No garage sales in the frontyard, i.e., on the grass.
- All garage sales to be conducted in backyard, garage or on driveway.
- All sale items to be displayed on tables, not on the ground.
- No sale items shall be located and no sale activity shall be conducted in the frontyard area, on the premises of any public sidewalk, parkway area or other public property.
- No sale signs, handbills or other advertising material shall be located or posted upon public parkway or on public property, signs, poles or light poles within the village of Melrose Park.
- Signs advertising the sales shall not exceed 3-by-5 feet and may be located only in the frontyard (private property) of the address having the garage sale, and must be removed immediately after the sale.
- The sale will be conducted without the use of outdoor loud speakers, amplification equipment or illuminated advertising devices.

Any person violating these rules shall be subject to a fine not to exceed \$500. A copy of garage sale rules is available at www.melrosepark.org.

Cook County Commissioner Frank J. Aguilar Partners with Board of Review and Assessor Office to Offer Help on Property Taxes

Cook County Commissioner Frank J. Aguilar recently partnered with the Cook County's Assessor Office and the Cook County's Board of Review to host two property tax events for 16th District residents. On Tuesday, April 19, representatives from Cook County Assessor Fritz Kaegi's office joined Commissioner Aguilar's staff at their district office for a property tax exemption workshop. On Wednesday, April 20, Commissioner Aguilar joined Board of

Review Commissioner Tammy Wendt to discuss ways for residents to appeal their property tax assessments.

"Property taxes are a source of stress for so many. I have always made a point to listen to residents about what issues they want to discuss or need help with and tailor our community outreach to their needs," said Commissioner Frank J. Aguilar. "Taxes, specifically property taxes, are a top concern in my district, so partnering with the two overlooking bodies (Assessor and Board of Review) to bring information and workshops directly to our residents is a way to offer help in an accessible manner."

On April 19, 16th District residents came to Commissioner Aguilar's district office where they met with employees of the Cook County Assessor Office to find out if they had, and how to use, eligible property tax exemptions. Both offices used a "train-the-trainers" technique, as representatives from the Assessor's Office trained Commissioner Aguilar's staff on the process of locating and utilizing property tax assessments to further

assist district residents.

"It is vital that we collaborate with partner agencies to provide property tax services to homeowners in Cook County," said Assessor Fritz Kaegi.

"My team travels around the county to ensure that homeowners don't have to go far to receive services. By dropping by or scheduling an appointment, homeowners can learn about their individual property assessments and apply for property tax saving exemptions. Thank you to Commissioner Aguilar for inviting us to visit your office and serve the community."

On April 20, Commissioner Aguilar joined Board of Review Commissioner Tammy Wendt and other electeds for a workshop on ways to appeal your property tax assessment. This was a virtual town hall, aimed to bring information directly to citizens throughout multiple Cook County districts. Presenters demonstrated the process for appealing your property tax bills and had analysts ready to walk people through the technicalities of appealing your property tax.

"I am looking forward to the opportunity to connect with the residents in Commissioner Aguilar's 16th District and other areas to share key information on how to appeal your property taxes," says

Wendt. "The Board of Review plays a vital role in county government by providing a voice and course of action for residents whose properties are not assessed at a fair value. When elected officials can come together in an event like this to educate taxpayers and provide how-to steps to successfully complete the appeal process, it is government working at its best. We need more of this and I am honored to be a part of it."

These two events worked together to bring people information and resources on two of the most important aspects of property taxes – making sure people are aware of and use their exemptions, while also giving them the tools needed to successfully appeal their property tax bills. Both services were wanted by the community, and Commissioner Aguilar helped facilitate this information to the residents he serves.

Cook County Commissioner Frank J. Aguilar Joins Board Members to Promote Cook County's 2021 Sustainability Report County Commits More Than \$100 Million for Upcoming Environmental Initiatives

Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle released the 2021 Cook County Sustainability Report, highlighting the County's efforts to support healthy and resilient communities that thrive economically, socially and environmentally.

"Climate change is an urgent threat to us all, but especially to underserved communities and communities of color," said President Preckwinkle. "The progress outlined in this report in addition to future investments that center around sustainability, represent a big step forward in our fight against climate change." President Preckwinkle committed over \$100 million in American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding for future sustainability initiatives throughout Cook County. The county's Policy Roadmap is helping guide these investments.

The county's goals to fight climate change overall includes achieving a 45 percent reduction in carbon emissions and using 100 percent renewable electricity by 2030 in county-owned facilities and making them carbon neutral by 2050.

"Addressing climate change needs to be centered in everything we do," said Cook County Commissioner Frank J. Aguilar. "The risks and impact of climate change for future generations is laid out, but we must also work tirelessly to protect the here and now. Residents must be supported, with proactive government services both addressing root causes of climate change, but also continuing to move towards sustainable practices and services for our communities."

The most notable environmental initiatives that will receive funding include:

- Increasing electric vehicle charging stations throughout Cook County, primarily in the south and west suburbs where there are large gaps in service.
- Expanding the brownfield program to improve vacant or underutilized sites that have real or perceived environmental issues which deter redevelopment for jobs and businesses.
- Removing and replacing lead, leaking and obsolete water service lines in high-risk communities, including individual homes and facilities such as preschools, daycare centers, home daycare providers, group daycare homes, parks, playgrounds, hospitals and clinics.
- Providing stormwater management and identifying flood mitigation projects in communities that experience significant flooding.
- Preserving and restoring public areas to promote health through the acquisition of 500 acres from willing sellers in the southeast suburbs.

Cook County's Sustainability Report looks at what the county has done to make its internal operations more sustainable as well community initiatives. Highlights from the 2021 Annual Sustainability Report include:

- Launching the Commercial Property Assessed Clean Energy program to provide favorable financing to commercial and industrial properties investing in energy and water efficiency, clean energy and resiliency.
- Winning a 2021 National Association of Counties Achievement Award for the Clean Energy Plan, which details the county's path to carbon neutrality.
- Developing the Cook County Bike Plan, which will focus on expansion, equity and enhancement.
- Reducing water use in county-owned buildings by 5.3 percent from the previous year.
- Seeking to purchase a large portion of the county's electricity supply from a renewable source by 2023.

Cook County Board of Commissioners Announce Additional Funds for Emergency Rental and Utility Assistance

Funding will Add to the Over \$130 Million in Rental Assistance Disbursed by the County Since the Start of the Pandemic to Benefit Eligible Applicants Who Previously Qualified but did not Receive Assistance

On Wednesday, April 27, President Preckwinkle, the Cook County Bureau of Economic Development and the Housing Authority of Cook County (HACC) announced an additional \$6.643M in funds for Emergency Rental Assistance to continue to support residents of suburban Cook County who are at risk of experiencing homelessness or housing instability due to the pandemic.

"I encourage all 16th District residents who qualify to apply for these additional funds as soon as possible," said Cook County Commissioner Frank J. Aguilar. "We saw over the last year how big an impact this rental and utility payment assistance made in our community. The key now is to make sure our residents in need are aware of these programs and know exactly how to get access to this assistance. My office will continue to conduct robust out-reach programs in both English and Spanish, in our office and out in the district, to make sure everyone who wants to apply is able to."

The county's program has ranked among the most efficient in the nation and quickly delivered much-needed relief to tenants and landlords alike. Administered by the Housing Authority of Cook County (HACC) and the Cook County Bureau of Economic Development, the initial round of rental assistance distributed \$65.5 million of CARES Act funding in rent and utility bill relief.

A second round, launched in October 2021 with funding from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA), delivered an additional \$66 million, this time including up to three months of future rent as well as compensation for related housing expenses. In total, over \$130 million in rental assistance has been distributed by the county and hundreds of millions more has been administered by the state of Illinois and the city of Chicago to assist Cook County renters and landlords in need.

"This is a crucial extension of our Emergency Rental Assistance Program, which has provided aid to over 17,000 households during this difficult time. It was a top priority for the county to continue this program and make critical improvements, such as covering relocation, security deposits and other housing-related expenses that our residents so desperately need," said Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle.

The program last accepted applications in October 2021 and received more applications than available funding at the time could fulfill. Due to the county's strong performance in distributing the original ERA rounds of funding, the U.S. Department of Treasury re-allocated funding from other areas in the country to assist people who still need support. These additional funds will be allocated to applicants already in the county's application portal – the program is not currently taking new applications.

"Cook County's Emergency Rental Assistance has been one of the most successful programs of its kind in the nation," states Xochitl Flores, bureau chief of Economic Development of Cook County. "This program has been instrumental in providing direct rental assistance, preventing evictions and helping ensure our residents can maintain a stable home, even in the face of unprecedented financial hardships caused by the pandemic."

From October 2019 through March 2020, prior to the pandemic-related eviction moratorium which began on March 20, 2020, nearly 25 percent of eviction filings ended in an eviction enforced by the Sheriff's Office, meaning the Sheriff's Office dispatched deputies to enforce the judge's order. In contrast, between October 2021 and the end of March 2022, after the expiration of the moratorium, less than 10 percent of eviction filings have resulted in the court ordering the Sheriff's Office to enforce an eviction.

Residents and landlords dealing with issues surrounding evictions and debt are also encouraged to contact Cook County Legal Aid for Housing and Debt (CCLAHD) at www.cookcountylegalaid.org or by calling (855) 956-5763 to get free legal aid and mediation services to help resolve issues.

News from Loyola Medicine, a Member of Trinity Health

Loyola Medicine Allergy Count Resumes Weekday Reports

For more than 20 years, Loyola Medicine has provided the Chicago area with allergy counts every weekday via Twitter during the allergy season. The Loyola Medicine Allergy Count began 2022 reporting on April 1.

Rachna Shah, MD, leads the Loyola Medicine Allergy Count. Pollen samples are gathered every weekday morning during allergy season from the roof of Gottlieb Memorial Hospital. Pollen grains and mold spores are collected from a cubic meter sample of air and counted under a microscope. The counts include daily numbers for mold, tree, grass and weed pollens, and can be viewed online by visiting www.loyolamedicine.org/find-a-condition-or-service/allergy-count.

"The daily count helps the community better understand the allergies that affect them daily during allergy season," says Dr. Shah. "When people experience allergy symptoms, they can look to our counts and identify the causes of their symptoms. It's an extra layer of security when everyone is on high alert regarding their health."

Spring allergies most often cause itchy, watery eyes and runny nose, sneezing, nasal congestion and post-nasal drip. Difficulty breathing, coughing, wheezing and/or shortness of breath also can be caused by seasonal allergies. Allergy season commonly runs from March through the first hard freeze in October.

Trees reach peak allergen season from March to May, grass from May to June, and weeds and ragweed in August. Mold peaks occur in damp conditions throughout the season.

Loyola Medicine Offers American Sign Language Interpreters for Telehealth Appointments

As part of Loyola Medicine's commitment to making health care accessible to all, Loyola has added American Sign Language (ASL) to the interpreter services available for individuals making telehealth appointments. Loyola already provides medical interpretation in 250 languages for virtual visits. "We are excited to offer ASL interpretation to our deaf and hard of hearing patients making telehealth appointments," said Richard Freeman, MD, MBA, FACS, regional chief clinical officer at Loyola Medicine. "The COVID-19 pandemic dramatically increased the demand for telemedicine and underscored the importance of making it available to as many people as possible."

Loyola Medicine employs a total of 18 qualified medical interpreters who speak Spanish, Polish and ASL, supplemented by 24-hour interpreting service over the phone and video. In fiscal year 2021, Loyola Medicine cared for patients from around the world who speak 58 languages. "Our medical interpreters are essential members of the health care team," said Guadalupe Garcia, regional manager of interpreter services at Loyola Medicine. "They know that they're making a difference in patients' lives by making sure they understand their diagnosis and instructions on how to take their medication and take care of themselves."

The service is easy to use and available through Loyola's myChart self-scheduling tool. During the scheduling process, when a patient indicates that English is not their primary language, the system automatically asks, "Would you like an interpreter free of charge?" Patients can also schedule interpreter services by calling (888) 584-7888. "When patients come into the hospital or clinic, we have translators and bilingual staff available, and now we can offer the same services to people at home," said Neil Gupta, MD, vice president of Ambulatory Services.

Loyola Medicine Infectious Disease Experts Discuss Monkeypox

Illinois has reported a presumptive case of monkeypox in an adult male Chicago resident with a recent travel history to Europe. While the case remains isolated and there is no indication there is a great risk of extensive local spread of the virus, Loyola Medicine infectious disease experts are available to discuss monkeypox symptoms, transmission, treatment options and more.

"I don't think the general population should be worried," said Jorge Parada, MPH, MD, medical director, Infection Prevention and Control at Loyola Medicine. "The bottom line is that while it can be pretty easily spread from any open lesion, aerosol transmission is exceptionally rare."

Monkeypox symptoms include headache, skin rash, fever, body aches, chills and swollen lymph nodes. Skin lesions typically begin to develop simultaneously and evolve together on any given part of the body. The evolution of lesions progresses through four stages — macular, papular, vesicular, to pustular, before scabbing over and resolving.

"There is no specific treatment for monkeypox, although antivirals developed for use in smallpox may prove beneficial," said David Slade, MD, Loyola Medicine's associate medical director, Infection Prevention and Control. "Typically, the smallpox vaccine is protective against monkeypox."


The CDC is urging health care providers in the United States to be alert for patients who have rash illnesses consistent with monkeypox and possible exposure history. Among the risks, having traveled to countries with recently confirmed cases of monkeypox, or reporting contact with a person or people who have a suspicious rash or have received a diagnosis of confirmed or suspected monkeypox.

"All of our physicians are monitoring patients closely for signs of monkeypox," said Kevin Smith, MD, MBA, chief medical officer at Loyola University Medical Center. "Our Infectious Disease and Emergency departments are ready to respond and initiate precautions to keep the community safe."



ComEd Invests \$893 Million with Diverse Suppliers in 2021

10-year Diverse Supplier Spend Reaches \$6.4 Billion



ComEd spent \$893 million with businesses owned by women, people of color and veterans in 2021, or 42 percent of its total supply chain spend, bringing its diverse supplier spend since 2012 to \$6.4 billion. Maintaining its focus on investing locally, ComEd spent \$641 million, or more than 71 percent of its total diverse spend last year, with Illinois-based suppliers, as detailed in the company's annual report to the Illinois Commerce Commission, which regulates the state's public utilities.

"Hundreds of diverse suppliers play critical roles on our power grid and throughout our company, and the transition to clean energy will create even more opportunities for them to grow and make a positive impact within their communities," said Gil Quiniones, CEO, ComEd. "Investing in businesses owned by people of color, women and veterans is one of our greatest opportunities to build equity throughout our service territory."

ComEd partners with 662 diversity-certified suppliers, including 153 added last year, and they work throughout the company in utility construction, engineering and materials, among others. A growing sector for diverse suppliers is energy efficiency, which is expected to accelerate as a result of the Climate and Equitable Jobs Act, which increases funding for expanded offerings with an emphasis on income eligible customers. To take full advantage of the opportunity, ComEd is partnering with diverse supplier Walker-Miller Energy Services, an energy efficiency specialist, led by CEO Carla Walker-Miller. It will focus on supplier and customer engagement.

"Because building energy efficiency is key to helping fight climate change and facilitating the necessary decarbonization of our country, the growth opportunities in energy efficiency are endless," said Walker-Miller, who has 30 years of energy industry experience. "ComEd's energy efficiency team is empowered and expected to identify, engage and develop diverse suppliers, and it has empowered us to do the same," said Walker-Miller. "We are also helping ComEd reach economically distressed communities to reduce customers' energy and water consumption."

ComEd's report profiles Milhouse, Inc., a Chicago-based African-American-owned engineering and construction company led by CEO Wilbur Milhouse. It plays a key role in ComEd's Voltage Optimization Program, which enables ComEd to deliver power with enhanced precision, helping customers to reduce their energy consumption by up to 2 percent annually.

The report also highlights ComEd's work in the growing data center sector where it's creating opportunities for diversity-certified suppliers, such as Environmental Design International, a woman-owned company specializing in environmental consulting and civil engineering; McKissack & McKissack, the oldest minority-owned architecture and construction company in the United States; and Meade Electric, a leader in diversity advocacy with hundreds of active diversity-certified supplier relationships.

Illinois utility companies' diverse supplier spend contributed \$11.8 billion to the Illinois GDP from 2017-2020, with \$4 billion in purchases from Illinois-based diverse businesses, according to the Illinois Utilities Business Diversity Council (IUBDC), which was formed in 2015 to help utilities establish and share best practices for diverse supplier participation and development. Members include Ameren Illinois, Aqua, ComEd, Illinois American Water, Nicor Gas, North Shore Gas and Peoples Gas.

More than 26,000 private solar systems have been connected to ComEd's smart grid and more than 20,000 ComEd customers subscribe to community solar. Community solar subscribers receive bill credits for their portion of the electricity generated by the project. ComEd expects to have more than 80 community solar projects connected to its grid by the end of this year.

ComEd Takes Steps to Implement Approved Expansion of Energy Efficiency Programs State's New Energy Law Creates More Customer Savings, Including Through Electrification

ComEd recently filed a request with the Illinois Commerce Commission (ICC), which regulates the state's public utilities, seeking cost recovery of \$50 million that would support expanded programs to help customers reduce their energy usage and bills, and contribute to a cleaner environment. The cost increase would support the Climate and Equitable Jobs Act (CEJA), the state's new energy law and ComEd's ICC-approved four-year energy efficiency plan, which significantly increases funding for programs benefitting low-income customers.

"ComEd energy efficiency programs have only grown more effective in helping customers of all kinds reduce their energy bills and consumption, which also helps us reduce dependence on fossil fuels," said Gil Quiniones, CEO, ComEd. "Customers now can save as much energy in five years' time what used to take them a decade. And the cost to customers is still far less than what it was under the energy efficiency program prior to 2017. Thanks to CEJA, customers have more savings opportunities than ever."

If approved, the request would add about 30 cents to ComEd's average monthly residential customer bill beginning in January 2023. ComEd customers have saved more than \$6.4 billion on their bills as a result of the energy efficiency program that ComEd launched in 2008, with nearly 460,000 families and businesses participating in 2021.

For the first time, ComEd's programs include measures by residential and commercial customers to electrify vehicles or processes that would otherwise require fossil fuels. CEJA also allows utilities to fund solutions that enable business, public sector and residential customers to electrify space heating, water heating, cooling, drying, cooking and industrial end uses that reduce energy consumption. ComEd will launch pilot projects this year, including an offering for income-eligible (IE) customers to fully electrify their homes with HVAC systems, water heating, appliances and necessary electrical upgrades. ComEd will increase electrification opportunities over the course of four years and plans to spend an average of \$10 million annually on solutions for IE customers who earn at or below 80 percent of average area income.

"CEJA is widely recognized throughout Illinois and beyond as ambitious clean energy legislation and the ComEd energy efficiency programs that it supports will contribute significantly to reducing carbon emissions," said Stacey Paradis, executive director of the Midwest Energy Efficiency Association. "In Illinois, energy efficiency is a key component to achieving climate targets while reducing household costs, decreasing emissions and improving indoor air quality and resiliency."

Last year, more than 15,000 ComEd customers took advantage of ComEd's free home energy assessment, which includes a customized report and free installation of energy-saving products, such as LED bulbs, advanced power strips, low-flow showerheads, hot water pipe insulation, bathroom and kitchen sink aerators, and discounted smart thermostats.

In coordination with the local natural gas utilities, ComEd also offers customers rebates for installing high-efficiency equipment, including air conditioning systems and weatherization. Business and public sector customers can take advantage of a wide range of EE incentives and services, including free facility assessments and larger incentives are available for customers in ComEd's most in-need communities.

CEJA also encourages diverse businesses and service providers to become involved in delivering ComEd energy efficiency programs, which ComEd will pursue through a new market development initiative that will be funded at a level of \$4 million annually over four years.

Butterflies! is home to a variety of butterfly species, including painted ladies, monarchs, zebra longwings and swallowtails. New this season, several species of moths will be sharing the habitat. Upon entering, a color graphic highlights the species of butterflies and moths that can be seen. Guests can watch adult butterflies flutter amidst a beautifully landscaped exhibit featuring a winding path with water features and a wide assortment of flowering plants and native grasses. Many of the plant species are labeled to give guests an idea of what they can plant in their own backyards to attract the winged wonders.

There is also an off-exhibit space that guests can peek into to see the transformation from pupa to butterfly. Additionally, Brookfield Zoo staff and volunteers are available throughout the day to answer any questions about the colorful delicate insects.

Butterflies! is located near the zoo's north entrance and is open during regular zoo hours of 9:30 a.m.-5:30 p.m. The price of admission to the exhibit is \$4 for adults, \$3 for children ages 3-11, and \$3.50 for seniors who are 65 and older. To learn more, visit CZS.org/Butterflies.

South American Tapir Born at Brookfield Zoo

The Chicago Zoological Society, which manages Brookfield Zoo, is happy to announce the birth of a male South American tapir calf on May 22. Zoogoers are able to see 11-year-old mom Sorghum (pronounced SOAR-gum) and her calf indoors at the

Pachyderm House. When the weather is warm, they will have access to their outdoor habitat, located on the north side of the building.

Following a 13-month gestation, Sorghum gave birth to the approximately 20-pound calf. Throughout her pregnancy, the zoo's veterinary staff was able to monitor the fetus with regular ultrasounds. To accomplish this voluntary behavior from Sorghum, animal care specialists used positive reinforcement to desensitize the 550-pound mother-to-be to the sound of the ultrasound machine, the smell of rubbing alcohol and gel used on the ultrasound probe, and the feeling of the probe on her belly,

"Being able to monitor the development of the tapir fetus and the well-being of Sorghum throughout her pregnancy is a testament to our dedicated staff and the relationship they have with the animals in their care," said Joan Daniels, senior curator of animals for the Chicago Zoological Society, which manages Brookfield Zoo.

Sorghum arrived at Brookfield Zoo in September 2020 and Sonny, the calf's sire, a few years earlier in 2017.

Baby tapirs are born with white stripes, which serve as an excellent camouflage. The stripes begin to fade after a few months and are completely gone by 6 months of age. The calf will nurse from its mom as long as milk is being produced. It will reach full size at about 18 months of age and are considered mature at 2 to 4 years old.

Tapirs have thick skin and are classified as a pachyderm. The South American tapir is one of four species of tapir that live in the Americas, with adults

reaching around 2.5 to 4 feet tall and 6 to 8 feet long. Their streamlined bodies make them excellent swimmers and they can also run fast in short bursts. The species has a distinctive crest on the top of the head and a mane that runs between their forehead and shoulders. They have a prehensile snout that is used to reach leaves and fruit, and large teeth for grinding up their food.

The South American tapir, also known as the lowland tapir, is most closely related to the horse and rhinoceros. The species is found in moist swamp forests and shrublands, grasslands and a wide variety of wetlands in north and central South America, including Paraguay, Brazil, Colombia, Argentina and Peru. It is the continent's largest native land mammal. It is listed as "vulnerable" on the International Union for Conservation of Nature and Natural Resources' (IUCN) Red List, with the population declining due to loss of habitat, hunting and competition with domestic livestock.

The Chicago Zoological Society has provided support to the Tapir Specialist Group, which is a unit of the IUCN Species Survival Commission. Projects by the organization have included a variety of field research in Argentina, Brazil, Colombia, Ecuador and French Guiana, to better understand tapir biology and how to save the species in its native habitat.

VILLAGE OF MELROSE PARK DRINKING WATER SOURCE

Lake Michigan is the surface water supply used to provide drinking water for Chicago and 123 suburban communities. The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has found that the quality of Lake Michigan has improved dramatically over the past 21 years. Lake Michigan, by volume, is the second largest Great Lake and the only one located totally within the United States. It serves as a source of drinking water, as a place for swimming and fishing, and as a scenic wonderland. Sources of drinking water used for both tap water and bottled water can pick up contaminants as water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground. The drinking water source is vulnerable to industrial waste and runoff from surrounding lands. Potential sources of pollution such as pesticides, herbicides, radioactive materials, and organic and inorganic petroleum and gas production by-products can impact the source water. We do not have indications of the presence of these contaminants at this time, mainly because of restrictions, which prohibit industrial effluents from entering Lake Michigan, Sewage treatment plant effluents are not discharged into the lake, thereby reducing the threat of microbial contamination. All 63 miles of shoreline within Illinois are now considered to be in good condition. The Illinois EPA Office of Groundwater will be doing a source water assessment within the next three years. When completed, all sources of Pollutants into Lake Michigan will be identified and there will be information regarding the source water's susceptibility to contaminants based on the findings of the assessment. Since the quality of the raw water source is good, conventional treatment methods of disinfection, coagulation and sedimentation, and sand filtration are adequate for producing a water that is free of harmful contaminants.

HOW IS MY WATER TREATED AND PURIFIED?

The City of Chicago Water Department provides the water treatment necessary to safeguard the water delivered to Melrose Park. Water is taken from Lake Michigan at several water inlets located about 3 miles from shore. Chlorine is then injected into the water for disinfection. The water then flows through a series of settling and filtration basins where small amounts of polymer and sedimentation chemicals are added. After this process is complete, the water is filtered to remove the sediment. At this point the water is filtered through layers of fine charcoal and silicate sand. Small particles are removed and pure clean water is ready to be re-chlorinated as a safeguard and precaution against any microorganisms.

VOLUNTARY TESTING (OPTIONAL)

The Chicago Water Department monitors for contaminants which are proposed to be regulated or for which no standards currently exist but which could provide useful information in assessing the quality of the source water or the drinking water.

Cryptosporidium – Analyses have been conducted monthly on the source water since April 1993. Cryptosporidium has not been detected in these samples. Treatment processes have been optimized to ensure that if there are cryptosporidium cysts in the source water, they will be removed during the treatment process. By maintaining a low turbidity and thereby removing the particles from the water, the threat of cryptosporidium organisms getting into the drinking water system is greatly reduced.

Asbestos – Samples are examined for asbestos fibers in the source water and finished water on a routine basis. The EPA has determined that asbestos fibers greater than 10 microns in length could potentially cause lung cancer. We did not find fibers that are in this size category.

Taste and odor compounds – MIB and geosmin are monitored both in the source water and finished water. These analyses assist the personnel to determine the effectiveness of the treatment process as they strive to reduce these compounds and provide a drinking water without detectable tastes and odors.

The City of Chicago carefully monitors the chlorine, using just enough chlorine to protect its customers, without compromising taste. Lastly, fluoride is added to inhibit tooth decay. A corrosive inhibitor is added to protect the distribution system pipes.

The finished water is pumped into the City of Chicago supply system. The water there is pumped westerly by the city's Springfield Pumping Station through a 48"-36" supply line to the Village of Melrose Park's connection at Harlem and Wabansia.

Water is stored in the Village's 2 million gallon reservoir and again pumped by a booster station at 8300 North Avenue. The water travels through a 42" supply line to 2-4 million gallon reservoirs at the 15th Avenue pumping station and a 2 million gallon reservoir at the 23rd Avenue Main Pumping Station. At those points the water is pumped into the local water distribution lines. The Village of Melrose Park once again tests the water for chlorine levels, and adds the required chlorine to insure clean and safe water to its consumers.

SUBSTANCE EXPECTED IN DRINKING WATER

Under The Safe Drinking Water Act. S.D.W.A., the U.S.A. Environmental Protection Agency is responsible for establishing national limits for hundreds of substances in drinking water. The Act also specifies various treatments that water systems must use to remove these substances.

The Food and Drug Administration regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which must provide the same protection for public health.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the USEPA's Safe Water Hotline (1-800-426-4791).

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. USEPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by Cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the USEPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (1-800-426-4791).

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. The Village Of Melrose Park is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. IF THERE WERE A PROBLEM WITH WATER CONTAMINANT, WHO WOULD NOTIFY ME?

If contaminant levels were to exceed the M.C.L. for safe use, the Village of Melrose Park Department of Public Works will notify you with newspaper, TV and radio announcements. Also, the Village's Emergency Services/Public Safety would patrol the streets of Melrose Park instructing you of what appropriate action you can use to protect your family's health. These actions might include boiling the water for a particular period of time.

TABULAR INFORMATION

This report includes tables of contaminants found in drinking water. The tables do not list contaminants that were not found in the Chicago and Melrose Park water supply. Any contaminants detected in Melrose Park's water were under maximum contaminants levels (M.C.L.) within the safe drinking water guidelines set by U.S. EPA and are not expected to cause any health risks. However, it is important for you to know exactly what was detected and how much of the substance was present in the water.

The Village of Melrose Park hopes this information helps make its water customers better informed on the water we use in our homes and businesses.

2021 NON-DETECTED CONTAMINANTS

The following table includes contaminants monitored for, but not detected in the most recent sample. The CCR rule does not require that this information be reported; however, monitoring had indicated that these contaminants were not present in the water supply. In some cases, if a contaminant is not detected in a water supply, monitoring can be reduced to once every three or six years, however, the Village monitors every year.

Action Level (AL): The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which water systems must follow.

WATER QUALITY DATA TABLE FOOTNOTES

Turbidity

Turbidity is a measure of the cloudiness of the water. We monitor it because it is a good indicator of water quality and the effectiveness of our filtration system and disinfectants.

Unregulated Contaminants:

A maximum contaminant level (MCL) for this contaminant has not been established by either state or federal regulations, nor has mandatory health effects language. The purpose for monitoring this contaminant is to assist USEPA in determining the occurrence of unregulated contaminants in drinking water, and whether future regulation is warranted.

Fluoride

Fluoride is added to the water supply to help promote strong teeth. The Illinois Department of Public Health recommends an optimal fluoride range of 0.9 mg/l to 1.2 mg/l.

Sodium

There is not a state or federal MCL for sodium. Monitoring is required to provide information to consumers and health officials that are concerned about sodium intake due to dietary precautions. If you are on a sodium-restricted diet, you should consult a physician about this level of sodium in the water.

Until 01/01/2005, surface water supplies serving less than 10,000 people, any size water supply that purchase from a surface water source, and groundwater supplies serving more than 10,000 people must meet a state imposed TTHM MCL of 100 ppm.
