#### A QUICK NOTE TO UPDATE WEEKEND PARKING RULES ...

As of Thursday, Dec. 1, 2022, parking is no longer permitted on both sides of the street on weekends.

Overnight parking restrictions remain the same in the West Melrose and Winston Park areas.

Residents who wish to participate in the new program can contact Deputy Chief of Police Anthony Greco at cameras@melroseparkpd.com.


Residents must then fill out a form for participation in the program.

Camera Program will be launched in early 2023.






#### Give a phone - save a life. Donate your old cell phones today

#### **Holiday Fire Safety Tips**

Our holiday traditions can increase the risk of home fire. Learn how to stay safe while you celebrate. From Thanksgiving to New Year, it's time to enjoy our favorite holiday traditions, celebrating around the table, and making new memories with friends and family. To ensure that the festivities are both happy and safe, here are some useful holiday season fire safety tips from Red Cross regions across America.

#### **Cooking and Baking**

No holiday celebration would be complete without a feast, but be sure to take precautions against kitchen fires when you're cooking and baking. That includes keeping children and flammable items such as grocery bags and kitchen towels away from the stove and oven. Clean up greasy spills as you go to remove another fire hazard. If you're deep frying a turkey, keep the fryer well away from structures and trees, make sure your turkey is fully thawed, and follow the manufacturer's instructions for your fryer. See the National Fire Protection Association's guidelines for Cooking Safety at www.nfpa.org/Public-Education/Fire-causes-and-risks/Top-fire-causes/Cooking.

#### **Christmas Trees**

Old fashioned Christmas celebrations featured wax candles on live tree branches – inside homes! Today we know better, but risks still remain. If your family prefers real trees, be sure to water yours

every day because dry needles and wood catch fire more easily. Go ahead and use many strings of light, but don't plug more than three strings into each other (opt for a power strip instead). Discard light strings that are worn or broken. And be sure to always unplug the lights before leaving the house or going to sleep.



#### Menorah or Kinara

It's possible to buy electric menorahs and kinaras, but if you prefer traditional candles you can still celebrate Hanukkah and Kwanzaa in a fire-smart way. Keep flammable items, including curtains and holiday decorations, at least 3 feet away from your candles. Place your menorah or kinara on a non-flammable surface to catch the melting candle wax, such as a tray lined with aluminum foil. Never leave lit candles unattended.



#### **Fireplaces**

Nothing takes the chill off winter holidays like the light and heat of a fire on your hearth. Just be sure to keep "fuel" – from wrapping paper to rugs to clothing – at least 3 feet away from the flames. Use a fire screen to keep embers and logs from escaping. Lastly, make sure all embers are fully extinguished before you turn in for the night.



#### **Fireworks**

We usually talk about firework safety for the Fourth of July, but many New Year celebrations also include fireworks. If you'll be setting off fireworks at home, choose a location away from buildings and trees. Be sure your spectators, including children and pets, stay well back. Keep a supply of



water or fire extinguisher at hand. If you live in an area that's experiencing a drought, consider cancelling the show this year – a stray spark that lands on dry grass or leaves can lead to a wildfire.



## Always Stepping Up ...

#### Melrose Park Police Department and Area Towing to Launch Catalytic Converter Painting Program Next Spring

The Melrose Park Police Department is partnering with Area Towing of Melrose Park for the catalytic converter painting Program that will take place in early spring 2023.

The effort to begin painting catalytic converters so they can be more easily identified as a way of deterring thieves.

Law enforcement agencies across the Cook County communities have partnered in an effort to mitigate the alarming trend of increasing catalytic converter thefts over the past few years.

A catalytic converter is a device that converts toxic exhaust gasses from an internal combustion engine into less-toxic pollutants. The converters contain precious metals in a muffler-like package attached to the exhaust pipe. It's readily accessible underneath the car and thieves can steal them within minutes. They sell them for the precious metals and it can cost car owners thousands to replace.

Law enforcement officials are hoping that painting the expensive car parts will make it difficult for them to be sold to purveyors of the stolen parts as they could be easily identified as stolen, and therefore a liability to scrap yards and other potential buyers.

## A Note from the Melrose Park Fire Department **Buried Fire Hydrants Can Pose Danger**

Living in the Chicago Metropolitan area, we always expect a snowy winter. However, residents never know for certain how much snow will blanket the area. Hopefully, this winter will not result in the massive snowfalls we experienced in recent years. Melrose Park residents know only too well the obvious difficulties and hazards that accompany a hard winter. However, many do not realize the dangers and difficulties that can result when fire hydrants are buried in snow. Such conditions make it difficult, if not impossible, for firefighters to locate and uncover hydrants in their efforts to extinguish fires. Director of Fire Department Rick Beltrame hopes that residents will help firefighters by clearing nearby fire hydrants when they shovel or plow their sidewalks and driveways. The cooperation of all neighbors will go a long way toward keeping Melrose Park's residents safe this winter.

#### Homeland Security — Public Safety, Assist Gottlieb Memorial Hospital With Drills

On Nov. 28 and 29, evacuation drills were conducted on the 6th floor West and 4th South of Gottlieb Memorial Hospital in Melrose Park.

The purpose of the exercise was to demonstrate the actual physical movement/evacuation of patients from the fourth and sixth floors down to the ground level and into a waiting ambulance. Members of the Melrose Park Fire Department and Melrose Park Departments of Homeland Security – Public Safety participated in this drill. Their role was that of observers, safety and instruction. At the beginning of each drill, the evacuation policy was reviewed, as well as the acronym RACE (Rescue, Alert, Contain, Extinguish), command responsibilities at the Incident Command, unit and evacuation team levels were discussed, the role of first responders during such an event and safety protocols for the drill were explained. The drill commenced with the decision to evacuate having been made. The drill was conducted multiple times on each shift to ensure all colleagues had a chance to participate. Each drill ended with the patient being placed into a waiting ambulance.

Republic Services is contracted to pick up your regular, everyday garbage and household items, such as couches, tables, mattresses, box springs, desks and chairs, etc.

Recycling and yard waste is collected on Tuesdays from April through November and must be placed in a 33-gallon refuse can or biodegradable paper bags. Plastic bags will not be accepted.



## IDPH Reports 63 Illinois Counties are at Elevated COVID-19 Community Levels

With COVID-19 cases and other respiratory viruses on the increase around Illinois, the Illinois Department of Public Health is reminding the public to take steps to protect themselves and their loved ones during the holiday season. This includes being fully vaccinated and boosted for COVID-19 and the flu, and getting tested for COVID-19 before attending holiday gatherings, especially if you'll be visiting someone at high risk for severe outcome. Public health officials also urged Illinoisans who test positive to immediately contact a health care provider and discuss whether they should take one of the widely available and effective treatments for COVID-19.

Data indicates that the risk of hospitalization and severe outcomes from COVID-19 is much higher for unvaccinated people than for those who are up to date on their vaccinations. All data are provisional and are subject to change.

The CDC authorized two new bivalent booster vaccines on Sept. 1 that include an mRNA component of the original strain to provide an immune response that is broadly protective against COVID-19 and an added mRNA component in common between the omicron variant BA.4 and BA.5 lineages to provide better protection against COVID-19 caused by the omicron variant.

"As the weather continues to get colder, Illinois is beginning to see an anticipated increase in COVID-19 and other respiratory illnesses, such as the flu," said IDPH director, Dr. Sameer Vohra. "Please continue to take all preventative measure to protect yourself, your family and friends, especially very young children and individuals over 65 who are most vulnerable to severe outcomes. These effective strategies include COVID-19 testing, especially if visiting someone at risk for severe disease; enhanced ventilation; good hand hygiene; staying home if sick; and getting up to date with both the COVID-19 bivalent booster and the flu shot."

#### **Medium Community Level**

In counties at the Medium Community Level, persons who are elderly or immunocompromised (at risk of severe outcomes) are advised to wear a mask in indoor public places. They should also get up to date on COVID-19 vaccines or get their bivalent booster, if eligible.

IDPH has been supporting pharmacies and health care providers in efforts to increase their inventories of the various FDA-authorized treatments. There are over 1,200 treatment locations in Illinois – including all the major retail pharmacies. More than 96.7 percent of the state's population is within a 10-mile radius of one of these locations.

A total of 25,393,251 vaccines have been administered in Illinois. The seven-day rolling average of vaccines administered daily is 13,865 doses, including the bivalent booster and first doses. Since Nov. 25, 97,052 vaccine doses were reported administered in Illinois. More than 1.9 million people in Illinois have received the new bivalent booster dose since it was authorized. Of Illinois' total population, more than 78 percent have received at least one COVID-19 vaccine dose, more than 70 percent have completed their primary series of COVID-19 vaccines, and of the eligible population, more than 16 percent have received the bivalent booster dose, according to data from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

#### **High Community Level**

The CDC recommends the following measures for people in areas that are rated at High Community Level for COVID-19 transmission:

- Wear a well-fitting mask indoors in public, regardless of vaccination status (including in K-12 schools and other indoor community settings).
- If you are immunocompromised or high risk for severe disease:
  - Wear a mask or respirator that provides you with greater protection.
  - Consider avoiding non-essential indoor activities in public where you could be exposed.
  - Talk to your health care provider about whether you need to take other precautions.
  - Have a plan for rapid testing if needed (e.g., having home tests or access to testing).
  - If you test positive: Talk to your health care provider about whether you are a candidate for treatments like oral antivirals and monoclonal antibodies.
- If you have household or social contact with someone at high risk for severe disease:
  - Consider self-testing to detect infection before contact.
  - Consider wearing a mask when indoors with them.
- · Stay up to date with COVID-19 vaccines and boosters.
- Maintain improved ventilation throughout indoor spaces when possible.
- Follow CDC recommendations for isolation and guarantine, including getting tested if you are exposed to COVID-19 or have symptoms of COVID-19.

#### Winter Storms ... The Deceptive Killers

Winter storms can range from a moderate snow over a few hours to a blizzard with blinding, wind-driven snow that lasts for several days. Some winter storms are large enough to affect several states, while others affect only a single community. Many winter storms are accompanied by dangerously low temperatures and sometimes by strong winds, icing, sleet and freezing rain.

Regardless of the severity of a winter storm, you should be prepared in order to remain safe during these events.

#### **Know the Difference**

Winter Storm Outlook – Winter storm conditions are possible in the next two to five days.

**Winter Weather Advisory** – Winter weather conditions are expected to cause significant inconveniences and may be hazardous. When caution is used, these situations should not be life threatening.

**Winter Storm Watch** – Winter storm conditions are possible within the next 36 to 48 hours. People in a watch area should review their winter storm plans and stay informed about weather conditions.

Winter Storm Warning – Life-threatening, severe winter conditions have begun or will begin within 24 hours. People in a warning area should take precautions immediately.

#### **How to Prepare for a Winter Storm**

- Winterize your vehicle and keep the gas tank full. A full tank will keep the fuel line from freezing.
- Insulate your home by installing storm windows or covering windows with plastic from the inside to keep cold air out.
- Maintain heating equipment and chimneys by having them cleaned and inspected every year.
- If you will be going away during cold weather, leave the heat on in your home, set to a temperature no lower than 55° F.

#### Put Together a Supply Kit

- Water at least a three-day supply; one gallon per person per day.
- Food at least a three-day supply of non-perishable, easy-to-prepare food.
- Flashlight.
- Battery-powered or hand-crank radio (NOAA Weather Radio, if possible).
- Extra batteries.
- First aid kit.
- Medications (seven-day supply) and medical items (hearing aids with extra batteries, glasses, contact lenses, syringes, etc.).
- Multipurpose tool.
- Sanitation and personal hygiene items.
- Copies of personal documents (medication list and pertinent medical information, proof of address, deed/lease to home, passports, birth certificates, insurance policies).
- Cell phone with chargers.
- Family and emergency contact information.
- Extra cash.
- Baby supplies (bottles, formula, baby food, diapers).
- Pet supplies (collar, leash, ID, food, carrier, bowl).
- Tools/supplies for securing your home.
- Sand, rock salt or non-clumping kitty litter to make walkways and steps less slippery.
- Warm coats, gloves or mittens, hats, boots, and extra blankets and warm clothing for all household members.
- Ample alternate heating methods such as fireplaces or wood- or coal-burning stoves.

#### **Winter's Impact**

#### **Storms with Strong Winds**

Sometimes winter storms are accompanied by strong winds creating blizzard conditions with blinding wind-driven snow, severe drifting and dangerous wind chill. Strong winds with these intense storms and cold fronts can knock down trees, utility poles and power lines. Storms near the coast can cause coastal flooding and beach erosion as well as sink ships at sea. In the west and Alaska, winds descending off the mountains can gust to 100 mph or more damaging roofs and other structures.

#### **Extreme Cold**

Extreme cold often accompanies a winter storm or is left in its wake. Prolonged exposure to the cold can cause frostbite or hypothermia and become life-threatening. Infants and elderly people are most susceptible. What constitutes extreme cold and its effect varies across different areas of the United States. In areas unaccustomed to winter weather, near freezing temperatures are considered "extreme cold." Freezing temperatures can cause severe damage to citrus fruit crops and other vegetation. Pipes may freeze and burst in homes that are poorly insulated or without heat. In the north, below zero temperatures may be considered as "extreme cold." Long cold spells can cause rivers to freeze, disrupting shipping. Ice jams may form and lead to flooding.

#### **Ice Storms**

Heavy accumulations of ice can bring down trees, electrical wires, telephone poles and lines, and communication towers. Communications and power can be disrupted for days while utility companies work to repair the extensive damage. Even small accumulations of ice may cause extreme hazards to motorists and pedestrians.

#### **Heavy Snow Storms**

Heavy snow can immobilize a region and paralyze a city, stranding commuters, stopping the flow of supplies and disrupting emergency and medical services. Accumulations of snow can collapse buildings and knock down trees and power lines. In rural areas, homes and farms may be isolated for days, and unprotected livestock may be lost. In the mountains, heavy snow can lead to avalanches. The cost of snow removal, repairing damages and loss of business can have large economic impacts on cities and towns.

#### **Winter Precipitation**

#### **Snow**

- FLURRIES Light snow falling for short durations. No accumulation or light dusting is all that is expected.
- SHOWERS Snow falling at varying intensities for brief periods of time. Some accumulation is possible.
- SQUALLS Brief, intense snow showers accompanied by strong, gusty winds. Accumulation may be significant. Snow squalls are best known in the Great Lakes region.
- BLOWING SNOW Wind-driven snow that reduces visibility and causes significant drifting. Blowing snow may be snow that is falling and/or loose snow on the ground picked up by the wind.
- BLIZZARD Winds over 35 mph with snow and blowing snow reducing visibility to near zero.

#### **Sleet**

Raindrops that freeze into ice pellets before reaching the ground. Sleet usually bounces when hitting a surface and does not stick to objects. However, it can accumulate like snow and cause a hazard to motorists.

#### **Freezing Rain**

Rain that falls onto a surface with a temperature below freezing. This causes it to freeze to surfaces, such as trees, cars, and roads, forming a coating or glaze of ice. Even small accumulations of ice can cause a significant hazard.

#### **Winter Storm Facts: What Makes a Winter Storm?**

#### **Cold Air**

Below freezing temperatures in the clouds and near the ground are necessary to make snow and/or ice.


#### **Moisture**

To form clouds and precipitation. Air blowing across a body of water, such as a large lake or the ocean, is an excellent source of moisture.

#### Lift

something to raise the moist air to form the clouds and cause precipitation. An example of lift is warm air colliding with cold air and being forced to rise over the cold dome. The boundary between the warm and cold air masses is called a front. Another example of lift is air flowing up a mountain side.







#### **Grants, Access to Capital and Tax Incentives!**

On Nov. 15, the MPCCCD was joined by representatives from the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity (DCEO) and the West Regional Enterprise Zone to discuss current and upcoming programs and support to help businesses fuel growth of their existing business, expand/update their current location and even to start a new business!

Over 80 local businesses were on hand and heard from Sacella Smith, DCEO regional manager, as she shared programs to support businesses on everything from site selection and access to capital to workforce development and grant opportunities. Diana Alfaro, DCEO business development manager for OMEE with DCEO presented opportunities and supports for minority-, women- and veteran-owned businesses, as well as other small business programs available through DCEO. Jack Stonebraker, board chairman for the West Regional Enterprise Zone, shared information regarding tax incentives available to businesses in Melrose Park, Bellwood, Broadview and Maywood as part of the enterprise zone that was approved by the state and took effect January 2020. Stonebraker indicated that to date over 60 businesses have taken advantage of the zone benefits and have saved over \$21.5 million in state sales tax while investing over \$220 million in improvements to existing businesses as well as new construction!

One message that was clear from all presentations at the Nov. 15 meeting was that although there are several programs available, as well as grant opportunities for businesses, the state of Illinois now requires any business or nonprofit receiving grants to be SAMS-, UEI- and GATA-certified to receive grant funds from the state. For information on or assistance in completing your SAMS, UEI and GATA, contact the MPCCCD at (708) 343-9500.

Businesses were encouraged to complete the certification processes before grants are even announced as the process can sometimes take six to eight weeks for approvals and when grants are announced they usually have an application window of 30 days or less.

One of the primary functions of the MPCCCD is to connect businesses to resources to help support growth and to make a difference in the community. Although this takes many different shapes and approaches, one of the primary efforts is to host monthly training events, informational meetings and networking sessions, and participating in community events.



# Lead Hazard Home Improvements Reduction Program Free Home LED Inspection and Repairs

Who can apply? An adult living in a grant community, who has a child under six years old living with them or visiting with them regularly or a pregnant woman in the household can apply.

Who qualifies for the program? Applicants will qualify if they...

- live in a grant community
- lived in a house built before 1978
- live with children under six years old
- babysit or have children under six years old who visit them often or
- have income below the grant program limit

#### **What is Lead Poisoning?**

Lead poisoning is the number one environmental illness of children.

Lead is a poisonous metal that our bodies cannot use. Lead was used in paint before it was banned in the United States in 1978. Deteriorating lead-based paint, lead dust from renovation or deterioration in buildings and contaminated soil remain the most likely sources of childhood lead exposure. Water from lead pipes, make-up, imported spices and candy can also be sources of exposure.

Lead poisoning is hard to see, but it is very harmful. There is no safe blood-lead level.

Lead can cause lowered IQ and learning problems; trouble concentrating and paying attention; speech disorders; anemia (a disease caused by low iron levels), which can result in tiredness, shortness of breath, and difficulty paying attention; and when exposed children become adults, they have a higher risk of high blood pressure and heart disease.

# DHS Announces Extension of REAL ID Full Enforcement Deadline

**States to Have Additional Time to Meet Requirements** 

On Monday, Dec. 5, the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) announced its intent to extend the REAL ID full enforcement date by 24 months, from May 3, 2023 to May 7, 2025. Under the new regulations published to execute this change, states will now have additional time to ensure their residents have driver's licenses and identification cards that meet the security standards established by the REAL ID Act. As required by the law, following the enforcement deadline, federal agencies, including the Transportation Security Administration (TSA), will be prohibited from accepting driver's licenses and identification cards that do not meet these federal standards.

"DHS continues to work closely with U.S. states, the District of Columbia, and the U.S. territories to meet REAL ID requirements," said Secretary of Homeland Security Alejandro N. Mayorkas. "This extension will give states needed time to ensure their residents can obtain a REAL ID-compliant license or identification card. DHS will also use this time to implement innovations to make the process more efficient and accessible. We will continue to ensure that the American public can travel safely."

The extension is necessary, in part, to address the lingering impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic on the ability to obtain a REAL ID driver's license or identification card. REAL ID progress over the past two years has been significantly hindered by state driver's licensing agencies having to work through the backlogs created by the pandemic. Many of these agencies took various steps in response to the pandemic, including automatically extending the expiration dates of driver's licenses and identification cards, and shifting operations to appointment only.

Passed by Congress in 2005, following a 9/11 Commission recommendation, the REAL ID Act establishes minimum security standards for state-issued driver's licenses and identification cards. Security standards include incorporating anti-counterfeiting technology, preventing insider fraud and using documentary evidence and record checks to ensure a person is who they claim to be. Under the new regulations, beginning May 7, 2025, every traveler 18 years of age or older will need a REAL ID-compliant driver's license or identification card, state-issued enhanced driver's license, or another TSA-acceptable form of identification at airport 1security checkpoints for domestic air travel.

Since enactment of the REAL ID Act in 2005, advancements in technology have enabled TSA to make significant improvements in checkpoint screening, particularly in the areas of identity management, on-person screening, accessible property screening and alarm resolution. Through the deployment of technologies, such as Advanced Imaging Technology (AIT), Advanced Technology (AT) X-ray, then Computed Tomography (CT), Bottled Liquids Scanners (BLS), and Credential Authentication Technology (CAT), as well as deployment of Passenger Screening Canines (PSC) and the rollout of TSA PreCheck®, TSA has continually advanced its security capabilities. TSA also increased its vetting capability through Secure Flight, a risk-based passenger prescreening program that enhances security by identifying low- and high-risk passengers before they arrive at the airport by matching their names against trusted traveler lists and watchlists. REAL ID requirements will strengthen these improvements further by providing an additional layer of confidence in the identity of the traveler.

All 50 U.S. states, the District of Columbia and four of five U.S. territories covered by the REAL ID Act and related regulations are issuing REAL ID-compliant driver's licenses and identification cards. These standards have significantly improved the reliability and accuracy of state-issued driver's licenses and identification cards.

#### Triton's Cernan Center Celebrates the 50th Anniversary of the Apollo 17 Mission with a Moon Rock Display

Triton College's Cernan Earth and Space Center will display a NASA moon

rock collected during the Apollo 17 Mission in 1972. The celebration began Wednesday, Nov. 23, 2022, and will run through Saturday, April 8, 2023. Admission to the exhibit is free.

The lunar sample, known as a moon rock, was collected during Gene Cernan's Apollo 17 mission, NASA's final Apollo mission to the moon. The moon rock is encased within a lucite pyramid and will sit atop a lighted pedestal, which has been provided to Triton by NASA. This display will be viewable for free during normal business hours, including Saturday evenings.



To complement the lunar sample, adjacent exhibits will examine lunar geology, the origin of the moon, equipment needed for living in space and Apollo in popular culture.

A permanent addition to the Cernan Center will be an interactive activity presented on a large, flat-touch-screen table. The table will run a program called "Colonize Mars" in which multiple users can work to develop a colony on Mars through several stages of objectives. Players can work individually or together to build their colony as quickly as possible.

The Cernan Center's Planetarium will be featuring several shows, such as Dawn of the Space Age; Forward! To the Moon; One World, One Sky: Big Bird's Adventure – Early Explorers; Rusty Rocket's Last Blast, as well as a holiday-themed laser show, A Trans-Siberian Christmas.

The Planetarium admission is \$4 for youth ages 2-17 and seniors 55+, and \$8 for adults.

The Triton College Cernan Earth and Space Center hours are Monday-Thursday, 9:30 a.m.-5 p.m.; Friday, 9:30 a.m.-4 p.m.; and Saturday, 6:30-9:30 p.m. The Cernan Center is closed on Sundays.

# Triton College Offering Lifeguarding Classes this Spring

Triton College will be offering an entry-level lifeguarding course for individuals ages 15 and up. The course will teach participants the knowledge and skills to prevent, recognize and respond to aquatic emergencies. Students will learn to provide support or aid for breathing and cardiac emergencies, injuries and sudden illness, until an EMS responder arrives.

Those who take the course must meet several requirements, such as being able to swim 300 yards non-stop; tread water for two minutes using only their legs; complete a timed event within one minute, 40 seconds, starting in the water; swimming 20 yards; and performing a surface dive to a depth of 10 to 12 feet to retrieve a 10-pound object, then return to the surface and swim 20 yards on their back to return to the starting point, then complete the exercise by exiting the water without using steps or a ladder.

Those who successfully complete the course will receive an American Red Cross Certificate for Lifeguarding, valid for two years.

The event consisted of remarks and refreshments in the R Building (R-221), with the unveiling held outside.

Mark Stephens, Triton College's board chairman, described former President Jorndt as a "wonderful man," and "an honor and privilege to work with."



"It was my good fortune to call George Jorndt my friend," said Chairman Stephens. "In addition, he was my colleague who was instrumental in our efforts to transform Triton College. With George as our president, Triton regained its status as an outstanding educational institution focused on serving the residents of the Triton district. There isn't anyone who deserves this honor more than George Jorndt."

Dr. Jorndt's daughter Gretchen Reyes, described how her father's legacy will always live on through Triton College.

"I stand here today in front of so many people that my dad loved on a campus where he spent his best years," she said. "I know he wanted the best for the college and the students. I am so honored that his name, the stories and the passion that he had for Triton College will live on for years to come."

Mary-Rita Moore, current Triton College president, said she has "incredible memories with Dr. Jorndt," and "he always gave his personal touch with kindness and respect."

"For more than 30 years, Dr. Jorndt was a good steward of our Community College District 504, serving as an educator, leader, coach, cheerleader and mentor," said President Moore. "As a lifelong learner, no matter what the role or activity he was involved in, Dr. Jorndt always gave it his personal touch while performing his responsibilities with kindness and respect. It is fitting that our athletic complex bear his name."

Dr. Jorndt's friends and family in attendance expressed that he always wanted what was best for Triton.

"Triton meant the world to him," said Mary Jorndt, Dr. Jorndt's wife. "He absolutely loved it."

Jorey Reyes, Dr. Jorndt's granddaughter, said that Triton is a big part of their lives because of her late grandfather.

"It's amazing he's being recognized by an institution that we all really love," she said. "He was really important to us."

Garrick Abezetian, associate vice president of Athletics and Athletic Activities, and John Lambrecht, associate vice president of Operations and

Maintenance, performed the unveiling of the athletic complex, located outside the R Building on Fifth Avenue, while surrounded by his friends, family and colleagues. The celebration ended with cake and refreshments.

Dr. Jorndt began working at Triton in August of 1969 as a full-time faculty member as well as the college's swimming and diving coach. In 1973, he became the director of Admissions and Records, and within one year, he raised enrollment from 12,500 students to over 16,000 students. After five years in the position, Triton's admission was over 23,000 students. He began serving as president in 1992 and retired in 2001.

Dr. Jorndt grew up on the north side of Chicago. He received his doctorate degree in public administration from University of Utah in 1972.

He is survived by his wife Mary; three children - Douglas Jorndt, Bryan Jorndt and Gretchen Reyes; and seven grandchildren. Dr. Jorndt passed away on June 27, 2021, surrounded by his family. His daughter Gretchen Reyes is currently a professor of business at Triton College.

Ellison holds a master's degree in integration of psychology and religion, and has been teaching psychology for 15 years.




"For today in the city of David a savior has been born for you who is Messiah and Lord."

# Dominican Literacy Center Continues to Provide English Instruction and More ...

The Dominican Literacy Center originally began in Chicago, at the request of the pastor of Our Lady of Grace Parish in 1996. In 2008, the building housing the center was deemed to need extensive repairs and could not be used. In June of 2008, the center was graciously welcomed to rent a part of Sacred Heart Convent in Melrose Park, where it has continued to provide English instruction for the past 14 years.

The goal of the Dominican Literacy Center is the empowerment of persons who experience personal and economic limitations within our English-speaking society. Through literacy education and personal relationships, we strive to provide a small step toward eliminating racial and cultural prejudice and stereotypes, as well as a step up for persons seeking improvement in their personal, familial and economic abilities.

The Dominican Literacy Center provides weekly one and half hour tutored sessions in which one student meets with one tutor. The center provides tutoring in speaking, reading and writing English, as well as tutoring in preparation for the Citizenship interview and exam. This individualized instruction is provided for immigrant women and men (ages 17+) who are – endeavoring to reduce literacy and its consequential effects of isolation (due to their inability to communicate in English with health care providers, children's teachers, neighbors, co-workers, community leaders and/or first responders); in low-level jobs (due to lack of training or skills, or an inability to demonstrate their already achieved skills and knowledge); powerless to supervise their adolescent children or to influence systemic change; lacking confidence to enroll in traditional classes and or fear of requesting help when needed.

#### **English Classes**

English classes are provided for those who want to learn to speak, read or write in English. One student meets with one tutor, once a week.

These classes are offered at the Dominican Literacy Center, 1503 Rice Street, in Melrose Park (near Sacred Heart/St. Eulalia Parish).

Our program also assists persons studying for their Citizenship interview/exam.

We presently offer classes on Monday through Thursday, in the mornings and afternoons.

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#### **D&R Press Celebrates 50 Years in Business**

#### Melrose-Park-Based Company is Gold Standard and the Epitome of Printing Excellence

#### A Little D&R History from David L. Ransom, Jr., Founder ...

First, I thank GOD for His many blessings He has bestowed upon my family and me. I also thank Him for giving me a family that has been supportive of me and my printing business from the inception to this day. He has provided me many good times and brought me through the troubled times. Not to mention supplying D&R PRESS with great employees and many loyal customers over the past 50 years.

The Beginning: My being in printing started while I attended Austin High School back in 1970. I was a junior at the time. My cousin Dennis, a sophomore, told me how

much he liked the Graphic Arts (printing) class. He explained that he intended to take another advanced class and asked me to sign up with him in hopes that we may be in the same class together. So I

signed up for Graphic Arts in my senior year. Dennis and I ended up being in different classes.

Needless to say, I really enjoyed the class, so much so that my skills quickly surpassed my fellow classmates. I soon became one of the best hand-set typogra-

phers in the class. Because I was so far ahead, my teacher, Mr. Gerkhe, put me on the press while waiting for the rest of the class to catch up. He then asked me to do a special project, which I quickly agreed to. The project was for me to design and print anything of my choice and I chose to create recipe cards for my mother. I came up with the layout, set the type, completed a proof, made the plate, printed the recipe cards and presented them to my mother.

At that point, there was about five weeks left until graduation. I asked Mr. Gerkhe how I should go about furthering my edu-

cation in graphic arts. He said I should attend Washburn Trade School for printing. He also mentioned a couple of colleges. He further explained that companies often call the school looking for students that are interested in an apprenticeship. About three weeks before graduation in June 1971, he pulled me aside and told me of a printing company that called looking for such a student and asked if I was interested. I immediately said, "yes". He then gave me the phone number and I called to set up an interview with Mr. Sam Ranis of Ranis Menu Printing.

Sam was a Greek immigrant that had settled in the US about 20 years prior to my meeting him. His company printed 85 percent of the daily menus in the city of Chicago and the suburbs. He was running the same type of press that I learned to run in high school. After meeting with Mr. Ranis, he offered me the job and I gratefully accepted. This became my first job in printing. The position required me to be downtown in the Chicago Loop everyday after school. My duties included running the press and making deliveries to the restaurants daily, Monday through Friday. Once I graduated, I immediately went to work full time for Sam.

I was at Ranis about seven months before I was introduced to Kim Jue, a friend of Sam's. Kim, also an immigrant, printed menus for the Chinese restaurants in Chicago's China Town district. A short time later, I ran into Kim and he asked me if I would like to work for him at night running a 17"x22" Webendorfer — a fairly large offset press on which I was never trained. He said he would teach me and being enthusiastic to acquire any knowledge I could, I accepted. So, after working a full day from 9 a.m.-5:30 p.m. with Sam at Ranis Menu, I would leave and go upstairs in the same building to work for Kim until 10 or 11 p.m., two to three nights per week.

I really had a blast learning all I could on these presses and it was pretty cool to work :

for both Greek and Chinese printers. I learned a lot about their heritages, but mostly I learned a work ethic that remains with me until this day. Their energy and enthusiasm was to be admired. At this point I did not realize that I was working in the heart of the famous Printer's Row of Chicago.

We were located at 529 S. Dearborn in Chicago, III. Every building within an area two blocks east, three blocks south and three blocks west were printing-related com-

panies. This included printers, paper companies, binderies, printing equipment dealers, printing supplies and everything related.

Early in 1972, my cousin Sam Bianchi called to tell me of a friend of his (Joe Rossi) that worked the night shift in his full-time position for Hall Printing, where they printed magazines and books. Joe was looking for a kid to come in a couple of times a week to clean up his part-time printing business, Beacon Press, which he ran during the day. I accepted the position with

I worked with Joe for a while, keeping his shop in order and learning all I could. Due to financial issues, Joe was no longer able to keep me on his payroll. I was willing to do anything I could to be around printing, so I volunteered to continue on without pay – just to be in the printing atmosphere and learn. Joe didn't



feel right about this and initially refused the offer. So, I brought up the old hand-feed letterpress Joe had sitting idle in the corner of his shop. I explained I could use that machine for my own printing orders. I imagined I could use the press to print business cards, Christmas cards, invitations, etc. Joe explained that he didn't actually own the press, but put me in contact with the owner who was a friend of his.

Immediately after Joe gave me the name and number, I called and asked if I could use the press. His response was "How would you like to buy the press, kid?" This reply shocked me. I hesitated to answer, because I had no idea what a machine like this was worth. My pause caused him to say, "How about a hundred dollars?" I was stunned. I agreed and asked when and where we could meet. After the paperwork was completed, I informed Joe that I would be moving the press. He then explained that he occasionally uses the machine and offered me a \$35 per month lease.

At that point on Sept. 2, 1972, D&R Press was in business on Pulaski Road, two blocks south of Addison Street in the city of Chicago.

Within a few months, Beacon Press lost its lease, forcing me to junk that press because it was not worth the cost to move it. However, I was under pressure because I had weekly printing jobs to produce. So, I rented a press from my friend and owner of Federal Typesetting which was located at 525 S. Dearborn and just a couple of floors above Ranis Menu Printing. I was able to work at Ranis during the day for eight hours and then head upstairs to Federal Type to print my jobs because their second shift usually kept them operating most nights until 11 p.m.

Unfortunately, this only lasted a few months, because Federal Typesetting Company was a union shop and the owner was told by his employees that they would walk off the job if I continued to operate there. So, to avoid causing him any trouble, I finished the jobs I had to complete and departed.

Thankfully, I contracted my work with an elderly printer at Meredith Printing Company on the west side of Chicago. This gave me time to shop for and find a press in the *Tradin' Times*. This press was originally part of the fleet of presses at Cuneo Press. After purchasing it, my father, David, Sr., and my friend George Spathies, helped me move it into my dad's garage at 5468 W. Rice St., on the west side of Chicago, in the Austin neighborhood.

From the middle of 1973 until April of 1976, I ran D&R Press out of my parents' garage. In 1976, I moved the company to Printers Row at 525 S. Dearborn on the fifth floor of a seven-story building that housed printing companies and related services. I was still working for Ranis Menu Printing, which was on the first floor of this same building.

During the years of 1976-1980, I continued to work full time for Ranis Menu Printing. We had a great working relationship. I would work eight hours at Ranis during the day

and then go upstairs and work at D&R for six to eight hours every night and then eight hours on Saturdays and Sundays.

In 1980, the 525 S. Dearborn building fell prey to the urban development of condos in the Printers Row district. I located the Patten Building in the South Loop. D&R moved into its new location on the third floor of 161 W. Harrison Street. This was a 12-story building full of printers, binderies and graphic art supply companies, simply nothing but printing and related services.

During the next 15 years at 161 W. Harrison, we grew to 10 presses with a full dark room and Prepress Department, including typesetting and design capabilities. At one point we had 8,000 square feet of space. But as urban growth would have it, this building also went condo in 1995 and D&R Press was forced to move yet again to a new location.

Through my old contact, Steve Ranis (Sam's son) I learned of a printer that was looking to retire but still had a lengthy lease. I agreed to assume the lease and take over the equipment. The shop was over 5,000 square feet at 329 W. 18th Street in the South Loop area.

This acquisition allowed us to sell some of our older equipment and purchase the existing shop without moving large machines. The new shop contained two large offset presses, as well as some sophisticated bindery equipment. By January 1996, our operation was in full swing.

D&R Press was no longer a small player in the Chicago printing market. We were bigger and more efficient, now employing up to 15 people at our peak.

We enjoyed a non-stop, steady growth of 10 percent every year until 2000, when we noticed a change in the economy. Then 2001 brought 9/11 and changed the world as we knew it.

We continued through tough times. We lost key people starting with a department head leaving Chicago for a warmer climate in 2002. My mom, Esther, who was our receptionist for over 13 years, passed away in 2003. Our foreman moved back to Puerto Rico in 2004 to be with his ailing father and our head pressman of 19 years retired in 2005. Businesses continued to fail and print orders dwindled. We were thankful that we didn't have to let people go and my Faith in God kept me going.

While enduring the effects of a bad economy, declining business, the digital revolution, inflation and rising gas prices, we contemplated moving out of Chicago, where operating a small business became increasingly difficult. Some of our friends in the industry had already successfully moved to the burbs and felt they should have done it sooner.

In August of 2009, we approached our landlord of nearly 14 years about renewing our lease. We could not come to an agreement. So I mentioned to my son, David III, to take a "look around town" to see if there were any suitable spaces available for our new plant. David informed me of a storefront building with 5,000 square feet, an overhead door, a sufficient electrical supply and pre-built office space. This was perfect for D&R to set up shop.

As of Oct. 1, 2009, our new location was 7959 W. Grand Ave., Elmwood Park, Ill. Business continued to decline, but our lower overhead allowed us to stay afloat. The move and build-out was costly and we continued to struggle, but an opportunity arose that provided us with a needed influx of work at wholesale prices. Though it wasn't extremely lucrative, it supplied us with work and cash-flow - yet another example of God's Grace.

In the beginning of 2012, one of our business associates approached me with an opportunity that was a Godsend. Tony needed to exit the industry due to health problems and asked me if I was interested in taking over his shop. My simple and quick answer was, "I'm interested." As I left his shop that day, I was praying for answers on how to make this work with no money.

All the while, we were heavily involved with the U.S Department of State – being selected as the exclusive printer for The NATO Summit being held in Chicago that May. Tony persisted and sent us all of his financial records in an attempt to convince us to make an offer to buy out Rapid Copy.

Once the NATO project was completed, I conferred with my brother, Daryl, and my accountant of 30 years, and we made him an offer. Within five days, a deal was struck and D&R Press doubled in size, over night! I know it was God who sent this to me, because in my mind, I never thought I could make an offer that would work and yet the



changed our course and we began to grow; God had brought us through, yet again.

In February 2015, I lost my father - the man that let me set up shop in his garage more than 40 years prior. Broken-hearted, yet still grateful and Blessed, my God sent

another Blessing when we were approached by the 25-year pressman of another local printing company. Within a few weeks, D&R Press owned Romel Press and the D&R Press Print Group was formed. We were fast becoming a well-known local printing company in the suburbs while maintaining our client base in the city of Chicago.

Business continued to be steady and 2019 presented us with a hurdle; our "herbfriendly" neighbor caused a real estate tax increase on our building, forcing us to find a new place to call home. Steve, the son of my first boss, Sam Ranis, had established himself as a real estate agent in the area and located a beautiful building and by Christmas 2019, we relocated to our current home at 1723 N. 25th Ave., Melrose

The end of March 2020, brought the great "shutdown" and business went south, but only until God responded with our next Blessing and by December, Bulldog Printing joined our group buoying

us up for the next chapter. As we moved forward and the industry evolved,

we were approached with

an opportunity to venture

#### Taxes

Few people like paying taxes. Even fewer like preparing to pay taxes. However, finding last year's tax return and using it as a blueprint to know what is needed for this year's tax return can relieve some of the stress.

- Can you reduce tax liability by contributing more to a Bright Start college savings account? Or an ABLE account? Consider opening a Bright Start or ABLE account.

- Always consult your tax advisor, if possible.

- Should you have the ability to donate money to a favorite charity, please consider doing so. If you itemize your taxes, be sure to obtain a receipt.
- If you do not have the ability to donate money, please consider donating your time.

# Cook County Board Votes to Approve Commissioner Aguilar's Proposal for a Helicopter

Helicopter Funding Approved for Sheriff's Office to Improve Public Safety

On Thursday, Nov. 17, the Cook County Board of Commissioners voted overwhelmingly to approve Commissioner Frank J. Aguilar's proposal to lease a helicopter to the Cook County Sheriff's Office. While Cook County is among the largest metropolitan areas in the nation, its helicopter fleet lags far behind other large urban areas. The Los Angeles metropolitan area has 35 police helicopters and the New York City Police Department has recently purchased two additional helicopters, increasing their fleet to nine.

"This is an incredibly important investment by the county," Cook County Sheriff Tom Dart said. "I appreciate the county board realizing how important of an asset this is to the Sheriff's Office and am grateful they allocated the financial resources necessary to help protect the safety and security of Cook County residents."

The budget amendment approved reserves of \$11.4 million in the FY2023 budget for the

procurement of a helicopter and related equipment. The reserve is being carried forward from funds that were underutilized in the current fiscal year. "The addition of a helicopter to the Sheriff's Office will be invaluable," said Commissioner Frank J. Aguilar. "This initiative improves public safety and emergency preparedness by leaps and bounds. Helicopters will allow for officers to track carjackers and kidnappers without the need for high-risk chases in residential or commercial areas. It will also allow for first responders to navigate traffic, train schedules, closed roads, and more to ensure that emergency workers can get to where they need to be as quickly as possible in order to save lives and livelihoods. I want to thank my colleagues on the board for their support and look forward to seeing this measure's impact on our communities public safety."

"Commissioner Aguilar was instrumental in securing the necessary funding for this helicopter. He and his colleagues helped establish broad consensus on the county board around the critical need for this important public safety tool, which ultimately led to the approval of the budget amendment," said Sheriff Dart.

#### Cook County Officials Celebrate Día de Los Muertos

#### County President and Commissioners Remember Deceased Cook County Residents at Ofrenda in the Cook County Building

On Monday, Oct. 31, Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle joined Cook County Commissioner Frank J. Aguilar, Commissioner Alma Anaya, ofrenda artist Gloria Contreras and representatives from the Mexican Civic Society to celebrate Día de Los Muertos ("Day of the Dead"). After remarks, a song presentation was given by representatives of the Mexican Civic Society. To close the celebration, residents and officials gathered in front of the ofrenda (altar) located in the lobby of the Cook County Building to honor deceased Cook County residents and celebrate the contributions of the

Latino/a/X community.



"The celebration of Día de Los Muertos acknowledges that we still have a relationship with our ancestors and loved ones that have passed away. Today, we invite those Cook County residents who have left us to come back into our lives, if only for a moment, and remember the impact they had on all of us," said Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle.

Held annually on Nov. 1 and 2, Día de los Muertos is a traditional Meso-American holiday dedicated to the ancestors; it honors both death and the cycle of life. It is observed as a day to honor deceased family members and loved ones by "welcoming them back" through various customs, including making dedicated altars (ofrendas), laying out special food offerings and visiting their graves.

"The Día de Los Muertos ofrenda represents a memorial to remember and honor the lives of loved ones who passed on. It's remembering the good times we've had spent with them, keeping their memory alive in our hearts," said Cook County Commissioner Frank J. Aguilar.

An ofrenda is a traditional altar with a collection of objects placed on a ritual display during the annual Día de Muertos celebration. An ofrenda is created for individuals who

have died and is intended to welcome them to the altar setting.

Joining County Officials was the artist who created the ofrenda, Gloria Contreras, along with representatives from the Mexican Civic Society and State Farm, who sponsored Ms. Contreras' work.

"Día de Los Muertos is universal. We are all skeletons underneath our skins after our time is done," said artist Gloria Contreras.

# Cook County Announces \$5.5 Million to Increase Electric Vehicle Charging Infrastructure and Accessibility Throughout Suburban Cook County

#### Four-year Initiative Will Bring Up to 75 Charging Stations to Underserved Communities

Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle announced \$5.5 million in funding for the Electric Vehicle Charging Stations Program, an initiative led by the County's Department of Environment and Sustainability and Bureau of Asset Management, to increase the number and access to public electric vehicle (EV) charging stations throughout suburban Cook County.

"There are large gaps in access to public EV charging stations throughout the suburbs of Cook County, specifically in traditionally underserved communities on the south and west sides," said President Preckwinkle. "Bridging these gaps in access provides more residents the opportunity to consider the economic benefits of electric vehicle ownership."

The goal of this four-year initiative is to install up to 75 dual port public EV charging stations. Cook County will cover the cost of the EV station hardware, construction and installation, as well as networking and warranty fees for the first five years.

"As the need for electric vehicles rises every year, we must be proactive to ensure all communities have the resources to serve residents with electric vehicles," said Commissioner Frank J. Aguilar. "It is not enough to simply say, 'buy an electric vehicle.' We must build the necessary infrastructure needed to support residents who wish to own electric vehicles. This investment into charging stations throughout suburban Cook County is a crucial step."

The county is seeking input from municipal leaders, residents, business owners and community organizations to find the most suitable locations for the public charging stations. Examples of public charging station locations could be a city hall, public library, community center, house of worship, housing complex, shopping complex or any other location that would offer convenient access to charging. Station locations within disinvested communities will be prioritized.

"Gas powered vehicles may have a cheaper initial price but can wind up costing more over the lifetime of the vehicle," said Deborah Stone, chief sustainability officer and director of the county's Department of Environment and Sustainability. "Without access to a charging station, an electric vehicle is not a feasible option for residents, especially those who can't charge at home. This program will help change that."

The county is providing funding for the Electric Vehicle Charging Station Program through the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). The county allocated over \$100 million in ARPA funding to support a clean environment for all and to fight climate change.

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# New Tool Available to Help Spanish-Speaking ComEd Customers Lower Bills and Energy Use

Online Resource Customizes List of Financial-Assistance and Energy-Efficiency Offerings for Eligible Customers En Español

To support Spanish-speaking customers in identifying the bill-assistance and energy-management support they may need, ComEd has made its Smart Assistance Manager (SAM) available in Spanish.

SAM is an online self-service tool that helps families and individuals more easily access financial-assistance and energy-savings options that are available to them, based on their household information such as energy usage and billing history. Customers who create an online account with ComEd through the "My Account" tool can log in while using SAM to get a list of eligible programs more tailored to their needs.

"ComEd remains committed to enabling all customers access their account information anywhere and on their own time – especially the assistance they need to keep the lights on at their homes and businesses," said Melissa Washington, ComEd's chief customer officer and senior vice president of Customer Operations. "Offering our SAM tool in Spanish helps to remove the language barrier that will help our Spanish-speaking customers access information in the language with which they are most comfortable."

SAM matches customers with the payment-assistance programs they may be eligible for – including deferred-payment arrangements and financial-assistance options like Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) – then provides guidance and links to apply. SAM also provides ways to control energy costs through energy-efficiency offerings, including free home energy assessments and discounts on energy-saving products.

#### **Assistance Options Available through SAM**

Financial-assistance programs like the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) and ComEd's Supplemental Arrearage Reduction Program (SARP), which is available to ComEd residential customers who qualified to receive energy-assistance benefits from LIHEAP.

A flexible deferred payment arrangement of up to 12 months for eligible residential customers with a past-due balance. Make a



down payment on the amount owed, and the balance is paid through installments in addition to your regular monthly bill.

Budget billing, which provides a predictable monthly payment based on your electricity usage from the last 12 months.

Flexible payment options like extensions on a customer's due date by 21 calendar days.

High-usage alerts, which enable customers to receive alerts when their usage is trending higher than normal to help manage overall energy use, and energy-management tips to help customers manage energy use to save money now and on future energy bills.

Energy-efficiency offerings, including services and incentives designed for income-eligible residential customers, that can help reduce energy use now and in the long term.

To further support eligible, low-income residential customers struggling to pay their electric bills, ComEd no longer assesses late-payment fees or deposits. The energy company also no longer assesses additional fees for any customers when they use a credit card, debit card or electronic check when paying their ComEd bills month to month. Strong Performance Continues in 2022 with Reliability for the First 10 Months of the Year Better Than in Any Prior Year

Families and businesses served by ComEd experienced fewer power outages on average than customers of any comparable electric company for a fifth consecutive year in 2021, based on industry-standard measures for reliability. And, when ComEd customers did experience an outage last year, their service was restored as fast or faster on average than customers of the other electric companies. This is according to a company analysis of 25 peer U.S. energy companies with approximately 1 million customers or more.

"Our customers appreciate that the energy we deliver is some of the cleanest and lowest cost in the nation, but what they value most is the 24/7 reliability of our critical service," said ComEd CEO Gil Quiniones. "It's gratifying to see the difference a decade's worth of investment to make our power grid stronger and more intelligent has made for the 9 million people we have the privilege of serving every day."

ComEd has continued its consistent record of strong reliability performance in 2022. Overall reliability for the first 10 months of the year was better than in any prior year and 82 percent better than when ComEd began to increase its smart grid improvements in 2012. More than 3.6 million of ComEd's 4.1 million customers have experienced either zero or no more than one outage in 2022. Since it began its smart grid investments, ComEd and its more than 6,200 employees have helped customers avoid nearly 19 million outages, saving more than \$3 billion in outage-related costs.

ComEd continues to provide industry-leading reliability at some of the lowest costs to customers in the nation. Based on data from the U.S. Energy Information Administration, in 2021, the average monthly bill for a ComEd residential customer was lower than the average in 49 out of 50 U.S. states. # Nicor Gas Offers Tips to Protect Customers, Marked Nov. 16 as Utility Scam Awareness Day

The safety of our customers is a top priority for Nicor Gas and that includes protecting their personal information. Utility scams are on the rise and it is more important than ever for customers to be vigilant and know what steps to take to prevent themselves or their families from falling victim.

According to the Federal Trade Commission, utility scams cost American consumers more than \$2.3 billion last year. Nicor Gas joined 150 U.S. and Canadian energy companies and marked Nov. 16 as Utility Scam Awareness Day. The purpose was to raise awareness of and help educate consumers of the tactics commonly used by scammers. Many natural gas, electric and water customers throughout the country are being targeted by impostor utility scams each day.

In recent years, scammers have gotten deceptively creative with increased calls, texts, emails and in-person tactics, contacting natural gas and electric customers asking for immediate payment to avoid service disconnection. Nicor Gas strongly encourages customers to stay vigilant of potential scam activity such as:

- Threats to disconnect their natural gas service if payment is not made.
- · Requests that payments be made from a specific method, such as a debit card, prepaid card, checking account, cryptocurrency or to send funds via a mobile app to make a bill payment.
- · Claims they have overpaid and their bank account or credit card number is needed for a refund.
- · Requests to vacate their home so that a meter or other natural gas equipment can be replaced.
- · Suggestions through social media that their bill will be covered by a charity after they make a partial payment by way of a wire transfer.

We hold ourselves accountable to our customers first and foremost and will never use aggressive or intimidating tactics to pressure customers into making a payment toward their natural gas bill. Nicor Gas customers can

expect clear, open and honest communication from the company:


- By phone: When a customer service representative contacts a customer by phone regarding the status of their account or to discuss payment, they will identify themselves as a Nicor Gas employee. To verify legitimacy, customers can request that the representative confirm information about their account that only they and the company would know, for example:
  - The date of last payment.
  - The amount of the last payment.
  - Account number.
- By email: We will never ask for account or credit card information in an email. Customers can safely access and make changes to their account information and payment methods using our My Account online portal.
- In-person: When a field service representative visits your home or business, they'll wear branded uniforms that include navy pants, hats and jackets, a variety of beige shirts and neon yellow safety vest. Employees will always provide Nicor Gas identification.

As an additional safety measure, customer can sign up to receive Keep Me Informed appointment status text messages that include a photo of the technician assigned to perform work at their property.

#### Suspect fraud?

Customers who suspect or experience fraud should contact local authorities and then call the customer care center phone number listed on their billing statement. Customers who want to confirm that a Nicor Gas representative is scheduled to perform work at their premise should contact the Customer Care Center at 888.Nicor4U (888-642-6748).





#### How many guests can I invite to my Birthday Party?

In order to have a private, reserved area for your Birthday Party you must have a minimum of (15) guests. The maximum number of guests is (40). If your party is going to have more than (40)


