

### A Message from Rick Beltrame, Director of Fire Department

The Melrose Park Fire Department and Director of Fire Department Rick Beltrame want to ensure the safety of our residents by providing these generator safety tips on behalf of the National Fire Protection Association.

Please follow these tips to ensure your family's well-being!



Downed utility lines, power company blackouts, heavy snow falls or summer storms can all lead to power outages. Many people turn to a portable generator for a temporary solution without knowing the risks.

- Generators should be used in well ventilated locations outside at least 5 feet (1.5 metres) away from all doors, windows, and vent openings. Measure the 5-foot (1.5 metres) distance from the generator exhaust system to the building.
- Never use a generator in an attached garage, even with the door open.
- Place generators so that exhaust fumes can't enter the home through windows, doors or other openings in the building. The exhaust must be directed away from the building.
- Make sure to install carbon monoxide (CO) alarms in your home. Follow manufacturer's instructions for correct placement and mounting height.
- Turn off generators and let them cool down before refueling. Never refuel a generator while it is hot.



Store fuel for the generator in a container that is intended for the purpose and is correctly labeled as such. Store the containers outside of living areas.

### Just Remember..

When plugging in appliances, make sure they are plugged directly into the generator or a heavy duty outdoor-rated extension cord. The cords should be checked for cuts, tears and that the plug has all three prongs, especially a grounding pin.

If you must connect the generator to the house wiring to power appliances, have a qualified electrician install a properly rated transfer switch in accordance with the National Electrical Code® (NEC) and all applicable state and local electrical codes.

# Introducing the 24 PetWatch Microchip Reader at the Melrose Park Police Department

The Cook County Animal and Rabies Control had recently presented a class for police agencies to help pet owners in the recovery of their animals implanted with a microchip. By participating with this program, the Melrose Park Police Department (MPPD) was provided with a microchip scanner to check if the animal has been registered with a microchip. If registered, the animal's owner information can quickly be recovered and be notified for return







as soon as possible. Animals without a microchip are immediately transported to the Animal Care League in Oak Park, in partnership with MPPD.

This MPPD scanner is compatible with common microchip types and will provide their unique microchip identification number which can then be entered in a data-base with animal registrations. The registered animal's pet owner will then be notified by email, telephone and text message that the animal has been recovered, including a message regarding medical information.

The MPPD scanner service will be available at the Police Station front lobby, Monday-Friday, 8 a.m.-4 p.m. Information about the 24 PetWatch pet registries can be made through 24Petconnect.com and mypethealth.com website. 

### Republic Services Garbage Schedule for Residential Bi-Weekly Pickup

24th Avenue to 11th Avenue – Tuesday and Friday
Winston Park Area – Tuesday and Friday
West Melrose – Tuesday and Friday
North of North Avenue – Tuesday and Friday
Republic Services is contracted to pick up your regular, everyday garbage and household items, such as couches, tables, mattresses, box springs, desks and chairs, etc.

Recycling and yard waste is collected on Tuesdays from April through November and must be placed in a 33-gallon refuse can or biodegradable paper bags. Plastic bags will not be accepted.

All items are to be put out the night before or morning of scheduled garbage pickup.

Winston Park Area and West Melrose – Once garbage has been picked up, garbage container is to be removed from curb line and placed back on resident's property.

24th Avenue to 10th Avenue – North Side from Cortez to North Avenue – Monday



### **Lightning: What You Need to Know**

- No place outside is safe when thunderstorms are in the area!
- If you hear thunder, lightning is close enough to strike you.
- When you hear thunder, immediately move to safe shelter: a substantial building with electricity or plumbing or an enclosed, metal-topped vehicle with windows up.
- Stay in safe shelter at least 30 minutes after you hear the last sound of thunder.

### **Indoor Lightning Safety**

- Stay off corded phones, computers and other electrical equipment that put you in direct contact with electricity.
- Avoid plumbing, including sinks, baths and faucets.
- Stay away from windows and doors, and stay off porches.
- Do not lie on concrete floors, and do not lean against concrete walls.

### **Last Resort Outdoor Risk Reduction Tips**

If you are caught outside with no safe shelter anywhere nearby the following actions may reduce your risk:

- Immediately get off elevated areas such as hills, mountain ridges or peaks.
- Never lie flat on the ground.
- Never shelter under an isolated tree.
- Never use a cliff or rocky overhang for shelter.
- Immediately get out and away from ponds, lakes and other bodies of water.
- Stay away from objects that conduct electricity (barbed wire fences, power lines, windmills, etc.).

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### **Lightning Safety Myths and Facts**

Myth: Lightning never strikes the same place twice.

Fact: Lightning often strikes the same place repeatedly, especially if it's a tall, pointy, isolated object. The Empire State Building is hit nearly 100 times a year.

Myth: If it's not raining or there aren't clouds overhead, you're safe from lightning.

**Fact:** Lightning often strikes more than three miles from the center of the thunderstorm, far outside the rain or thunderstorm cloud. "Bolts from the blue" can strike 10-15 miles from the thunderstorm.

Myth: Rubber tires on a car protect you from lightning by insulating you from the ground.

**Fact:** Most cars are safe from lightning, but it is the metal roof and metal sides that protect you, not the rubber tires. Remember, convertibles, motorcycles, bicycles, open-shelled outdoor recreational vehicles and cars with fiberglass shells offer no protection from lightning. When lightning strikes a vehicle, it goes through the metal frame into the ground. Don't lean on doors during a thunderstorm.

**Myth:** A lightning victim is electrified. If you touch them, you'll be electrocuted.

**Fact:** The human body does not store electricity. It is perfectly safe to touch a lightning victim to give them first aid. This is the most chilling of lightning Myths. Imagine if someone died because people were afraid to give CPR!

Myth: If outside in a thunderstorm, you should seek shelter under a tree to stay dry.

Fact: Being underneath a tree is the second leading cause of lightning casualties. Better to get wet than fried!

Myth: If you are in a house, you are 100 percent safe from lightning.

**Fact:** A house is a safe place to be during a thunderstorm as long as you avoid anything that conducts electricity. This means staying off corded phones, electrical appliances, wires, TV cables, computers, plumbing, metal doors and windows. Windows are hazardous for two reasons: wind generated during a thunderstorm can blow objects into the window, breaking it and causing glass to shatter and second, in older homes, in rare instances, lightning can come in cracks in the sides of windows.

Myth: If thunderstorms threaten while you are outside playing a game, it is okay to finish it before seeking shelter.

Fact: Many lightning casualties occur because people do not seek shelter soon enough. No game is worth death or lifelong injuries. Seek proper shelter immediately if you hear thunder. Adults are responsible for the safety of children.

Myth: Structures with metal, or metal on the body (jewelry, cell phones, Mp3 players, watches, etc.), attract lightning.

Fact: Height, pointy shape and isolation are the dominant factors controlling where a lightning bolt will strike. The presence of metal makes absolutely no difference on where lightning strikes. Mountains are made of stone but get struck by lightning many times a year. When lightning threatens, take proper protective action immediately by seeking a safe shelter – don't waste time removing metal. While metal does not attract lightning, it does conduct it so stay away from metal fences, railings, bleachers, etc.

Myth: If trapped outside and lightning is about to strike, I should lie flat on the ground.

**Fact:** Lying flat increases your chance of being affected by potentially deadly ground current. If you are caught outside in a thunderstorm, you keep moving toward a safe shelter.

### **Tornados**

### **Before a Tornado**

Know the terms used to describe tornado threats.

**Tornado Watch – Tornados are possible.** Watch the sky and listen to the radio or television for more information. Be prepared to take shelter. If you see any rotating funnel-shaped clouds, report them immediately by telephone to your local law enforcement agency. If you live in a mobile home, this is the time to move to a more substantial structure.

**Tornado Warning – A tornado has been sighted or indicated by weather radar**. Take shelter. Turn on a battery-operated radio or television and wait for the "all clear" announcement by authorities. Determine the best location in your home and office to seek shelter when threatened by a tornado. A basement or cellar will usually afford the best protection. If an underground shelter is not available, identify an interior room or hall-way on the lowest level. Conduct periodic tornado safety drills with your family.

During a Tornado – Take the following actions when a Tornado Warning has been issued by the National Weather Service, when sirens have been activated or when a tornado has been sighted near your area.

**At Home** – Go at once to your predetermined shelter (storm cellar, basement or the lowest level of the building). In a basement, go under the stairs, under a heavy piece of furniture or a workbench. Stay there until the danger has passed. If there is no basement, go to an inner hallway or a small inner room without windows, such as a bathroom or closet. Stay away from windows, doors and outside walls.

Go to the center of the room. Outside windows and walls may be penetrated by high speed, wind-borne missiles

Get under a piece of sturdy furniture, such as a workbench or heavy table, and hold onto it.

Use pillows, mattresses or cushions to protect your head and neck.

If in a mobile home, get out and seek shelter elsewhere. A mobile home can overturn very easily even if precautions have been taken to tie down the unit. If there isn't a substantial shelter nearby, seek shelter in a low-lying area. Shield your head with your hands.

In a School, Nursing Home, Hospital, Shopping Center or at Work – Go to the designated storm shelter, basement or to an inside hallway on the lowest level.

Avoid places with wide-span roofs, such as auditoriums, cafeterias, gymnasiums and large hallways. Stay away from windows and open spaces.

Get under a piece of sturdy furniture, such as a workbench or heavy table or desk and hold onto it. If sturdy furniture is not available, make yourself the smallest target possible. Squat low to the ground. Put your head down and cover your head and neck with your hands.

If in a high-rise building, go to small, interior rooms or hallways on the lowest level possible and seek protection as detailed above. Stay away from windows and outside walls.

Learn how to shut off the utilities to your home. Decide how and where your family will reunite.

If you live in a mobile home, identify a safe shelter outside of your mobile home such as a community park shelter, a neighbor or friend's house, or a nearby public building.

In a mobile home, consider installation of an underground shelter that is large enough to accommodate you, your family or several other nearby mobile home residents.

Consider retrofitting your house with special fasteners, connectors and reinforcing bands to strengthen the structural integrity. Also, consider installing a reinforced concrete and steel "safe room" as a small room within your house, or excavated and installed beneath your garage floor.

In a Vehicle – Never try to outrun a tornado in a vehicle. Heavy rain, hail and traffic may impede your movement. Tornados can change directions quickly and can easily lift up a vehicle and toss it through the air.

Get out of the vehicle immediately and try to take shelter in a nearby building. Do not park under a bridge or underpass.

If there isn't time to get indoors, get out of the vehicle and lie in a ditch, culvert or low-lying area away from the vehicle.

# Notice Regarding Melrose Park Vehicle Stickers

### Village Vehicle Stickers Expired Dec. 31, 2021. New Stickers Can be Purchased at the Village Hall.

Sticker Fee for Passenger Vehicles is \$40 for Two Years (2022-2023).

Truck Fees Vary Based on the Type of Class/Plate and Are Good for One Year Only (2022).

Seniors Over 65 Years of Age are Free.

One free two-year sticker for a passenger vehicle or one free one-year sticker for a B-Truck vehicle registered to a person over 65 years in age. Limit one free sticker per household. If there is a second passenger or B-Truck vehicle registered to a senior in the household, a second senior sticker will be sold for half price (\$15).

Acceptable proof for a senior sticker is a valid driver's license or state ID card.

### **Vehicle Sticker Fee Details**

Sticker fees are as follows: Passenger Plates – \$40 for two years (2022-2023); Senior Citizen – One free per household for two years (2022-2023); Trucks – Good for one year (2022 only). The fees for vehicle licenses for each vehicle are as follows if paid on the dates set forth as listed here:

The rules on garage sales held in the village of Melrose Park are as follows:

Garage sales will be held on the third weekend only during the months of May, June, July, August and September. Sales are to be conducted on Thursday, Friday and Saturday of the designated weekends. No sales are

The dates for 2023 are May 18-20, June 15-17, July 20-22, Aug. 17-19 and Sept. 14-16.

allowed on Sundays.

Garage sales shall be conducted only during the hours of 9 a.m.-5 p.m.

No permit is needed for garage sales, however the following rules must be followed:

- No garage sales may be conducted in apartment buildings.
- No garage sales in the frontyard, i.e., on the grass.
- All garage sales to be conducted in backyard, garage or on driveway.
- All sale items to be displayed on tables, not on the ground.
- No sale items shall be located and no sale activity shall be conducted in the frontyard area, on the premises of any public sidewalk, parkway area or other public property.
- No sale signs, handbills or other advertising material shall be located or posted upon public parkway or on public property, signs, poles or light poles within the village of Melrose Park.
- Signs advertising the sales shall not exceed 3-by-5 feet and may be located only in the frontyard (private property) of the address having the garage sale, and must be removed immediately after the sale.
- The sale will be conducted without the use of outdoor loud speakers, amplification equipment or illuminated advertising devices.

Any person violating these rules shall be subject to a fine not to exceed \$500. A copy of garage sale rules is available at www.melrosepark.org.

# Dominican Literacy Center Continues to Provide English Instruction and More ...

The Dominican Literacy Center originally began in Chicago, at the request of the pastor of Our Lady of Grace Parish in 1996. In 2008, the building housing the center was deemed to need extensive repairs and could not be used. In June of 2008, the center was graciously welcomed to rent a part of Sacred Heart Convent in Melrose Park, where it has continued to provide English instruction for the past 14 years.

The goal of the Dominican Literacy Center is the empowerment of persons who experience personal and economic limitations within our English-speaking society. Through literacy education and personal relationships, we strive to provide a small step toward eliminating racial and cultural prejudice and stereotypes, as well as a step up for persons seeking improvement in their personal, familial and economic abilities.

The Dominican Literacy Center provides weekly one and half hour tutored sessions in which one student meets with one tutor. The center provides tutoring in speaking, reading and writing English, as well as tutoring in preparation for the Citizenship interview and exam. This individualized instruction is provided for immigrant women and men (ages 17+) who are – endeavoring to reduce literacy and its consequential effects of isolation (due to their inability to communicate in English with health care providers, children's teachers, neighbors, co-workers, community leaders and/or first responders); in low-level jobs (due to lack of training or skills, or an inability to demonstrate their already achieved skills and knowledge); powerless to supervise their adolescent children or to influence systemic change; lacking confidence to enroll in traditional classes and or fear of requesting help when needed.

### **English Classes**

English classes are provided for those who want to learn to speak, read or write in English. One student meets with one tutor, once a week.

These classes are offered at the Dominican Literacy Center, 1503 Rice Street, in Melrose Park (near Sacred Heart/St. Eulalia Parish).

Our program also assists persons studying for their Citizenship interview/exam.

We presently offer classes on Monday through Thursday, in the mornings and afternoons.

# Cook County Commissioner Frank J. Aguilar Encourages Homeowners to Apply for Property Tax Savings

On Monday, April 10, the Cook County Assessor's Office opened the application filing period for homeowners to apply for property tax exemptions. Property tax exemptions are savings that contribute to lowering a homeowner's property tax bill. The most common is the Homeowner Exemption, which saves a Cook County property owner an average of \$950 dollars each year.

For the last few years, some of the exemptions automatically renewed due to COVID-19. However, two of the automatic renewals have ended. This means that homeowners receiving the "Senior Freeze" and Veterans with Disabilities Exemptions must reapply this year.

- Here are the exemptions that automatically renew each year Homeowner Exemption,
   Senior Exemption and Persons with Disabilities.
- Here are the exemptions that must be reapplied annually "Senior Freeze" Exemption, Veterans with Disabilities Exemption, Returning Veterans Exemption and Long Time Homeowner Exemption.



"Property tax exemptions administered by my office provide significant savings on a homeowner's property tax bill," said Assessor Fritz Kaegi. "Many homeowners are unaware of the savings available to them, which is why I am proud to partner with Commissioner Aguilar's Office to reach more homeowners by expanding language accessibility and offering cus-

tomized assistance that meets the needs of residents."

"Homeowner exemptions are too often underutilized by residents, even though their impact cannot be overstated," said Commissioner Frank J. Aguilar. "I applaud the Assessor's Office for bringing opportunities to our residents to access these exemptions and learn more about the taxing process in general. Once a homeowner receives their exemptions, they will continue to apply for years to come. It is our job as elected officials to ensure that we are doing everything in our power to make sure residents are not only aware of these opportunities, but have the tools and resources to fully take advantage of these great savings."

# Cook County Awards Community-Based Service Providers \$25 Million to Address Gun Violence

# IDHS and Cook County Justice Advisory Council Partner to Expand Anti-Violence Programming in Vulnerable Communities

In response to high levels of gun violence experienced since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Illinois Department of Human Services Office of Firearm Violence Prevention (OFVP), together with Cook County's Justice Advisory Council (JAC), announced recently \$25 million in grants to fund a diverse array of service providers focused on supporting residents at risk of experiencing gun violence in Chicago and Suburban Cook County.

"Working together, we will rise to the challenge of addressing gun violence in our region," said Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle. "For the past three years, we have engaged in an unprecedented level of intergovernmental coordination around gun violence prevention. This funding is a testament to our shared commitment to building safe and thriving communities in Cook County and throughout Illinois. We will continue to invest in effective, equitable and sustainable solutions that address the root causes of gun violence in our communities."

"This funding demonstrates a commitment among Illinois leaders to cooperate and eliminate bureaucratic hurdles so that qualified violence prevention providers can quickly receive the resources that they need to adequately address firearm violence, one of our state's most significant public health challenges," said Chris Patterson, assistant secretary, the Illinois Department of Human Services. "As partners, we will continue to take a thoughtful, targeted approach to violence intervention in communities with the highest rates of firearm violence. Together, through our partnership with Cook County, across all levels of government and alongside our community stakeholders, we are working effectively to prevent and reduce gun violence."

In summer 2022, the JAC awarded a historic initial \$75 million in Gun Violence Prevention and Reduction Grants, funding individual organizations and coalitions that represent 68 services providers. Partnering with Illinois Department of Human Services' Office of Firearm Violence Prevention allows Cook County the opportunity to leverage state funding from the federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA), to expand upon JAC's successful funding model that provides vital support to vulnerable and at-risk residents in communities most impacted by crime, violence and incarceration. Through this second

funding cycle of \$25 million, another 39 grant awards to individual organizations and coalitions will support 74 service providers working to build safer communities in Cook County and Chicagoland. The \$75 million of 2022 funding builds on over \$50 million in county-funded grant investments distributed by the JAC between 2015 and 2020.

"Gun violence is not acceptable anywhere, and can never be accepted as normal. We cannot accept children growing up without parents, lost to gun violence. We cannot accept a world where parents lose their children to senseless shootings," said Cook County Commissioner Frank J. Aguilar.

"Through these new grant investments, and all the hard work of elected officials, stakeholders, dedicated front-line organizations and families, we commit to never accept gun violence as normal. I commend these 16th District organizations for doing the necessary work and coordinating efforts with my office to ensure that violence in our district is addressed comprehensively, backed by evidence, with support from the community."

"Throughout Cook County, community-based service providers are leading the way in delivering culturally-responsive, innovative and effective gun violence prevention programming," said Avik Das, executive director of the Justice Advisory Council. "These organizations are working on the front lines of the gun violence crisis, and they need robust and sustained support to make a lasting impact. Cook County is grateful to be collaborating with the Illinois Department of Human Services Office of Firearm Violence Prevention whose support is allowing us to scale up funding to meet the great need for services."

At the same time, in 2022, the Illinois Department of Human Services issued Notices of Funding Opportunities (NOFOs) across the city of Chicago and Cook County to provide similar services to those outlined in the JAC initiative. IDHS has issued over \$140 million in violence prevention and youth development services funding across Illinois.

# Cook County and Illinois Manufacturing Excellence Center (IMEC) Announce New 2023 Round of Applications for Manufacturing Reinvented

## \$5 Million Grant Program Seeks to Improve Business Resiliency and Competitiveness for Cook County Manufacturers

On Thursday, March 2, Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle and the Illinois Manufacturing Excellence Center (IMEC) announced the first round of 2023 applications for Manufacturing Reinvented, a \$5 million grant program that supports manufacturers to improve their competitiveness as they continue to rebound and rebuild from the COVID-19 pandemic. Cook County will reimburse any qualifying suburban Cook County manufacturer for up to \$25,000 in eligible expenses. Participating companies also receive IMEC's expert advising services to refine project design and scope.

Over 150 manufacturers have already applied for projects that will help them rebound and reinvent themselves.

"Clearly this program provides much-needed resources to support manufacturing, one of our region's key economic sectors," President Preckwinkle said. "Manufacturing represents the state's largest industry when ranked by contribution to GDP, and with 182,000 people, Cook County boasts the largest number of workers in Illinois employed in manufacturing. Cook County is proud to make this investment to support this critical industry."

Manufacturers have used funds to improve operations, find new customers and address talent needs. The program also supports a company's investments to adopt automation; build supply chain resiliency; enhance productivity; identify talent solutions; and find new customers.

McKlein Company LLC, a woman-owned manufacturer of leather goods with six employees in Broadview, recently took advantage of the program with a Search Engine Optimization project. Parinda Saetia, the company's CEO, has noted already seeing an increase in the company's SEO rankings. She explained that she has gained knowledge to help her company grow, adding, "this is a great program that will impact your business."

"You cannot separate Cook County from manufacturing," said Cook County Commissioner Frank J. Aguilar. "These grants reward manufacturers for initiative, for doing the work needed to drive Cook County forward. It is crucial that we continue to protect these jobs and this industry as a whole, so that Cook County can continue to be a leader in innovation and production in not only Illinois, but the entire country. I am thrilled to see this funding be approved – our commitment to supporting manufacturing in Cook County remains steadfast."

"Cook County manufacturers are already experiencing the benefits of this novel grant program," said David Boulay, president of IMEC. "With projects available in all areas of the organization, it's exhilarating to watch these companies receive the support they need and help them lead the way for the future of manufacturing in Illinois."

Cook County and IMEC designed Manufacturing Reinvented to address the needs identified by a survey of over 1,000 suburban Cook County manufacturers, summarized in the report called the *Urgent Needs of Manufacturers Report* published in March 2021. Cook County provides these grants with funding made available through the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA).



## **Secretary of State Veteran Services**

#### **Veteran Designation**

A "VETERAN" designation may be placed on the face of an Illinois driver's license or ID card at the request of the card applicant with proper documentation. The applicant must have received an honorable discharge from any branch of the U.S. military, served as a reservist or member of the National Guard, or retired from the U.S. Military. For more information, visit ilsos.gov or call the Illinois Department of Veterans' Affairs at (800) 437-9824.

#### **Registration Renewal Waiver**

Members of the U.S. Armed Forces serving on active duty or as a reservist, who can show proof of service in a combat mission, will have their standard vehicle registration fee waived for the renewal period immediately following their return to the United States. Proof must be shown at the time of registration renewal.

#### Free Duplicate Driver's License and ID Card

Members of the military currently on active duty may obtain a duplicate driver's license, instruction permit or ID card at no charge. This benefit is extended to the spouse or children living in the home while the family member is on active duty.

#### Military License Plates for Spouses of Deceased Military Members

The spouse of a deceased veteran may retain the veteran's military license plates by transferring the vehicle registration within 180 days following the veteran's death.

#### **Military Plates Transfer Fee Waiver**

Veterans can transfer their license plate to a military license plate free of charge. Fees apply for vanity and personalized military plates.

#### **Disabled Veteran License Plates**

Any veteran who holds proof of a 50 percent or greater service-connected disability from the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs may apply for any military series license plate one time, free of charge. Additional fees may apply for vanity and personalized military plates.

#### **Illinois Veterans' History Project**

The Illinois Veterans' History Project creates a permanent record of the names and stories of Illinois veterans and civilians who served our state and country during war so that their contributions will not be forgotten.



# Treasurer Frerichs Returns \$22.7 Million In Unclaimed Property in March

# **Record-Setting \$1.6 Billion Returned Since He Took Office**

The Illinois State Treasurer's Office returned nearly \$22.7 million in unclaimed property during March, Illinois State Treasurer Michael Frerichs said recently. The total includes more than \$20 million in cash and interest, and nearly \$2.6 million in stock value returned. All told, 11,366 claims were paid.

"I place a priority on reuniting people with money that belongs to them. Putting money in people's pockets is a way to help the state's economy," Frerichs said. "We will hold on to unclaimed property as long as it takes to return it."

Illinois' Unclaimed Property Program — also known as I-CASH — is one of the state's oldest consumer protection initiatives. The state treasurer is tasked with safeguarding unclaimed property, such as the contents of overlooked safe deposit boxes, unpaid life insurance benefits, forgotten bank accounts and unused rebate cards. Illinois holds more than \$3.5 billion in unclaimed property.

The Treasurer's Office has returned more than \$1.6 billion since Frerichs took office in January 2015. When Frerichs first became treasurer, there were 60,000 claims paid in a year. That number has increased six-fold to 362,352 claims paid in a year.

The record-setting performance is the result of a complete restructuring of the unclaimed property process under Frerichs. The State Treasurer's Office has added electronic claims, eliminated red-tape that slowed small-money claims and leveraged technology to allow payments to be made without a claim even needing to be filed.

Frerichs recently added a Friends and Family "share" feature. When visitors to the I-CASH website come across the name of someone they know, they can select the "share" icon and provide the email address of their friend or relative. Frerichs' office then will notify the individual by sending an email that mentions the unclaimed property, along with the name of the friend or relative who spotted it. Then, that individual can start the process of retrieving the property.

In addition, "Abe," an automated chatbot, is available to anyone visiting the I-CASH website. Abe provides an interactive way for people to obtain information when they ask short, simple questions about unclaimed property.

Illinois is a national leader in the unclaimed property space and is frequently consulted by other states that are reforming their unclaimed property laws, rules and procedures.

# **Loyola Medicine Allergy Count Returns**

For more than 20 years, Loyola Medicine's Gottlieb Memorial Hospital has provided the Chicago area with updated allergy counts every weekday during allergy season. This year's count has resumed as of Monday, April 3. Allergy sufferers can follow @LoyolaAllergy on Twitter or visit loyolamedicine.org/allergy-count for the latest numbers.

Rachna Shah, MD, leads the Loyola Medicine Allergy Count and notes that tree pollen counts are already rising. She advises allergy sufferers to stay informed. "Allergy counts are important to help monitor symptoms and prepare for the day." When pollen levels are high, she recommends people with severe pollen allergies stay indoors, but if that's not feasible, "pollen counts are highest before 10 a.m., so try shifting activities to later on in the day. And, if you do outdoor activities for more than a couple hours, it can be really helpful to come inside, rinse off and change clothes."



Dr. Shah explains how the count is performed – Pollen samples are gathered every weekday morning from the roof of Gottlieb Memorial Hospital; Pollen grains and mold spores are collected from a cubic meter air sample and counted under a microscope; The counts include daily numbers for mold, tree, grass and weed pollens.

Spring allergies often cause itchy, watery eyes and runny nose, sneezing, nasal congestion and post-nasal drip. Difficulty breathing, coughing, wheezing and/or shortness of breath also can be caused by seasonal allergies.

Allergy season commonly runs from March through the first hard freeze in October. Tree pollen generally begins to rise in late March to April, grass pollen arrives in May and June, while weed pollen is most prevalent in July to August. Ragweed typically peaks from late August to the first frost and mold can strike in damp conditions throughout the season.

# **New Urology Clinic at Gottlieb Memorial Hospital**

Loyola has the robotic technology and surgical expertise to repair blockages in the kidney and/or the tube that drains the kidney called the ureter. Blockages can occur as a result of cancer treatment, like radiation, chemotherapy or surgery, as well as trauma or previous instrumentation. Robotic surgery uses very small incisions, which allows for a much faster recovery and return to normal activities for patients.

Loyola Medicine's urology team is nationally recognized for their work in researching advanced treatments for a variety of urologic conditions, while providing specialized care for male and female urologic conditions.



# Walgreens, DoorDash and Uber Team Up to Launch Free, Same Day Rx Delivery of HIV Medications

This First-of-its Kind Offering is an Important Step to Help End the HIV Epidemic in the United States by 2030

Walgreens, in partnership with DoorDash and Uber, recently announced free, Same Day Rx Delivery of medications for the prevention and treatment of HIV. This service is available to eligible patients within 15 miles of thousands of participating Walgreens retail pharmacies nationwide.

"While most of the U.S. population lives within 5 miles of a Walgreens pharmacy, transportation remains a critical barrier to accessing health care," said Kevin Ban, MD, chief medical officer, Walgreens. "With more than half of Walgreens stores located in socially vulnerable or underserved communities, we can help make HIV prevention and treatment options more accessible, convenient and equitable across our communities."

This initiative is the latest offering in an ongoing collaboration between Walgreens, DoorDash and Uber. In December 2022, following the companies' response to the White House COVID-19 call to action, the companies launched free Paxlovid delivery services aimed at increasing access to COVID-19 treatment with a focus on reaching those in socially vulnerable or medically underserved areas.

Offering free, Same Day Rx Delivery of HIV medications supports the White House's updated National HIV/AIDS strategy for a more coordinated, reenergized national response to HIV. The strategy's targets include a 75 percent reduction in new HIV infections by 2025 and a 90 percent reduction by 2030. To realize these targets, the strategy focuses on four goals: prevent new HIV infections; improve HIV-related health outcomes of people with HIV; reduce HIV-related disparities and health inequities; and achieve integrated, coordinated efforts that address the HIV epidemic.

"Local delivery has broadened access for communities across the U.S. DoorDash is proud to partner with Walgreens to power the free, same-day delivery

of medication to prevent or treat HIV," said Elizabeth Jarvis-Shean, vice president of Communications & Policy, DoorDash. "Transportation barriers and other challenges can prevent people from accessing the medicine they need. Our partnership with Walgreens helps ensure that people aren't denied lifesaving medication just because they can't make it to their local pharmacy."

"Over 1 million people in the U.S. have HIV and the disease disproportionately impacts traditionally underserved populations," said Julia Paige, head of Global Social Impact at Uber. "By combining Walgreens nationwide network of pharmacies with Uber's industry-leading technology, our partnership will help reduce transportation and access barriers so that those who need it most can get their prescription delivered right to their door at no cost to them."

People with HIV who take HIV medicine (called antiretroviral therapy or ART) as prescribed, and get and keep an undetectable viral load – a very low level of HIV in the blood – can live long and healthy lives and will not transmit HIV to their HIV-negative partners through sex. And for people who do not have HIV but are at risk of getting HIV, pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP) is a highly effective tool for preventing HIV.

#### How to Register for Free, Same Day Rx Delivery

Eligible patients must have a prescription for antiretroviral medication or PrEP from a health care provider. After the pharmacy has filled the prescription and before it gets picked up, individuals can go online to choose Same Day Rx Delivery by visiting Walgreens.com/PrescriptionDelivery, the Walgreens app or by calling their store.

Age-restricted items are not eligible for delivery. Other exclusions may apply.

# **ComEd EV Rally Helps Make the Future (of STEM) Female**

# Summer Program Provides Scholarships and Networking for Young Women Interested in STEM Careers

With the end of the school year in sight, ComEd is excited for the return of the ComEd EV Rally, its signature summer program to support more women in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM). Young women in Illinois can apply to participate in the annual competition, which challenges teens to build and race high-tech, electric-powered go-carts. ComEd has expanded this year's pool of program participants by 50 percent, giving 45 students the chance to work with female mentors from ComEd to explore career pathways in STEM.

Participants will learn from ComEd mentors and peers how to apply their STEM knowledge while building an electric vehicle (EV). The program will culminate with a once-in-a-lifetime experience as participants race their vehicles at the Museum of Science and Industry in Chicago on Saturday, July 29. Every participant will receive a \$2,000 scholarship upon completion of the program.

"This program is a fun way to educate and empower young women to explore STEM careers and start their jour-

ney to becoming future leaders," said Michelle Blaise, senior vice president of Technical Services at ComEd and the company's chief engineer. "ComEd is committed to increasing the representation of women and people of color in the STEM fields because our future success and ability to solve our biggest challenges depends on a diverse workforce that drives innovation."

Educating the next generation on the value of zero-emissions vehicles and clean energy solutions is needed in the transition to a cleaner energy future. ComEd believes the next generation of the STEM workforce must be a more diverse one. Participants in the EV Rally come from diverse cultural and geographic backgrounds, with an emphasis on those from equity investment eligible communities—or EIECs, as defined by the Climate and Equitable Jobs Act in Illinois. Today, women make up 50 percent of the workforce, yet hold only 27 percent of jobs in STEM fields in Illinois, according to a study by the Illinois Science & Technology Coalition. The same study found that the share of women in Illinois in STEM jobs has grown by less than 1 percent since 2012.

- A **Flexible Deferred Payment** arrangement of up to 12 months for eligible residential customers with past-due balances. Make a down payment on the amount owed and pay the rest through installments in addition to your regular monthly bill.
- Budget Billing, which provides a predictable monthly amount due based on your electricity usage from the last 12 months.
- Flexible Payment Options like 21-day extensions on a customer's due date.
- High-Usage Alerts, which let customers know when their usage is trending higher than normal to help manage overall energy use, and energy-management tips to save money now and on future energy bills.

#### **Home Energy Savings**

To help residential customers manage future electric bills, the award-winning ComEd Energy Efficiency Program offers a variety of services and incen-

tives that can help ComEd customers manage energy use in their homes.

The first step in finding options that work for them is to sign up for a free Home Energy Savings assessment. An assessment is designed to improve the energy efficiency of a home and lower its energy costs, while enhancing the comfort of those who live within it.

Homeowners and renters, with their landlord's permission, receive a free review of their home – either in-person or virtually – to identify areas for energy savings. An energy advisor will collect information about a home's energy features by looking at its lighting, heating and cooling systems, water heaters and appliances. Customers then receive free and discounted energy-saving products plus personalized recommendations for saving money and energy.

By signing up for a Home Energy Savings assessment, customers can lower their energy costs and improve energy efficiency in their homes. The average customer saves over \$125 a year on utility bills because of the energy-saving products installed during or after the visual assessment.

Through Home Energy Savings assessments, customers have saved more than 129 million kilowatt-hours of electricity, which is enough energy to power more than 15,000 ComEd customers' homes. The offering helped reduce from the air more than 109 million pounds of carbon emissions that contribute to climate change, which is the equivalent of removing nearly 11,000 cars off the road for one year or planting nearly 60,000 acres of trees.

"As we accelerate historic efforts to address climate change, public-private partnerships will be essential to realizing the scale of our ambition," said EPA Administrator Michael S. Regan. "I applaud this year's ENERGY STAR Award winners for working with EPA to deliver a clean energy future that saves American consumers and businesses money and creates jobs."

The ComEd Energy Efficiency Program, which is funded in compliance with state law, helps families and businesses save money and use energy more wisely through a variety of services, incentives and rebates, including new rebates on ENERGY STAR-certified induction cooktops and heat pump clothes dryers.

"As ComEd works to provide customers with clean, reliable energy, we've also worked over the last decade to control costs and keep rates competitive," said Melissa Washington, senior vice president of Customer Operations for ComEd. "Part of that effort is through the ComEd Energy Efficiency Program, which enables customers to take control of when and how they use electricity to help them manage costs and lower their electric bills."

Since 2008, the program has saved customers approximately \$7.65 billion on their electric bills. The program also helped customers save more than 70 million net megawatt-hours of electricity, which is the annual equivalent to reducing nearly 60 billion pounds of carbon emissions from the atmosphere, removing nearly 6 million cars from the road, planting more than 33 million acres of trees and powering more than 8 million ComEd customers' homes.

The program has helped ComEd maintain an average monthly customer bill of \$104, which is in the lowest 25 percent compared to the average monthly bills in other states. ComEd's rates are also below the average of the top U.S. metropolitan areas based on population.

- Insulate outlets and light switches Outlets and light switches on the walls that separate your home from the outdoors are often overlooked sources of heating or cooling loss. Insulating these areas can reduce drafts and keep your home more comfortable.
- Clear areas around heating and cooling vents Furniture, carpets and other objects can block vents and prevent heated or cooled air from circulating. This makes your system work harder and prevents rooms from guickly achieving the temperature you desire.
- Unplug electronics when they're not in use Many gadgets, including televisions, DVR boxes, game consoles and computers continue to use power even when they are off, so unplug electronics when you don't need them. For frequently used devices, plug them into a power strip and turn it off.



Watching our resident Humboldt penguins swim and play at The Living Coast habitat is fun, but did you know you can actually meet them too? When you take part in a Penguin Encounter, you not only get to mingle with these special birds, but also learn about their behavior and the details of our conservation work in Punta San Juan (Peru). It's a wonderful experience for the whole family, as well as a great way to connect personally to the penguins while learning about the importance of protecting them.

**Encounter Information** – During your visit, you will enter the Penguin Encounter Room, which is located just past the Humboldt penguin habitat in The Living Coast; Encounter: Approximately 30 minutes, depending on the number of guest participants; Age: Participants must be at least 5 years old; children between ages 5 and 18 must be accompanied by an adult; Maximum Group Size: 20 participants; Schedule: Daily 2 p.m.; Penguin Arrival: The penguins will arrive and the birds will be allowed to mingle with the encounter participants. Like people, each of the penguins have distinct personalities and interests. They're allowed to interact with whoever they choose; During the Penguin Encounter: During the encounter one keeper will accompany the penguin through the group of participants while another keeper shares details of our conservation work in Punta San Juan (Peru) with the penguin's wild counterparts. The penguins participate in the encounter by their own free choice, walking the short distance from their exhibit to the


encounter room; Pictures: Participants are able to take pictures as cameras are welcome, but for the welfare of the birds, no flashes; Penguins Waddle Back: At the end of the encounter the penguins will bid the guests farewell and waddle back to their exhibit to be with their friends. The staff will answer any additional questions you have. We challenge you to remember the color of the penguin's wing band, and then see if you can find and identify it in the flock on exhibit!

On the Rainforest Aviary Feeding Adventure, you will assist our animal care specialists in preparing the food for the noon feeding of our rainforest birds in Feathers & Scales. You will learn how we present the different foods to accommodate the different feeding habits of each species and assist with placing the food in the habitat. The care staff will provide you with instructions on how to safely move through the rainforest and interact with the resident birds. As the different birds come down to eat, you will be able to learn which foods are the favorites of the different species. Participants must be at least 8 years old; a parent or guardian must accompany participants under age 17.


