A Message From Mayor Ronald M. Serpico

Almost everyone knows why we celebrate Memorial Day, but few Americans do not really understand the Flag Day holiday. Today, Flag Day is honored nationwide, but only Pennsylvania still recognizes it as a legal holiday.

Dear Neighbors,

I am writing this letter the morning after Memorial Day, which is the unofficial start of summer. Almost everyone knows why we celebrate Memorial Day, but few Americans, including me, do not really understand the story behind the Flag Day holiday, which occurs on June 14. So, I did some research on Google to learn about the beginnings of this holiday.

A resolution was adopted by the Continental Congress on June 14, 1777, that a flag of the United States shall be of 13 stripes of alternate red and white, with a union of 13 stars of white in a blue field, representing the new country. A flag of this design was first carried into battle on Sept. 11, 1777, in the Battle of the Brandywine.

It took nearly a century for the first official commemoration of June 14 as Flag Day to finally occur in 1861, in Hartford, Conn. Pretty soon schools all over the United States started holding Flag Day programs of their own to aid in the Americanization of immigrant children and from that point, it didn't take long for the observance to catch on in other communities.

The most recognized claim to the origins of this holiday comes from New York. On June 14, 1889, Professor George Bolch, principal of a free kindergarten for the poor of New York City, held the first patriotic ceremony ever in observance of the anniversary of the Flag Day resolution. This initiative attracted attention from the State Department of Education, which arranged to have the day observed in all public schools thereafter.

It wasn't too much longer before the New York State Legislature passed a law making it the responsibility of the state superintendent of Public Schools to ensure that schools also held observances for Lincoln's Birthday, Washington's Birthday, Memorial Day and Flag Day.

In 1893, the Society of Colonial Dames, led by Elizabeth Duane Gillespie, a direct descendant of Benjamin Franklin, succeeded in getting a resolution passed to have the flag displayed on all of Philadelphia's public buildings and to officially call June 14 Flag Day. However, it was not until May 7, 1937, that Pennsylvania became the first state to establish June 14 Flag Day as a legal holiday. It wasn't until Aug. 3, 1949, that Congress approved the national observance of Flag Day and President Harry Truman signed it into law. Today, Flag Day is honored nationwide, but only Pennsylvania still recognizes it as a legal holiday.

Through the past many years, there have been 27 different versions of the United States flag with the present configuration dating back to 1960. And speaking of special days, July 7 starts the 130th Anniversary of the Our Lady of Mount Carmel Feast. No event has brought more positive publicity to our village than the Feast. The Feast has become synonymous with Melrose Park and I am always honored to participate in the Sunday procession. While attending this year's Feast, please take a moment to visit the beautifully remodeled church. Well, it's time to end this letter because I need to buy propane for the BBQ grill, I just love summer!

A Message from Rick Beltrame, Director of Fire Department The Melrose Park Fire Department and Director of Fire Department Rick Beltrame want to ensure the safety of our residents by providing these sky lantern safety tips on behalf of the National Fire Protection Association. Please follow these tips to ensure your family's well-being!



Sky lanterns have become increasingly popular as a way to celebrate. However, they pose a serious fire safety hazard and their use is prohibited by National Fire Protection Association code requirements.

- >>> The lanterns are made of oiled rice paper with a bamboo frame, materials that can easily catch on fire.
- **)))** A candle or wax fuel cell is used with the device.
- >>> The lit flame heats the inside of the lantern, causing it to rise into the air.
- >>> Once lit and airborne, it can travel over a mile in distance.
- >>>> Wind can affect the sky lantern, blowing the sides, forcing the hot air out and sending the flaming lantern back to the ground.
- >>> These lanterns have the potential to cause fires.
- >>>> A flaming lantern can drop onto a rooftop, field, trees or power lines before the flame is fully extinguished.
- >>> A destructive fire can result when a flaming lantern reaches the ground during dry conditions.
- Sky lanterns should not be used under any circumstances.

Two sky lanterns landed in forested land impacting valuable wildfire firefighting resources.

Phase Five and Six of the Silver Creek Restoration Project will be completed this year.

This restoration project restores the natural balance of the creek by restoring the embankment, and bringing back native landscape and shrubbery along with aquatic habitat. This is an invaluable stream system that provides storm water runoff, flood management and many other benefits for the residents of Melrose Park.

Village of Melrose Park Residental Garbage Pickup Information

Republic Services Garbage Schedule for Residential Bi-Weekly Pickup

24th Avenue to 11th Avenue – Tuesday and Friday Winston Park Area – Tuesday and Friday West Melrose – Tuesday and Friday North of North Avenue – Tuesday and Friday Republic Services is contracted to pick up your regular, everyday garbage and household items, such as couches, tables, mattresses, box springs, desks and chairs, etc.

Recycling and yard waste is collected on Tuesdays from April through November and must be placed in a 33-gallon refuse can or biodegradable paper bags. Plastic bags will not be accepted.

All items are to be put out the night before or morning of scheduled garbage pickup.

Winston Park Area and West Melrose – Once garbage has been picked up, garbage container is to be removed from curb line and placed back on resident's property.

Friday. We are closed on Saturdays and Sundays and all major holidays. To book an appointment or make a cancellation, you must call at least 24 hours in advance.

Policies and Procedures

Only one reservation per rider per day. NO EXCEPTIONS! Only two appointments a week can be made for miscellaneous use such as grocery shopping etc. Anyone

using the van for doctor appointments, etc., may use the van up to three times a week.

You must stay at your destination you are going to for a minimum of an hour. Any residents of Victory Centre MUST go with the group provided at their center for grocery shopping, etc. Any doctor appointment can be made with us.

Only three shopping bags per rider. Forgotten items in the van will be returned at the next pickup date. Please note that our service is getting more popular every day so we will try to accommodate your needs to the best of our ability. Mayor Serpico encourages residents to use this *convenient* transportation resource for their *everyday* needs, such as shopping, doctor appointments, etc.

Know Your Risk When Severe Weather Occurs

Being prepared means learning about summer weather and water hazards such as hurricanes, heat, lightning, rip currents, air quality, tsunamis and wildfires. Here's what you need to know:

- Since 2003, more than 40 states within the continental United States have come under a tornado watch; more than 45 states have come under severe thunderstorm watches; and lightning strikes have occured in every state.
- Heat waves are common across the country during the summer. They are dangerous because the human body cannot cool itself properly when exposed to an extreme combination of heat and humidity.
- In 2015, there were 26 lightning fatalities. Flash flooding is the number one killer associated with severe weather.
- Air pollution can make it harder for people with asthma and other respiratory diseases to breathe. Children and teens may be more sensitive than adults to the health effects caused by air pollution. According to the EPA, poor air quality is responsible in the U.S. for an estimated 60,000 premature deaths each year.

Take Action

While the weather may be wild, you are not powerless. This summer, prepare for hazards with these simple steps:

- You may have only minutes to find shelter before a tornado strikes. Practice a family tornado drill at least once a year.
- Protect yourself from extreme heat by rescheduling outdoor activities to earlier in the day.
- There is no safe place outside when lightning is in the area. If you hear thunder, you are likely within striking distance of the storm. Just remember, When Thunder Roars, Go Indoors.
- Whether on foot or in a car, if you encounter flood waters, Turn Around Don't Drown!
- Make sure to check the Air Quality Index for your area at http://airnow.gov. If the air quality is poor, avoid prolonged or extreme exertion outdoors.

Be a Force of Nature

Your action can inspire others. Be a force of nature and share how you're working to stay safe from weather and water hazards this summer.

- Write a post on Facebook. Share with your friends and family the preparedness steps you're taking to stay safe this summer.
- Tweet that you're prepared with #SummerSafety. Tell us what you're doing to be prepared for summer hazards.
- Create a Family Communication Plan so that your loved ones know how to get in touch during an emergency. And let your friends know that they should create a plan also.
- Look for ways to help your town prepare, such as volunteering. Register for America's PrepareAthon! to learn how to stay safe during disasters.
- With these steps, you'll be doing more than just protecting yourself you'll help NOAA build a Weather-Ready Nation.

The rules on garage sales held in the village of Melrose Park are as follows:

Garage sales will be held on the third weekend only during the months of May, June, July, August and September. Sales are to be conducted on Thursday, Friday and

Saturday of the designated weekends. No sales are allowed on Sundays.

The upcoming dates for 2023 are July 20-22, Aug. 17-19 and Sept. 14-16.

Garage sales shall be conducted only during the hours of 9 a.m.-5 p.m.

No permit is needed for garage sales, however the following rules must be followed:

- No garage sales may be conducted in apartment buildings.
- No garage sales in the frontyard, i.e., on the grass.
- All garage sales to be conducted in backyard, garage or on driveway.



- All sale items to be displayed on tables, not on the ground.
- No sale items shall be located and no sale activity shall be conducted in the frontyard area, on the premises of any public sidewalk, parkway area or other public property.
- No sale signs, handbills or other advertising material shall be located or posted upon public parkway or on public property, signs, poles or light poles within the village of Melrose Park.
- Signs advertising the sales shall not exceed 3-by-5 feet and may be located only in the frontyard (private property) of the address having the garage sale, and must be removed immediately after the sale.
- The sale will be conducted without the use of outdoor loud speakers, amplification equipment or illuminated advertising devices.

Any person violating these rules shall be subject to a fine not to exceed \$500. A copy of garage sale rules is available at www.melrosepark.org.

Chamber Highlights from April and May 2023

On April 11, the Melrose Park Chamber of Commerce and Community Development hosted its Annual Legislative Breakfast and along with Mayor Ronald Serpico, welcomed over 185 business and community leaders from the area. During this event, attendees were provided with a state legislative update by House Speaker Emanuel "Chris" Welch and Senate President Don Harmon.

In addition to the current state of the state presentation from Speaker Welch and President Harmon, there was over 45 minutes of Q&A where they answered questions and took suggestions from the audience on topics that included education, workforce challenges and resources, tax incentives, business grants, public safety, transportation, and repair plans for Lake Street and North Avenue business corridors.

Thanks to all that attended and for your engagement during the event, as well as the networking time before and after the actual presentations.

As part of the MPCCCD mission, we work to bring resources and information to our businesses to help them fuel growth, and for sustainability of their business and the local community. This is done through many programs, but one that occurs regularly is our Business Breakfast Program that is generally held around the third week of each month.

At our May Breakfast on May 25, more than 40 business owners joined in as Michael Corrigan from Corrigan Financial Services explained the Employee Retention Tax Credit (ERC) and how businesses that experienced losses or other financial hardship in 2020 and 2021 because of the COVID-19 pandemic, but retained employees, could qualify for and recover up to \$26,000 per employee retained. Through this presentation, we learned that the deadlines for applying for these funds are approaching quickly and the last date to apply for 2020 will be on April 15, 2024, and to recover money from 2021, the last date to apply will be April 15, 2025.

Mr. Corrigan also cautioned businesses not to wait to apply for the ERC as there have been regular changes to this program since it was first approved as part of the CARES Act and federal legislative efforts to support businesses that were navigating difficult times.

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Dominican Literacy Center Continues to Provide English Instruction and More ...

The Dominican Literacy Center originally began in Chicago, at the request of the pastor of Our Lady of Grace Parish in 1996. In 2008, the building housing the center was deemed to need extensive repairs and could not be used. In June of 2008, the center was graciously welcomed to rent a part of Sacred Heart Convent in Melrose Park, where it has continued to provide English instruction for the past 14 years.

The goal of the Dominican Literacy Center is the empowerment of persons who experience personal and economic limitations within our Englishspeaking society. Through literacy education and personal relationships, we strive to provide a small step toward eliminating racial and cultural prejudice and stereotypes, as well as a step up for persons seeking improvement in their personal, familial and economic abilities.

The Dominican Literacy Center provides weekly one and half hour tutored sessions in which one student meets with one tutor. The center provides tutoring in speaking, reading and writing English, as well as tutoring in preparation for the Citizenship interview and exam. This individualized instruction is provided for immigrant women and men (ages 17+) who are – endeavoring to reduce literacy and its consequential effects of isolation (due to their inability to communicate in English with health care providers, children's teachers, neighbors, co-workers, community leaders and/or first responders); in low-level jobs (due to lack of training or skills, or an inability to demonstrate their already achieved skills and knowledge); powerless to supervise their adolescent children or to influence systemic change; lacking confidence to enroll in traditional classes and or fear of requesting help when needed.

English Classes

English classes are provided for those who want to learn to speak, read or write in English. One student meets with one tutor, once a week.

These classes are offered at the Dominican Literacy Center, 1503 Rice Street, in Melrose Park (near Sacred Heart/St. Eulalia Parish).

Our program also assists persons studying for their Citizenship interview/exam.

We presently offer classes on Monday through Thursday, in the mornings and afternoons.

John Lulio – A Good Man and A Happy 90 Years Young! Well-known, Long-time and Loved Melrose Park Resident Celebrates a Milestone – He's a Genuine Friend Worth Having! Here's the Lulio Story ...

Celebrating a remarkable milestone, John Lullo, at the helm of four generations and a cherished member of the Melrose Park community, recently turned 90, marking a lifetime filled with extraordinary experiences and an unwavering commitment to his family and hometown. Displaying exemplary dedication and commitment, he rose through the ranks from private to sergeant in just 13 months. His role in the adjutant general's office involved administering aptitude tests and assisting with soldier placement, showcasing his strong organizational skills and attention to detail. Later, he was deployed to Korea, where he efficiently managed transportation for fellow soldiers while sta-

tioned in the sergeant's office. John's service in Korea spanned 18 months before he returned home at Christmas time.

Following his military service, John returned to his original place of work, International Harvester, where he was previously employed as a typist. Upon John's re-entry into the workforce at Harvester, he became a technical writer and embarked on a distinguished career spanning 43 years there. He quickly rose through the ranks, earning promotions to high-level management positions. Throughout his tenure, he exhibited exceptional leadership qualities and a tireless work ethic, becoming a respected figure within the company. Additionally, John's entrepreneurial spirit led him to establish and manage a ceramic studio in Melrose Park for over 55 years, where he not only shared his expertise, but also taught
classes, sharpened his artistic talents and inspired others to explore their creativity. He won many awards for his work at various ceramics shows throughout the years.

Love found its way into John's life when he met Antoinette Bianco at International Harvester. Their courtship began with a memorable second date, where Antoinette took a literal fall while dancing. John humorously remarked, "This is the first time I took a girl out on a date and she fell for me so fast." The couple eventually married in 1957 and embarked on a beautiful journey together, nurturing a bond that withstood the tests of time.

However, life presented John with profound challenges as Antoinette faced serious and debilitating illnesses. Undeterred, he dedicated himself wholeheartedly to her care, standing as a pillar of strength and support. Their enduring love and commitment demonstrated the power of partnership and the true essence of a lifelong bond.

John and Antoinette were blessed with two children, Karen and John, who would continue the family's tradition of making a positive impact in their respective endeavors. Karen, born in 1958, pursued a successful career in the corporate world at Rust-Oleum, contributing her talents to the company's growth. John, lov-ingly known as John Nick, made his entrance into the world on New Year's Day in 1960, being the first baby born at Westlake Hospital that decade. His professional journey led him to become the assistant supervisor of the Maintenance Department at School District 89, where he diligently served all the facilities throughout the district.

John's grandchildren carry forward the Lullo family's legacy of achievement and community service. Dr. Scott Price, his eldest grandson, stands as a testament to academic excellence, serving as a tenured chemistry lecturer at UC Santa Barbara. John beamed with pride as he attended Scott's dissertation defense, witnessing his grandson's remarkable achievement. The most common is the Homeowner Exemption, which saves a Cook County property owner an average of \$950 dollars each year. Listed here are the exemptions that automatically renew each year - Homeowner Exemption, Senior Exemption and Persons with Disabilities.
Listed here are the exemptions that must be reapplied annually – "Senior Freeze" Exemption, Veterans with Disabilities Exemption, Returning Veterans Exemption and Long Time Homeowner Exemption.

Cook County to Award Additional \$100,000 in Honor Grants to Nonprofits that Serve Veterans Awards Help Expand Existing Programming for Veterans and Their Families

Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle recently announced an additional \$100,000 in funding for Honor Grants, a program spearheaded by the Cook County Department of Veterans Affairs (CCVA) to expand programming offered by nonprofit organizations that serve the veteran community and their families. Applications are open and close Friday, June 30.

Last November, the county awarded \$1.4 million in Honor Grants to 18 nonprofits. This year, CCVA will distribute 10 \$10,000 grants, bringing the total amount of Honor Grant funding awarded to \$1.5 million.

"Last year, the county helped expand programming and resources to over 2,000 veterans through Honor Grant funding," said President Preckwinkle. "I am grateful to be able to offer this opportunity once again for nonprofits who continue to do the heavy lifting to assist and create a better quality of life for our veteran community."

Honor Grants are available to nonprofit organizations who have existing programs for veterans and their families that provide resources and services to address mental health, education and job placement, home and food security in addition to making benefits more accessible.

"In America, veterans volunteer to protect this country. They show courage and embrace all challenges when serving both overseas and at home. When their tours are over, we must be there to support them and give them the tools they need to succeed in life," said Cook County Commissioner Frank J. Aguilar. "By funding specific organizations who are equipped to help veterans, we are making sure these funds are used appropriately, delivering the most effective relief to those who served."

The county is funding the Honor Grants Program through the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). CCVA was allocated nearly \$5 million in ARPA funding to support programs that assist veterans and their families.

Cook County Commissioner Frank J. Aguilar Encourages Eligible Residents to Apply for Medicaid Redetermination

During the COVID-19 public health emergency, Medicaid Continuous Enrollment protected people from losing Medicaid coverage. The public health emergency declaration ended on May 11, 2023, causing Medicaid Continuous Enrollment and other Medicaid flexibilities to end as well.

This means – Medicaid customers could lose coverage as soon as July 1, so don't wait to renew. Individuals must go back to applying for their eligibility of benefits every year. This is called redetermination. It is critical that those receiving Medicaid benefits take action to avoid losing coverage. To continue your Medicaid coverage, manage your case at abe.illinois.gov or call 1-800-843-6154 for help with the renewal process.

"All residents who are enrolled in Medicaid need to be aware of these developments," said Commissioner Aguilar. "Over the last few years, things have been very different. Now as we return to a more normal state of affairs, we need to make sure that residents, municipalities, community organizations and all other networks are aware of these changes to Medicaid Redetermination. I am looking at every possible avenue to get this information out to the 16th District and to bring those in need of help into direct contact with county and state health officials who can help navigate this process."

Commissioner Aguilar would also like to promote an upcoming Medicaid Redetermination event in North Riverside. On Monday, June 26, from 10 a.m.-2 p.m., Cook County will be hosting a Medicaid Redetermination session at the North Riverside Health Center, 1800 S. Harlem Ave., Suite A, North Riverside, III. Commissioner Aguilar encourages all eligible residents to attend this event if they have any questions on the process for applying for redetermination.

What is the Cook County Department of Public Health (CCDPH) doing to educate the public about Medicaid redetermination?

- Since mid-April, CCDPH has been raising awareness on its web and social media sites, and collaborating with community-based organizations and partners to share information regarding the need for Medicaid customers to complete redetermination in order to maintain coverage after the end of the Public Health Emergency declarations on May 11, 2023. Materials can be found by going to ccdph411.com.
- CCH is working to educate Medicaid members about redetermination, creating and sharing information English, Spanish, Polish, Chinese, Hindi, Arabic and Russian.

Loyola Medicine Donates Ambulance to Support the Effort in Ukraine

On Monday, June 5, during a ceremony at Loyola University Medical Center, Loyola Medicine donated an ambulance to help save lives in Ukrainian communities under attack by Russian forces. The ambulance was covered with signatures and messages of support from Loyola Medicine colleagues to lift the spirits of the people of Ukraine.

"Loyola Medicine is committed to delivering health care and hope to those we serve," said Shawn Vincent, President and CEO of Loyola Medicine. "And when we can serve a larger purpose, we will. I am proud that we are donating this ambulance to help save the lives of those fighting to protect their home country."

U.S. Ambulances for Ukraine will work with the UA Resistance Foundation, a charity fund to support Ukraine, to deliver the ambulance to the front lines. U.S. Ambulances for Ukraine was founded by Chris Manson, vice president of Government Relations at OSF HealthCare in Peoria. He was inspired to find a way to donate an ambulance by his 7-year-old daughter who was moved by coverage of the war and asked how they could help. Since March 2022, U.S. Ambulances for Ukraine has facilitated the donation of 39 ambulances.

During a visit to Ukraine, Manson was struck by the reception the ambulances receive. "The reactions you see from the people when they see the American vehicle, when they see the messages, you can just tell there's another kind of benefit. They know they aren't alone."

To ensure the ambulance is in good condition and ready to get to work, Loyola Medicine Transport gave the ambulance a tune-up and will fill it with five Stryker stretchers and additional EMS supplies. "We are beyond excited and grateful to be helping those in Ukraine," said Tim Prokop CCEMT-P, operations manager for Loyola Medicine Transport.

It's Never Too Late for Scholarships

It is never too late to search for college scholarships.

Yes, high school seniors and their families, there still is time to earn financial help.

College is expensive, but still attainable. The average price for college tuition and required fees at a public four-year school in Illinois is more than \$26,000 annually for in-state students.

"Early and often is sort of my credo regarding scholarship searches," Kevin Ladd, chief operating officer at Scholarships.com, told the Tribune Content Agency.

Start looking at home.

First, have a conversation with the high school guidance counselor, who should have a ready-made list of scholarships.

Second, stop by your city hall, park district or chamber of commerce. Each might know of scholarship opportunities presented by local employers, foundations or service organizations, such as Kiwanis or the American Legion.

Do not forget your local place of worship, which also might have information on ways to help.

Remember, it is possible to win more than one scholarship.

Finally, do not forget to ask the financial aid office at the college you plan to attend. The office will know if additional scholarships or grant money are available since the last time you checked.

Also, be stingy. Do not pay money to find scholarships and do not pay a fee to apply for a scholarship. There are plenty of free services available. Prioritize and keep track of your work. Know application deadlines, as well as when scholarships will be awarded. Re-use your work – An essay written

as part of the application for one scholarship can be edited and tailored to another scholarship application.

"Knock out the ones that are about to expire first," Ladd said, "particularly the ones that don't take as much of your time."

5/29, A Day for a College Savings Plan

On May 29, Illinois marked 5/29 Day, named after the 529 college savings plans that allow parents to put away money for their children's education. Illinois lawmakers approved the May 29 designation six years ago "to help raise awareness about the escalating costs of higher education and the importance of saving for college."

In Illinois, the Bright Start Program is a tax-advantaged investment vehicle to help save for college. Under Illinois State Treasurer Michael Frerichs, the state's highly rated Bright Start Program has more than doubled to \$16.5 billion in assets since 2015 and has grown to more than 850,000 accounts. The Treasurer's Office has worked with program manager Union Bank & Trust to reduce fees to ensure more investment dollars go directly to college savings.

We understand parents' desire to save for their children's future, and the Illinois Treasurer's Office's 529 plans offer a variety of investment options and flexibilities for families. We want families to be comfortable investing their hard-earned dollars in a college savings plan.

Anyone can contribute to an account and there are no enrollment fees, minimum contribution or minimum balance requirements to open or maintain one. There are tax benefits, too. Earnings are free from federal and state taxes if used for qualified education expenses, and up to \$10,000 per year in contributions (\$20,000 per year for married couples filing jointly) to an account are eligible for an Illinois income tax deduction. With Bright Start, you don't even need a financial advisor and it takes just approximately 10 minutes to open an account online.

ComEd Rebates for Rooftop Solar Reach \$100 Million Church on Chicago's Northwest Side Presented Rebate for \$27,000

ComEd industrial and commercial customers, as well as schools and churches, have received a total of \$100 million in rebates from the electric company for rooftop solar installations, including the St. Paul Lutheran Church and School in the Norwood Park neighborhood, which was presented on April 19 with a rebate check for \$27,580.70. Established in 2019, ComEd's distributed generation (DG) rebate program reduces the upfront costs of installing solar systems and spurs renewable energy development across northern Illinois.

"Our roof-top solar installation is enabling us to realize meaningful savings on our energy bill through ComEd's DG Rebate Program," said Rev. Todd Roberts, pastor at St. Paul Lutheran Church and School. "What's more, it's well aligned with our effort to be better stewards of the land and facilities under our management and reduce our carbon footprint."

The 226 solar panels installed on the roof of the St. Paul Early Childhood Center generate approximately 91.9 kilowatts of clean energy – equal to one year of planting 1,435 acres of forest or removing greenhouse gas emissions from 268 gasoline-powered vehicles.

"We applaud St. Paul Lutheran for taking the initiative to support a cleaner energy future by installing rooftop solar panels at their school," said Scott Vogt, vice president of Strategy and Energy Policy at ComEd. "The DG rebate program is one example of the many ways ComEd continues to support the growth of solar in our service territory."

ComEd estimates that solar power on its grid, including rooftop and community solar systems, will grow five times from almost 650 MWs today to about 3,300 MWs by 2030. In 2022, ComEd received a record-setting 19,292 applications from residential, commercial and industrial customers to connect solar panels and other distributed energy resources to ComEd's grid, a 40-percent increase from the prior year.

The multi-year grid and rate plans ComEd filed with the Illinois Commerce Commission (ICC) earlier this year support this rapid expansion of renewable energy and help ensure equitable access to the benefits of clean energy under the state's Climate and Equitable Jobs Act. The plans align with ComEd 2030, the company's recently announced vision for a carbon-free energy future that will benefit all communities and meet customers' changing needs for the rest of this decade and beyond.

The DG Rebate Program is available to commercial, industrial, and residential customers that install distributed generation projects, as well as community solar projects. Owners and operators of a distributed energy generating system are eligible for rebates of \$250 or \$300 per kilowatt of generating capacity, dependent on customer rate class. Rebates are also available on energy storage systems associated with an eligible DG facility. To be eligible for the rebate, customers need to install a smart inverter, which converts direct current power to alternating current power.

ComEd Program Prepares More than 80 Local Residents for Growing Clean Energy Jobs ComEd CONSTRUCT and Craft Academy Graduates Train for Careers in Construction, Energy Industries

Community members, and corporate and workforce partners joined ComEd on April 28, for a graduation ceremony celebrating the newest cohort to complete the CONSTRUCT Infrastructure Academy and Craft Academy job training programs. More than 80 local residents graduated from these programs, which develop a skilled and diverse talent pipeline to support the clean energy transition in Illinois.

A recent study reveals that the clean energy transition could bring as many as 150,000 jobs to Illinois by 2050. To ensure that local talent is available to maintain and operate the electric grid, and enable the clean energy transition, ComEd has pledged to hire additional entry-level trades roles and has continually invested to expand workforce training programs, such as CONSTRUCT and Craft Academy.

"Our move to a cleaner energy future requires swift action and skilled talent, which is why we are investing to grow training programs that will prepare people from our communities to take on the jobs of the future," said Gil Quiniones, CEO of ComEd. "Programs like CONSTRUCT and Craft Academy are essential to our efforts to prepare the electric grid to meet future demand and provide our communities the key to earning not just a job, but a family sustaining career in our fast-growing industry."

Today's graduates represent diverse backgrounds and every corner of the ComEd service region, including 49 different Illinois zip codes; 98 percent of the graduates are people of color and 21 percent are women. The CONSTRUCT and Craft Academy programs increase the pool of qualified female and minority candidates for construction jobs in Illinois by strengthening job readiness and life skills, and preparing for industry-required testing.

CONSTRUCT Infrastructure Academy

Now in its 11th year, CONSTRUCT Infrastructure Academy is an 11-week program that prepares individuals for careers in the skilled trades. Since its launch, nearly 800 participants with diverse backgrounds have completed the program, boasting a more than 70 percent job placement rate.

CONSTRUCT exposes students to innovative solar and energy efficiency technologies to help prepare them to join the local future energy workforce. Participants gain knowledge and experience that helps qualify them for entry-level jobs with good-paying, livable wages. Participants can earn various certifications, including a Class A Commercial Driver's License (CDL) and an Occupational Safety and Health Administration's (OSHA) 10-Hour Safety Training Certification via City Colleges of Chicago's Olive-Harvey College. CONSTRUCT participants also receive a stipend to supplement expenses during training.

"CONSTRUCT has been a life-changing investment for me," said Brieanna Ware, a 2023 CONSTRUCT graduate. "I knew I wanted a career change and this program has shown me all the interesting opportunities that are available. I am looking forward to entering this industry. As a single mom, it is important that my son and I both have a secure future. I am grateful to ComEd and the YWCA for this amazing opportunity."

Since its launch, the CONSTRUCT Program has greatly expanded and now includes more than 40 partners – including organized labor, construction companies, educational institutions and 10 workforce community organizations – working to recruit, train and prepare area residents for well-paying construction and related careers. Illinois American Water is ComEd's newest corporate partner, joining the program this year.

"We are proud to partner with ComEd in developing the next generation of talent and leadership in this industry," said Jennifer Morrison, program director, Supplier Diversity and Community Outreach of Illinois American Water. "ComEd along with their many agency partners have done a remarkable job selecting the right talent, and supporting and nurturing them along the way. They are making an incredibly positive impact on the communities that they serve."

Craft Academy

CRAFT Academy, which lasts three weeks, prepares students for utility and construction roles that require pole climbing and other specific physical attributes. The program is designed to increase knowledge, awareness and capabilities – with an emphasis on field roles that require physical aptitude to increase the success rate of employment offers. At the conclusion of the program, students are prepared for entry-level roles, including construction worker and overhead helper.

CONSTRUCT and Craft Academy participants must be at least 18 years old with a high school diploma or GED equivalent, a valid driver's license, and able to pass a background check and admission interview.

ComEd offers a range of exposure and career readiness programs for adults and youth at every stage of their career journey, and last year alone these programs reached more than 2,000 people in the service territory. Power Grid Investments Increase ComEd Resilience to Severe Weather as Summer Approaches ComEd Preparing System for Higher Temps and Greater Electrification

With severe weather showing up early and often, and high summer temperatures placing more stress on the electric grid, ComEd has taken steps to ensure reliable energy for the 9 million people it serves in northern Illinois. On May 4, ComEd presented its summer readiness plan and a look at its future work to the Illinois Commerce Commission (ICC).

"The summer is typically our most active weather season," said Terence Donnelly, president and COO at ComEd. "However, climate change has made severe weather more likely year-round. While we spoke with the ICC about our preparations for this summer, the reality is that the work we do is meant to ensure reliability in the face of increasing severe weather and prepare the grid for the rapid growth of clean energy technologies."

In ComEd's presentation, Donnelly reviewed ComEd programs and processes to help protect against the impacts of severe weather, including Distribution Automation, a technology that has helped ComEd avoid more than 15 million customer outages; light detection and ranging, or Lidar, which helps to identify trees that might be more susceptible to the effects of climate change; and an outage prediction tool that uses analytics from system data to map out effective preventative maintenance.

Last year, investments in the power grid continued to pay reliability dividends for ComEd customers as the electric company delivered record reliability. Since grid improvements began in 2011, overall reliability has improved more than 80 percent. In that time, ComEd has avoided more than 19 million power outages for customers, saving more than \$3.3 billion in outage-related costs. In 2022, 85 percent, or nearly 3.5 million ComEd customers, experienced zero or one interruption in service.

Preparing for the Clean Energy Transition

In addition, Donnelly outlined steps the company is taking to support policy goals outlined in Illinois' Climate and Equitable Jobs Act (CEJA) while continuing to invest in the system to provide reliable, safe, clean and equitable electric service.

"We are never just doing one thing at a time," said Donnelly. "We build with an eye toward resiliency and preparing the grid for severe weather, as well as increased clean energy technology and decarbonization, so that we maximize the long-term benefit for customers every time we make improvements to the grid."

Supporting the adoption of electric vehicles, and electrification of buildings and industry while maintaining grid safety and reliability will require physical and digital infrastructure upgrades. ComEd outlined these needs in the multi-year grid and rate plans that it filed in January with the ICC. The plans align with ComEd 2030, the company's vision for a carbon-free energy future that will benefit all communities and meet customers' changing needs for the rest of this decade and beyond.

This feeling of concern around socialization increases for the Black senior community 55 and older with nearly four in 10 (39 percent) of these seniors reporting feeling socially isolated, 13 percentage points higher than the total population of 55 and older. In addition, over four in 10 (43 percent) seniors in the Black community reported they are limiting what they do and where they go in fear of catching COVID-19 – 16 percentage points higher than the total population of 55 and older.

SOURCE WATER (MANDATORY)

VILLAGE OF MELROSE PARK DRINKING WATER SOURCE

Lake Michigan is the surface water supply used to provide drinking water for Chicago and 123 suburban communities. The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has found that the quality of Lake Michigan has improved dramatically over the past 21 years. Lake Michigan, by volume, is the second largest Great Lake and the only one located totally within the United States. It serves as a source of drinking water, as a place for swimming and fishing, and as a scenic wonderland. Sources of drinking water used for both tap water and bottled water can pick up contaminants as water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground. The drinking water source is vulnerable to industrial waste and runoff from surrounding lands. Potential sources of pollution such as pesticides, herbicides, radioactive materials, and organic and inorganic petroleum and gas production by-products can impact the source water. We do not have indications of the presence of these contaminants at this time, mainly because of restrictions, which prohibit industrial effluents from entering Lake Michigan, Sewage treatment plant effluents are not discharged into the lake, thereby reducing the threat of microbial contamination. All 63 miles of shoreline within Illinois are now considered to be in good condition. The Illinois EPA Office of Groundwater will be doing a source water assessment within the next three years. When completed, all sources of Pollutants into Lake Michigan will be identified and there will be information regarding the source water's susceptibility to contaminants based on the findings of the assessment. Since the quality of the raw water source is good, conventional treatment methods of disinfection, coagulation and sedimentation, and sand filtration are adequate for producing a water that is free of harmful contaminants.

HOW IS MY WATER TREATED AND PURIFIED?

The City of Chicago Water Department provides the water treatment necessary to safeguard the water delivered to Melrose Park. Water is taken from Lake Michigan at several water inlets located about 3 miles from shore. Chlorine is then injected into the water for disinfection. The water then flows through a series of settling and filtration basins where small amounts of polymer and sedimentation chemicals are added. After this process is complete, the water is filtered to remove the sediment. At this point the water is filtered through layers of fine charcoal and silicate sand. Small particles are removed and pure clean water is ready to be re-chlorinated as a safeguard and precaution against any microorganisms.

VOLUNTARY TESTING (OPTIONAL)

The Chicago Water Department monitors for contaminants which are proposed to be regulated or for which no standards currently exist but which could provide useful information in assessing the quality of the source water or the drinking water.

Cryptosporidium – Analyses have been conducted monthly on the source water since April 1993. Cryptosporidium has not been detected in these samples. Treatment processes have been optimized to ensure that if there are cryptosporidium cysts in the source water, they will be removed during the treatment process. By maintaining a low turbidity and thereby removing the particles from the water, the threat of cryptosporidium organisms getting into the drinking water system is greatly reduced.

Asbestos – Samples are examined for asbestos fibers in the source water and finished water on a routine basis. The EPA has determined that asbestos fibers greater than 10 microns in length could potentially cause lung cancer. We did not find fibers that are in this size category.

Taste and odor compounds – MIB and geosmin are monitored both in the source water and finished water. These analyses assist the personnel to determine the effectiveness of the treatment process as they strive to reduce these compounds and provide a drinking water without detectable tastes and odors.

The City of Chicago carefully monitors the chlorine, using just enough chlorine to protect its customers, without compromising taste. Lastly, fluoride is added to inhibit tooth decay. A corrosive inhibitor is added to protect the distribution system pipes.

The finished water is pumped into the City of Chicago supply system. The water there is pumped westerly by the city's Springfield Pumping Station through a 48"-36" supply line to the Village of Melrose Park's connection at Harlem and Wabansia.

Water is stored in the Village's 2 million gallon reservoir and again pumped by a booster station at 8300 North Avenue. The water travels through a 42" supply line to 2-4 million gallon reservoirs at the 15th Avenue pumping station and a 2 million gallon reservoir at the 23rd Avenue Main Pumping Station. At those points the water is pumped into the local water distribution lines. The Village of Melrose Park once again tests the water for chlorine levels, and adds the required chlorine to insure clean and safe water to its consumers.

SUBSTANCE EXPECTED IN DRINKING WATER

Under The Safe Drinking Water Act. S.D.W.A., the U.S.A. Environmental Protection Agency is responsible for establishing national limits for hundreds of substances in drinking water. The Act also specifies various treatments that water systems must use to remove these substances.

The Food and Drug Administration regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which must provide the same protection for public health.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the USEPA's Safe Water Hotline (1-800-426-4791).

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. USEPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by Cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the USEPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (1-800-426-4791).

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. The Village Of Melrose Park is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. Information on lead in drinking water, testing methods, and steps you can take to minimize exposure is available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline or at http://www.epa.gov/safewater/lead.

IF THERE WERE A PROBLEM WITH WATER CONTAMINANT, WHO WOULD NOTIFY ME?

If contaminant levels were to exceed the M.C.L. for safe use, the Village of Melrose Park Department of Public Works will notify you with newspaper, TV and radio announcements. Also, the Village's Emergency Services/Public Safety would patrol the streets of Melrose Park instructing you of what appropriate action you can use to protect your family's health. These actions might include boiling the water for a particular period of time.

TABULAR INFORMATION

This report includes tables of contaminants found in drinking water. The tables do not list contaminants that were not found in the Chicago and Melrose Park water supply. Any contaminants detected in Melrose Park's water were under maximum contaminants levels (M.C.L.) within the safe drinking water guidelines set by U.S. EPA and are not expected to cause any health risks. However, it is important for you to know exactly what was detected and how much of the substance was present in the water.

The Village of Melrose Park hopes this information helps make its water customers better informed on the water we use in our homes and businesses.

2022 NON-DETECTED CONTAMINANTS

The following table includes contaminants monitored for, but not detected in the most recent sample. The CCR rule does not require that this information be reported; however, monitoring had indicated that these contaminants were not present in the water supply. In some cases, if a contaminant is not detected in a water supply, monitoring can be reduced to once every three or six years, however, the Village monitors every year.

Turbidity

Turbidity is a measure of the cloudiness of the water. We monitor it because it is a good indicator of water quality and the effectiveness of our filtration system and disinfectants. **Unregulated Contaminants:**

A maximum contaminant level (MCL) for this contaminant has not been established by either state or federal regulations, nor has mandatory health effects language. The purpose for monitoring this contaminant is to assist USEPA in determining the occurrence of unregulated contaminants in drinking water, and whether future regulation is warranted. Fluoride

Fluoride is added to the water supply to help promote strong teeth. The Illinois Department of Public Health recommends an optimal fluoride range of 0.9 mg/l to 1.2 mg/l.

Sodium

There is not a state or federal MCL for sodium. Monitoring is required to provide information to consumers and health officials that are concerned about sodium intake due to dietary precautions. If you are on a sodium-restricted diet, you should consult a physician about this level of sodium in the water.

MCL's are set as close to the Maximum Contaminant Level Goal as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG): The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLG's allow for a margin of safety. mg/l: milligrams per litre or parts per million - or one ounce in 7,350 gallons of water.

Ug/l: micrograms per litre or parts per billion - or one ounce in 7,350,000 gallons of water.

Na: not applicable.

*MCL Statement: The maximum contaminant level (MCL) for TTHM and HAA5 is 80 ppm and 60 ppm respectively and is currently only applicable to surface water supplies that serve 10,000 or more people. These MCLs will become effective 01/01/2005 for all groundwater supplies and surface supplies serving less than 10,000 people. Until 01/01/2005, surface water supplies serving less than 10,000 people, any size water supply that purchase from a surface water source, and groundwater supplies serving more than 10,000 people must meet a state imposed TTHM MCL of 100 ppm. Some people who drink water containing trihalomethanes in excess of the MCL over many years experience problems with their livers, kidneys, or central nervous systems, and may have increased risk of getting cancer.
