Dear Neighbors,
Once again, it is almost time for that culinary delight, the Taste of Melrose Park, which will be held Sept. 1-3. What makes our food festival unique is that out of 60 food vendors, only a handful will be operated by restaurants. The vast majority of the Taste food booths are family operated, which is appropriate since we pride ourselves on being the most family-affordable food festival in Illinois.


This year, some food booths were forced to raise their long-standing price of $\$ 3$ to $\$ 4$ due to inflation. However, in light of the inflationary infused food prices, I believe $\$ 4$ is still a bargain, though I am happy to report that a few vendors were able to hold their food offerings to $\$ 3$. The Taste of Melrose Park is my favorite village event. I love strolling the grounds and watching people laugh and interact with friends, neighbors and family. It is an event that for many caps off the end of summer.
In the spirit of fun, I did some research and found a few interesting facts about some of the Taste of Melrose Park food items, such as Italian beef, which is unique to the Chicago area. Its origin is traced back to the early 1900s Chicago Italian community where they celebrated what was called "Peanut Weddings." Most of the newly arrived Italian families were impoverished, so when they hosted a wedding the only items they could afford to serve were peanuts and low-grade beef, which they would slice into very thin pieces and simmer in spices so they could feed their guests.
Tacos, a mainstay for centuries in Mexico, first appeared down in Texas in the early 1900s. Most Americans had no idea what a taco was until the late 1950s when this tasty import made its way into restaurants like Taco Bell. According to NationalTacoDay.com, an astonishing 4.5 billion tacos were consumed in America in 2022.
Tomato sauce ladled over many dishes at the Taste of Melrose Park is thought of as originating in Italy, but that perception is wrong. Italy had no tomatoes until they were brought over from the Americas by the Spanish Conquistadors in the 16th century via the Aztecs.
The Missionary Sisters of St. Charles serve a popular Taste of Melrose Park confection called Sfingi. It is only appropriate that the good nuns chose this confection as their offering, as its origins date back to the Middle Ages when it was first created by another order of sisters, the Nuns of St. Francis Stigmata in Palermo, Sicily.
Many Taste of Melrose Park dishes are created using a form of pasta. The average person in Italy eats 51 pounds of pasta a year compared to Americans who consume 17 pounds.
The most important fact to know about the Taste of Melrose Park is that the nearly $\$ 1.3$ million dollars raised from the sale of beer and wine has been donated to the Melrose Park Sports and Family Benefit Fund. This fund has supported many youth programs, senior citizen groups, local charities and educational endeavors. Thank you for supporting this cause over the years.

## Melrose Park Police Department Releases Speed Enforcement Numbers

The Melrose Park Police Department conducted a traffic safety campaign July 6-31, 2023, reminding motorists to slow down to save lives. The speed enforcement effort was conducted by the Melrose Park Police Department, and other state and local law enforcement agencies across Illinois to reduce highway fatalities.

During the campaign, the Melrose Park Police Department issued 72 speeding, two possession of cannabis, two suspended/revoked licenses arrest, four uninsured motorists, seven expired registrations and four driving while holding cellphone citations.

We continue to urge residents and others traveling through our community to slow down and obey speed limits," said Deputy Chief Anthony Greco. "The choices you make behind the wheel could help save lives."

## Silver Creek Restoration Project

Under the direction of Mayor Ronald M. Serpico, the Village of Melrose Park Public Works employees constructed the Silver Creek Eagles Nest Park. This is a natural preserve that will include a walking path and a pavilion/gazebo, along with a canoe/kayak launch.

Phase Five, Six and Seven of the
Silver Creek Restoration Project have been completed.
Phase Eight is in the final planning stages.
This restoration project restores the natural balance of the creek by restoring the embankment, and bringing back native landscape and shrubbery along with aquatic habitat. This is an invaluable stream system that provides storm water runoff, flood management and many other benefits for the residents of Melrose
 Park.

## Silver Creek Trail Park

The Silver Creek Trail Park is located off of First Avenue. The trail is centered off the pond between Silver Creek and its tributary, the Des Plaines River. Native plants of this area were once lost to development and are now being reintroduced to the area. With the help of these native plants, more wildlife is
 returning to the area from the Bald Eagle (sighted in the area), the Northern Pike, Red Foxes, Black-Crowned Night Herons and Cooper's Hawk, to name a few.

## Public Information Regarding Resident Safety Outdoor Warning System

Melrose Park has a siren warning system at multiple locations throughout the community. The system consists of several sirens strategically located throughout the village and is intended to provide outdoor warning of impending danger. You may only hear the sirens if you are outside. Please review the following information as it explains the function, operation and procedures associated with the Village of Melrose Park Outdoor Warning Siren System.

## Warning System Activation

The system is designed to notify the community by alert warning and attack warning signals. the signals are standardized for outdoor warning devices by the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

## Alert Warning

An alert warning signal is a three- to five-minute steady siren. This signal is used during a severe weather emergency or funnel cloud sighting. The reporting area includes a 10 -mile perimeter around the village. The alert warning signal shall indicate to all persons to "immediately seek shelter, turn on your radio or television and listen for essential emergency information." Please
 note, severe weather watches are reports of weather conditions in which tornados could occur. The warning system is not activated for severe weather watches.

## Attack Warning

An attack warning signal is a three- to five-minute wavering siren. This signal means that an actual attack against the United States has been detected and that the Federal Emergency Broadcast System has been activated. According to federal government guidelines, this signal will be used for no other purpose and will have no other meaning. The use of indoor warning systems is essential, as most residents and businesses will not hear the warning system unless they are outside. An indoor warning system includes commercial broadcast radio, television stations, cable television override systems, tone activated radio receivers and public address systems in public buildings.

## Listen for the Siren Testing the First Tuesday of Every Month at 10 a.m.

It is important that the village system be tested on a regular schedule to ensure proper operation and to assist in educating the public to recognize the different warning signals. Testing occurs the first Tuesday of each month at 10 a.m. Federal and state guidelines indicate that monthly warning system tests should occur in the following manner:

- Alert warning signal (steady siren) will sound for one minute.
- One minute of silence.
- Attack warning signal (wavering siren) will sound for one minute.

This testing procedure will establish a test pattern different from that used in an actual emergency when the signals are sounded for three to five minutes. Reactivation
Once it is activated, the warning sirens will not be reactivated for the same incident. The warning sirens will be reactivated for new, confirmed incidents.

## All Clear

In keeping with established policies, the village of Melrose Park will not issue the all clear for any alert or attack signals. Please monitor commercial radio and television for further information.

## Sheltering In Place

## Should I Shelter at Home?

Taking appropriate shelter is critical in times of disaster. Sheltering is appropriate when conditions require that you seek protection in your home, place of employment or other location when disaster strikes. Sheltering outside the hazard area could include staying with friends and relatives, seeking commercial lodging or staying in a mass-care facility operated by disaster relief groups.
To effectively shelter, you must first consider the hazard and then choose a place in your home or other building that is safe for that hazard. For example, for a tornado, a room should be selected that is in a basement or an interior room on the lowest level away from corners, windows, doors and outside walls.
The safest locations to seek shelter vary by hazard. Be Informed about the sheltering suggestions for each hazard.
There may be situations, depending on your circumstances and the nature of the disaster, when it's simply best to stay where you are and avoid any uncertainty outside by sheltering in place.

The length of time you are required to shelter may be short, such as during a tornado warning, or long, such as during a winter storm or a pandemic. It is important that you stay in shelter until local authorities say it is safe to leave. Additionally, you should take turns listening to radio broadcasts and maintain a 24 -hour safety watch.
During extended periods of sheltering, you will need to manage water and food supplies to ensure you and your family have the required supplies and quantities. Guidelines for Staying Put (Sheltering In Place)
Whether you are at home, work or elsewhere, there may be situations when it's simply best to stay where you are and avoid any uncertainty outside.
There may be circumstances when staying put and creating a barrier between yourself and potentially contaminated air outside, a process known as "sealing the room," is a matter of survival.
Use common sense and available information to assess the situation and determine if there is immediate danger. If you see large amounts of debris in the air, or if local authorities say the air is badly contaminated, you may want to take this kind of action.
The process used to seal the room is considered a temporary protective measure to create a barrier between you and potentially contaminated air outside. It is a type of sheltering in place that requires preplanning.

## Additional Sheltering in Place Guidelines

- Bring your family and pets inside.
- Lock doors, close windows, air vents and fireplace dampers.
- Turn off fans, air conditioning and forced air heating systems.
- Take your emergency supply kit, unless you have reason to believe it has been contaminated.
- Go into an interior room with few windows, if possible.
- Seal all windows, doors and air vents with 2-4 mil. thick plastic sheeting and duct tape. Consider measuring and cutting the sheeting in advance to save time.
- Cut the plastic sheeting several inches wider than the openings and label each sheet.

- Duct tape plastic at corners first and then tape down all edges.
- Be prepared to improvise and use what you have on hand to seal gaps so that you create a barrier between yourself and any contamination.
- Local authorities may not immediately be able to provide information on what is happening and what you should do. However, you should watch TV, listen to the radio or check the internet often for official news and instructions as they become available.

## Village of (e) Melrose Park Ganage Sale Notice Garage Sales are Back ... It's Time to Sell All Those Treasures

The rules on garage sales held in the village of Melrose Park are as follows:
Garage sales will be held on the third weekend only during the months of May, June, July, August and September. Sales are to be conducted on Thursday, Friday and Saturday of the designated weekends. No sales are allowed on Sundays.
The remaining dates for 2023 are Sept. 14-16.
Garage sales shall be conducted only during the hours of 9 a.m.-5 p.m.
No permit is needed for garage sales, however the following rules must be followed:

- No garage sales may be conducted in apartment buildings.
- No garage sales in the frontyard, i.e., on the grass.
- All garage sales to be conducted in backyard, garage
 or on driveway.
- All sale items to be displayed on tables, not on the ground.
- No sale items shall be located and no sale activity shall be conducted in the frontyard area, on the premises of any public sidewalk, parkway area or other public property.
- No sale signs, handbills or other advertising material shall be located or posted upon public parkway or on public property, signs, poles or light poles within the village of Melrose Park.
- Signs advertising the sales shall not exceed 3-by-5 feet and may be located only in the frontyard (private property) of the address having the garage sale, and must be removed immediately after the sale.
- The sale will be conducted without the use of outdoor loud speakers, amplification equipment or illuminated advertising devices.
Any person violating these rules shall be subject to a fine not to exceed $\$ 500$.

In the Catholic church, basilica status is reserved for the largest, most beautiful and most historically important churches. There are about 60 basilicas in the United States. Chicago is one of the few cities to be lucky enough to have three, all of which have been visited during Mt. Carmel's Holy Thursday pilgrimages.
Now, we are visiting the next closest basilica to Chicago, St. Josaphat on the south side of Milwaukee in historic Lincoln Village. In 1929, St. Josaphat Church was named the third basilica in the United States. It is as close as we get to a European cathedral. It is the largest church in Milwaukee, with a seating capacity of over 1,000 on the main floor, hundreds more can be accommodated in the galleries. A ministry of the Conventual Franciscans, it is a center for prayer and spirituality, inspiration and beauty. It remains a testament to the faith of the Polish immigrants who created it. The bricks used for the Basilica were from the old Chicago Post Office and were shipped by rail from Chicago to Milwaukee. Ground was broken in 1896 and completed in 1901.

# Dominican Literacy Center Continues to Provide English Instruction and More ... 

The Dominican Literacy Center originally began in Chicago, at the request of the pastor of Our Lady of Grace Parish in 1996. In 2008, the building housing the center was deemed to need extensive repairs and could not be used. In June of 2008, the center was graciously welcomed to rent a part of Sacred Heart Convent in Melrose Park, where it has continued to provide English instruction for the past 14 years.
The goal of the Dominican Literacy Center is the empowerment of persons who experience personal and economic limitations within our Englishspeaking society. Through literacy education and personal relationships, we strive to provide a small step toward eliminating racial and cultural prejudice and stereotypes, as well as a step up for persons seeking improvement in their personal, familial and economic abilities.
The Dominican Literacy Center provides weekly one and half hour tutored sessions in which one student meets with one tutor. The center provides tutoring in speaking, reading and writing English, as well as tutoring in preparation for the Citizenship interview and exam. This individualized instruction is provided for immigrant women and men (ages 17+) who are endeavoring to reduce literacy and its consequential effects of isolation (due to their inability to communicate in English with health care providers, children's teachers, neighbors, co-workers, community leaders and/or first responders); in low-level jobs (due to lack of training or skills, or an inability to demonstrate their already achieved skills and knowledge); powerless to supervise their adolescent children or to influence systemic change; lacking confidence to enroll in traditional classes and or fear of requesting help when needed.

## English Classes

English classes are provided for those who want to learn to speak, read or write in English. One student meets with one tutor, once a week.
These classes are offered at the Dominican Literacy Center, 1503 Rice Street, in Melrose Park (near Sacred Heart/St. Eulalia Parish).
Our program also assists persons studying for their Citizenship interview/exam.
We presently offer classes on Monday through Thursday, in the mornings and afternoons.

## A Messaye from Norma Hernandez Illinois State Representative • 77th District Hernandez Bill Promoting Better Enforcement of Water Sanitation Regulations Becomes Law

Cook County's water management agency will be able to more quickly and efficiently hold accountable those who violate the law by improperly discharging waste into the sewage system under a new law introduced by state Rep. Norma Hernandez, D-Melrose Park.
"When hazardous waste is being introduced into our sewer system by unscrupulous businesses or other entities, we can't afford to let that go on any longer than it has to," Hernandez said. "Having to wait for a letter to arrive in the mail and for the offender to read it takes too long and results in additional contamination, and longer and
 more expensive cleanup."
Under existing law, when a person or entity was found to be unlawfully discharging waste into the sewer system, notices and orders - including cease-and-desist orders - had to be sent either by certified mail or by official courier.
Hernandez's House Bill 3133 permits Cook County's Metropolitan Water Reclamation District (MWRD) to implement an electronic reporting system that, once operational, can be used to serve notices and orders to violators via email. It also stipulates that such electronic notices have the same validity and effect as those delivered by mail or by hand.
The bill was signed into law by Gov. J.B. Pritzker on July 28 and took effect immediately.
"Protecting the water supply that Chicago families depend on is far too important for authorities to be forced by outdated policies to drag their feet," Hernandez said. "I'm confident that by updating the tools at their disposal, we're empowering the MWRD to better protect public health, the environment and our economy from the effects of sewage violations."

# Cook County Commissioner Frank J. Aguilar Introduces Ordinance to Create a Property Tax Credit Program for Storm Relief 

 Introduced to the Cook County Board of Commissioners, the Ordinance Would Give Tax Credits to Uninsured and Underinsured Homeowners Who Experienced Damage from Storms and FloodingOn Thursday, July 20, during the Cook County Board of Commissioners meeting, Cook County Commissioner Frank J. Aguilar (16th) introduced a proper-

 ty tax credit for uninsured and underinsured homeowners who experience damages due to storms and flooding. The ordinance moved forward to the Finance Subcommittee, where it will undergo further discussion and evaluation.

Flooding and flood mitigation are significant issues in Cook County that plague thousands of residents every year. Flooded homes require immediate remediation to salvage the properties afflicted. The structural damage to buildings and homes caused by flood water can be catastrophic and the cost to property owners can be a burden that results in the abandonment of property.
The ordinance is aimed to provide relief to Cook County property owners, who otherwise would be forced to incur and expend unforeseen costs due to storm damage. The economic impact of flooding can be financially devastating because for so many residents, homeownership is their pathway to generational wealth, particularly in communities of color, communities that are already vulnerable and communities that already lack livable, affordable housing.
"Throughout Cook County, homeownership is one of the best ways to ensure some sort of generational wealth," said Commissioner Aguilar. "When homes are damaged, it can take years for residents to get back to a level of economic comfortability that homeownership should lead to. This ordinance will put money back in the pockets of our residents so that they are able to prevent wide-scale loss of home value in the present, which will protect their livelihoods for decades to come."
Rates and severity of flooding in various parts of Cook County are contingent upon not only rainfall, but on the underground water removal and sewage system. Throughout Cook County, small towns and villages are incapable of managing the stormwater that is thrusted upon them by other municipalities. As a result of climate change, extreme weather events are becoming more devastating, causing these local municipal systems to be more frequently overwhelmed.
In an effort to alleviate part of the financial burden to Cook County residents and businesses caused by catastrophic storm water, the ordinance would establish a real property tax credit program for disaster relief. The relief program will allow property owners who undertake certain types of storm damage repairs or remediation to submit provable evidence of the costs of the repairs to Cook County, which, if approved, would allow for a real property tax credit in the amount of the provable repairs.

If affected municipalities elect to participate, the tax credit will not exceed the amount of the real property tax bill for that tax year, as assessed on behalf of Cook County and the municipality where the property is situated. As proposed, the financial responsibility of the tax credit will be borne on a pro rata basis among Cook County and all the taxing districts located within the corporate limits of any municipality which passes an ordinance or resolution electing to participate in the relief program.

Municipalities that wish to participate must submit their request to Cook County within 30 calendar days of the declaration of a disaster. If municipalities do not pass, approve, and submit an ordinance or resolution electing to participate in the relief program to Cook County within 30 calendar days of the passage and approval of this ordinance, such municipalities will be ineligible to participate in the relief program for this disaster.

## Cook County Board Reminds Residents County Wheel Tax was Eliminated on July 1

## Effort will Relieve Cook County Residents from County Vehicle Registration Fees and Fines

Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle reminded residents living in unincorporated Cook County that one less tax exists in the area as the repeal of the Cook County Wheel Tax went into effect starting July 1. Sponsored by Cook County Commissioner Kevin Morrison, the county board voted unanimously to repeal the tax during its September 2022 board meeting.
"We're proud to alleviate any financial burden imposed by the Wheel Tax and ensure that taxpayers are able to keep more of their hard-earned money," said Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle. "We are immensely proud of the hard work and fiscal stewardship that made this possible. I am thankful for Commissioner Morrison's leadership on this initiative and our board of commissioners for voting to eliminate this tax."
Created in the early 1970s, the now eliminated tax required a Cook County Vehicle License costing between $\$ 80$ and $\$ 200$ for all motor vehicles owned and operated by residents of unincorporated Cook County.
"This is a common sense approach to addressing inequity, eliminating a tax that is far too often punitive. Cars are a necessity for so many people in our county to get to work, to get to community services, to receive health care and much more," said Cook County Commissioner Frank J. Aguilar. "This is a regressive tax, plain and simple, one that hurts our residents more than any justification to keep it. I applaud Commissioner Kevin Morrison for authoring this ordinance, and stand with my colleagues on the board to continue delivering relief and support for all of our residents."

The Cook County Bureau of Finance estimates that around 8,000 staff hours dedicated to administering the tax can be redirected to other services. They also estimate that the revenue lost from eliminating the tax will be partially offset by savings on administrative costs and new county revenues. In terms of impact to the county's overall budget, revenues from the Wheel Tax constitute less than half of a percent of the more than $\$ 8.7$ billion budget. The lost revenue from eliminating this tax is negligible in comparison to the cost savings to individual families.
The ordinance repealing the Wheel Tax was officially effective starting June 30, 2023.

On Thursday, June 15, Commissioner Frank J. Aguilar partnered with Melrose Park's Chamber of Commerce and Community Development, the Illinois Manufacturing Excellence Center, and Cook County's Bureau of Economic Development for a Manufacturing Reinvented seminar and workshop in Melrose Park. The event, which attracted over 50 organizations, was held to inform 16th District manufacturers about available grants for their businesses and to offer onsite application assistance.
"You can not separate Cook County from manufacturing," said Cook County Commissioner Frank J. Aguilar. "These grants reward manufacturers for initiative for doing the work needed to drive Cook County forward. Events like today do such important work getting resources to interested parties in a highly accessible manner, making these opportunities more easily obtainable. These grants are funded through the Illinois Manufacturing Excellence Center, in partnership with Cook County's Bureau of Economic Development, to boost operations for manufacturers and businesses over a wide range of subjects. Interested parties could apply for grants to help with website design, cybersecurity, employee retention and promotion, business marketing and more. In total, $\$ 5$ million of grant funding is available to Cook County manufacturers.
"Cook County manufacturers are already experiencing the benefits of this novel grant program," said David Boulay, president of IMEC. "With projects available in all areas of the organization, it's exhilarating to watch these com-
 panies receive the support they need and help them lead the way for the
future of manufacturing in Illinois."
The event began with a networking session, as representatives from the attending organizations discussed their work, goals and business needs. After the networking session, a presentation was conducted by the Cook County Bureau of Economic Development and IMEC that gave an overview of the program and the needed qualifications to be eligible to apply. # Skip-the-Line Program at Busiest DMVs Scheduling Appointments/New Extended Hours Part of nititiative to Save Customers Time - Push for More Illinoisans to Renew Online - Required Appointments will Reduce Wait Times - Extended Hours Offer More Availability 

Giannoulias Implementing

In an effort to improve customer service and eliminate the unpredictability of wait times at Illinois DMVs, Secretary of State Alexi Giannoulias will begin implementing a Skip-the-Line Program starting Sept. 1.
The Skip-the-Line Program includes:

- Simplified Online Services - Customers are encouraged to take advantage of the many services offered online at ilsos.gov, including renewing their driver's license or ID card and license plate sticker online.
- Appointment Scheduling - Customers will be required to make appointments for in-person visits at 44 of the busiest DMVs including all Chicago and suburban locations, and some central and downstate DMVs for those seeking REAL ID, driver's license and ID card services, and in-car driving tests. Those seeking vehicle-related services, such as title and registration or renewing their license plate sticker, do not need to make an appointment and can just walk in. Upon arrival, customers will check in with DMV staff and "Skip the Line," eliminating lines and unpredictable wait times. Illinoisans may visit ilsos.gov or call (844) 817-4649 to schedule an appointment.
- New Extended Hours of Operation - All DMVs statewide will extend hours of operation, with 16 facilities open six days a week - Monday through Saturday.
- All DMVs will change their days and hours of operation from Tuesday-Saturday to Monday-Friday, 8 a.m.-5:30 p.m.
- 16 DMVs will also be open on Saturday, 8 a.m.-12:30 p.m., as noted below.
"Customers will save time by skipping the line," said Giannoulias. "Our goal is to eliminate the Time Tax that has plagued Illinoisans for years, forcing them to stand in long lines wasting time - just to conduct basic services. Extending hours at all DMVs and requiring appointments at our 44 highest-volume facilities is the most efficient way to get the services you need quickly and without the headache of unpredictable wait times."
The appointment-only facilities include 24 Chicago and suburban DMVs, and 20 DMVs in central and downstate Illinois that are within 10 miles from a population center of at least 25,000 residents. The list of these facilities is below, along with their days of operation.

# Giannoulias Launches Enhanced Secretary of State Website 

## Redesigned Website Simplifies Customer Experience; Offers Faster and Easier Transactions, More Functionality

The Illinois Secretary of State's Office launched a redesign of its website, making it easier to navigate and adding new functions for services that users can access remotely, Secretary of State Alexi Giannoulias announced recently.
"The revamped website is more intuitive and prioritizes our most popular programs and services so customers can find the information they want and need faster and more conveniently," Giannoulias said. "Whether it's renewing your driver's license, searching for information about a business or looking for a job, making these changes and adding new functionality to the website reflect our commitment to residents and understanding their needs."
Along with creating a new and consistent look throughout the website that is easier to view and navigate, other enhancements include:

- Simplifying the homepage to prominently feature key services and most frequently sought information.
- Consolidating the process of renewing a driver's license or ID card online by eliminating unnecessary and confusing steps.
- Developing a job portal allowing people to search and apply for available Secretary of State positions.
- Adding new functionality to Businesses Services that allow users to submit more filings online, including terminating an LLC.
- Creating a new Business Entity search function that details more information about all Illinois corporations, LLCs, and other businesses and allows the entity to perform transactions such as ordering a certificate of good standing or filing an annual report.
- Enhancing the search function to allow for detailed searches and a reformatted page to display more information about lobbyist activities.
- Streamlining the search functions for business entities and lobbyists to allow the user to use the back button on the browser to return to the list of entities generated by the user's initial search entry. The old website feature took the user back to the original blank search page.
- Uploading essential lobbyists' information maintained by the office to the State of Illinois Data Portal.

Giannoulias emphasized that his office will continue implementing new features on the website in conjunction with the efforts to modernize the office's antiquated IT infrastructure.
"This is only the beginning," said Giannoulias. "I hope people explore ilsos.gov to see what services they can conduct online. We will continue modernizing the website and adding capabilities to ensure customers can access the resources they need. We look forward to feedback from the public about their experience with the new functions on the site and incorporating more updates and improvements in the future."
Giannoulias has spearheaded efforts to modernize the office since taking office in January, and this represents another step in the ongoing process.

# Giannoulias Announces Illinois to Receive Part of \$12.4 Million Settlement from RJFE Illinois is Among Five Other States that Found Raymond James Financial Entities Charged Unreasonable Commissions on Trades 

Illinois Secretary of State Alexi Giannoulias announced that Illinois is part of a $\$ 12.4$ million settlement with Raymond James \& Associates, Inc. and Raymond James Financial Services, Inc. Illinois is among five other states that discovered Raymond James entities had charged unreasonable commissions on trades that have harmed main-street investors, including Illinoisans.
As part of the settlement, Raymond James will pay at least $\$ 8.2$ million in refunds to clients nationwide and $\$ 4.2$ million in penalties and costs to state securities regulators.
"This case will help ensure that investors are treated fairly by broker-dealers and financial services firms," Giannoulias said. "These companies must comply with protections currently in place. No matter how large or small an investor's transactions are, the state securities regulators in Illinois will ensure investors are protected."
Giannoulias noted that Illinois customers will receive $\$ 328,000$ in restitution. The Secretary of State's Securities Department levied a $\$ 75,000$ fine and will receive an additional $\$ 25,000$ reimbursement for the cost of the investigation.
An investigation by the state securities regulators from Illinois, Alabama, California, Massachusetts, Montana and Washington concluded that Raymond James charged excessive commissions on over 270,000 low-principal amount equity transactions nationwide. The investigation found that Raymond James' commissions on transactions were more than 5 percent of the principal value and Raymond James took up to 100 percent of proceeds from customer sales. Over five years, this amounted to more than $\$ 8,250,000$ of excess commissions.

Raymond James agreed to confirm that its policies and procedures have been recently enhanced to ensure that commissions are fair and reasonable. One year after demonstrating its new policies and procedures, Raymond James will conduct a review to confirm they are being properly implemented. The review will be reported to the states involved in the investigation.
Giannoulias encouraged investors to contact the Illinois Secretary of State Securities Department at (800) 628-7937 for investment questions or concerns. The Illinois Securities Department ensures that any person offering securities or providing financial services complies with the state's laws.
The Securities Department licenses and regulates financial services, including investment advisers, loan brokers and business brokers. Information about the Securities Department is available at ilsos.gov.

# Building a Better Community Charitable Trust Applications Accepted 

Communities are stronger when we help each other.
Small nonprofits that help people with housing or workforce and economic development assistance are encouraged to apply for grant funding through the Charitable Trust Stabilization Program operated by the Office of Illinois State Treasurer Michael Frerichs.
Grant applications will be accepted through Sept. 30.
"We are helping these organizations fulfill their important role in securing housing, employment and job training for people in need," Frerichs said. "The Charitable Trust Program offers an excellent opportunity for small nonprofits to have an even greater impact on the people they serve."
The Charitable Trust Stabilization Fund assists small nonprofits with annual budgets of $\$ 1$ million or less. The fund's money comes from filing fees that nonprofits pay when incorporating in the state of Illinois - not from personal or property tax dollars.
This is the second grant cycle of 2023 and up to $\$ 200,000$ is available. The maximum award amount for an organization is $\$ 20,000$. An independent 11 -member committee, which oversees the management and guidelines of the fund, will select the grant recipients.
Previous grant recipients are eligible to apply if the term of their grant has been complete for at least one calendar year.

Since the grant program was established in 2017, more than $\$ 4.1$ million has been awarded to 178 nonprofit organizations throughout the state.

## Bright Start College Savings Invest for College with Confidence

Parents can open a 529 Bright Start college savings plan knowing that should the investment not be needed, there are other uses for the money. If the child decides not to attend college, that's OK. Another family member can use the money.
If the child earns a scholarship, that's OK. Parents can make a withdrawal in the amount of the scholarship - tax free and without penalty - to use as they wish.
If the child might want to go to college, but not right after graduating high school, that's OK. Keep the money in the account and watch it grow. It will be ready when the child is ready.
That is why opening a Bright Start college savings plan is a wise investment.
Let's say a child is 18 when she graduates high school. If a Bright Start account was opened 18 years ago, with an initial investment of $\$ 2,500$ and
monthly deposits of $\$ 50$, it would be worth more than $\$ 23,000$ today.
If you could set aside $\$ 100$ each month, it would be worth more than $\$ 41,000$ today.
If you could invest $\$ 250$ each month, it would be worth more than $\$ 93,000$ today.
Investments grow tax-free when the proceeds are used to pay for qualified education expenses, such as tuition housing or a laptop computer. In Illinois, the deposits also qualify for a substantial income tax deduction.
If your child decides not to go to college, there are options to consider so you can avoid paying taxes or penalties and keep more of your hard-earned money.

- The Bright Start funds can be used to pay for community college, trade school, vocational school or other post-secondary education at an eligible institution.
- Change the Bright Start beneficiary to a sibling or other qualifying family member.
- Use the money for your own continuing education.
- Save the money for a future grandchild.

You do not need a crystal ball to know that opening a Bright Start college savings account is a wise investment. Research shows that students who know they have a college savings account are three times more likely to attend college. A college savings account sends them the message that they're smart and that someone believes in them.
That is a message that changes lives.

## Don't Fall Prey to Scams

An Illinois woman reports that a man claiming to be from the National Association of Unclaimed Property Administrators had called her to say that she has money, but then insisted she must pay a lawyer in a different state to receive it.
This is a scam and the woman did not fall for it.
The association never calls and demands money to receive unclaimed property. Neither does the Illinois State Treasurer's Office, which administers the program in Illinois.

The woman said the scammer demanded to be paid $\$ 2,865$ using three money orders of $\$ 1,000, \$ 1,000$ and $\$ 865$ in order for her to receive her unclaimed property. The woman also said the caller telephoned her several times, was aggressive and threatened to come to her home.

According to the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau, these tactics of bullying and intimidation are common in scams. Other red flags include seeking immediate payment through gift cards, a wire transfer or mobile payment apps.
Some scammers call with stories, such as a child is hurt or imprisoned and needs money right away, a charity seeking assistance after a specific disaster, or offers to fix your computer.

When in doubt, hang up the telephone.

## Melrose Park Native Bob Nardella Named Head Coach of Chicago Wolves

The Chicago Wolves didn't have to look far when it came to naming the 13th head coach in franchise history. In June, the Wolves announced that Bob Nardella has been named head coach of the American Hockey League team, continuing the legacy of one of the most accomplished figures in team history that began when he was a


Bob Nardella defenseman during the inaugural season in 1994-1995. Nardella was promoted to assistant coach on July 12, 2017, after serving two seasons as skills development coach and three seasons as a part-time assistant for the franchise.
During his six seasons as a full-time assistant, the 55 -year-old Nardella helped lead the
 Wolves to the 2022 Calder Cup championship, the 2019 Calder Cup finals and four Central Division crowns - 2018, 2019, 2021 and 2022.
"Having been a member of the Wolves family for decades, no one embodies the organization's team philosophy more than Bob," Wolves general manager Wendell Young said. "His accomplishments as a player are welldocumented, but it's his skills as a coach that make him the perfect man to lead the Wolves during the 2023-2024 season."

Nardella ranks second on the team's all-time regularseason list for games (476), fifth in assists (239) and sixth in points (298) after spending six full and three partial seasons with the Wolves. He was a key player when Chicago captured the 1998 and 2000 Turner Cups, as well as the 2002 Calder Cup.
"It's a thrill," Nardella said of being named head coach. "I never really dreamed to be the head coach of the organization that I played with and coached under, so I'm very lucky. It's worked out great.
We fully expect to win championships here and our first step is to get back in the playoffs so we can try to accomplish that."
The Melrose Park, III., native made his Wolves debut during the '94-95 season and later after spending one season in Italy and another in Germany - punctuated by his first of two appearances in the Winter Olympics with Italy's national team - Nardella returned to the Wolves as a player in 1997
"We're going to try to make all the Chicago Wolves fans proud by working hard, acting the right way and playing the right way," Nardella said. "I'm extremely fortunate to be in the position."
The Wolves, who will play as an independent AHL team without an affiliation to an NHL club during the 2023-2024 season, have announced that their '23-24 home opener is scheduled for Oct. 14 at Allstate Arena.

## ComEd Community Energy Assistance

 Ambassador Program Earns National RecognitionComEd's work to connect customers in need with bill assistance while also providing temporary, part-time employment to residents from low-income neighborhoods, was recently recognized by utility-industry association Chartwell Inc., one of three awards presented to ComEd and its parent company, Exelon.
ComEd won Chartwell's 2023 Best Practices Bronze Award in the category of Serving Vulnerable Customers for its Community Energy Assistance Ambassador (CEAA) Program. The CEAA Program, originally launched in 2020 in response to the economic impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic, was designed with community-based organization Chatham Business Association (CBA) to increase both education and access to financial assistance options that can help income-eligible customers pay their electric bills, while creating local employment opportunities for this same vulnerable population.
"At ComEd, ensuring all our customers can access safe and reliable electricity is just as important as delivering it," said Melissa Washington, ComEd's chief customer officer and senior vice president of Customer Operations. "It's important to us that families and businesses know they can turn to us for help from the moment they start electric service and through any changes and hardships they may encounter. It's a tremendous honor to be recognized by the utility industry for these efforts."
Since its inception, the CEAA Program has provided employment to approximately 300 residents from Chicago's underserved south and west sides. During the 2022-2023 winter season alone, CEAAs reached out to approximately 1,800 families; 27 percent of whom received a total of more than $\$ 59,000$ in assistance. This effort contributed to ComEd helping connect more than 87,000 eligible customers to more than $\$ 26$ million in bill assistance during the first quarter of 2023. For ComEd, this is the largest amount of assistance provided - and second-largest number of customers supported - for any first quarter dating back to at least 2019.
The annual Chartwell Best Practices Awards recognize excellence among electric and gas utilities with respect to customer-oriented projects, programs and service initiatives. Each year, judges, made up of members of Chartwell's research team, select the best projects for recognition. More than 90 entries were
submitted across all six categories for this year's selection process.
"Chartwell's Best Practices Awards are truly the mark of excellence in utility service and marketing, and that's because awards are judged by industry experts," said Russ Henderson, director of Research, Chartwell Inc. "It feels like Best Practices Awards submissions get better and better every year, and I think that's because utilities continue to raise their game in serving their customers. Customer expectations have risen in recent years and utilities like ComEd keep raising the bar to meet those expectations."
In developing the CEAA Program, ComEd analyzed 40 communities with the lowest median incomes within the areas it serves. Research showed that many low-income customers, despite qualifying for bill assistance, did not apply for resources that were available to them. To increase education about available resources, ComEd and CBA hired individuals who live and work within these same communities to foster relationships and educate customers about energy assistance programs available.
"I am grateful for ComEd's trust in CBA to manage the CEAA program," said Melinda Kelly, CBA chairman and president. "ComEd looks to CBA to collaborate with reputable community organizations and stakeholders so that, together, we can provide the type of education and outreach that helps anyone access the assistance they need."

## Other Chartwell Best Practices Awards

Chartwell also presented ComEd the Gold Customer Service Award for its development of an Email Welcome Series for new and relocating ComEd customers. These customers receive a series of four emails, which begin shortly after their electric service is activated, that provide guidance on the full range of programs and offerings available by ComEd and address questions most frequently asked of customers establishing or moving their electric service. The goal is to proactively address customer needs, boost awareness and participation in programs that help the customer, and lay the foundation for a superior customer service experience.
Exelon earned the Silver Digital Experience Award for the development of its "I Sign Up \& Move" (ISUM) Program that further simplifies the process for customers establishing a service account or transferring service with each of Exelon's utilities, including ComEd. The program provides customers with more personalization, autonomy and simplicity in creating and managing their utility accounts. It also streamlines the account-registration process and provides customers with real-time review and edit capabilities for stopping, starting and moving their electric service. Since its launch, Exelon has increased customer-satisfaction rates and seen a reduction in operational costs.

## ComEd's New and Enhanced Online Solar Calculators Help Customers Navigate Clean Energy Options

ComEd announced it has introduced new enhancements to its private rooftop and community solar calculators to make it easier for customers to learn more about costs, benefits and savings as demand for these options continues to grow and contribute to the goals of Illinois' Climate and Equitable Jobs Act (CEJA), one of the nation's most ambitious plans for renewable energy development.
"The updates to the new solar calculators make it easy for customers to determine their best options for accessing the benefits of solar energy, including the positive environmental impact they can make by reducing their carbon footprint through solar energy," said Louie Binswanger, ComEd's senior vice president of Government and External Affairs. "We are available to support customers in every step of their solar journey."
The number of ComEd residential and business customers who have installed solar systems has grown from 837 at the end of 2016 to 41,270 customers through May of this year. Additionally, there are more than 82 community solar projects in ComEd's northern Illinois service territory and the company estimates there will be more than 100 projects serving more than 25,000 customers by the end of this year. Community solar is a popular option for customers whose roofs are not suited for rooftop solar, do not own their roofs or want to combine rooftop solar with community solar.
Not every home is well suited for rooftop solar, which is why ComEd offers a tool to help customers get the facts to decide if rooftop solar is right for them. The interactive rooftop solar calculator evaluates a roof's solar energy potential, including factors such as roof direction, slope and shading. To ensure that rooftop solar estimates will reflect a customers' energy requirements, the calculator allows customers to include future electric usage that would result from electric vehicle charging or the replacement of gas appliances with electric alternatives. Customers receive a personalized report that combines current and estimated future energy usage and includes the number of solar panels required to meet their energy needs, project costs, rebates, incentives and payback period.

The calculator also provides information on a rebate program that is newly available to residential customers through CEJA. It offers a rebate of $\$ 300$ per kilowatt for an eligible distributed generation facility, such as a private solar system, and a rebate of $\$ 300$ per kilowatt hour for an associated energy storage device. Customers are able to compare their potential payback with and without incorporating the rebate, enabling them to see how it would impact their estimated payback period.

ComEd also has launched a new community solar calculator, which provides estimated savings based on current energy usage. Community solar allows all ComEd customers to subscribe to a solar energy "farm" of solar panels owned by an independent developer and earn credits on their monthly ComEd bills for their portion of the energy produced by the project.

The rooftop and community solar calculators provide information on customer assistance programs, including Illinois Solar for All, which helps customers who may qualify for more affordable solar installation or community solar subscriptions through state incentives. CEJA, which was enacted in 2021, increases funding for Illinois Solar for All from $\$ 30$ million to $\$ 70$ million annually.

The multi-year grid and rate plans ComEd filed with the Illinois Commerce Commission (ICC) earlier this year outline the proposed investments required to support this rapid expansion of renewable energy and help ensure equitable access to the benefits of clean energy under CEJA. The plans align with ComEd 2030, the company's recently announced vision for a carbon-free energy future that will benefit all communities and meet customers' changing needs for the rest of this decade and beyond.
