Notice Regarding Melrose Park Vehicle Stickers

Village Vehicle Stickers Will Expire Dec. 31, 2023. New Stickers Can be Purchased at the Village Hall

Sticker Fee for Passenger Vehicles is \$30 for Two Years (2024-2025).

Truck Fees Vary Based on the Type of Class/Plate and Are Good for One Year Only (2024).

Seniors Over 65 Years of Age are Free.

One free two-year sticker for a passenger vehicle or one free one-year sticker for a B-Truck vehicle registered to a person over 65 years in age. Limit one free sticker per household.

If there is a second passenger or B-Truck vehicle registered to a senior in the household, a second senior sticker will be sold for half price (\$15).

Acceptable proof for a senior sticker is a valid driver's license or state ID card.


Vehicle Sticker Fee Details

Melrose Park Funds New Security and Safety Systems at Schools

On Monday, Nov. 13, Melrose Park Mayor Ron Serpico distributed grants totaling \$1.3 million to assist the schools in his community in developing more advanced safety and security initiatives to better protect students and avert potential threats. Serpico made the announcement at a meeting with leadership from five schools and first responders from Melrose Park.

"The safety and protection of our children is the highest order of business for any community and this money will go toward ensuring that protection," Serpico said. The money, which are being made available from unused economic development funds, can be spent on a variety of safety enhancements in the school districts, including such items as better doors and locks, surveillance cameras, and window coverings.

Melrose Park recently convened a security expo for school districts in the village to talk to different vendors and see safety systems and protocols firsthand before deciding which ones to purchase. The village has previously assembled and convened a School Safety Task Force which included school leaders and police and fire first responders to examine broad security issues.

"We believe that by bringing together school leaders and first responders we can assist in the development of stronger more effective security systems and mechanisms that help keep our children safe," Serpico added. "We are allowing schools to pick and choose whatever safety, and systems and security measures they believe they most need, since they have a firsthand knowledge of those requirements."

District #88 Superintendent Dr. Victoria Hansen Stockton said the funds are most welcome at a time when student safety issues are paramount. "Anything we can do as educators to protect children in our schools is worthwhile and I am grateful to Mayor Serpico and the people of Melrose Park for assisting us in that endeavor," Dr. Stockton said.

The program is believed to be one of the first ever in the state where discretionary funds were made available to school districts for safety and security measures.

A Message from Rick Beltrame, Director of Fire Department



As you deck the halls this holiday season, be fire smart. A small fire that spreads to a Christmas tree can grow large very quickly.



PICKING THE TREE

• Choose a tree with fresh, green needles that do not fall off when touched.



PLACING THE TREE

- Before placing the tree in the stand, cut 2" from the base of the trunk.
- Make sure the tree is at least three feet away from any heat source, like fireplaces, radiators, candles, heat vents or lights.
- Make sure the tree is not blocking an exit.
- Add water to the tree stand. Be sure to add water daily.



LIGHTING THE TREE

- Use lights that are listed by a qualified testing laboratory. Some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use.
- Replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections. Read manufacturer's instructions for number of light strands to connect.
- Never use lit candles to decorate the tree.
- Always turn off Christmas tree lights before leaving home or going to bed.



Get rid of the tree after Christmas or when it is dry. Dried-out trees are a fire danger and should not be left in the home or garage, or placed outside against the home.

Check with your local community to find a recycling program.

Bring outdoor electrical lights inside after the holidays to prevent hazards and make them last longer.

FACTS

- ! Almost one third of home Christmas tree fires are caused by electrical problems.
- ! Although Christmas tree fires are not common, when they do occur, they are more likely to be serious.
- ! A heat source too close to the tree causes more than **one in every five** of the fires.



Winter Storms ... The Deceptive Killers

Winter storms can range from a moderate snow over a few hours to a blizzard with blinding, wind-driven snow that lasts for several days. Some winter storms are large enough to affect several states, while others affect only a single community. Many winter storms are accompanied by dangerously low temperatures and sometimes by strong winds, icing, sleet and freezing rain.

Regardless of the severity of a winter storm, you should be prepared in order to remain safe during these events.

Know the Difference

Winter Storm Outlook – Winter storm conditions are possible in the next two to five days.

Winter Weather Advisory – Winter weather conditions are expected to cause significant inconveniences and may be hazardous. When caution is used, these situations should not be life threatening.

Winter Storm Watch – Winter storm conditions are possible within the next 36 to 48 hours. People in a watch area should review their winter storm plans and stay informed about weather conditions.

Winter Storm Warning – Life-threatening, severe winter conditions have begun or will begin within 24 hours. People in a warning area should take precautions immediately.

How to Prepare for a Winter Storm

- Winterize your vehicle and keep the gas tank full. A full tank will keep the fuel line from freezing.
- Insulate your home by installing storm windows or covering windows with plastic from the inside to keep cold air out.
- Maintain heating equipment and chimneys by having them cleaned and inspected every year.
- If you will be going away during cold weather, leave the heat on in your home, set to a temperature no lower than 55° F.

Put Together a Supply Kit

- Water at least a three-day supply; one gallon per person per day.
- Food at least a three-day supply of non-perishable, easy-to-prepare food.
- · Flashlight.
- Battery-powered or hand-crank radio (NOAA Weather Radio, if possible).
- Extra batteries.
- First aid kit.
- Medications (seven-day supply) and medical items (hearing aids with extra batteries, glasses, contact lenses, syringes, etc.).
- Multipurpose tool.
- Sanitation and personal hygiene items.
- Copies of personal documents (medication list and pertinent medical information, proof of address, deed/lease to home, passports, birth certificates, insurance policies).
- Cell phone with chargers.
- Family and emergency contact information.
- Extra cash.
- Baby supplies (bottles, formula, baby food, diapers).
- Pet supplies (collar, leash, ID, food, carrier, bowl).
- Tools/supplies for securing your home.
- Sand, rock salt or non-clumping kitty litter to make walkways and steps less slippery.
- Warm coats, gloves or mittens, hats, boots, and extra blankets and warm clothing for all household members.
- Ample alternate heating methods such as fireplaces or wood- or coal-burning stoves.

Winter's Impact

Storms with Strong Winds

Sometimes winter storms are accompanied by strong winds creating blizzard conditions with blinding wind-driven snow, severe drifting and dangerous wind chill. Strong winds with these intense storms and cold fronts can knock down trees, utility poles and power lines. Storms near the coast can cause coastal flooding and beach erosion as well as sink ships at sea. In the west and Alaska, winds descending off the mountains can gust to 100 mph or more damaging roofs and other structures.

Extreme Cold

Extreme cold often accompanies a winter storm or is left in its wake. Prolonged exposure to the cold can cause frostbite or hypothermia and become life-threatening. Infants and elderly people are most susceptible. What constitutes extreme cold and its effect varies across different areas of the United States. In areas unaccustomed to winter weather, near freezing temperatures are considered "extreme cold." Freezing temperatures can cause severe damage to citrus fruit crops and other vegetation. Pipes may freeze and burst in homes that are poorly insulated or without heat. In the north, below zero temperatures may be considered as "extreme cold." Long cold spells can cause rivers to freeze, disrupting shipping. Ice jams may form and lead to flooding.

Ice Storms

Heavy accumulations of ice can bring down trees, electrical wires, telephone poles and lines, and communication towers. Communications and power can be disrupted for days while utility companies work to repair the extensive damage. Even small accumulations of ice may cause extreme hazards to motorists and pedestrians.

Heavy Snow Storms

Heavy snow can immobilize a region and paralyze a city, stranding commuters, stopping the flow of supplies and disrupting emergency and medical services. Accumulations of snow can collapse buildings and knock down trees and power lines. In rural areas, homes and farms may be isolated for days, and unprotected livestock may be lost. In the mountains, heavy snow can lead to avalanches. The cost of snow removal, repairing damages and loss of business can have large economic impacts on cities and towns.

Winter Precipitation

Snow

- FLURRIES Light snow falling for short durations. No accumulation or light dusting is all that is expected.
- SHOWERS Snow falling at varying intensities for brief periods of time. Some accumulation is possible.
- SQUALLS Brief, intense snow showers accompanied by strong, gusty winds. Accumulation may be significant. Snow squalls are best known in the Great Lakes region.
- BLOWING SNOW Wind-driven snow that reduces visibility and causes significant drifting. Blowing snow may be snow that is falling and/or loose snow on the ground picked up by the wind.
- BLIZZARD Winds over 35 mph with snow and blowing snow reducing visibility to near zero.

Sleet

Raindrops that freeze into ice pellets before reaching the ground. Sleet usually bounces when hitting a surface and does not stick to objects. However, it can accumulate like snow and cause a hazard to motorists.

Freezing Rain

Rain that falls onto a surface with a temperature below freezing. This causes it to freeze to surfaces, such as trees, cars, and roads, forming a coating or glaze of ice. Even small accumulations of ice can cause a significant hazard.

Winter Storm Facts: What Makes a Winter Storm?

Cold Air

Below freezing temperatures in the clouds and near the ground are necessary to make snow and/or ice.

Moisture

To form clouds and precipitation. Air blowing across a body of water, such as a large lake or the ocean, is an excellent source of moisture.

Lift

something to raise the moist air to form the clouds and cause precipitation. An example of lift is warm air colliding with cold air and being forced to rise over the cold dome. The boundary between the warm and cold air masses is called a front. Another example of lift is air flowing up a mountain side.

Silver Creek Restoration Project

Under the direction of Mayor Ronald M. Serpico, the Village of Melrose Park Public Works employees constructed the Silver Creek Eagles Nest Park. This is a natural preserve that includes a walking path and a pavilion/gazebo, along with a canoe/kayak launch.

Phase Five, Six and Seven of the Silver Creek Restoration Project have been completed.

Phase Eight is in the final planning stages.

This restoration project restores the natural balance of the creek by restoring the embankment, and bringing back native land-scape and shrubbery along with aquatic habitat. This is an invaluable stream system that provides storm water runoff, flood management and many other benefits for the residents of Melrose Park.



Silver Creek Trail Park

The Silver Creek Trail Park is located off of First Avenue. The trail is centered off the pond between Silver Creek and its tributary, the Des Plaines River. Native plants of this area were once lost to development and are

now being reintroduced to the area. With the help of these native plants, more wildlife is returning to the area – from the Bald Eagle (sighted in the area), the Northern Pike, Red Foxes, Black-Crowned Night Herons and



Cooper's Hawk, to name a few.

The Melrose Park Chamber of Commerce and Community Development and our team of community navigators have been working with Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity (DCEO), Cook County Small Business Source, the Small Business Administration (SBA) and many other agencies to connect businesses to grant programs and other resources to support growth, expansion, job creation, workforce development, etc.

We are proud to announce that through the most recent round of Back 2 Business Grants from the state of Illinois to help restaurants, hotels and creative

arts that were most impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic, we were able to inform and assist local businesses in applying for grants. Although not every business that applied received a grant award, several did and our local businesses received over \$1.1 million with \$510,000 going to local restaurants, \$431,000 to area hotels and \$220,000 was received by businesses in the creative art sector.

In the coming weeks, Cook County will be announcing the recipients of the Cook County Source Grant and we look forward to learning which businesses in the area receive support from this program!

Although several of the grant programs we have been working to assist businesses in applying for have





been related to COVID-19 relief efforts from the state and Cook County, there are ongoing programs to assist businesses and the MPCCCD community navigators will continue to lead the way in these efforts. That said, new requirements from DCEO and the SBA require businesses and nonprofits applying for grants to have a current UEI, SAMS and GATA registration number.

Dominican Literacy Center Continues to Provide English Instruction and More ...

The Dominican Literacy Center originally began in Chicago, at the request of the pastor of Our Lady of Grace Parish in 1996. In 2008, the building housing the center was deemed to need extensive repairs and could not be used. In June of 2008, the center was graciously welcomed to rent a part of Sacred Heart Convent in Melrose Park, where it has continued to provide English instruction for the past 14 years.

The goal of the Dominican Literacy Center is the empowerment of persons who experience personal and economic limitations within our English-speaking society. Through literacy education and personal relationships, we strive to provide a small step toward eliminating racial and cultural prejudice and stereotypes, as well as a step up for persons seeking improvement in their personal, familial and economic abilities.

The Dominican Literacy Center provides weekly one and half hour tutored sessions in which one student meets with one tutor. The center provides tutoring in speaking, reading and writing English, as well as tutoring in preparation for the Citizenship interview and exam. This individualized instruction is provided for immigrant women and men (ages 17+) who are – endeavoring to reduce literacy and its consequential effects of isolation (due to their inability to communicate in English with health care providers, children's teachers, neighbors, co-workers, community leaders and/or first responders); in low-level jobs (due to lack of training or skills, or an inability to demonstrate their already achieved skills and knowledge); powerless to supervise their adolescent children or to influence systemic change; lacking confidence to enroll in traditional classes and or fear of requesting help when needed.

English Classes

English classes are provided for those who want to learn to speak, read or write in English. One student meets with one tutor, once a week.

These classes are offered at the Dominican Literacy Center, 1503 Rice Street, in Melrose Park (near Sacred Heart/St. Eulalia Parish).

Our program also assists persons studying for their Citizenship interview/exam.

We presently offer classes on Monday through Thursday, in the mornings and afternoons.





Officials Remember Deceased Cook County Residents at Ofrenda in the Cook County Building

On Wednesday, Nov. 1, Cook County and city of Chicago officials came together to celebrate Dia de Los Muertos ("Day of the Dead"). In attendance was Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle, Chicago Deputy Mayor of Immigration Beatriz Ponce de Leon,

Cook County commissioners Frank J. Aguilar, Anthony Quezada, Alma Anaya and John Daley, ofrenda artist Gloria Contreras and representatives from the Mexican Civic Society of Illinois. To close the celebration, residents and officials gathered in front of the ofrenda (altar) located in the lobby between County and City Hall to honor deceased Cook County residents and celebrate the contributions of the Latino/a/X community.

"The celebration of Día de Los Muertos acknowledges that we still have a relationship with our ancestors and loved ones that have passed away.

Today, we invite those Cook County residents who have left us to come back into our lives, if only for a moment and remember the impact they had on all of us," said Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle.

Held annually on Nov. 1 and 2, Día de los Muertos is a traditional Meso-American holiday dedicated to the ancestors; it honors both death and the cycle of life. It is observed as a day to honor deceased family members and loved ones by "welcoming them back" through various customs, including making dedicated altars (ofrendas), laying out special food offerings and visiting their graves.

"The Día de Los Muertos ofrenda represents a memorial to remember and honor the lives of loved ones who passed on. It's remembering the good times we've spent with them, keeping their memory alive in our hearts," said Cook County Commissioner Frank J. Aguilar.

An ofrenda is a traditional altar with a collection of objects placed on a ritual display during the annual Día de Muertos celebration. An ofrenda is created for individuals who have died and is intended to welcome them to the altar setting.

This is the third year Ms. Contreras' ofrenda has been featured in the Cook County lobby and the first year Cook County has partnered with the city of Chicago for Dia de Los Muertos. The combination of stakeholders from different levels of government reaffirm Cook County and Chicago's commitment to Meso-American culture, our history and to always remember those who came before us.

"Día de Los Muertos is universal. We are all skeletons underneath our skins after our time is done," said artist Gloria Contreras.

The rebranding effort will also include redesigning DMV facilities to improve flow and functionality; negotiating new leases to enhance DMV office space, add amenities and reduce costs; and standardizing signage throughout all DMVs.

"Our goal at the Secretary of State's Office is to update and modernize our DMV facilities and operations, reduce wait times and make the DMV a more pleasant experience for Illinois residents," Giannoulias added.

Giannoulias Urges Illinois Military Vets to Share Their Stories

Secretary of State's Veterans History Project Preserves Accounts for Future Generations

In advance of Veterans Day this year, Secretary of State Alexi Giannoulias announced a new effort to encourage Illinois military veterans to share their stories, photos and mementos for future generations as part of the Illinois History Project.

In addition, Giannoulias also announced his office is forming a Veterans Advisory Board to advise on issues important to veterans and to ensure Illinois veterans are aware and take advantage of the programs and services the Secretary of State offers.



As the state's librarian, Giannoulias' office administers the Illinois Veterans History Project, a statewide initiative launched in response to the national effort of the Library of Congress that collects, preserves and makes accessible firsthand recollections of veterans and civilians who served the military branches.

"It is an honor to commemorate the brave Americans who have served our country," Giannoulias said. "Our state's Veterans History Project shines a spotlight on veteran voices and serves as a permanent record for Illinois veterans to memorialize their experiences and contributions to ensure they are not forgotten."

Currently, more than 6,700 records from Illinois veterans have been submitted as part of the program, including 675 oral histories, dating from the Civil War to those serving on active duty.

Knowing that many of those who served are getting older, Giannoulias encourages veterans and their family members to submit materials so his office can digitize them and make them available online.

"We're asking family members to play a role by helping upload photographs and other mementos to help preserve their legacies," Giannoulias added. "Veterans are often reluctant to tell their stories of heroism, so it's up to us to ask, listen and make sure they are heard."

Giannoulias encourages the public to visit www.idaillinois.org and search Veterans History Project to view submissions, which can be searched by name, war and hometown of veterans who have submitted materials. Oral history interviews are also available on the project's YouTube page at youtube.com/user/ilveteransproject.

How to Submit Information

Veterans, civilians and their families are encouraged to share oral histories, photos, memoirs, obituaries, letters, service records and more to be preserved in the project.

To submit an entry, visit www.ilsos.gov/veteranshistoryproject and complete and submit an Illinois Patriot Information Form to the Illinois State Library. Completed forms can be submitted electronically to ilvhp@ilsos.gov or by mail to the Illinois State Library, 300 S. Second St., Springfield, IL 62701-1796.

Stories and mementos from veterans of all ages, whether they saw conflict or not, are welcome. Any civilians who were actively involved in supporting war efforts, including war industry workers, flight instructors, medical volunteers and more, are encouraged to submit their experiences and memories.

This is a no appointment, walk-in facility that offers the following driver and motor vehicle services: REAL IDs, driver's licenses and state identification cards; vehicle registration stickers; organ and tissue donor registration; voter registration; and in-car driving tests.
- A Road Testing Center in Addison, located at 50 E. Oak St. It is open 8 a.m.-4 p.m., Monday-Friday. Driver's licenses will be issued as part of the road tests. Vehicle registration stickers and temporary disability placard cards are also offered.

The pop-up facilities are part of Giannoulias' effort to improve the Skip-the-Line Program and eliminate long lines at DMVs. Since launching Sept. 1, Illinois DMVs have seen over 638,500 customers statewide, and customers are experiencing little to no wait times.

"I'm excited to announce the opening of our two new DMVs geared toward serving seniors and offering road tests," Giannoulias said. "Our Skip-the-Line Program has been functioning at a high level since its launch in September, but I know that we can always improve so that our DMVs are as efficient as possible for Illinoisans statewide, especially for our seniors."

"This new senior-only facility will be an excellent addition to our Westchester community and the surrounding area," said House Speaker Emanuel "Chris" Welch. "The DMV has almost become synonymous with long lines and wait times, so I appreciate Secretary Giannoulias' effort to improve the overall experience for all of Illinoisans, including our seniors."

"I applaud the secretary of state for opening this road testing center in DuPage County which serves those drivers who are required to take road tests upon obtaining or renewing a driver's license," said Rep. Norma Hernandez (77th District-Melrose Park). "This center located within the 77th District is an exciting addition to Secretary Giannoulias' Skip-the-Line Program that is saving Illinoisans valuable time while shortening lines and reducing wait times at regular DMV facilities."

Giannoulias' office previously opened two "Senior Only" walk-in centers in Evanston and Bridgeview on Sept. 25. Other improvements made to the Skip-the-Line Program include increasing the number of available appointments by over 40 percent or nearly 1,300 more per day; adding additional call center features to serve seniors aged 70 and older who require a road exam; and adding new features to the appointment website so users can filter DMVs by ZIP code, highlighting appointment openings closest to them.

Giannoulias Announces Long-Awaited Launch of State's Monarch Butterfly Plate

After more than seven years, Illinois residents who placed deposits for the state's Monarch Butterfly Specialty License Plate can finally redeem it, Illinois Secretary of State Alexi Giannoulias announced recently.



The Monarch Butterfly License Plate is the first Universal Specialty Plate issued by the state of Illinois – even though the General Assembly approved it in 2016.

"This is an important issue, not just because it will positively impact the environment and preserve the Monarch's cultural significance, but also because it finally makes good on a long-awaited promise," Giannoulias said. "Government needs to work more efficiently and deliver for its residents, which means people shouldn't have to wait seven years to get what they paid for."

In 2016, Illinois lawmakers passed legislation to create a "universal" license plate to limit the number of specialty license plates – all designed differently and deemed problematic for law enforcement. At the time, there were 109 different specialty plates. The legislation stated that any new charitable organization would need at

least 2,000 Illinoisans to place deposits that benefitted an organization or charity before any new specialty plate could get issued. Furthermore, the new specialty plates would have a universal, standardized design, but include a decal on the left side depicting the cause or charity it supports.

The Monarch plate reached the necessary 2,000 deposits in 2018, yet it was never produced despite residents having already paid the necessary \$10 to pre-order the plate. The money raised from Illinoisans' deposits goes toward protecting the Monarch from extinction.

On the campaign trail, Giannoulias heard from residents inquiring about the status of the plate and he committed to ensuring that those who supported the Monarch's charity get the opportunity to obtain the plate.

The \$10 deposits are allocated to the Roadside Monarch Habitat Fund, which is part of the Illinois Department of Natural Resources. If renewed, \$23 of the universal special license plate renewal fee will benefit the fund. The Monarch Butterfly, Illinois' state insect, is considered endangered.

The fund helps foster habitats to support the butterflies during their twice-yearly migratory journey from Mexico to Chicago with a goal to add 150 million new milkweed stems and other nectar resources to the Illinois landscape in the next 15 years.

Common Banking Terms

State Treasurer Michael Frerichs wants to help people be financially secure, so he recently launched the Illinois Financial Wellness Hub (FinWell Hub). It provides free resources to help all Illinois residents plan a better financial future. Below is an example of the information you can find there.

Part of understanding how banking works is getting a handle on the industry's vocabulary. Here are some terms that will help you as you open and manage accounts.

Types of Financial Institutions

Traditional Bank – The type of financial institution where most consumers have traditionally gone to deposit funds in checking and savings accounts. The major national banks in the United States are all traditional banking facilities.

Credit Union – A financial cooperative whose members can open and access checking and savings accounts as well as borrow from the institution's pooled deposits at a low interest rate. Credit unions are typically nonprofit and members are their shareholders.

Commercial Bank – A financial institution that offers its services to general consumers, as well as business customers. Commercial banks may also make short-term loans to businesses or individuals.

Savings and Loan – A specialized bank that accepts savings at interest and lends money out for home mortgage loans. Savings and Loans were created to assist people looking to buy a home.

FDIC – The Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, or FDIC, is the federal agency that insures deposits in U.S. banks against loss in bank failures. Created in 1933, the FDIC exists to maintain public confidence in banks and encourage economic stability.

NCUA – The National Credit Union Administration, or NCUA, is the independent federal agency that regulates, charters and supervises federal credit unions.

Basic Banking Terms

Savings Account – An account that encourages saving due to its higher interest rate. Many savings accounts have restrictions on how many times per month you can withdraw money.

Checking Account – An account that allows the holder to deposit and withdraw money as needed to cover daily expenses.

Deposit – Money that is added to an account.

Withdrawal – Money that is taken out of an account.

Balance – The total funds that are in an account.

Interest – A percentage of an account balance that is paid to the account holder periodically. Banks use interest to reward account holders for letting them hold their money.

Minimum Deposit – The lowest dollar amount necessary to deposit in order to open a new account.

Minimum Balance – The minimum balance that a bank requires account holders to maintain in their accounts each day. If an account goes below the minimum balance, the bank may charge the account holder a maintenance fee.

Overdraft – If an account holder tries to withdraw more money than they have available in their account, that is called an overdraft. If an account is overdrafted, the bank may charge the account holder an overdraft fee.

Account Statement – A monthly summary of all account activity sent by the bank to the account holder either in the mail or online.

Direct Deposit – An electronic transfer of money from one account to another. For example, a worker could use direct deposit to have every paycheck sent directly to their checking account. Some banks will waive fees on checking accounts if the account holder receives a minimum direct deposit amount each month.

Checking Account Terms

Bounced Check – A check that is returned because there are not enough funds in the account to cover the amount of the check.

Debit Card – A plastic payment card that withdraws funds from the user's checking account.

Stop Payment – In case a check is stolen, the account holder can issue a stop payment notice to their bank. This notice protects the account holder from fraudulent charges.

Transfer – Sending money from one account to another. You can transfer money between your own accounts or from an account that you own to another person's account.

State Treasurer Returns \$18.9 Million In Missing Money

The Illinois State Treasurer's Office returned more than \$18.9 million in missing money during October, Illinois Treasurer Michael Frerichs announced recently.

The total includes more than \$18 million in cash and interest, and more than \$900,000 in stock value. All told, 33,845 claims were paid.

"We help Illinois' economy by putting money back in people's pockets," Frerichs said. "Our efforts to improve the efficiency of reuniting people with their missing money are paying off."

Illinois' missing money program — also known as I-CASH — is one of the state's oldest consumer protection initiatives. The state treasurer is tasked with safeguarding unclaimed property, such as the contents of overlooked safe deposit boxes, unpaid life insurance benefits, forgotten bank accounts and unused rebate cards. Illinois holds more than \$5 billion in unclaimed property.

The Treasurer's Office has returned more than \$1.84 billion during Frerichs' time in office. When Frerichs first became treasurer, there were 60,000 claims paid in a year. Today, more than 200,000 claims are paid each year.

So far this year, the Treasurer's Office has returned more than \$220 million through more than 223,700 claims.

The record-setting performance is the result of a complete restructuring of the missing money process under Frerichs. The State Treasurer's Office has added electronic claims, eliminated red-tape that slowed small-money claims and leveraged technology to allow payments to be made without a claim even needing to be filed.

In recent months, the Treasurer's Office has sent out letters to more than 140,000 people through the Enhanced Money Match Program, which leverages data already collected by the state and crossmatches it with the treasurer's unclaimed property database. When a matching name and mailing address is identified and confirmed, the unclaimed property owner will receive a letter from the Treasurer's Office that describes the amount and source of the money. After one additional security step is concluded, a check simply is issued to the owner. All they have to do is watch for the mail.

Frerichs worked with state lawmakers to raise the limit on the amount of money that can be returned to \$5,000. The total to be returned through the two rounds of Enhanced Money Match letters is about \$76 million.

Frerichs also has added a Friends and Family "share" feature. When visitors to the I-CASH website come across the name of someone they know, they can select the "share" icon and provide the email address of their friend or relative. Frerichs' office then will notify the individual by sending an email that mentions the missing money, along with the name of the friend or relative who spotted it. Then, that individual can start the process of retrieving it. Illinois is a national leader in the unclaimed property space and is frequently consulted by other states who are reforming their unclaimed property laws, rules and procedures.

The Treasurer's Office recommends that people check for missing money at least twice a year. You can check icash.illinoistreasurer.gov to see if missing money is waiting for you.

Helping a Man Fulfill His Late Sister's Wishes for Her Children

When Fredrick walked into the state government building in late September, he was at his wit's end. About a decade ago, he'd had some cashier's checks drawn up to pay for his daughter's college tuition. But she changed plans and he ended up not using them.

He decided to hold on to the money and when the time came, help put his late sister's children through college.

Fredrick attempted to use the cashier's checks, only to find out they had expired. After jumping through some hoops with a bank, he discovered that under the law, the bank turned them over to the Illinois Treasurer's Office, which is tasked with safeguarding unclaimed property, such as the contents of overlooked safe deposit boxes, unpaid life insurance benefits, forgotten bank accounts and the like.



Fredrick visited the Treasurer's Office to seek help on a Friday in September.

Ashton, who oversees the Unclaimed Property division, normally works out of

Ashton, who oversees the Unclaimed Property division, normally works out of the Springfield office. She happened to be in Chicago that day and worked with a team to help Fredrick with his situation. Treasurer's staff reviewed Fredrick's paperwork, which was in order, and helped him file a claim. By Monday, the claim had been approved. By the following weekend, a \$100,000 check had arrived – the amount the Illinois Treasurer's Office had been holding for him.

"Ashton was a blessing," Fredrick said. "I said 'Lord, I don't know what you did by bringing that angel there. She helped me so much."

Now, his niece is looking at studying pre-med at Howard University in Washington, D.C. His nephew is considering a business degree at North Park College in Chicago. And his other nephew is interested in community college.

Fredrick said he is very satisfied with the help he received from State Treasurer Michael Frerichs' office.

"When I think about my sister and the things she wanted for them, she wanted her children to go to college," he said. "I just want them to make it. I just want to be a helping hand."

Energy-Saving Tips for Cold-Weather Months

During the cold-weather season, ComEd's Energy Doctors remind customers that they can manage energy use and save money on their electric bills by following a few tips:

- When the sun is shining, open shades on south-facing windows and take advantage of natural light for warmth. Close shades during the night to help insulate your home.
- Set your thermostat to as low a temperature as possible to maintain personal comfort. The smaller the difference between the indoor and outdoor temperatures, the lower your overall heating bill will be. Overnight, you can also save by turning your thermostat down a few degrees while sleeping.
- Clear area around heating and cooling vents. Furniture, carpets and other objects can block vents and prevent heated air from circulating in your home.
- Unplug electronics when they're not in use. Some devices, like televisions, game consoles and computers, continue to draw electricity even when turned off, so unplug electronics when you don't need them.

"As the weather gets colder and the sun goes down earlier, energy bills tend to go up. In addition to taking advantage of free, energy-saving tips, making your home more energy efficient with simple upgrades like LED bulbs, power strips and smart thermostats allows you to cozy up with your cocoa while keeping your energy bills low," said Paige Knutsen, MEEA executive director.

ComEd, Better Business Bureau Find Latest Scams Bilking Customers Out of Larger Sums of Money

For Utility Scam Awareness Day, ComEd Also Sees Increase in Scams Involving Cryptocurrency and QR Codes

Based on a ComEd analysis of reported scams for the first eight months of 2023, the energy company found that, while the number of reported incidents stayed the same compared to 2021, the amount of money lost per incident increased significantly. In recognition of Utility Scam Awareness Day (Wednesday, Nov. 15), ComEd and the Better Business Bureau shared tips to help its customers identify – and hopefully avoid – the latest scam trends.

Through August of this year, the number of scams reported into ComEd decreased slightly as compared to the same timeframe in 2021 (1,156 vs. 1,151). Unfortunately, the total amount of money lost as a result of these reported scams more than doubled (\$86,771 vs. \$175,604).

Reason to Remain Vigilant

As the holiday season approaches, ComEd and the Better Business Bureau (BBB) of Chicago and Northern Illinois ask customers to be heightened alert for imposters who will call or visit homes and businesses, then threaten to turn off service if payment is not immediately made.

"Scammers use the holiday season as the time to increase their attempts to separate us from our money and even personal information, like Social Security or bank account numbers," said Melissa Washington, ComEd chief customer officer and senior vice president of Customer Operations. "Scammers know that we're busier this time of year; distracted with plans and paying less attention to our spending and bill-paying habits. They use urgency to make their demands sound more believable. But what our customers need to know is that ComEd will never demand immediate payment under threat of disconnection."

Last year, ComEd noticed a rise in scammers demanding payment through mobile banking apps because they often have higher transaction limits than prepaid cash cards. In some instances, the scammer will falsely claim not to have received a payment to get the victim to transfer money two or three times, allowing imposters to scam victims out of thousands of dollars with a single encounter.

Steve J. Bernas, president and CEO of the Better Business Bureau, says "Utility scams against businesses are also more prevalent during the holiday season because many restaurants and retail businesses depend so much on November and December for the peak sales for their businesses. The fear of losing power closing down their business often clouds common sense necessary to act before they think. It's a busy time of the year for reports of both utility and online scams being reported to the BBB Scam Tracker."

Scammers Turn to Crypto and QR Codes

Recently, ComEd also noticed two additional trends scammers use to steal money from businesses and individuals. The first includes demands for bogus payments in the form of cryptocurrency since transactions are harder to trace. The second trend involves scammers' use of QR codes to solicit fraudulent payments. In this latter instance, imposters provide customers with QR codes and instructions to present the code to foster payment through retailers like Walmart and Walgreens, without the knowledge or consent of those stores.

Tips to Help Identify Scam Attempts

ComEd will never call or visit your home or business to:

- Ask for direct payment with a prepaid cash card, cryptocurrency, such as Bitcoin, or third-party payment apps like Cash App, QuickPay, Venmo or Zelle.
- Demand immediate payment.
- Ask for personal information, such as a Social Security number, driver's license number or bank information; we also will not ask for your ComEd account number unless you contact us first to enroll in a program or service.


Tips to Help Identify a True ComEd Employee

The energy choices you make are important. They affect the environment, certainly. They also affect how comfortable you are in your own home. And very importantly, they affect how much money you spend. If you're using natural gas today, you've already made a good choice for the environment, your home and your finances.

Tips for Efficient Water Heating ...

About Water Heaters

Natural gas water heaters can heat up to twice the amount of water in the same amount of time as an electric model – which means you're less likely to run out of hot water when you need it. Natural gas water

heaters are available in tank and tankless models. Both have significant advantages over electric and propane water heaters. With fewer parts to wear out, natural gas water heaters are generally considered more durable than electric models. If the power goes out, most gas water heaters continue to deliver plenty of hot water.

Water Heating – Set your water heater to 120 degrees; Take five-minute showers; Install low-flow showerheads and faucets; Insulate water heater pipes; Turn your water heater off or down when you're away; Choose an Energy Star® water heater.

Water Heaters and Furnaces – Lower the temperature setting on your water heater to 120 degrees; Put an insulation wrap around the sides of your water heater. (But remember, never put insulation on the top of the heater or near the bottom.)

Sinks and Showers – Fix leaky faucets; Install low-flow showerheads and faucets.

Washers and Dryers – A natural gas dryer can dry two loads of clothes in the same time it takes for one load in an electric dryer. This precision allows your dryer to keep pace with your washing machine. Less tumbling means that natural gas dryers are gentler on your clothes. Natural gas dryers dry clothes more quickly and with less static electricity and fewer wrinkles than electric dryers.

- Use a water-level setting that matches the size of the load you're washing.
- Select the proper setting and time for the clothing type and load size.
- In your dryer, separate heavier clothes (towels, heavy cottons) from the lightweight fabrics (synthetics) for more efficient drying.
- Dry full loads, but be sure not to overload your dryer. Clean the dryer's lint filter before every load. Don't add wet clothes during the drying cycle.
- Don't over-dry clothes. Use the automatic moisture control if your dryer has one or select the appropriate amount of time on the automatic timer.
- Be sure the outside dryer vent is free of any obstructions and the vent cover fully opens when the dryer is in use.

• Clean the lint filter. • Replace leaky exhaust terminals. • Check the outside dryer exhaust terminal. • Avoid overloading the dryer.

Heating Your Home ...

Furnaces

Natural gas furnaces heat your home faster. Air from a natural gas furnace is up to 25 degrees warmer when it comes through the vent than air from an electric heat pump. Most new high-efficiency furnaces have an annual fuel utilization efficiency (AFUE) rating of 90 percent or higher. The higher the AFUE, the more efficient the unit and the more money you can save.

Look for these high-tech features that improve furnace efficiency:

- Electronic spark ignitions or "hot surface" ignitions eliminate the need for continuously burning pilot lights that waste fuel and increase operating costs.
- Condensing furnaces recapture some of the heat from water vapor, which is wasted by traditional furnaces. The exhaust gases from a condensing furnace are cool enough that they can be vented through a wall with plastic piping.
- Pulse furnaces burn natural gas in small pulses, much like a car engine, allowing maximum heat to be extracted from the fuel. These furnaces can achieve AFUE ratings as high as 97 percent.
- Automatic vent dampers close the flue pipe when the burners are off and reduce the amount of heated air drawn up and wasted.

Gas Space Heaters

Energy-efficient gas space heaters are growing in popularity – and for good reason, they operate even during power outages. They're also great solutions for heating small rooms – or whenever you need a bit more warmth.

The two basic types of gas space heaters are:

- Vent-free models virtually 99 percent fuel-efficient and require no electricity. You can control them manually or with thermostats and they can be mounted on walls or floors.
- · Vented models thermostatically controlled and sit on the floor

Fireplaces

Natural gas logs and fireplaces provide the warmth and charm of a glowing fire without the mess and bother of firewood and ashes. More homeowners are discovering the lasting benefits of gas logs:

- Install a smart or programmable thermostat and set it to automatically adjust the temperature each day.
- Keep your heating system tuned up and clean.
- Improve your home's insulation by sealing air leaks, weatherstrip windows and doors, and add insulation in your attic.
- Upgrade your old heating equipment and have the system inspected and maintained regularly.
- Clean or replace your furnace filters every one to three months. Close fireplace dampers when not in use.
- Lower the temperature setting on your water heater to 120 degrees. Lower the thermostat when no one is home.
- Keep heating and return vents free of all obstructions for proper airflow.

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

Our Nature Express Bus Program can help your group access Forest Preserves events or visit our partner organizations, the Chicago Botanic Garden and the Brookfield Zoo. Best of all, it's free.

Program Overview

Groups can visit one of our big annual events, including Teen Exploration Day, Beaubien Woods Celebration, Fall Paddle Fest or Kids Fest. A trip to the Chicago Botanic Garden or Brookfield Zoo includes the price of admission (restricted dates include the Garden's Orchid Show, Light Scape, and Night of 1,000 Jack-o-lanterns and the Zoo's Holiday Magic light festival).



Application Process

- Ensure that your group has a minimum of 25 and a maximum of 44 passengers for the bus.
- Designate one or more group leaders they will be the main contact for all Nature Express Bus communications.
- Complete the application and email it to experience.nature@cookcountyil.gov.
- Groups can expect to hear back with a decision within five business days of the form submission.
- The Forest Preserves will provide your group leader with a copy of the bus confirmation.
- Report back! After your trip, you will be sent a survey to complete. Let us know about your group's experience and share two fun photos that sum up your trip.

Requirements

To qualify, your group must have a minimum of 25 and a maximum of 44 passengers, and demonstrate a need for transportation funding. In order to provide equal access, groups are limited to one free bus per calendar year.

- School field trips through the Nature Express Bus Program are only permitted on weekends.
- In order to be eligible for a Nature Express Bus next year, applicants must complete their posttrip survey.
- Please list your two preferred trip dates and times.
- Groups must submit their application a minimum of three weeks prior to their proposed trip date.
- Be based in Cook County and serve primarily Cook County residents.

When the Snow Starts Falling, Nothing Says "Winter Fun" Like Sledding in the Forest Preserves.

Sledding Hill Locations

Sledding hills are open when the ground is frozen and covered with a minimum of three inches of snow.

Public safety requires the temporary closing of some Forest Preserves parking areas during the winter season. However, our Maintenance Department prioritizes the clearing of parking areas serving winter activities. Always call ahead to make sure sledding hills and parking areas are open.

With Lighting

Sledding hills with lighting are staffed and open Sunday-Thursday, 10 a.m.-7:30 p.m.; Friday-Saturday, 10a.m.-8:30 p.m. daily, when conditions allow.

Caldwell Woods - Devon Avenue and Nagle Avenue, Chicago. Call (847) 647-2240 for sledding hill status.

Dan Ryan Woods Visitor Center – Western Avenue and 87th Street, Chicago. Call (773) 233-3766 for sledding hill status.

Swallow Cliff Woods-North - Calumet Sag Road/Route 83, west of La Grange Road/96th Avenue, near Palos Park.

Call (708) 839-5617 for sledding hill status. Requires a minimum of six inches of snow.

Westchester Woods - Cermak Road, east of Mannheim Road/La Grange Road, near LaGrange Park.

Call (708) 447-0090 for sledding hill status.

Without Lighting

Sledding hills without lighting are open 10 a.m. to sunset daily, when conditions allow.

Deer Grove - Quentin Road, north of Dundee Road, near Palatine.

Sledding hills located at both Picnic Grove #4 and Picnic Grove #5. Call (847) 437-8330 for sledding hill status.

Pioneer Woods - 107th Street, east of Willow Springs Road/Flavin Road, near Willow Springs.

Sledding Rules and Regulations

- · Children under the age of 12 should wear a bicycle or multi-sport helmet and be supervised by an adult.
 - Properly use appropriate sledding devices in good repair with no sharp edges.
 - Use of skis, non-winter tubes, carpets, toboggans and metal rail sleds is strictly prohibited.
- Unauthorized building of ramps, bumps, moguls, hills or jumps out of any material is strictly prohibited.
 - Pets and alcoholic beverages are strictly prohibited on sledding hills.
 - Sledding hills may be closed due to lack of snow cover or for safety-related reasons.
 - Use of Forest Preserves of Cook County sledding hills is at visitor's own risk.
- Forest Preserves staff reserves the right to turn away visitors who do not comply with these rules and regulations.

Brookfield Zoo's Ring-tailed Lemurs Treated to a Special Thanksgiving Feast

The annual tradition of an early Thanksgiving feast for Brookfield Zoo's ring-tailed lemurs took place recently. This year's meal featured a special theme in celebration of the 50th anniversary of the popular *A Charlie Brown Thanksgiving*, which aired for the first time in 1973.

Those familiar with the nostalgic holiday special, may recall that the Thanksgiving meal the lead character prepared for his friends did not feature the usual fare of turkey, dressing and cranberry sauce, but instead included an array of snack food items.

The zoo's creative animal care staff replicated the iconic meal while still keeping it nutritious for the two ring-tailed lemurs – Ramses and Moses, who are both 16 years old. The primates seemed to enjoy their feast of popcorn (air-popped, no salt or butter); toast, which was made of primate biscuit mixed with honey; jelly beans that were created with strawberry and lime sugar-free gelatin in coffee bean molds; pretzel sticks made of primate biscuits; and apple juice in cups featuring the zigzag pattern on the cartoon character's shirt. Additionally, the lemurs were treated to pies made of a primate biscuit crust and filled with mashed sweet potatoes garnished with almonds and puffed rice cereal. (Ice cream parfaits, which did not interest the lemurs, were made of tissue paper and were strictly for décor.)
