

Dear Director of Police Sam Pitassi and Deputy Chief Anthony Greco...

I am writing to express our sincere appreciation for the invaluable support provided by officers Schiller and Sullo during the incident that occurred on Feb. 7, 2024, at 6:08 a.m., at Woodward MPC in Niles.

The coordinated effort and professionalism displayed by responding officers significantly contributed to the successful resolution of a challenging situation.

On that day, the Niles Police Department responded to an organized pro-Palestinian protest in the area of Howard and Croname, where participants had bound themselves together, obstructing traffic and creating a hazardous environment. Despite numerous instructions to vacate the roadway, the individuals refused, necessitating additional assistance.

The swift response of the NIPAS Mobile Field Force ensured the safe removal of self-induced restraints from all bound protesters, leading to their subsequent custody without any reported injuries. This collaborative effort played a crucial role in the efficient resolution of the incident.

As a result of the collaborative efforts, both Howard and Croname roadways were reopened by 12:31 p.m., minimizing disruption to the community.

In total, seven adult males and 26 adult females were charged with Unlawful Assembly 430 ILCS 70/4, a class A misdemeanor, and were processed and released from the Niles Police Department on the same day.

Once again, I express my appreciation for your support in ensuring the successful resolution of this incident. The cooperation between our agencies exemplifies the strength of our community's commitment to safety.

Village Vehicle Stickers Expired Dec. 31, 2023. 2024-2025 Stickers Can be Purchased at the Village Hall.

Sticker Fee for Passenger Vehicles is \$30 for Two Years (2024-2025).

Truck Fees Vary Based on the Type of Class/Plate and Are Good for One Year Only (2024).

Seniors Over 65 Years of Age are Free.

One free two-year sticker for a passenger vehicle or one free one-year sticker for a B-Truck vehicle registered to a person over 65 years in age.

Limit one free sticker per household.

If there is a second passenger or B-Truck vehicle registered to a senior in the household, a second senior sticker will be sold for half price (\$15).

Acceptable proof for a senior sticker is a valid driver's license or state ID card.

Vehicle Sticker Fee Details

Sticker fees are as follows: Passenger Plates – \$30 for two years (2024-2025); Senior Citizen – One free per household for two years (2024-2025); Trucks – Good for one year (2024 only).



A Message from Rick Beltrame, Director of Fire Department

The Melrose Park Fire Department and Director of Fire Department Rick Beltrame want to ensure the safety of our residents by providing these outdoor electrical fire safety tips on behalf the Red Cross and National Fire Protection Association.

Please follow these tips to ensure your family's well-being and safety!



Outside Electrical Work

- Have a qualified electrician do all electrical work.
- To prevent an electrical shock, make sure all your outside electrical receptacles are GFCI (groundfault circuit interrupter) protected.

Equipment Safety

- Use lighting and power tools that are listed by a qualified test laboratory and make sure they are made for outdoor use.
- Store your electrical tools indoors.
- Keep electric tools away from children.
- Keep the area around your electric meter and other electrical equipment clear.
- Check lighting and extension cords for damage before using. Replace any damaged cords right away.
- Use extention cords that are listed by a qualified test laboratory and are marked for outdoor use.
- Extension cords are not meant for long-term use.

POWER LINES

Have a professional tree cutting service trim branches that might fall on electric wiring. Use a wooden or fiberglass ladder outside. Keep the ladder at least 10 feet away from power lines. Never touch anyone or anything in contact with a downed wire. Power lines may be live, stay a safe distance away. Report downed wires to authorities right away.

(8-1-1) before any digging on your property. They will mark where your underground utilities are located. It's a free service!

Silver Creek Restoration Project

Under the direction of Mayor Ronald M. Serpico, the Village of Melrose Park Public Works employees constructed the Silver Creek Eagles Nest Park. This is a natural preserve that includes a walking path and a pavilion/gazebo, along with a canoe/kayak launch.

> Phase 5 and 6 of the Silver Creek Stabilization Project have been completed. Phase 7 is underway.

This stabilization project restores the natural balance of the creek by restoring the embankment, and bringing back native landscape and shrubbery along with aquatic habitat. This is an invaluable stream system that provides storm water runoff, flood management and many other benefits for the residents of Melrose Park.



Silver Creek Trail Park

The Silver Creek Trail Park is located off of First Avenue. The trail is centered off the pond between Silver Creek and its tributary, the Des Plaines River. Native plants of this area were once lost to development and are

now being reintroduced to the area. With the help of these native plants, more wildlife is returning to the area from the Bald Eagle (sighted in the area). the Northern Pike, Red Foxes, Black-Crowned Night Herons and



Cooper's Hawk, to name a few.

- 1. No littering. Please clean up after any activities.
- 2. Pets must be leashed.
- 3. Smoking or fires are prohibited.
- 4. Please clean up pet waste and dispose of it.
- 5. Do not disturb any plants, trees or wildlife.
- 6. No loitering.
- 7. No hunting.
- 8. Fisherman must clean up any cut line, bail containers and all litter.
- 9. Park opens one hour after sunrise and closes one hour before sunset. 10. Enjoy the park.







From the Desk of Chief Philip C. Schwartz, Departments of Homeland Security — Public Safety

Lightning: What You Need to Know

- No place outside is safe when thunderstorms are in the area!
- If you hear thunder, lightning is close enough to strike you.
- When you hear thunder, immediately move to safe shelter: a substantial building with electricity or plumbing or an enclosed, metal-topped vehicle with windows up.
- Stay in safe shelter at least 30 minutes after you hear the last sound of thunder.

Indoor Lightning Safety

- · Stay off corded phones, computers and other electrical equipment that put you in direct contact with electricity.
- · Avoid plumbing, including sinks, baths and faucets.
- Stay away from windows and doors, and stay off porches.
- Do not lie on concrete floors, and do not lean against concrete walls.

Last Resort Outdoor Risk Reduction Tips

If you are caught outside with no safe shelter anywhere nearby the following actions may reduce your risk:

- Immediately get off elevated areas such as hills, mountain ridges or peaks.
- · Never lie flat on the ground.
- · Never shelter under an isolated tree.
- · Never use a cliff or rocky overhang for shelter.
- Immediately get out and away from ponds, lakes and other bodies of water.
- Stay away from objects that conduct electricity (barbed wire fences, power lines, windmills, etc.).

Lightning Safety Myths and Facts

Myth: Lightning never strikes the same place twice.

Fact: Lightning often strikes the same place repeatedly, especially if it's a tall, pointy, isolated object. The Empire State Building is hit nearly 100 times a year.

Myth: If it's not raining or there aren't clouds overhead, you're safe from lightning.

Fact: Lightning often strikes more than three miles from the center of the thunderstorm, far outside the rain or thunderstorm cloud. "Bolts from the blue" can strike 10-15 miles from the thunderstorm.

Myth: Rubber tires on a car protect you from lightning by insulating you from the ground.

Fact: Most cars are safe from lightning, but it is the metal roof and metal sides that protect you, not the rubber tires. Remember, convertibles, motorcycles, bicycles, open-shelled outdoor recreational vehicles and cars with fiberglass shells offer no protection from lightning. When lightning strikes a vehicle, it goes through the metal frame into the ground. Don't lean on doors during a thunderstorm.

Myth: A lightning victim is electrified. If you touch them, you'll be electrocuted.

Fact: The human body does not store electricity. It is perfectly safe to touch a lightning victim to give them first aid. This is the most chilling of lightning Myths. Imagine if someone died because people were afraid to give CPR!

Myth: If outside in a thunderstorm, you should seek shelter under a tree to stay dry.

Fact: Being underneath a tree is the second leading cause of lightning casualties. Better to get wet than fried!

Myth: If you are in a house, you are 100 percent safe from lightning.

Fact: A house is a safe place to be during a thunderstorm as long as you avoid anything that conducts electricity. This means staying off corded phones, electrical appliances, wires, TV cables, computers, plumbing, metal doors and windows. Windows are hazardous for two reasons: wind generated during a thunderstorm can blow objects into the window, breaking it and causing glass to shatter and second, in older homes, in rare instances, lightning can come in cracks in the sides of windows.

Myth: If thunderstorms threaten while you are outside playing a game, it is okay to finish it before seeking shelter.

Fact: Many lightning casualties occur because people do not seek shelter soon enough. No game is worth death or lifelong injuries. Seek proper shelter immediately if you hear thunder. Adults are responsible for the safety of children.

Myth: Structures with metal, or metal on the body (jewelry, cell phones, Mp3 players, watches, etc.), attract lightning.

Fact: Height, pointy shape and isolation are the dominant factors controlling where a lightning bolt will strike. The presence of metal makes absolutely no difference on where lightning strikes. Mountains are made of stone but get struck by lightning many times a year. When lightning threatens, take proper protective action immediately by seeking a safe shelter – don't waste time removing metal. While metal does not attract lightning, it does conduct it so stay away from metal fences, railings, bleachers, etc.

Myth: If trapped outside and lightning is about to strike, I should lie flat on the ground.

Fact: Lying flat increases your chance of being affected by potentially deadly ground current. If you are caught outside in a thunderstorm, you keep moving toward a safe shelter.

Tornados

Before a Tornado

Know the terms used to describe tornado threats.

Tornado Watch – Tornados are possible. Watch the sky and listen to the radio or television for more information. Be prepared to take shelter. If you see any rotating funnel-shaped clouds, report them immediately by telephone to your local law enforcement agency. If you live in a mobile home, this is the time to move to a more substantial structure.

Tornado Warning – A tornado has been sighted or indicated by weather radar. Take shelter. Turn on a battery-operated radio or television and wait for the "all clear" announcement by authorities. Determine the best location in your home and office to seek shelter when threatened by a tornado. A basement or cellar will usually afford the best protection. If an underground shelter is not available, identify an interior room or hall-way on the lowest level. Conduct periodic tornado safety drills with your family.

During a Tornado – Take the following actions when a Tornado Warning has been issued by the National Weather Service, when sirens have been activated or when a tornado has been sighted near your area.

At Home – Go at once to your predetermined shelter (storm cellar, basement or the lowest level of the building). In a basement, go under the stairs, under a heavy piece of furniture or a workbench. Stay there until the danger has passed. If there is no basement, go to an inner hallway or a small inner room without windows, such as a bathroom or closet. Stay away from windows, doors and outside walls.

Go to the center of the room. Outside windows and walls may be penetrated by high speed, wind-borne missiles

Get under a piece of sturdy furniture, such as a workbench or heavy table, and hold onto it.

Use pillows, mattresses or cushions to protect your head and neck.

If in a mobile home, get out and seek shelter elsewhere. A mobile home can overturn very easily even if precautions have been taken to tie down the unit. If there isn't a substantial shelter nearby, seek shelter in a low-lying area. Shield your head with your hands.

In a School, Nursing Home, Hospital, Shopping Center or at Work – Go to the designated storm shelter, basement or to an inside hallway on the lowest level.

Avoid places with wide-span roofs, such as auditoriums, cafeterias, gymnasiums and large hallways. Stay away from windows and open spaces.

Get under a piece of sturdy furniture, such as a workbench or heavy table or desk and hold onto it. If sturdy furniture is not available, make yourself the smallest target possible. Squat low to the ground. Put your head down and cover your head and neck with your hands.

If in a high-rise building, go to small, interior rooms or hallways on the lowest level possible and seek protection as detailed above. Stay away from windows and outside walls.

Learn how to shut off the utilities to your home. Decide how and where your family will reunite.

If you live in a mobile home, identify a safe shelter outside of your mobile home such as a community park shelter, a neighbor or friend's house, or a nearby public building.

In a mobile home, consider installation of an underground shelter that is large enough to accommodate you, your family or several other nearby mobile home residents.


Consider retrofitting your house with special fasteners, connectors and reinforcing bands to strengthen the structural integrity. Also, consider installing a reinforced concrete and steel "safe room" as a small room within your house, or excavated and installed beneath your garage floor.

In a Vehicle – Never try to outrun a tornado in a vehicle. Heavy rain, hail and traffic may impede your movement. Tornados can change directions quickly and can easily lift up a vehicle and toss it through the air.

Get out of the vehicle immediately and try to take shelter in a nearby building. Do not park under a bridge or underpass.

If there isn't time to get indoors, get out of the vehicle and lie in a ditch, culvert or low-lying area away from the vehicle.

Garage sales will be held on the third weekend only during the months of May, June,

July, August and September. Sales are to be conducted on Thursday, Friday and Saturday of the designated weekends. No sales are allowed on Sundays.

The dates for 2024 are May 16-18, June 13-15, July 18-20 Aug. 15-17 and Sept. 19-21.

Garage sales shall be conducted only during the hours of 9 a.m.-5 p.m.


No permit is needed for garage sales, however the following rules must be followed:

- No garage sales may be conducted in apartment buildings.
- No garage sales in the frontyard, i.e., on the grass.
- All garage sales to be conducted in backyard, garage or on driveway.
- All sale items to be displayed on tables, not on the ground.
- No sale items shall be located and no sale activity shall be conducted in the frontyard area, on the premises of any public sidewalk, parkway area or other public property.
- No sale signs, handbills or other advertising material shall be located or posted upon public parkway or on public property, signs, poles or light poles within the village of Melrose Park.
- Signs advertising the sales shall not exceed 3-by-5 feet and may be located only in the frontyard (private property) of the address having the garage sale, and must be removed immediately after the sale.
- The sale will be conducted without the use of outdoor loud speakers, amplification equipment or illuminated advertising devices.

Any person violating these rules shall be subject to a fine not to exceed \$500. A copy of garage sale rules is available at www.melrosepark.org.


Furthermore, Aaron's aspirations include potentially pursuing a graduate degree in engineering, showcasing his ambition and determination to excel in his field.







Dominican Literacy Center Continues to Provide English Instruction and More ...

The Dominican Literacy Center originally began in Chicago, at the request of the pastor of Our Lady of Grace Parish in 1996. In 2008, the building housing the center was deemed to need extensive repairs and could not be used. In June of 2008, the center was graciously welcomed to rent a part of Sacred Heart Convent in Melrose Park, where it has continued to provide English instruction for the past 14 years.

The goal of the Dominican Literacy Center is the empowerment of persons who experience personal and economic limitations within our English-speaking society. Through literacy education and personal relationships, we strive to provide a small step toward eliminating racial and cultural prejudice and stereotypes, as well as a step up for persons seeking improvement in their personal, familial and economic abilities.

The Dominican Literacy Center provides weekly one and half hour tutored sessions in which one student meets with one tutor. The center provides tutoring in speaking, reading and writing English, as well as tutoring in preparation for the Citizenship interview and exam. This individualized instruction is provided for immigrant women and men (ages 17+) who are – endeavoring to reduce literacy and its consequential effects of isolation (due to their inability to communicate in English with health care providers, children's teachers, neighbors, co-workers, community leaders and/or first responders); in low-level jobs (due to lack of training or skills, or an inability to demonstrate their already achieved skills and knowledge); powerless to supervise their adolescent children or to influence systemic change; lacking confidence to enroll in traditional classes and or fear of requesting help when needed.

English Classes

English classes are provided for those who want to learn to speak, read or write in English. One student meets with one tutor, once a week.

These classes are offered at the Dominican Literacy Center, 1503 Rice Street, in Melrose Park (near Sacred Heart/St. Eulalia Parish).

Our program also assists persons studying for their Citizenship interview/exam.

We presently offer classes on Monday through Thursday, in the mornings and afternoons.

Congressman García Secures \$12.2 Million in Community Project Funding for IL-04



Springfield Updates – State Rep. Norma Hernandez **Moves Property Tax Relief Bill Out of Committee**

State Rep. Norma Hernandez is working to provide property tax relief for home buyers and expand access to housing by creating a property tax exemption for certain kinds of newly built homes.

"Many Illinoisans are looking to achieve their American dream and purchase their own home. Unfortunately, property tax burdens can make this dream unobtainable, leaving these homes to go unsold or be bought by those not looking to make that home their permanent residence. This leads to even less construction of new homes, further diminishing the options available to potential home-buyers. This new legislation will help buyers of new homes with property taxes and lead to greater utilization of existing land."

Rep. Hernandez's House Bill 1377 allows homebuyers to receive a 50% reduction value used to calculate property tax assessments for eight years, followed by two years of a 33% reduction. The bill would apply to recently built constructions and is limited to certain areas, emphasizing areas that have been historically underutilized.

IL-77th State Rep. Norma Hernandez Expands Youth Engagement Programing with the Launch of the New "Young Ambassadors Program"

Last April, State Rep. Norma Hernandez launched the 77th District's first-ever Youth Advisory Council and implemented a participatory budgeting component. \$5,000 in funds were donated towards the youth council by Rep. Hernandez so participating students could have a budget to discuss and decide on how to properly allocate funds towards projects that would be most beneficial to youth in the 77th District. Students from local area high school districts overlapping





with the 77th District convened every month to share their ideas and discuss which were the best projects to select and fund for the coming year.

A winning project from last year's cohort is our new Youth Ambassador Program, which was amongst two selected projects by our young participants. This youth program consists of 10 students who were selected through an application process to become youth ambassadors. Each youth ambassador comes from a high school district that overlaps with the 77th District. These youth ambassadors are split up into cohorts based on township, and each cohort actively participates in attending library, village and board of education meetings. Our monthly meetings serve as a platform for the students to share and discuss their experiences, as well as what they've learned from these meetings.





Rep. Hernandez stated the following, "I'm excited to continue growing this initiative, it provides an opportunity for young people to really understand how local government works. I'm looking forward to seeing how our youth council continues to help build capacity for our young leaders and that they see our office as a safe space to be able to do that."

Cook County United Against Hate Hosts Hate Crime Prevention Panel

Cook County Commissioners Frank J. Aguilar, Scott Britton, Tara Stamps and Maggie Trevor, and River Forest Mayor Catherine Adduci Invited Residents to Learn How Law Enforcement Investigates Hate Crimes and Repairs Communities

On Tuesday, March 12, Cook County Commissioner Frank J. Aguilar joined Commissioner Scott Britton, Commissioner Tara Stamps, Commissioner Maggie Trevor, and River Forest Mayor Catherine Adduct to host a workshop on how hate crimes and hate incidents are handled by Cook County criminal and civil agencies.

The panel featured representatives from Cook County departments, including the Sheriff's Office, State's Attorney, Department of Human Rights and Ethics, and Public Defender. Experts discussed how incidents of hate are investigated, the criteria to determine a crime, the prosecutorial process, and how the county partners to repair victims and communities. Attendees left knowing how they can play an important role in identifying a hate crime and supporting their community, and what we can all do to prevent hate before it becomes a crime.

"These conversations force us to think about how we ensure justice is served for those who experience hate crimes and give residents the tools they need to be leaders in combating hate in their communities," said Commissioner Aguilar. "We cannot do this alone, and so with our partners, we are able to present a united front and be unequivocal that hate has no home in Cook County."

"Our goal is to equip residents with the knowledge to respond to a hate crime should they have the misfortune of witnessing such an event," said Commissioner Britton. "We are living in difficult and emotionally charged times. Education is key. Giving the community the tools to properly report a hate crime, creating awareness of available support services and introducing tactics for disrupting hate in their communities is paramount. Together, we can stand up and say, 'hate is not the answer."



As of Oct. 31, 2023, at least 256 hate crimes had been reported in the Chicago area, far surpassing the 206 reported in the whole of 2022. Hate crimes in every category, which can range from vitriolic graffiti to homicide, have been on the rise over the last 22 years. This comes amid a rise a white nationalism, anti-Asian rhetoric during the pandemic, sweeping anti-LGBTQIA+ rhetoric, and heightened antisemitism and anti-Muslim sentiment.

"Prejudice and hate that leads to violence and other repulsive behavior just because of someone's race, religion, economic status, etc., is completely against what we stand for as a society and will never be accepted," said Sheriff Thomas J. Dart. "Citizens need to be aware of these rights and be assured we are committed to pursuing justice for victims of hate crimes."

"The Cook County State's Attorney's Office is steadfast in its commitment to prosecute those who perpetrate hate crimes, ensuring justice for victims and maintaining the fabric of our diverse community," said State's Attorney Kim Foxx. "As we continue to experience a rise in hate crimes, this panel discussion is a vital step towards educating and empowering our residents to recognize and report hate crimes. By working together we can fight against acts of intolerance and prejudice, and create a safer, more inclusive Cook County where hate has no refuge."

"Enforcing anti-discrimination and harassment laws in Cook County is of the utmost importance," Jennifer King, Esq., director of the Cook County Commission on Human Rights, said. "Cook County Commission on Human Rights works diligently to ensure individuals who experience discrimination and harassment can file a complaint in our jurisdiction or are directed to a peer agency with jurisdiction or a community-based organization for additional support. We are grateful to everyone who is working to make Cook County a welcoming place."

"The Law Office of the Cook County Public Defender is excited to be a part of this discussion and stand together with our counterparts in believing that hate crimes must be eradicated. We look forward to solutions that prioritize community safety and healing," said Cook County Public Defender Sharone R. Mitchell, Jr.

News from Illinois Secretary of State Alexi Giannoulias

Illinoisians Can Now Get Documents Notarized Without Leaving Home

Giannoulias Launches E-Notary Adding New Convenience for Residents & Businesses

Illinois residents will no longer have to notarize documents in person under a new electronic-notary system administered by Secretary of State Alexi Giannoulias' office.

Electronic notarization, or "E-Notary," will radically change the way people use notary services, Giannoulias predicted. Without leaving the home or office, an individual or business can have their documents notarized and signed electronically within minutes.

"In keeping with our ongoing effort to modernize the Secretary of State's Office, É-Notary serves as a game-changer for Illinoisians by now providing a convenient way to notarize documents without leaving their home or office," Giannoulias said. "Enabling commissioned notaries to work virtually makes the process faster and more secure for individuals and businesses alike."

E-Notary allows both the customer and notary to sign with an electronic signature, and to electronically attach both the notarial certificate and notary seal to a document.

In 2021, the Illinois General Assembly passed legislation to allow the secretary of state to implement electronic notarization.

Upon taking office last year, Giannoulias made it a priority to gain state approval of administrative rules, create a new application reflecting the E-Notary requirements, review and approve E-Notary technology platform providers and train staff to process the new E-Notary applications.

Illinois now joins 47 other states that allow electronic notaries to operate.

Although Illinois had allowed remote notarization, it required all parties, (the notaries, signers and witnesses) to be located in Illinois. Additionally, while someone could sign the document remotely by audio-video communication, the notary had to sign the notarized paper document and apply the notary seal in ink. With E-Notary, the document, signing and seal are all electronically applied, dramatically reducing the time it takes to notarize a document. Additionally, while the notary must be present in Illinois, the other parties may be located outside the state.

To find a notary who offers electronic notarization, customers can visit apps.ilsos.gov/notarysearch. Customers will need a computer, phone or other device that supports audio-video communication and a valid form of identification to complete the notarization electronically.

When getting a document notarized, the notary public or electronic notary will:

- Require the customer to personally appear before them via an audio-video communication platform during the notarization.
- Check over the document to ensure its complete and verify the name on the document matches the customer's ID.
- Confirm the identity of the customer by examining their ID.
- Once steps one through three are done, the customer will be permitted to sign the document electronically.
- The notary public will then complete the notarial certificate and affix their seal.

Fees for services vary by provider, but are capped by state law at \$5 for any notarial act and \$25 for any electronic notarial act. All notaries public are required to provide receipts and keep records of the fees they charged for services provided.

The Illinois Secretary of State's Office is highlighting the 60th anniversary of the iconic 1964 Ford Mustang at its annual Vehicle Show in Springfield, Secretary Alexi Giannoulias announced recently.

Giannoulias made the announcement while revealing the Vehicle Show will take place on Saturday, Sept. 7, 10 a.m.-3:30 p.m., in downtown Springfield.

The Do-it-Online Program built on the success of the Skip-the-Line Program, making more services readily accessible online.

"I'm excited to see customers' reactions at the new look and feel of our DMV facilities. The 'One-Stop-Shop' experience tears down silos, revolutionizing how our facilities serve Illinoisans."

At a single service counter, customers can obtain the following services:

- Apply for a REAL ID or a new driver's license or state ID card.
- Renew a driver's license, state ID or Temporary Visitor Driver's License (TVDL).
- Order a new license plate using Pick-A-Plate.
- Register or renew their vehicle registration.
- · Join the Illinois Organ and Tissue Donor Registry.

Drivers services and vehicle services employees at "One-Stop-Shop" DMVs are now cross-trained to provide both sets of services. The office has redesigned customer service counters and signage to create a more logical flow.

The "One-Stop-Shop" experience will be implemented at all new DMV facilities. The office is conducting an assessment of existing facilities and prioritizing the rollout of this new experience.

State Treasurer Michael Frerichs Pushes to Reunite Residents with Unclaimed Property, Missing Money

\$5 Billion Waiting to be Claimed Through I-Cash

Illinois State Treasurer Michael Frerichs likely has missing money for you, your spouse, your business or your favorite charity.

Hundreds of thousands of people have billions of dollars in cash and property they have not claimed under the Illinois State Treasurer's I-Cash Program, which safeguards unclaimed property including unpaid life insurance benefits, forgotten bank accounts and unused rebate cards.

Illinois State Treasurer Frerichs' reminder is part of a statewide digital media, newspaper and direct mail push to reunite residents with more than \$5 billion in unclaimed property. State law requires the Illinois State Treasurer's Office to publish newspaper ads in each of the state's 102 counties every six months and to send letters to residents who have newly reported unclaimed property of \$100 or more.

"It's often a surprise for people to find out they have an overlooked investment account or final paycheck that did not make it to them. We aim to address that oversight, and it's easier than ever to do," Frerichs said. "This money and property belong to the people of Illinois. It should be in their pocketbook rather than the state's safe."

An estimated one-in-four adults in Illinois who search I-Cash find unclaimed property and the average claim is \$1,000. Treasurer Frerichs has returned a record \$1.9 billion in unclaimed property through 1.5 million claims during his tenure after he prioritized changes in technology, efficiency and state law to streamline the process.

Thousands of items are reported and remitted annually to the Illinois State Treasurer's Office and residents are encouraged to check the unclaimed property database twice each year. Set up a reminder on your smart phone's calendar or fire up your computer and do a search when you change your smoke detector batteries every six months. Visit www.illinoistreasurer.gov/ICASH to enter your name and find out if unclaimed property is waiting for you.

"Our great state is a leader in the agricultural industry, thanks to skilled workers, millions of acres of rich farmland and diversity in products," Frerichs said. "The Cream of the Crop competition is designed to inspire students to pick up their cameras and phones, go out and explore, and showcase the beauty of Illinois agriculture."

Top photographs will be chosen in three age-based categories – ages 8-10, 11-14 and 15-18. Each student may submit up to two photos by June 14, 2024. Now in its 12th year, the photo contest offers Illinois students an opportunity to showcase their most innovative or scenic pictures that depict their vision of agriculture in our state. The Cream of the Crop Photo Contest is part of the Illinois State Treasurer's Ag Invest Program. Winning photos will be featured in Ag Invest marketing material and next year's Cream of the Crop calendar, as well as at the 2024 Illinois State Fair.

Ag Invest is one of the nation's largest agricultural linked deposit programs, celebrating 41 years in 2024. It helps hundreds of Illinois farmers and agriculture professionals. The State Treasurer's Office, through Ag Invest, partners with eligible financial institutions to offer farmers and ag businesses operating lines of credit and long-term, low-interest loans which can be used for operating costs, equipment purchases, construction-related expenses and livestock purchases.

Illinois State Treasurer Michael Frerichs Returns Nearly \$20 Million in Missing Money in February

The Illinois State Treasurer's Office returned nearly \$20 million in missing money during February, Illinois Treasurer Michael Frerichs announced recently.

The total includes more than \$17.1 million in cash and interest, and nearly \$2.5 million in stock value. All told, 19,046 claims were paid in February.

"We help Illinois' economy by putting money back in people's pockets," Frerichs said. "Our efforts to improve the efficiency of reuniting people with their missing money are paying off."

Illinois' missing money program – also known as I-CASH – is one of the state's oldest consumer protection initiatives. The Illinois state treasurer is tasked with safeguarding unclaimed property, such as the contents of overlooked safe deposit boxes, unpaid life insurance benefits, forgotten bank accounts and unused rebate cards. Illinois holds more than \$5 billion in unclaimed property.

The Illinois State Treasurer's Office has returned more than \$1.9 billion during Frerichs' time in office. When Frerichs first became treasurer, there were 60,000 claims paid in a year. Today, more than 200,000 claims are paid each year.

So far in 2024, the Treasurer's Office has returned more than \$36.8 million through 44,480 claims. Frerichs completely restructured the missing money process. The Illinois State Treasurer's Office has added electronic claims, eliminated red-tape that slowed small-money claims, and leveraged technology to allow payments to be made without a claim even needing to be filed.

Frerichs also has added a friends and family "share" feature. When visitors to the I-CASH website come across the name of someone they know, they can select the "share" icon and provide the email address of their friend or relative. Frerichs' office then will notify the individual by sending an email that mentions the missing money, along with the name of the friend or relative who spotted it. Then, that individual can start the process of retrieving it.

Illinois is a national leader in the unclaimed property space and is frequently consulted by other states who are reforming their unclaimed property laws, rules and procedures.

The Illinois State Treasurer's Office recommends that people check for missing money at least twice each year. You can check icash.illinoistreasurer.gov to see if missing money is waiting for you.

State Treasurer Michael Frerichs' Bright Start College Savings Plan Named Best in the Nation

Bright Start has been named the nation's Best 529 College Savings Plan for 2024 by *Business Insider*, Illinois State Treasurer Michael Frerichs announced recently. "It's important to note that not all 529 accounts are built the same," *Business Insider* wrote. "The best state 529 plans have low minimum requirements, low fees, diverse investment options and a tax deduction benefit."

State Treasurer Frerichs said he appreciates the recognition for the office's work on Bright Start, which has gone from one of the nation's worst college savings plans before he took office to one of the best.

"We negotiated lower fees for families to help them save more money for college," Frerichs said. "We also updated the program to offer more options for families to invest their college savings dollars. We have boosted enrollment by working every day to convince families that they have the ability to save for the future, no matter the financial pressures they face today."

Bright Start is a college savings plan an individual can open without assistance. It's counterpart, Bright Directions, is a college savings plan an individual can open through a financial advisor. Both are 529 tax-advantaged plans, meaning the investment grows tax-free when used for qualified expenses, such as tuition, housing or books. Funds saved in Bright Start or Bright Directions can be used at thousands of colleges, universities, trade and technical schools.

Business Insider noted that Bright Start offers six target-risk portfolios, 17 individual fund investment portfolios, as well as mutual fund options. The publication also noted that married couples can deduct up to \$20,000 a year in Bright Start contributions, while individuals can deduct up to \$10,000.

The number of accounts and money invested in them has more than doubled since Frerichs first took office in 2015. Together, there are 880,000 accounts with \$18 billion in assets, up from 375,000 accounts with \$7 billion in assets. Since 2015, families have used these accounts to pay for \$5 billion in college expenses.

The *Business Insider* recognition is the latest for Bright Start, which also has been recognized as among the best 529 plans by Morningstar, Forbes and Savingforcollege.com.

In 2022, the College Savings Plans Network, the national network of 529 plans, states and private-sector partners, honored Frerichs with the Distinguished Service Award, its highest honor.

Nicor Gas Reminds Communities to 'Call 811 Before You Dig'

Warmer spring weather provides the perfect timing for outdoor projects. As a part of National Safe Digging Month, Nicor Gas reminded everyone to contact 811 before they begin any digging project. This includes jobs such as mailbox/fence installation, planting trees or putting in a pool. It also applies to professional excavators when performing work such as paving, tunneling or blasting.

Contacting 811 is free. There is no cost to have your underground utility lines marked. It's also a law designed to help to protect both our communities and to ensure the underground utilities stay safe and connected. Nicor Gas offers the following safe digging guidelines:

- Contact 811 Before You Dig: Before starting an outdoor digging project, contact 811 or visit georgia811.com to request having underground utility lines marked at least three days prior to digging.
- Allow the Required Time for Marking: After contacting 811, allow time for the underground utility lines to be marked before digging. The approximate location of the lines will be marked with color-coded spray paint, flags or stakes that correspond to the utility. The natural gas markings will be yellow.
- Respect the Marks: Only use hand digging tools in areas near the utility line markings.
- Excavate Carefully: Make sure the marks remain visible during the project. If the markings are no longer visible, contact 811 to have lines remarked. If a natural gas line is damaged accidentally or the distinctive rotten-egg odor associated with natural gas is present, call 911 or the Nicor Gas 24-hour emergency phone line at 1-888-642-6748 from a safe location.

Nicor Gas maintains more than 34,300 miles of natural gas infrastructure across Northern Illinois. In addition to those lines, there are underground communications, water and sewer lines, and other utility lines. Knowing where underground infrastructure is before you dig helps prevent injuries, property damage and inconvenient service outages.

Loyola Medicine Allergy Count Returns

For more than 20 years, Loyola Medicine's Gottlieb Memorial Hospital has provided the Chicago area with updated allergy counts every weekday during allergy season. This year's official count resumed on Monday, April 1. Allergy sufferers can follow @LoyolaAllergy on X (formerly known as Twitter) or visit loyolamedicine.org/allergy-count for the latest numbers.

Rachna Shah, MD, leads the Loyola Medicine Allergy Count and warns that tree pollen counts are already rising due to the recent unseasonably warm weather. "At the beginning of February, some of my patients started to say, 'I feel like I'm sneezing more, have itchy eyes, a runny nose and drainage in the back of the throat;' all of the symptoms typical of spring allergies. Typically, I don't see maple pollen until maybe mid-April to May. I was already seeing that a few weeks ago."

She advises allergy sufferers to stay informed, "Allergy counts are important to help monitor symptoms and prepare for the day." When pollen levels are high, she recommends people with severe pollen allergies stay indoors, but if that's not practical, "pollen counts are highest before 10 a.m., so try shifting activities to later in the day. And if you do outdoor activities for more than a couple hours, it can be really helpful to come inside, rinse off and change clothes."

In a video at youtube.com (search for "Loyola Medicine Allergy Count"), Dr. Shah explains how the count is performed. Pollen samples are gathered every weekday morning from the roof of Gottlieb Memorial Hospital. Pollen grains and mold spores are collected from a cubic meter air sample and counted under a microscope. The counts include daily numbers for mold, tree, grass and weed pollens.

Spring allergies often cause itchy, watery eyes, a runny nose, sneezing, nasal congestion and post-nasal drip. Difficulty breathing, coughing, wheezing and/or shortness of breath can also be triggered by seasonal allergies.

Allergy season commonly runs from March through the first hard freeze in October. Tree pollen generally begins to rise in late March to April, grass pollen arrives in May and June, while weed pollen is most prevalent in July to August. Ragweed typically peaks from late August to the first frost and mold can strike in damp conditions throughout the season.

ComEd Proposes Discount Program to Reduce Energy Burden for Income-Eligible Customers Income-Based Discount to be Available as Early as 2025, Pending Regulatory Approval

ComEd recently presented a proposal to the Illinois Commerce Commission (ICC) outlining a new Low-Income Discount (LID) Program to help incomeeligible customers manage their energy bills. The proposed program would enable qualifying customers to receive a percentage-based discount on their monthly electric bill determined by income level. Those with household incomes less than or equal to 50% of the federal poverty level (FPL) will receive the greatest discount. However, customers with household incomes up to 300% of the FPL will be still eligible for a discount. ComEd hopes to begin providing discount credits in 2025, pending final approval from the commission.

"ComEd's newly proposed low-income discount program builds upon our longstanding commitment to keep bills affordable for all customers," said Gil Quiniones, president and CEO, ComEd. "Electricity is an essential service and LID will provide a measure of security for households dealing with financial challenges."

ComEd's LID aims to ensure residential customers' energy expense does not exceed more than 3% of household income (or 6% for electric space heat customers). The program will also promote opportunities for low-income households to participate in the ComEd Energy Efficiency Program, which helps customers manage energy use to save money on future energy bills. Since 2008, the award-winning program has helped hundreds of thousands of customers save a total of \$9 billion on their energy bills, as well as a total of 82 million megawatt-hours of electricity, which is enough energy to power more than 9.5 million ComEd customers' homes for one year.

Should ComEd's proposal be approved by the ICC, applications to participate will be available in mid-2025. To make it easy for customers to apply and participate, ComEd proposes to leverage existing relationships with local administrative agencies. Those enrollment pathways include:

- Auto Enrollment: ComEd will automatically enroll in LID those customers who have been enrolled in other income-qualified programs within 12 months from date of implementation. Examples of income-qualified programs include Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP), Percentage of Income Payment Plan (PIPP), Supplemental Arrearage Reduction Program (SARP) and Give-A-Ray, or customers who qualify for past due payment charge and deposit waivers.
- Local Administrative Agencies (LAAs): When applying for LIHEAP or PIPP assistance with LAAs, customers will be able to concurrently apply for ComEd's LID program.

The LID program will build upon ComEd's long history of efforts to expand the options for customers, particularly income-eligible customers, to manage energy bills. Efforts to support families and individuals include bill-assistance options, energy-management programs tailored for income-eligible customers, along with electric vehicle charger and installation rebates reserved for equity-eligible communities.

Imposters and Scams

You Have the Power to Stop Energy Scams

ComEd cares about your safety. We regularly receive reports of individuals posing as ComEd employees. We want to help you be better informed and avoid being the victim of an energy scam or disconnect-related fraud. Be aware, be prepared!

These imposters may contact you and falsely claim that your electric service will be disconnected unless payment is made. They may instruct you to buy a prepaid credit card and call back to a different phone number with the personal identification number (PIN) or other personal information. They also use a tactic called "spoofing" to manipulate the Caller ID displayed phone number so that it appears as a ComEd number.

Tips to Help You Identify Energy Scams

We Will Never Call or Come to Your Home or Business to:

- Threaten to disconnect service.
- Sell you electricity.
- Ask for direct payment or accept payment through a bogus website or via a QR Code, with a prepaid
 cash card, or through a third-party payment app like Cash App, Zelle, Venmo, QuickPay, or cryptocurrency, such as Bitcoin.



- ComEd never collects payments at kiosks that issue prepaid cash cards or cryptocurrency, such as Bitcoin.
- Ask for personal information, such as Social Security number, Tax ID or bank info; we also will not ask for your ComEd account number unless you contact us first to enroll in a program or service.
- · Ask to see your energy bill.

How You Can Recognize a ComEd Employee:

A ComEd field employee may knock on your door if we are unable to access equipment, like our meter or pedestal transformer. You can identify a ComEd employee by:

- Uniform all ComEd field employees wear a uniform with the blue ComEd logo, including a shirt and safety vest.
- ID employees will be wearing a ComEd ID badge with the logo and employee's first name.
- Vehicles all ComEd vehicles are white with a ComEd logo.

ComEd underwent a logo change in 2022, so you may continue to see the red ComEd logo on uniforms, badges and vehicles until it is phased out.

BEWARE! Scammers also may be wearing ComEd clothing and a fake ComEd ID badge. To confirm that someone is really a ComEd employee, simply call 800-EDISON1 (800-334-7661) before engaging with the person. A true ComEd employee is happy to wait while the call is made.

We Also Ask Customers to be Wary About Sharing the Following Information:

• ComEd account number. • Passwords to your accounts. • Information on your last payment. • Social Security number. • A copy of your energy bill.

Different Types of Scams Can Occur at Anytime:

- Telephone and text or smishing scams the scammer is reluctant to answer questions about the business or the offer, or might request that you "confirm your personal information."
- Doorstep criminal scams/In person examples of this can be switching a customer's account/stealing personal info, to walking homeowner into back-vard while accomplice enters home to steal valuables.
- Website/email or phishing scams these scams will take you to a bogus website and involve a request of payment with gift cards, cryptocurrency or banking apps, or QR code.

Please Be Aware of Cyber-Security Threats:

- Carefully review messages originating from outside your organization's network.
- Check the name of the sender and business in the email and make sure it matches the name and business in the email address. Look for bad grammar, spelling mistakes and zeros in place of the letter O.
- If you don't recognize the sender, call the individual or business directly to verify the message is legitimate. Use a phone number from your own records or the company's official website and not the number provided in the email.
- Confirm the contents of the email look legitimate especially when a request can impact your business, such as transferring money.
- Hover over website links before clicking to confirm the legitimacy of the site.

If at any time you are uncomfortable or you feel you are experiencing suspicious behavior, call1-800-EDISON-1 (1-800-334-7661).

Report Phone Scams

Report any suspicious behavior immediately. Call 800-EDISON-1 to report. 
