Dear Neighbors.

The 42nd Taste of Melrose Park is quickly approaching. If the weather is nice the Taste will attract around 100,000 patrons over the upcoming Labor Day weekend. From the minute people arrive at the Taste of Melrose Park, they can tell they are about to experience something special ... 61 booths of culinary delights, three stages offering music to sway and sing along with, and best of all, time to spend laughing and having fun with friends and family.

The Taste provides free parking, offers free trolley service to parking lots scattered around town and does not charge fest goers for any of the entertainment ... we are one of the few festivals who provide these services free of charge.

The Taste of Melrose Park is also the most affordable food festival in Illinois. Every delicious food item costs \$4 or less!

Most importantly, the Taste of Melrose Park donates the net proceeds from the sale of beer and wine to the Melrose Park Sports and Family Benefit Fund, which has raised over \$1.5 million for local charities and organizations. I consider this charitable fund to be one of my proudest achievements as mayor.

People are always amazed how well organized and family affordable our Taste is. What they do not see is the months of preparation that goes into making this yearly festival run like clockwork.

To better understand how this three-day event is pulled together please read on.

The person in charge of the Taste of Melrose Park is Peggy DiFazio, who has held this position for the past 28 years. She is assisted by Lorena Anguiano. Beginning in January, they contact over 400 businesses and individuals to gauge their interest in purchasing one of the sponsorship programs, which range in price from \$500 to \$10,000. The Taste Of Melrose Park is dependent on sponsors to help defray the overhead associated with hosting this event. This year we will have nearly 200 sponsors.

Beginning in February, Peggy starts booking the entertainment. Each year, she tries to bring different musical groups to the main stage located on the football field. She reads reviews on different bands, seeks recommendations from concert goers and personally attends area concerts to decide whether a band meets the criteria needed to perform on the main stage. We are unique in that we hire our entertainment without using a booking

agency, which saves us money. Peggy usually has no problem booking groups since the Taste of Melrose Park has earned a reputation as a must-play event for musicians.

On our smaller Peroni Stage, we feature groups that are crowd favorites from past years. Between the two stages, we will present 13 musical acts in 2024. This number does not include the acts on our Sabor de Mexico Stage, which is still being finalized.

Now on to the real star of the Taste of Melrose Park ... the food! The first Taste of Melrose Park featured 14 food vendors, this year we will have 61 food booths (more than the Taste of Chicago) several of which participated in the very first Taste.

In February, Peggy sends out food booth applications to the previous year participants. The application, along with a deposit, must be in by March 1. If a past vendor decides not to be involved (which is very rare), an application is mailed to the next person on the waiting list.

The only variation of this system is if a vendor drops out due to illness, at which point the next food booth applicant on the waiting list is given that spot, but only for the current year, as we do hold the original vendor's place for the following year. If the original vendor doesn't return then, the replacement vendor will maintain the spot they were given.

The Taste of Melrose Park is unique in that almost all the food booths are family operated using original family recipes. The Missionary Sisters of St. Charles delicious "Sfingi" dessert and steak teriyaki are our biggest sellers.

We also make certain that no two vendors sell the same product. For example, if one booth is selling a pasta dish with meat sauce, then another vendor also selling pasta must make theirs with something like oil and shrimp.

All food vendors are held to strict state and county food-safety standards. A health inspector comes in before the Taste begins to confirm that all food booths are operating properly. If the stringent requirements are met, the food booth is issued a State of Illinois Outdoor Food and Sanitation Certificate. We offer a food sanitation class twice, usually in May, whereupon completion, attendees are issued a Food Safety Certificate that is good for a year.



To preserve the quality of the food offered, the vendors are provided three refrigerator trucks and one freezer truck, which allows them to maintain and quickly retrieve fresh products. The village does not get a percentage of food sales.

The wonderful Taste of Melrose Park experience is possible due to the 400 volunteers who perform a variety of jobs from overseeing the bingo games, to manning the beer stand, to collecting trash, to assisting senior citizens and so many other jobs.

We have a volunteer team that arrives on the grounds 10 days prior to opening night to assist with setting up more than 200 tents, the stages, the fencing, hanging sponsor signage, arranging chairs and tables, and much, much more. Many nights they sleep on-site.

Before the crew sets up the grounds, the Taste team has to lay out where everything needs to be placed. It is like organizing a military operation. Every detail must be considered, such as who gets what size tent and where it's to be placed. What food booth gets skirts and which gets counters. What booth gets side walls and which do not. Who needs water barrels and what tent gets cement blocks that get staked in the grass. Many people have no clue how much work goes into putting up just one tent, let alone 200.

And when the Taste closes each night, Billy Rich (who has been doing this for 42 years) and his hardworking crew go to work preparing the grounds for another day of fest attendees by performing a whole host of jobs. We also hire a private firm to sanitize the grounds each night and all garbage is picked up before we open the next day.

After the Taste's last night, the volunteers tear down the equipment on the grounds and by the next day everything is gone.

In this day and age, security at large events is a concern. Rest assured we have one of the safest festivals held in Illinois. Security is handled through our Police and Homeland Security departments. We have both undercover and uniform police walking through the crowds, we have drones watching from above and we have officers on the roof. We have two ambulances manned by paramedics and a fire truck on-site.

We are required to have dram shop insurance and a liquor license. All the food vendors have to get a certificate of insurance, naming the Taste as additional insured.

We began a carnival 15 years ago for children 12 and under that has proven to be quite successful. We have a deal with the independent amusement firm that provides the rides that no ride will cost more than \$4 and a percentage of the profit will go to the village.

I think what makes us unique is we're family affordable, family friendly and very safe. We have 61 ethnic food items where fest goers can sample a little bit of everything. We have three stages of free continuous entertainment and the senior patrons have an oasis to sit and relax. For my money, there is no better food fest in Illinois than the Taste of Melrose Park thanks to the hard work of Billy, Peggy and their army of volunteers. I also want to thank our residents and businesses who are impacted by the crowds and our generous sponsors.

Village Vehicle Stickers Expired Dec. 31, 2023. 2024-2025 Stickers Can be Purchased at the Village Hall.

Sticker Fee for Passenger Vehicles is \$55 for Two Years (2024-2025). Truck Fees Vary Based on the Type of Class/Plate and Are Good for One Year Only (2024).

Seniors Over 65 Years of Age are Free.

One free two-year sticker for a passenger vehicle or one free one-year sticker for a B-Truck vehicle registered to a person over 65 years in age. Limit one free sticker per household.

If there is a second passenger or B-Truck vehicle registered to a senior in the household, a second senior sticker will be sold for half price (\$15).

Acceptable proof for a senior sticker is a valid driver's license or state ID card.

Vehicle Sticker Fee Details

Sticker fees are as follows: Passenger Plates - \$55 for two years (2024-2025): Senior Citizen – One free per household for two years (2024-2025); Trucks – Good for one year (2024 only).

Overnight Parking Procedures

Approved Vehicles Will Avoid Being Ticketed

The village of Melrose Park has established parking procedures for residents requiring overnight parking availability on village streets near their home.

Residents seeking permission to park any visitor, construction or family emergency vehicles on streets with overnight parking restrictions can visit the Melrose Park Police Department website at mppd.com, download the Melrose Park Police Department Parking Permission Form (under forms), complete all details and then submit it to the MP Police Department Front Desk.

After review, a Police Department supervisor will contact the requestor to notify them of approval or disapproval. The form can only be used for three days per month and is not valid until a supervisor signs off on it.

If approved, the permission will not allow the violation of village ordinances or parking laws. All violators will be ticketed.

Silver Creek Restoration Project

Under the direction of Mayor Ronald M. Serpico, the Village of Melrose Park Public Works employees constructed the Silver Creek Eagles Nest Park. This is a natural preserve that includes a walking path and a pavilion/gazebo, along with a canoe/kayak launch.

Phase 5 and 6 of the Silver Creek Stabilization Project have been completed.

Phase 7 is underway.

This stabilization project restores the natural balance of the creek by restoring the embankment, and bringing back native land-scape and shrubbery along with aquatic habitat. This is an invaluable stream system that provides storm water runoff, flood management and many other benefits for the residents of Melrose Park.



Silver Creek Trail Park

The Silver Creek Trail Park is located off of First Avenue. The trail is centered off the pond between Silver Creek and its tributary, the Des Plaines River. Native plants of this area were once lost to development and are

now being reintroduced to the area. With the help of these native plants, more wildlife is returning to the area – from the Bald Eagle (sighted in the area), the Northern Pike, Red Foxes, Black-Crowned Night Herons and



Cooper's Hawk, to name a few.

Do's and Don'ts While Visiting the Silver Creek Trail Park

- 1. No littering. Please clean up after any activities.
- 2. Pets must be leashed.
- 3. Smoking or fires are prohibited.
- 4. Please clean up pet waste and dispose of it.
- 5. Do not disturb any plants, trees or wildlife.
- 6. No loitering.
- 7. No hunting.
- 8. Fisherman must clean up any cut line, bail containers and all litter.
- 9. Park opens one hour after sunrise and closes one hour before sunset.
- 10. Enjoy the park.



Republic Services Garbage Schedule for Residential Bi-Weekly Pickup

24th Avenue to 11th Avenue – Tuesday and Friday
Winston Park Area – Tuesday and Friday
West Melrose – Tuesday and Friday
North of North Avenue – Tuesday and Friday
Republic Services is contracted to pick up your regular, everyday garbage and household items, such as couches, tables, mattresses, box springs, desks and chairs, etc.

Recycling and yard waste is collected on Tuesdays from April through November and must be placed in a 33-gallon refuse can or biodegradable paper bags. Plastic bags will not be accepted.

All items are to be put out the night before or morning of scheduled garbage pickup.

Winston Park Area and West Melrose – Once garbage has been picked up, garbage container is to be removed from curb line and placed back on resident's property.

The Village of Melrose Park Public Works Department Garbage Pickup Schedule

24th Avenue to 10th Avenue – North Side from Cortez to North Avenue – Monday
24th Avenue to 10th Avenue – South Side from Cortez to Main Street – Tuesday

The village of Melrose Park Public Works Department pickup items include

all household remodeling items (homeowner/self – not contractor), such as kitchen and bathroom cabinets, drywall and cement.

All items are to be put out the night before or before 7 a.m. the morning of scheduled garbage pickup.

Once village trucks have passed and picked up items, the trucks will not pass again.

Any other garbage items are not to be left out and are to be put out for the next scheduled pickup.

This service is for Melrose Park residents in single and two-flat buildings only. Commercial and apartment buildings must use a private scavenger company.



appointments during the hours of 8 a.m.-5 p.m., Monday thru Friday. We are closed on Saturdays and Sundays and all major holidays. To book an appointment or make a cancellation, you must call at least 24 hours in advance.

Policies and Procedures

be made for miscellaneous use such as grocery shopping etc. Anyone using the van for doctor appointments, etc., may use the van up to three times a week.



Public Information Regarding Resident Safety Outdoor Warning System

Melrose Park has a siren warning system at multiple locations throughout the community. The system consists of several sirens strategically located throughout the village and is intended to provide outdoor warning of impending danger. You may only hear the sirens if you are outside. Please review the following information as it explains the function, operation and procedures associated with the Village of Melrose Park Outdoor Warning Siren System.

Warning System Activation

The system is designed to notify the community by alert warning and attack warning signals. the signals are standardized for outdoor warning devices by the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

Alert Warning

An alert warning signal is a three- to five-minute steady siren. This signal is used during a severe weather emergency or funnel cloud sighting. The reporting area includes a 10-mile perimeter around the village. The alert warning signal shall indicate to all persons to "immediately seek shelter, turn on your radio or television and listen for essential emergency information." Please note, severe weather watches are reports of weather conditions in which tornados could occur. The warning system is not activated for severe weather watches.

Attack Warning

An attack warning signal is a three- to five-minute wavering siren. This signal means that an actual attack against the United States has been detected and that the Federal Emergency Broadcast System has been activated. According to federal government guidelines, this signal will be used for no other purpose and will have no other meaning. The use of indoor warning systems is essential, as most residents and businesses will not hear the warning system unless they are outside. An indoor warning system includes commercial broadcast radio, television stations, cable television override systems, tone activated radio receivers and public address systems in public buildings.

Listen for the Siren Testing the First Tuesday of Every Month at 10 a.m.

It is important that the village system be tested on a regular schedule to ensure proper operation and to assist in educating the public to recognize the different warning signals. Testing occurs the first Tuesday of each month at 10 a.m. Federal and state guidelines indicate that monthly warning system tests should occur in the following manner:

- · Alert warning signal (steady siren) will sound for one minute.
- · One minute of silence.
- Attack warning signal (wavering siren) will sound for one minute.

This testing procedure will establish a test pattern different from that used in an actual emergency when the signals are sounded for three to five minutes.

Reactivation

Once it is activated, the warning sirens will not be reactivated for the same incident. The warning sirens will be reactivated for new, confirmed incidents.

All Clear

In keeping with established policies, the village of Melrose Park will not issue the all clear for any alert or attack signals. Please monitor commercial radio and television for further information.

Sheltering In Place

Should I Shelter at Home?

Taking appropriate shelter is critical in times of disaster. Sheltering is appropriate when conditions require that you seek protection in your home, place of employment or other location when disaster strikes. Sheltering outside the hazard area could include staying with friends and relatives, seeking commercial lodging or staying in a mass-care facility operated by disaster relief groups.

To effectively shelter, you must first consider the hazard and then choose a place in your home or other building that is safe for that hazard. For example, for a tornado, a room should be selected that is in a basement or an interior room on the lowest level away from corners, windows, doors and outside walls.

The safest locations to seek shelter vary by hazard. Be Informed about the sheltering suggestions for each hazard.

There may be situations, depending on your circumstances and the nature of the disaster, when it's simply best to stay where you are and avoid any uncertainty outside by sheltering in place.

The length of time you are required to shelter may be short, such as during a tornado warning, or long, such as during a winter storm or a pandemic. It is important that you stay in shelter until local authorities say it is safe to leave. Additionally, you should take turns listening to radio broadcasts and maintain a 24-hour safety watch.

During extended periods of sheltering, you will need to manage water and food supplies to ensure you and your family have the required supplies and quantities. **Guidelines for Staying Put (Sheltering In Place)**

Whether you are at home, work or elsewhere, there may be situations when it's simply best to stay where you are and avoid any uncertainty outside.

There may be circumstances when staying put and creating a barrier between yourself and potentially contaminated air outside, a process known as "sealing the room," is a matter of survival.

Use common sense and available information to assess the situation and determine if there is immediate danger. If you see large amounts of debris in the air, or if local authorities say the air is badly contaminated, you may want to take this kind of action.

The process used to seal the room is considered a temporary protective measure to create a barrier between you and potentially contaminated air outside. It is a type of sheltering in place that requires preplanning.

Additional Sheltering in Place Guidelines

- · Bring your family and pets inside.
- · Lock doors, close windows, air vents and fireplace dampers.
- Turn off fans, air conditioning and forced air heating systems.
- Take your emergency supply kit, unless you have reason to believe it has been contaminated.
- Go into an interior room with few windows, if possible.
- Seal all windows, doors and air vents with 2-4 mil. thick plastic sheeting and duct tape. Consider measuring and cutting the sheeting in advance to save time.
- Cut the plastic sheeting several inches wider than the openings and label each sheet.
- Duct tape plastic at corners first and then tape down all edges.
- · Be prepared to improvise and use what you have on hand to seal gaps so that you create a barrier between yourself and any contamination.
- Local authorities may not immediately be able to provide information on what is happening and what you should do. However, you should watch TV, listen to the radio or check the internet often for official news and instructions as they become available.

Garage Sale Notice

Garage Sales are Back ... It's Time to Sell All Those Treasures

The rules on garage sales held in the village of Melrose Park are as follows:

Garage sales will be held on the third weekend only during the months of May, June,

July, August and September. Sales are to be conducted on Thursday, Friday and Saturday of the designated weekends. No sales are allowed on Sundays.

The remaining dates for 2024 are Sept. 19-21.

Garage sales shall be conducted only during the hours of 9 a.m.-5 p.m.

No permit is needed for garage sales, however the following rules must be followed:

- No garage sales may be conducted in apartment buildings.
- No garage sales in the frontyard, i.e., on the grass.
- All garage sales to be conducted in backyard, garage or on driveway.
- All sale items to be displayed on tables, not on the ground.
- No sale items shall be located and no sale activity shall be conducted in the frontyard area, on the premises of any public sidewalk, parkway area or other public property.
- No sale signs, handbills or other advertising material shall be located or posted upon public parkway or on public property, signs, poles or light poles within the village of Melrose Park.
- Signs advertising the sales shall not exceed 3-by-5 feet and may be located only in the frontyard (private property) of the address having the garage sale, and must be removed immediately after the sale.
- The sale will be conducted without the use of outdoor loud speakers, amplification equipment or illuminated advertising devices.

Any person violating these rules shall be subject to a fine not to exceed \$500. A copy of garage sale rules is available at www.melrosepark.org.


Strengthening Community Ties in Melrose Park with Summer Networking Event

Dominican Literacy Center Continues to Provide English Instruction and More ...

The Dominican Literacy Center originally began in Chicago, at the request of the pastor of Our Lady of Grace Parish in 1996. In 2008, the building housing the center was deemed to need extensive repairs and could not be used. In June of 2008, the center was graciously welcomed to rent a part of Sacred Heart Convent in Melrose Park, where it has continued to provide English instruction for the past 14 years.

The goal of the Dominican Literacy Center is the empowerment of persons who experience personal and economic limitations within our English-speaking society. Through literacy education and personal relationships, we strive to provide a small step toward eliminating racial and cultural prejudice and stereotypes, as well as a step up for persons seeking improvement in their personal, familial and economic abilities.

The Dominican Literacy Center provides weekly one and half hour tutored sessions in which one student meets with one tutor. The center provides tutoring in speaking, reading and writing English, as well as tutoring in preparation for the Citizenship interview and exam. This individualized instruction is provided for immigrant women and men (ages 17+) who are – endeavoring to reduce literacy and its consequential effects of isolation (due to their inability to communicate in English with health care providers, children's teachers, neighbors, co-workers, community leaders and/or first responders); in low-level jobs (due to lack of training or skills, or an inability to demonstrate their already achieved skills and knowledge); powerless to supervise their adolescent children or to influence systemic change; lacking confidence to enroll in traditional classes and or fear of requesting help when needed.

English Classes

English classes are provided for those who want to learn to speak, read or write in English. One student meets with one tutor, once a week.

These classes are offered at the Dominican Literacy Center, 1503 Rice Street, in Melrose Park (near Sacred Heart/St. Eulalia Parish).

Our program also assists persons studying for their Citizenship interview/exam.

We presently offer classes on Monday through Thursday, in the mornings and afternoons.

Proviso Public Partnership Awarded \$500K Grant from Cook County Health

Grant Will Expand In-School Counseling Services

The Proviso Public Partnership (PPP), in collaboration with the Proviso Township Mental Health Commission, is pleased to announce that it is the recipient of grant for nearly half a million dollars from Cook County Health's Stronger Together: Building a

More Equitable Behavioral Health System in Cook County Initiative.

"The PPP currently supports five schools in Proviso Township with counselors that offer behavioral health services for students and this grant will help us reach more Proviso residents," said PPP President Mike Corrigan. "Not only does this program give us the opportunity to support students, but it opens the door to their family and lets them know that we have a wide variety of programs that might benefit other people in their network."

The Proviso Public Partnership was awarded \$499,960.67 for its project titled, The Proviso Comprehensive School Program (PCSP). The program provides school-based behavioral health services within Proviso Township communities, including Maywood, Melrose Park, Northlake, Bellwood,

Hillside and Stone Park. President Corrigan expects that the grant from Cook County Health will help them more than double the number of schools where they provide behavioral health care services.

"The PPP is incredibly grateful to Cook County and the Stronger Together Initiative for their support of our Proviso Comprehensive School Program," said Proviso Public Partnership Director Joe Vasilevski. "We are excited to see where this collaborative partnership takes the PPP and are looking forward to continue serving members of the Proviso community with their behavioral health needs."

The Stronger Together Initiative aims to address behavioral health inequities across the region's system of care through increased systems alignment, enhanced system quality, and the expansion of access to early intervention and prevention, treatment, support, recovery, and crisis assessment and care.

Fifty-three organizations were selected, with applicants that serve communities that score the highest on the Social-Vulnerability Index receiving priority.

This initiative, led by the Office of Behavioral Health at Cook County Health (CCH) is supported by funds from the U.S. Department of Treasury, under the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) allocated to CCH by Cook County Government.

"This initiative highlights how government and other sectors of our community can work together to benefit the greater good," Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle said. "This is a historic opportunity to make meaningful change in Cook County for generations."

"I am grateful to President Preckwinkle, and the Cook County Board of Commissioners for entrusting us as stewards of these funds to help address the broad behavioral health needs we see across Cook County," said Cook County Health Interim CEO Dr. Erik Mikaitis. Rep. Norma Hernandez Hosts End Of Session Town Hall

On Thursday, July 25, Rep. Norma Hernandez held her annual end of session town hall in conjunction with Senate President Don Harmon. Those in attendance consisted of members from our senior community, elected officials and community organizations. The town hall consisted of two portions, a

joint presentation and Q&A session led by both Rep. Hernandez and Senate President Harmon. They reported on the passing of this year's fiscal budget and accomplishments by the General Assembly.

They shared good news like the passing of a responsible balanced budget for the sixth year in a row, the elimination of the bill backlog by paying our bills on time, fully funding our pension obligations and education funding commitments, and having over \$2 billion in the state's Rainy Day Fund.

Key highlights during the joint presentation were local government resources receiving \$1 billion and developmental disabilities services gaining \$2.4 billion. During the Q&A session, residents asked about various topics ranging from the status of the Chicago

Bears' stadium, property tax reform and health insurance access. Other budget items highlighted were the allocation of \$100 million for DCFS and \$350 million for K-12 education, as well as

committing \$10 million to protect against food insecurity.

Rep. Norma Hernandez spoke about protecting Illinois communities and making health care more accessible.

She highlighted important key notes to protect Illinois communities, such as allocating \$45 million for "Reimagine Public Safety" to fund local intervention efforts, as well as enhancing law enforcement by \$30 million statewide for crime prevention to protect against gun violence and community-based violence. Rep. Hernandez emphasized the importance of our youth and highlighted the allocation of \$200 million to summer youth groups and camps to keep children safe and engaged while creating safer communities.

When addressing health care access, Rep. Hernandez emphasized the necessity for affordable medication for seniors and those who rely on daily medication. The efforts made to make health care more accessible.

Rep. Hernandez voiced a list of health care topics she is working on, like banning prior authorization for crisis mental health care, improving network adequacy by addressing the issue of "ghost networks" and ending unchecked rate increases by large group insurance companies.

On the workforce level, Rep. Hernandez addressed the need for a wage increase for caregivers and direct service professionals who care for our most vulnerable population by expanding the hours of availability to current clients through the Community Care Program with the aid of \$159M.

The town hall was a great opportunity for residents to meet with state staff and hear from Rep. Norma Hernandez on matters important to them, as well as to learn more about the various accomplishments throughout the 77th District of Illinois."

Rep. Hernandez Joins State Leaders at O'Hare Press Conference

State Rep. Norma Hernandez joined House Speaker Chris Welch, Senate President Don Harmon and Illinois Gov. JB Pritzker for a press conference at O'Hare International Airport for an announcement from United Airlines led by company President Brett J. Hart.

State leaders highlighted the role that Illinois' SAF tax credits played in bringing sustainable aviation fuel to one of the largest airports in the U.S., as United Airlines is set to purchase 1 million gallons of sustainable aviation fuel, or SAF, at O'Hare International Airport located in the 77th District of Illinois.

Rep. Norma Hernandez stated, "This initiative was made possible through the passing of legislation in the General Assembly and is a step forward in helping make our state more sustainable and creating a more eco-friendly environment."

77th District Youth Engagement Program Updates

The Youth Ambassadors Program aims to provide many opportunities for our youth to connect with local elected officials and community leaders who have made a positive impact in their community. We've had the honor of hosting

Recently, we were honored to welcome Congresswoman Delia C. Ramirez and Senate President Don Harmon, who had the opportunity to share their experiences of serving in government. Youth ambassadors had the opportunity to

meet with them and ask questions about what motivated them as youth to get involved.

Our 77th District Youth Ambassadors Program consists of 10 students from various high schools within our district, including West Leyden High School, East Leyden High School, Proviso Math & Science Academy (PMSA), Addison Trail High School and many others.

These students are divided into cohorts based on township, and each cohort actively participates in attending library, village and board of education meetings. Our youth ambassadors attend local government meetings to learn about the process of passing ordinances and new programs, and to understand the importance of staying informed about community affairs. They meet with our representative once a month to provide updates on these meetings, offering a learning opportunity for our youth and allowing the representative to hear their perspectives on what's occurring in the district.

The Youth Ambassadors Program serves as a platform for the students within the 77th District. Through engagement with individuals like Congresswoman Delia C. Ramirez and Senate President Don Harmon, our youth gain knowledge of civic responsibility and community

leadership. Their participation in various municipal meetings and interactions with our representatives not only empowers them, but also strengthens relationships within our community. We are proud of the progress our ambassadors have made and remain committed to expanding youth programs and opportunities in our district.



16th District Organizations Receive Over \$2.3 Million in Starting Block Grants

Nine organizations that work with communities and residents within Cook County's 16th District received \$857,900 in grant funding through the second round of Cook County's Starting Block Grant initiative. In total, 24 16th District organizations received \$2,317,640 in grant funding through the first and second rounds of Starting Block Grants, with \$1,459,740 distributed to 15 organizations in the first round and \$857,900 distributed to nine organizations in the second round.

"Throughout the 16th District, countless community organizations are doing incredible work for our residents," said Cook County Commissioner Frank J. Aguilar. "These organizations know their communities, where the need is, and are in constant communications with residents and local stakeholders. I am

so thrilled to see this funding go to the 16th District to help these organizations continue to do important work." The grant initiative is primarily funded through the Cook County Equity Special Purpose Fund, created to address historic



"Cook County has long recognized the impact community-based organizations have in the lives of individuals and the vital role they play in communities, particularly those that have been historically underserved," said Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle. "Despite being key stakeholders that advance the health, safety and economic success of residents and communities, funding for these organizations to address key operational needs has been limited. We are proud that the Starting Block Grant initiative fills this critical gap and will help many nonprofit organizations achieve greater stability now, and for the future."

The grant initiative aims to increase equity in grantmaking in Cook County by supporting the individualized capacity building efforts of nonprofit organizations with annual operating budgets under \$1 million. The initiative, funded by the Cook County Equity Special Purpose Fund and the Cook County Justice Advisory Council (JAC), recognizes that smaller and grassroots organizations play important roles in communities, but often face barriers to securing consistent funding or meeting goals for growth.



"The Starting Block Grant initiative was designed in response to feedback and observation that many smaller community organizations are held back by operational limitations or lack the funding to meet meaningful goals that are just out of reach", said Avik Das, executive director of the JAC. "We see these organizations doing incredibly impactful work in communities with

limited resources and support. Starting Block Grants are an investment in their long-term sustainability and success, designed to help them innovate and thrive in a changing world and ultimately serve the community at a higher level."

Loyola Medicine, Cook County and Undue Medical Debt Partner to Abolish More Than \$112 Million in Medical Debt

Lovola Medicine. Undue Medical Debt, a national nonprofit, and Cook County's Medical Debt Relief Initiative (MDRI), have reached an agreement that will result in the erasure of \$112.12 million worth of non-Medicare/Medicaid medical debt for Loyola's patients in 2024.

In the Catholic Jesuit tradition, Loyola is committed to providing health care services to all patients. With a commitment to patients and communities, Loyola has partnered with Undue Medical Debt, to examine and acquire accounts for erasure that are over two years old, with individuals making at or below 400% of the federal poverty level or medical debt representing more than 5% of an individual's annual household income. More than 60,000 Loyola patients qualified for medical debt relief. Undue Medical Debt branded envelopes will arrive in the mail to those benefiting from medical debt relief.

"When individuals and their loved ones face medical issues, getting healthy should be the top priority," said Commissioner Frank J. Aguilar. "This initiative will allow for people who are unable to pay their medical bills another chance to live their lives fully. This is a targeted approach to those who need help the most, and will give individuals more money to save for their future and participate in the economy. Thank you to our health partners and Cook County everywhere for making this life-changing initiative a reality."

Cook County's Medical Debt Relief Initiative (MDRI) was a significant contributor to this partnership, with over 44,000 beneficiaries receiving nearly \$80.5 million of medical debt relief through the Loyola partnership. Since the program's launch in 2022, Cook County's MDRI has now abolished over \$382 million in medical debt for more than 213,000 Cook County residents.

"Cook County is committed to alleviating the burden of medical debt on our residents," said Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle. "Through the Medical Debt Relief Initiative, we have been able to provide substantial financial relief to over 213,000 individuals, including more than 44,000 through our partnership with Loyola Medicine. Today represents a critical step in our ongoing efforts to promote economic stability and health equity across Cook County communities."

Undue Medical Debt is a nonprofit that acquires medical debts belonging to individuals who are financially burdened and then abolishes those debts. Medical debt relief cannot be requested and is source-based, meaning Undue can abolish debts only for past-due accounts belonging to provider partners like Loyola Medicine. Undue has two criteria for relief: individual or family income cannot be more than four times the federal poverty level and/or the individual's medical debt must be 5% or more of that person's gross annual income.

Loyola does not sell medical debt and never reports medical debt to credit bureaus or sends accounts to collections. Loyola is committed to working with patients to ensure they have sustainable health coverage; its financial counseling team helps patients navigate all public and private health coverage options.

In 2024, the federal poverty guideline is \$15,060 a year for an individual plus \$5,380 for each additional family member. "Working directly with providers like Loyola Medicine is an amazing win-win-win scenario," said Undue Medical Debt President and CEO Allison Sesso. "Our valued hospital partner is compensated for some of the care it provided (without having to sell accounts to a debt collector), patients are relieved of the financial and emotional burden of debt they can't pay, and communities are uplifted as a result."

"Our unwavering commitment to care for the whole person – body, mind and spirit – drives us," asserted Shawn Vincent, president and CEO of Loyola Medicine. "We understand that medical debt can be a daunting challenge for our patients. Our partnership with Undue and Cook County's Medical Debt Relief Initiative empowers us to relieve our patients of their medical debt to Loyola Medicine while simultaneously recovering a portion of that debt. This enables us to continue providing exceptional care to our patients and communities in a confident, responsible and sustainable manner."

Illinois Streamlines Notary Public Application Process

Giannoulias Encourages Illinoisans to Sign Up Online

Illinois residents interested in becoming notary publics can now apply online as of Aug. 1, Secretary of State Alexi Giannoulias announced recently. The program builds on the new Electronic Notary System administered by the Secretary of State's Office that launched in April as part of its effort to modernize operations.

"Modernizing the notary process in Illinois has made it easier for customers who want to notarize documents without having to leave their home, but we've also streamlined the process for prospective notaries and those renewing," Giannoulias said. "Applicants are no longer required to submit paper forms, eliminating the cumbersome paper-based submission process and reducing processing times."

There are currently 148,059 notaries public and nearly 600 who are also electronic notaries public commissioned in Illinois.

As part of the new system, anyone wishing to become a notary must submit their application and current notaries must renew their registrations online.

For online applications, applicants must be Illinois residents and will need:

- · A valid Illinois driver's license or ID card.
- An electronic copy of their Notary Public Study Course Completion Certificate from an approved study course provider.
- An electronic copy of their completed form I 263 or I 264 (Notary Public Bond), signed and certified by a qualified surety bond company.

Current notary publics who are also adding an electronic notary designation will need:

- An electronic copy of their electronic signature that was approved by their electronic notarization system provider.
- The name of their electronic notarization system provider.

"This iconic car show has left an indelible mark on automotive history, embodying the spirit of ingenuity and craftsmanship. Owners that wish to display their vehicle at the annual show must pre-register by Aug. 30. Giannoulias Announces First-Ever Illinois DMV+, Melrose Park DMV Offers Additional Services and One-Stop-Shop Efficiencies

Illinois Secretary of State Alexi Giannoulias' Office has transformed its Melrose Park facility into a DMV+ and "One-Stop-Shop" design, offering new services and reduced wait times.

The Melrose Park location marks the first DMV+ facility, which includes Secretary of State services that have never been accessible at an Illinois DMV location. These include specialized services from its Business, Index and Personnel Departments that would otherwise require an in-person visit to a Secretary of State's Office located in downtown Chicago or Springfield.

In addition, the DMV+ also includes a One-Stop-Shop design that combines both driver's and vehicle services, allowing customers to access service at a single customer service counter and reducing the number of steps to create a more intuitive flow. It also frees up space for additional service stations and appointments to accommodate more customers.

"Our continued effort to modernize the office allows us to not only create efficiencies, but also to reimagine the services we can provide and come up with innovative ways to meet customers' needs," Giannoulias said. "A DMV+ brings more services directly to our customers and their communities, and doesn't require them to spend valuable time traveling downtown or to Springfield."

"This will make it easier for customers to get vehicle stickers or renew their licenses, all while helping local businesses," said Senate President Don Harmon (39th Senate District – Oak Park). "Convenient, efficient customer service is always the goal."

"I'm thrilled our community is the first in the state to have DMV+ services that makes it faster to process driving and vehicle transactions and promotes employment opportunities and supports our businesses," said State Rep. Norma Hernandez (77th District – Melrose Park). "Now residents can skip the trip by not needing to travel downtown for in-person services."

"This upgraded DMV will help our community get the services they need without wasting their time waiting in line," said Melrose Park Mayor Ron Serpico Sr. "The impact will be significant and noticeable for not only Melrose Park residents and families who have busy schedules, but for those living in nearby communities."

Prior to its redesign, the Melrose Park DMV was already one of 44 designated facilities statewide that was part of the the Secretary of State's Skip-the-Line Program introduced last fall, which requires residents to schedule an appointment for in-person visits at its busiest DMVs.

The new services offered in a DMV+ facility include:

- Business Services: In-person expedited services; obtaining certified copies of business records; filing documents, including articles of incorporation and amendments for corporations and various types of LLCs; filing reinstatements to return their business to good standing; and filing trademarks with ILSOS. These services currently require customers to visit the Business Services Office in Chicago or Springfield, or to conduct their transaction through the mail, which delays processing time.
- Index Services: Walk-in service for customers obtaining apostilles and certificates of authority for foreign use documents. Due to the sensitive nature of the documents being certified, customers must provide physical original copies and services are not offered digitally.

 Customers are currently required to visit the Index Department in Chicago or Springfield or mail their documents to the office. The DMV+ offers on-site processing and certification.
- Personnel Services: Employment testing required for most entry-level and all DMV employees. Currently, prospective employees must travel to Chicago or Springfield for in-person testing. The office will also offer a hub of public-use computers for those with limited access or need assistance to submit job applications.

One-Stop-Shop

The Melrose Park DMV is the first DMV+ and marks the fifth Secretary of State facility to complete the One-Stop-Shop upgrade.

The One-Stop-Shop renovation will allow customers to access service at a single customer service counter and will include updated signage to create a more logical, intuitive flow, making the DMV process more efficient and allowing for expanded services.

As a part of the Secretary of State's ongoing modernization efforts, the new DMV experience will save customers considerable time and several steps by offering both vehicle and driver services at a single-service counter.

Driver services and vehicle services employees at "One-Stop-Shop" DMVs are now cross-trained to provide both sets of services.

At a single service counter, customers will be able to obtain the following services – renew a driver's license or state ID; apply for a REAL ID; register or renew a vehicle registration/obtain vehicle stickers; convert a Temporary Visitor Driver's License (TVDL) to a Standard DL; order a new license plate; register to vote; and join the Illinois Organ and Tissue Donor Registry.

Illinois State Treasurer Michael Frerichs' Plan to Allow Leftover College Savings Funds to Be Used For Retirement Signed Into Law

Frerichs Thanks Governor, Lawmakers for Bipartisan Approval

Parents who don't use all the money in their Illinois 529 College Savings Accounts (Bright Start and Bright Directions) are now able to roll over the funds into a Roth IRA under Illinois Treasurer Michael Frerichs' plan that was signed into law.

"This will give parents another option when deciding what to do with the money they've saved for their children if they don't use all of it," said Treasurer Frerichs, who thanked Gov. JB Pritzker for signing the legislation, and State Sen. Steve Stadelman and State Rep. Diane Blair-Sherlock for sponsoring it. "A common question we get from parents is what they can do with their Illinois 529 money if their child doesn't go to college or gets a scholarship and there is money left over in the account, and we have good news to share with them."

The option is possible because Congress approved a measure in December 2022 changing Section 529 of the Internal Revenue Code to authorize taxand penalty-free rollovers from college savings plans to Roth IRAs, with some limitations. The measure took effect on Jan. 1, 2024.

To take effect in Illinois, however, lawmakers needed to change state law to allow the Roth IRA rollover option for Bright Start and Bright Directions 529 college savings account owners.

"We are pleased to be able to tell families who are responsibly saving for their children's future education that any unused funds can now be used to help start saving for their child's retirement without penalty," said Blair-Sherlock of Villa Park.

"We worked together to approve this common-sense change that will help families who open college savings accounts for their children," said Stadelman, whose district includes Rockford.

State law already allows parents to leave leftover money in a Bright Start account for future use by another family member going to college or roll over the money into an Illinois ABLE account. The money also can be taken out as a nonqualified withdrawal, but there are tax implications and people are encouraged to consult a tax professional.

The federal law set some limitations on college savings rollovers, including a \$35,000 lifetime limit on transfers, which also are subject to annual Roth IRA contribution limits (this year they are \$7,000 for people under 50). In addition, rollovers must be made to the college savings account beneficiary and not the owner. And rollovers only can be made from 529 accounts that have been active for 15 years and no contributions or investment earnings in the last five years are eligible for rollover.

Treasurer Frerichs Makes Record \$130 Million in Investment Earnings for State Portfolio During May

\$90.9 Million Earned for Cities and School Districts Through Illinois Funds

The State Treasurer's Office made a record \$130.1 million in investment earnings from the state investment portfolio in May, Illinois Treasurer Michael Frerichs announced recently.

Treasurer Frerichs is the state's chief investment and banking officer. He is responsible for investing state revenue in the state investment portfolio. So far in Fiscal Year 2024, Frerichs' Office has earned more than \$1.3 billion for the state portfolio.

"Every dollar we earn in interest is a dollar that lawmakers don't have to raise in taxes," Frerichs said. "The State Treasurer's Office cannot solve all of our problems, but we can be part of the solution."

Also in May, nearly \$90.9 million in gross investment earnings was earned for cities, villages, school districts, counties and other units of government that take part in the highly rated Illinois Funds local government investment pool the State Treasurer's Office operates. So far in Fiscal Year 2024, the office has earned more than \$973.6 million for the Illinois Funds, which has received the highest rating of AAA from Fitch, a national credit ratings agency.

Illinois Treasurer Michael Frerichs Returns Purple Heart Medal to Family of Pearl Harbor Veteran

11th Medal Returned Under Frerichs' Operation Purple Heart

Ahead of the Independence Day holiday, Illinois State Treasurer Michael Frerichs returned a missing Purple Heart medal to the family of a late Army Air Corps veteran from Park Ridge.

The medal, given to those wounded or killed in military combat, belonged to Jerome Even, who served in the U.S. Army Air Corps and rose to the rank of master sergeant. Mr. Even put the medal in a bank safe deposit box. He died in April 2014 at age 92 and the contents of the safe deposit box ended

up at the State Treasurer's Office, which works to reunite people with unclaimed property.

"Jerome Even was a true hero, part of the greatest generation, who bravely served his country at such a crucial time in our nation's history," Treasurer Frerichs said. "We honor his sacrifice. I am grateful we returned his Purple Heart to his family, where it belongs."

The medal was returned as a result of Operation Purple Heart, an unprecedented mission to return Purple Heart medals to their rightful owners. In May, Treasurer Frerichs unveiled a web page listing Purple Heart medals the Treasurer's Office is seeking to return.



Jim Even, one of Jerome Even's sons, said about a dozen people who had seen coverage of Treasurer Frerichs' news conference reached out to him asking if the medal might belong to his family.

"I said, 'Oh my goodness.' I didn't know he had anything left in that safe deposit box. It was a shock. We were very surprised and happy," said Jim Even, who then contacted the State Treasurer's Unclaimed Property Team. "The people there are just wonderful and just walked me through everything with the forms. I couldn't wait to share this whole story with my siblings when we all got together."

Master Sergeant Even was awarded the Purple Heart by Headquarters, 7th Bombardment Group on Feb. 3, 1942, according to military paperwork in the safe deposit box. Jim Even said his father told him the Purple Heart was earned during the Dec. 7, 1941, attack on Pearl Harbor.

"My recollection is that he was doing guard duty overnight. He and his fellow soldiers saw planes flying over the island going toward the harbor that had rising suns on the tail, which was the Japanese Zeros insignia," Jim Even said his father told him.

"Bombs started falling and he realized, 'Oh my gosh, this is for real.' He went into the barracks where he was guarding the officers. He said, 'Air raid,' and they didn't hear it because it was from far away and the sound hadn't traveled. They didn't believe him and started throwing shoes at him. And then a bomb hit close and everyone ran for shelter. And that's how he was wounded in the back of his leg during the bombing," Even said his father told him.

Jim Even said he found letters from his grandmother to his father from Dec. 8 and Dec. 12 asking if her son was alive. His father didn't get the letters until a week later and he was able to telegraph that he was OK.

Master Sergeant Even also earned numerous other awards during World War II, including an Air Medal, Good Conduct Ribbon and the Asiatic Pacific Campaign Ribbon with four battle stars.

Treasurer Frerichs has now returned 11 Purple Heart medals to their rightful owners, the most by any administration in Illinois, but there is still more work to be done

"Our ask is simple. If you recognize a name, then reach out to them or their family because maybe we have their Purple Heart," Frerichs said. "You also can reach my office through operation purple heart.org."

Military medals are among the most difficult items to return because neither the armed forces nor the federal government maintains a comprehensive list of awardees.

A thorough vetting of inquiries will occur once an electronic claim is made at icash.illinoistreasurer.gov.

ComEd Joins YMCA and Goodwill to Graduate 89 Local Teens from Summer Job Training Program

ComEd's CONSTRUCT Youth Academy Expands in Second Year to Prepare More Area Youth for Roles in the Growing Clean Energy Field

On July 26, ComEd, the YMCA of Metropolitan Chicago and Goodwill Greater Milwaukee & Chicago hosted a graduation event for 89 teens who have completed summer job training that prepared them for emerging career opportunities in the clean energy and construction fields.

Through the CONSTRUCT Youth Academy Program, ComEd and its partner agencies are expanding access to training for local teens interested in careers in the fast-growing energy sector. Expanding training for local youth and job seekers is critical to preparing communities for the expected future job growth, with a recent study finding that the clean energy transition could add as many as 150,000 jobs in Illinois by 2050.



"With the clean energy transition set to create thousands of jobs in the years ahead, programs like CONSTRUCT Youth Academy are essential to creating pathways for more diverse local youth to join the utility field and to prepare our communities for a cleaner energy future," said Melissa Washington, senior vice president of Customer Operations and Strategic Initiatives at ComEd. "Through collaboration with incredible partners at the YMCA, Goodwill and numerous other agencies in the region, ComEd is expanding training programs to expose the next generation of leaders to knowledge and technology needed to unlock good-paying jobs in our fast-growing field."

During the three-week program, rising high school juniors and seniors learn about the wide range of careers in energy, from entry-level craft positions to roles in STEM, engineering and more. Students also have the chance to connect with industry leaders, visit ComEd training facilities and receive demonstrations on the latest technologies used by the energy company, like drones and electric vehicles.

ComEd launched the CONSTRUCT Youth Academy last year as part of its plan to build a pipeline of skilled and diverse talent needed to meet the evolving demand for clean energy and strengthen our power infrastructure in the face of increasingly severe weather tied to climate change. In partnership with the local YMCA and Goodwill, ComEd expanded training to five sites in Chicago, including a new site in Palatine. This allowed for a significant expansion of the program this year, up from 21 participants last year. Reflecting the diversity of ComEd's service territory, over 95% of program participants are people of color and a quarter of them are girls.

"There is no greater privilege than to empower young people to envision a future that they otherwise may never envision for themselves," said Martina "Tina" Hone, chief economic inclusion & equity officer, YMCA of Metropolitan Chicago. "The CONSTRUCT Youth Academy provided that opportunity to dozens of young people this summer, and our team is incredibly grateful to have been able to deliver this program at the YMCA again this year, alongside our phenomenal partners at ComEd and Goodwill."

This year, students participated in a community service event assembling dressers for people in need. Two participants from last year's cohort also served as mentors throughout the program, providing the opportunity to develop their leadership skills while offering support to those who are now in their shoes. The CONSTRUCT Youth Academy is set to return next summer with applications to open in the spring.

"At Goodwill, we are committed to joining partners like ComEd and the YMCA of Metropolitan Chicago to open the door to opportunities for young Chicagoans," said Clayton Pryor, chief mission officer, Goodwill Greater Milwaukee & Chicago. "We are proud to be part of this effort by providing an additional program access point and skills training that empowers students to confidently enter a STEM or trade-focused career following graduation. We look forward to continuing helping this next generation of changemakers unlock their potential and build a foundation for continued success, career advancement and self-sufficiency."

"This program opened my eyes to new possibilities," said Gabriel Gaytan, Jr., CONSTRUCT Youth Academy graduate. "During the program, I decided I want a future job at ComEd, but every time we would learn about a new career I would change my mind about what I wanted to do. I can't remember the last time I was this excited about the future."

CONSTRUCT Youth Academy builds on the award-winning CONSTRUCT Infrastructure Academy, ComEd's premier workforce development program for adults looking to gain the skills needed for entry-level roles in construction and the utilities. To date, the program has graduated nearly 900 residents, with a majority of participants from diverse communities and a more than 70% job placement rate.

The CONSTRUCT Youth Academy Program is one example of ComEd's expanding STEM education and workforce development programs, which last year reached more than 2,000 local residents. In partnership with agencies and community organizations across the region, ComEd is expanding training opportunities for local youth and residents to help prepare for expected talent needs in the years ahead. ComEd Reaches 1 Gigawatt Milestone for Distributed Solar

More than 59,000 DER Interconnected to Smart Grid, Rooftop Solar Drives Growth

Solar energy is shining brighter than ever in northern Illinois as ComEd today announced that it has interconnected more than 1 gigawatt of distributed energy resource (DER) capacity to the ComEd grid, including 57,780 residential rooftop solar systems. The more than 59,000 DER on the ComEd smart grid include 1,582 commercial systems, 118 community solar farms, 23 industrial and two utility scale projects helping to place Illinois first among Midwestern states based on DER and second for total capacity, according to the Solar Energy Industry Association.

"Achieving the 1-gigawatt milestone for DER reflects progress with the adoption of distributed energy resources and our commitment to helping residential, commercial and industrial customers take full advantage of the benefits of solar energy," said Scott Vogt, vice president of Strategy and Energy Policy at ComEd. "With available state and federal incentives, this is a great time to go solar and we are here to help customers every step of the way."

"For ComEd to reach 1 gigawatt of distributed energy resources on its system illustrates the positive impact that our equitable energy policies are making in Illinois, and the importance of transparency and open communication between utilities and the developer community, and strong customer education," said Brian Granahan, director of the Illinois Power Agency. "Everyone benefits from solar energy, so it's important to work together in support of achieving our state's renewable energy goals."

Over the past five years, ComEd has supported 114% annual growth in DER for residential customers and 25% annual growth for C&I customers. Community solar has grown more than 4,000% since the first project was placed into service in the ComEd service territory in 2019. A gigawatt is equal to 1,000 megawatts (MW), or 1 billion watts, which is equivalent to about 3.12 million photovoltaic panels, 431 utility scale wind turbines and 100 million LED light bulbs.

Through May of this year, ComEd has received a record volume of 8,273 new interconnection applications and completed 5,073 systems totaling 95.76 MW of capacity, demonstrating the positive impact of climate legislation in Illinois and growing consumer interest in managing energy bills and reducing their carbon footprint with solar energy.

ComEd expects that DER capacity will increase to over 1,900 MW by 2025 and to more than 3,600 MW by 2030, or enough energy to power approximately 120,000 homes for one year. In addition to solar resources, DER technologies also include assets that can help balance and control demand on the grid, such as battery storage and batteries in electric vehicles used to export power back to the grid.

For customers with overly shady roofs or who rent or live in a multi-family dwelling, community solar may be a better option than private residential solar panels. Community solar participants subscribe to a large solar energy project owned by an independent developer and earn credits on their monthly ComEd bills for their portion of the electricity produced by the project. By the end of this year, ComEd expects to have more than 150 community solar projects interconnected to its distribution system serving a total of about 40,000 customers.

Rebate programs are available to commercial and residential renewable energy facilities. The rebate is valued at up to \$300 per kilowatt for an eligible distributed generation facility, such as rooftop solar, and a rebate of up to \$300 per kilowatt-hour for an associated energy storage device.

The multi-year grid and rate plans that ComEd filed with the Illinois Commerce Commission (ICC) outline the proposed investments required to support this rapid expansion of renewable energy and help ensure equitable access to the benefits of clean energy under the Climate and Equitable Jobs Act. The plans align with ComEd 2030, the company's vision for a carbon-free energy future that will benefit all communities and meet customers' changing needs for the rest of this decade and beyond.
