A Message From Mayor Ronald M. Serpico

If you have never witnessed the solemn Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Feast Sunday Procession, I highly recommend viewing this event on July 13!

There was a time when people in the Chicago area would hear Melrose Park and immediately think of the Feast of Our Lady of Mount Carmel. This festival, which began in 1894, is the longest-running religious festival in the Chicago area. The Feast, as it is commonly known, will celebrate its 132nd anniversary this year from July 4-13.

On Feb. 20, 1894, the "Società di Signore Italiane di Maria Santissima del Carmine" was founded by women primarily from Laurenzana, Italy. The purpose of this society was to establish a "Festa Della Madonna," similar to one celebrated in their hometown in Italy.

Emanuella DeStefano, their leader, embodied the group's enthusiasm. When her husband fell ill, Emanuella made a vow that if he recovered, she would establish the Feast of Our Lady of Mount Carmel as a gesture of gratitude for his return to health.

The first Feast was celebrated on July 16, 1894, at the DeStefano farm on 25th and North Avenues. Hundreds of newly arrived Italian immigrants attended to honor a statue commissioned by Emanuella, a replica of the famous statue of Our Lady of Mount Carmel, venerated for centuries in Laurenzana.

In September 1905, Rev. Benjamin Franch arrived in Melrose Park to develop a new parish.

The development of the new parish required a careful management of the Feast. Emanuella donated the statue she cherished to the parish. Father Franch continued to serve at Mount Carmel until his

death nearly 50 years later.

In 1906, Father Franch founded the "Congregazione Parrocchiale Maria SS Del Monte Carmelo" to raise funds for a new church. This group also helped organize the Feast, serving as a prototype for what would later

become the Feast Committee. By 1908, a new, larger and more beautiful church was constructed to accommodate the growing number of Feast devotees.

The Feast is celebrated on the closest date to Our Lady's Day, which falls on July 16. Traditions have developed over time; on Thursday evening before the Feast, a marching band serenades the Virgin and parades through the parish. On Saturday evening, they perform again in front of the church and conclude with a concert.

Visitors from outside the area would start arriving in Melrose Park early on the Sunday morning of the procession. Many would set up temporary camps on the lawns of homes along the procession route.

Fireworks marked the Madonna's exit from the church after the Solemn High Mass. In 1926, Father Franch commissioned an Italian woodcarver to create a beautiful canopy still in use today.

On Sunday, thousands would march behind the statue of Mary. The procession journeyed south on 24th Avenue to Main Street, then returned north on 23rd Avenue to the church. In the evening, another band concert, the crowning of the Queen of the Fiesta and magnificent fireworks would conclude the Feast.

By 1925, the growing number of groups marching in front of the statue necessitated the appointment of a grand marshal to organize the procession. Sebastian Lorenzo was appointed grand marshal in 1930 and served for 40 years.

Since 1925, decorative illuminated arches have been installed over 23rd Avenue from Lake Street to Cortez Street. The committee that year also decided to serve food and drinks, as well as provide entertainment for the children.

In 1944, the Golden Jubilee of the Feast was celebrated. To commemorate this occasion, the committee purchased a new crown for the statue. An outdoor altar was built near 25th and Augusta for a Field Mass due to the expected large crowd, a tradition that continued until 1981.

In 1966, the old church was demolished. The new church was dedicated in 1968, featuring an intimate chapel for Our Lady near the entrance.

To celebrate the 75th anniversary of the Feast in 1969, Father Adam Torresan arranged for an Italian jeweler to create new crowns for the statue using gold and gems from votive offerings. After the Field Mass, Father Adam crowned the statue with the latest 18K gold crowns.

Many former residents still return each year to join in the Feast and the procession, as my family has done since I was a child. Even though Melrose Park's demographics have changed, the Feast of Our Lady of Mount Carmel will continue to be an enduring part of Melrose Park's heritage.

If you have never witnessed the solemn Sunday Procession, I highly recommend viewing this event on July 13, an event so deeply ingrained in Melrose Park's fabric.

Village of Melrose Park Vehicle Sticker Information

All vehicles registered in the village of Melrose Park are required to display a current year Melrose Park vehicle sticker. Stickers must be renewed every two years and must be displayed on or before Jan. 1 of the applicable year. They are valid from Jan. 1 through Dec. 31 of the following year.

Who Needs a Sticker?

- All vehicles registered to a Melrose Park address.
- All vehicles registered to businesses located in Melrose Park.
- You must buy a sticker within 30 days of moving into the village or purchasing a vehicle.

Vehicle Sticker Fees

Passenger Cars (Regular Vehicles)

· Covers two years if purchased on time.

Seniors (Age 65+)

- · Covers two years if purchased on time.
- One free sticker per household (65 and older).
 - Choose one free two-year passenger car sticker or one free oneyear B-truck sticker.
- Second vehicle for a senior in the same household is \$15 (half price).
- Bring a valid driver's license or state ID as proof of age to receive your sticker.

Dear Deputy Police Chief Anthony Greco ...

On April 21, 2025, I learned that a Forest Park Police Department communications clerk committed a theft of currency from a found wallet that was turned into the Police Department by a citizen. This accusation was backed by security video evidence.

I initiated an internal investigation, but also wanted to pursue criminal charges against the communications clerk so I had our detectives open a criminal investigation. Consulting with the Cook County State's Attorney's Office, our detectives were advised to have an outside agency conduct the criminal investigation since the suspect was a Forest Park Police Department employee.

Our detectives contacted the Melrose Park Police Department and you agreed to have your investigators look into the apparent wrongdoing by our communications clerk. Det. Jose Velazquez #17 and Det. Jessica Ortiz #49 were assigned to assist our agency.

I want to thank you for allowing Det. Velazquez and Det. Ortiz to assist us. The detectives were a great help and extremely professional. Ultimately, they closed their case in an extremely timely manner and the communications clerk was charged with one count of official misconduct on April 29, 2025. The time they took to investigate this matter is appreciated.

Keep a 3-foot safe zone around your grill. This will keep kids and pets safe.






Keep an eye on your grill, fire pit or patio torches. Don't walk away from them when they are lit.

A QUICK NOTE TO UPDATE WEEKEND PARKING RULES

As of April 1, 2025, parking is permitted on both sides of the street on weekends (Friday, 5 p.m.-Monday, 9 a.m.) until Dec 1, 2025.

These hours do not include the Winston Park and West Melrose areas.

REMEMBER, PARKING IS NEVER ALLOWED ON EAST AND WEST STREETS — 2-6 A.M.

Melrose Park Police Department Reminds Residents of New Overnight Parking Program

The village of Melrose Park ordinance 10.44.080 states that parking is prohibited during certain hours on certain streets. It is unlawful, during the hours of 2 a.m. and 6 a.m., for any motor vehicle to be parked on any and all of the following streets:

- a) From Ninth Avenue to 25th Avenue, all streets traveling in an easterly and westerly direction in the village.
- b) From 31st Avenue to 37th Avenue.
- c) In the area commonly known as "Winston Park".

As a "courtesy" the Police Department realizes that issues may arise where street parking is necessary. The Police Department will allow parking as indicated below.

Some streets (or portions of) allow west-side/east-side parking during these hours. Permission cannot be granted on the west-side/east-side streets and in the event the computer system grants permission in error you are still liable. If you need to park your vehicle overnight you must submit your request using the online form at https://melrosepark-il.dacragov.com/il/melrosepark/nightparking.

If a resident needs overnight parking for more than three days due to extenuating circumstances, please contact the Melrose Park Police – Traffic Department, Monday-Friday, 8 a.m.-4 p.m., at (708) 344-8409. Each request will be handled on a case-by-case basis.

The Police Department reserves the right to revoke the privilege of those utilizing this night park system if a person is found to be falsifying or manipulating the system in order to obtain extra days of parking.

- Requests must be received prior to the midnight cutoff.
- Overnight parking is limited to three nights within a 30-day period.
- Any incorrect information entered resulting in the issuance of a citation will not be a reason to dispute the citation in question.
- Overnight parking cannot be granted for residents of multi-family (apartment) buildings.
- · Overnight parking will not be granted when there is two inches or more of snowfall.
- · Motor vehicle must be legally parked.





Multi-Purpose Field

Feeding Wildlife

Attention Winston Park Area Residents – Please refrain from feeding wildlife, especially deer, around the Winston Park area. The food is attracting skunks and raccoons, and they are becoming a nuisance throughout this area.



Attention Residents Along Silver Creek Embankment

Please refrain from throwing grass clippings and any other yard waste into the creek.

25th Avenue Municipal Lot

Silver Creek Restoration Project

Under the direction of Mayor Ronald M. Serpico, the Village of Melrose Park Public Works employees constructed the Silver Creek Eagles Nest Park. This is a natural preserve that includes a walking path and a pavilion/gazebo, along with a canoe/kayak launch.

Phase 5 and 6 of the Silver Creek Stabilization Project have been completed.

Phase 7 is underway.

This stabilization project restores the natural balance of the creek by restoring the embankment, and bringing back native landscape and shrubbery along with aquatic habitat. This is an invaluable stream system that provides storm water runoff, flood management and many other benefits for the residents of Melrose Park.



Silver Creek Trail Park

The Silver Creek Trail Park is located off of First Avenue. The trail is centered off the pond between Silver Creek and its tributary, the Des Plaines River. Native plants of this area were once lost to development and are

now being reintroduced to the area. With the help of these native plants, more wildlife is returning to the area – from the Bald Eagle (sighted in the area), the Northern Pike, Red Foxes, Black-Crowned Night Herons and



Cooper's Hawk, to name a few.

Do's and Don'ts While Visiting the Silver Creek Trail Park

- 1. No littering. Please clean up after any activities.
- 2. Pets must be leashed.
- 3. Smoking or fires are prohibited.
- 4. Please clean up pet waste and dispose of it.
- 5. Do not disturb any plants, trees or wildlife.
- 6. No loitering.
- 7. No hunting.
- 8. Fishermen must clean up any cut line, bail containers and all litter.
- 9. Park opens one hour after sunrise and closes one hour before sunset.
- 10. Enjoy the park.





Village of Melrose Park Building Dept. Report

From the Desk of Ralph Sorce, Building Commissioner

A Note to All Melrose Park Residents Regarding Property Flood Protection, Flood Insurance, Village Assistance

The village of Melrose Park has earned a Class 7 Rating through the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) Community Rating System (CRS); for this reason, flood insurance policies issued or renewed in the Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA) qualify for a 15 percent discount off the premium cost.

Flood Protection Information

The village of Melrose Park strongly encourages these flood protection tips to be used:

- Stream Maintenance Per the Clean Water Act and village ordinance, dumping into our ditches, creeks and sewers is strictly prohibited. This regulation helps prevent contamination to our water supply and lessens the chance of flooding. Grass clippings, leaves and branches can also cause problems as they can accumulate and plug the storm sewer channels. If your property is next to a ditch or creek, please do your part and keep the banks clear of brush and debris. Please feel free to contact the Public Works Department for information regarding the village's Creek Maintenance Program or reporting downed tree and other major blockages.
- Construction Requirements Always check with the Building Department before you alter, re-grade or fill your property. A permit is needed to ensure that projects do not cause drainage problems to other properties and to ensure the general public welfare.
- Flood-Proofing There are several different ways to protect a building from flood damage retrofitting (altering a building to eliminate or reduce flood damage) measures include:
 - Elevations This involves raising the house so that the lowest floor is above protection level.
 - Relocation Moving a building out of the flood zone is the surest way to protect it from a flood.
 - Floodwalls These work to keep water from reaching your home by constructing barriers out of fill or concrete between the building and the flood water.
 - Dry Flood-Proofing Makes the building's walls and floors watertight so water does not enter.
 - Wet Flood-Proofing Modifies the structure and relocates the contents so that when flood water enters the building there is little to no damage.

Important notice: Any alteration to a building or land requires a permit from the Building Department. Even re-grading or filling in the floodplain requires a permit.

Flood Protection Assistance

If you have any concerns or issues with flooding or drainage, please call the Village of Melrose Park Sewer Department at (708) 531-5347 or the Building Department at (708) 343-4000. The Building Department can provide information, professional input and problem-solving measures without negatively affecting nearby neighbors. The Building Department can also provide a list of flood proofing contractors and conduct inspections.

Sand Bags

During a rainstorm or flood, sand bags are readily available for pickup at the Melrose Park Public Works Building located at 1002 N. 27th Ave. The Public Works Department also drops off sand bags throughout the village's high impact flood areas.

Flood Event Suggestions

Please keep in mind, during a flood the less water pumped into the village's storm sewer system the better. Please avoid excessive water use such as washing clothes, showering, washing dishes and toilet flushing. This provides time for the sewer system to stabilize and catch up to the large influx of water, thus, lowering the probability of a sewer backup in a building.

Be Prepared!

Have a plumber inspect sump pumps regularly!

If you experience flooding or drainage issues on your property, the village's staff may be able to help. Remember to televise and clean sewer laterals to prevent sewer backups.

Leaf Removal, Street Sweeping, Storm Sewers and Swales

It is a violation of village code and the Clean Water Act to directly or indirectly discharge illicit substances into a storm sewer. The village strongly encourages that all grass clippings, leaves and yard waste be placed in approved containers and placed at the designated location for garbage pickup on scheduled pickup days.

Community Effort


The Public Works Department kindly requests your help. Throughout the village's corporate boundaries there are many streets with curbside storm sewer catch basins, culverts and storm sewer pipes that are prone to trouble in heavy rains when they are blocked by leaves and grass clippings. The village street sweeping vehicle is not effective in removing large quantities of wet or dry leaves off the streets and curbed areas. The street sweeper's intended use is to remove road debris such as gravel, dirt and trash from the road surface by way of water and scrubbing brushes.

The Public Works Department respectfully asks that every village resident do their part in keeping our storm sewer grates, culvert pipe and swales in front of their property free from leaves and debris throughout the year. By doing this, this will greatly diminish the need for storm sewer cleanups, as well as, eliminating street inlet flooding due to leaves clogging the designed drainage path.

Flood Insurance

Homeowner's insurance policies do not cover damage from floods. The village strongly encourages property owners to invest in flood insurance. This insurance is backed by the federal government and is available to everyone, even properties that have been flooded. In some cases, flood insurance is required by a bank when people purchase a property and get a mortgage or home improvement loan. These policies typically only cover the building's structure and not its contents. During the types of flooding that occur in your area, there is usually more damage to the furniture and personal items than there is to the structure. Be sure you have contents coverage! Don't wait for the next flood to buy insurance protection! In most cases, there is a 30-day waiting period before NFIP coverage takes effect. Contact your insurance agent for more information on rates and coverage.

Republic Services is contracted to pick up your regular, everyday garbage and household items, such as couches, tables, mattresses, box springs, desks and chairs, etc.

Recycling and yard waste is collected on Tuesdays from April through November and must be placed in a 33-gallon refuse can or biodegradable paper bags. Plastic bags will not be accepted.

All items are to be put out the night before or morning of scheduled garbage pickup.

Winston Park Area and West Melrose – Once garbage has been picked up, garbage container is to be removed from curb line and placed back on resident's property.

24th Avenue to 10th Avenue – North Side from Cortez to North Avenue – Monday

The village of Melrose Park Public Works Department pickup items include
all household remodeling items (homeowner/self – not contractor),
such as kitchen and bathroom cabinets, drywall and cement.

All items are to be put out the night before or before 7 a.m. the morning of scheduled garbage pickup.

Once village trucks have passed and picked up items, the trucks will not pass again.

Any other garbage items are not to be left out and are to be put out for the next scheduled pickup.

This service is for Melrose Park residents in single and two-flat buildings only. Commercial and apartment buildings must use a private scavenger company.

Village of Melrose Park Public Works regular hours are 7 a.m.-3 p.m.

Know Your Risk When Severe Weather Occurs

Being prepared means learning about summer weather and water hazards such as hurricanes, heat, lightning, rip currents, air quality, tsunamis and wildfires. Here's what you need to know:

- Since 2003, more than 40 states within the continental United States have come under a tornado watch; more than 45 states have come under severe thunderstorm watches; and lightning strikes have occured in every state.
- Heat waves are common across the country during the summer. They are dangerous because the human body cannot cool itself properly when exposed to an extreme combination of heat and humidity.
- In 2015, there were 26 lightning fatalities. Flash flooding is the number one killer associated with severe weather.
- Air pollution can make it harder for people with asthma and other respiratory diseases to breathe. Children and teens may be more sensitive than adults to the health effects caused by air pollution. According to the EPA, poor air quality is responsible in the U.S. for an estimated 60,000 premature deaths each year.

Take Action

While the weather may be wild, you are not powerless. This summer, prepare for hazards with these simple steps:

- You may have only minutes to find shelter before a tornado strikes. Practice a family tornado drill at least once a year.
- Protect yourself from extreme heat by rescheduling outdoor activities to earlier in the day.
- There is no safe place outside when lightning is in the area. If you hear thunder, you are likely within striking distance of the storm. Just remember, When Thunder Roars, Go Indoors.
- Whether on foot or in a car, if you encounter flood waters, Turn Around Don't Drown!
- Make sure to check the Air Quality Index for your area at http://airnow.gov. If the air quality is poor, avoid prolonged or extreme exertion outdoors.

Be a Force of Nature

Your action can inspire others. Be a force of nature and share how you're working to stay safe from weather and water hazards this summer.

- Write a post on Facebook. Share with your friends and family the preparedness steps you're taking to stay safe this summer.
- Tweet that you're prepared with #SummerSafety. Tell us what you're doing to be prepared for summer hazards.
- Create a Family Communication Plan so that your loved ones know how to get in touch during an emergency. And let your friends know that they should create a plan also.
- Look for ways to help your town prepare, such as volunteering. Register for America's PrepareAthon! to learn how to stay safe during disasters. With these steps, you'll be doing more than just protecting yourself you'll help NOAA build a Weather-Ready Nation.

Garage Sale Notice

Garage Sales are Back ... It's Time to Sell All Those Treasures

The rules on garage sales held in the village of Melrose Park are as follows:

Garage sales will be held on the third weekend only during the months of May, June,

July, August and September. Sales are to be conducted on Thursday, Friday and Saturday of the designated weekends. No sales are allowed on Sundays.

The dates for 2025 are July 17-19, Aug. 21-23 and Sept. 18-20.

Garage sales shall be conducted only during the hours of 9 a.m.-5 p.m.

No permit is needed for garage sales, however the following rules must be followed:

- No garage sales may be conducted in apartment buildings.
- No garage sales in the frontyard, i.e., on the grass.
- All garage sales to be conducted in backyard, garage or on driveway.
- All sale items to be displayed on tables, not on the ground.
- No sale items shall be located and no sale activity shall be conducted in the frontyard area, on the premises of any public sidewalk, parkway area or other public property.
- No sale signs, handbills or other advertising material shall be located or posted upon public parkway or on public property, signs, poles or light poles within the village of Melrose Park.
- Signs advertising the sales shall not exceed 3-by-5 feet and may be located only in the frontyard (private property) of the address having the garage sale, and must be removed immediately after the sale.
- The sale will be conducted without the use of outdoor loud speakers, amplification equipment or illuminated advertising devices.

Any person violating these rules shall be subject to a fine not to exceed \$500. A copy of garage sale rules is available at www.melrosepark.org.

- 4) Only three shopping bags per rider. Forgotten items in the van will be returned at the next pickup date.

Jarrell David of Broadview, Illinois, is the new student trustee for Triton College's Board of Trustees for the 2025-2026 academic year. David, a

high school student enrolled in Triton's Dual Degree Program, will serve as the official student representative, acting as a liaison between the student body and the college's governing board.

"Serving as the student trustee at Triton College is just a steppingstone," added David. "I want to have a future in politics and eventually become the president of the United States."

David is currently a student at Proviso Mathematics and Science Academy and a student in Triton's Early College Program, which allows students to earn both high school and college credit simultaneously. His commitment to civic engagement and education is already evident – he was appointed Chairman of the Young Democratic Party of Proviso by Illinois House Speaker Emanuel "Chris" Welch, lead-

ing to Maywood Mayor Nathaniel George Booker asking him to be his assistant.

"Jarrell is going to bring a new perspective and youth engagement to Triton College," said Village of Maywood President Nathaniel George Booker. "He's going to be intentional with bringing a sense of community to Triton. He's going to be motivated."

David said his desire to serve as student trustee stems from a passion for leadership and a belief in the power of education.

"Triton breaks down barriers and opens doors," said David. "At Triton, anybody can receive a great education. Education is the greatest equalizer to equity in this nation."

Born in Murfreesboro, Tennessee, David moved to Broadview at age 2 with his mother, who sought a fresh start for their family. He has lived in the community ever since and credits his upbringing – and the support of his great-grandmother – with shaping his values and determination.

As student trustee, David wants to ensure students' voices are heard. "Students want somebody that's going to speak unapologetically and honestly for them," said David. "Now that I'm elected, my goal is to build student and community relations at Triton."

Following Triton, David plans to attend Morehouse College, a historically Black institution in Atlanta and alma mater of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. He hopes to pursue a law degree and a long-term career in politics.

Triton College Introduces New Cosmetology Certificate Program

Triton College is excited to announce the launch of a new Cosmetology Certificate Program, designed to provide students with a comprehensive education in both the art and science of cosmetology. Beginning this fall, the program will feature a curriculum that blends hands-on training with academic instruction and will work in tandem with the college's existing Barber Certificate Program.

"Triton's Cosmetology Certificate Program is both cost and time effective," said Donita Mitchell, Cosmetology faculty. "There are endless possibilities for success."

"Triton College is responding to the requests of our district high schools, as well as our surrounding communities," added Dr. Troy Moran, dean of Triton's Health Careers and Public Service Programs. There is strong demand for this program and community colleges strive to meet the needs of our residents, he said.

New learning facilities for the Cosmetology and Barber Program are set to be constructed in Triton College's M Building. The space will include salon chairs and grooming stations, along with an expanded reception area, manicure and pedicure stations – creating a real-world salon environment for student learning.

According to Dr. Moran, community residents will be able to make an appointment for a range of services.

"Our instructors will guide students and clients, teaching and supervising," said Dr. Moran. The certificate and learning facilities are great new additions for our campus community.

As for the program itself, Dr. Moran noted that students will gain knowledge on all aspects of cosmetology, including coloring, cutting, waxing, eyebrow services, weaves, wigs and esthetic, among other skills. Students will also learn about human anatomy and the nervous system, with a focus on the head, hands and feet. As the program grows, Dr. Moran hopes to add more class schedules that would cater to a wider variety of prospective students.

Students will learn about scalp diseases and disorders, anatomy of nails, hair relaxers, product knowledge, hair extension, skin care and much more.

The Cosmetology Certificate Program requires 50 credit hours, equivalent to 1,500 clock hours required by the Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation. Courses will follow an eight-week format, allowing students to focus intensively on fewer subjects at a time and to maintain a flexible schedule. Upon completion, students will be eligible to take the Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation, Division of Professional Regulation, Licensing Exam.

In addition to a high-quality education, Triton's Cosmetology Certificate Program is much more affordable than many larger cosmetology schools, where tuition can exceed \$22,000 per year, not including additional fees and costs.

Dr. Moran also emphasized the entrepreneurial spirit and skills students will gain, including inventory management and front desk operations.

"At Triton College, we want students to be empowered and create their own pathways of success and change," said Dr. Moran.



Summer Learning is Underway in District 89!









Walther Alumni Spotlight

Joshua Easter, Walther Class of 2010 and Cody Cotton, Walther Class of 2012, are executives with A Greater Good Foundation (AGGF), a non-profit organization focused on mentoring youth, building community and modeling wellness. Joshua and Cody, along with Walther grads Anthony Garland '11

and Patrell Green '12, and friend Charles Carter, founded the organization with the goal of holistically mentoring youth. Joshua serves as chief operating officer while Cody is the organization's chief of heart.

"We were all college athletes. When that ends, most athletes experience a bit of an identity crisis," explained Cody. "Thankfully, we had been introduced to personal development, the values and principles of character, and were interested in life coaching. That allowed us to have an identity of more than an athlete." Joshua added, "We wanted to make an impact on teens, but wanted to be more than Twitter and Facebook warriors."

AGGF focuses on the power of self-education, unique experiences, wellness and service to inspire young people and communities to live more holistic lives. Initially, AGGF worked with youth at MECA Elementary, a Christian school in Bellwood. Their first unique experience was taking a group of youth from MECA to Niagara Falls. Early on they also worked with West40, an organization that provides alternative schooling in west Cook County where they continue to mentor youth who had been removed from their schools for a variety of reasons. Since 2018, AGGF has worked closely with the Oak Park Library's Teen Services Department and more recently has begun programs in some local colleges working with first-generation students on how to navigate college and life.

In their nine years of existence, AGGF has served over 2,000 students, conducted more than 15,000 hours of mentorship, held nearly 500 restorative circles, taken students on 36 unique experiences including trips to

Columbia and Cuba, and has eight ongoing programs. Their work spans the city of Chicago and several surrounding suburbs reflecting a broader com-

mitment to serving communities in need across the Chicagoland area. Both Joshua and Cody give credit to Walther for laying the groundwork for what they are doing today with AGGF. Joshua shared, "First, I made great



connections with friends who we ended up partnering with. I appreciate that we were able to learn in a safe environment and learned how to learn. Unlike many of my college teammates, I was academically prepared to succeed in college. My experiences through athletics and service hours in different environments put life into perspective." Cody added, "I appreciated the opportunity to be involved in student council, choir and drama in addition to sports. The time management and discipline I learned at Walther still carry me through life today. The Christian values I experienced are the reason I now send my kids to private school."

Both also credited their coaches at Walther for teaching them a lot about life and helping them become the men they are today. The list included coaches Tuomi, Bo, Hoger, Muzzall, Heuser, Orr, Perry, Mack, Eberhard, Pederson, Gillingham, Jackson, Benke, Christian, Bishop and both Koehnes.



ervant of God Carlo Acutis, as an expert catechist, had continually sought to find increasingly new ways to help others reinforce their faith. For this reason he bequeathed to us as an inheritance his Exhibitions, among which is the very notable one on Eucharistic Miracles. It was precisely in 2002, while visiting the expositions of the Meeting of Rimini, that Carlo had decided to organize an exhibition on the Eucharistic Miracles recognized by the Church. A demanding commitment in which even his family members were involved for nearly two and a half years. The spiritual effects being brought about by this Exhibition were unpredictable on the eve of the project. To this day we can affirm that the Exhibition has been hosted in all 5 Continents thanks to the generous contribution of several very special people, among whom stand out the members of the Real Presence Eucharistic Education and Adoration Association who assisted so very much in this

Finally in 2014 we have succeeded in bringing also to completion this exhibition, dedicated to the Virgin Mary, which Carlo had initiated in 2006 but was unable to finish due to the sudden onset of a fulminating leukemia that brought him to Heaven within a few days. The young Servant of God Carlo Acutis was profoundly marked in his spiritual journey by the Virgin Mary, "humble and high beyond any creature" (Dante Alighieri), and he established from the inception the objective of imitating her in all of her virtues. The Virgin Mary was for him the highest example of purity and of unconditional love for God. Mary Most Holy revealed to mankind the image of that which the Church, a wanderer upon the earth, will be one day - at the end of this world. We know that for each Christian, holiness is achieved only through an intense life of Faith, Hope, and Charity. Of all three of these theological virtues, Carlo wrote that Mary "is an exemplary model and

her example of faith, supported by her perfect charity, must encourage us to continue in our journey toward holiness regardless of our fragility."

Because of this, the motive is well understood that drove Carlo to be continually interested in all of the manifestations of the Virgin Mary which, for more than two millennia, like very bright stars, have illuminated the path for multitudes of people. "Surely", Carlo said, "the miracles accomplished by the Virgin Mary during her apparitions on earth can be of a great help to increase the Faith of many people... How can they be ignored", he often asked, "the appeals that Our Lady gave us? And yet", he said, "knowing our little Faith, in her maternal goodness, the Blessed Mother wanted to work countless numbers of miracles precisely to help us to believe, yet despite these amazing signs many, still today, remain so indifferent!" Carlo used to say that "many people seek signs from Heaven to reinforce their Faith, but there are also many who unfortunately do not even seek them and if by chance they find them, intentionally ignore them

because they are too preoccupied with worldly things."

However, he never lost spirit, because he nourished in his heart the ever lively hope that, sooner or later, the Guardian Angels would have created favorable circumstances in order to sensitize souls that were distant from God to embark upon a life more consistent with His Laws. Our wish, like Carlo□s, is that through this exhibition many will rediscover the path which leads to God and that they, too, are able to become bearers of light to all

those who are still in darkness.







Springfield Updates ... State Rep. Norma Hernandez Passes Three Bills and State Budget Out of Both Houses



In Springfield, State Rep. Norma Hernandez has achieved significant legislative success. Three impactful bills, prioritizing the well-being of Illinois residents, have been successfully passed by both houses. These bills include measures to bolster mental health support on college campuses, guarantee transparency among disability service providers and honor student leaders contributing to state education boards.


These legislative wins are a direct result of Rep. Hernandez's deep commitment to equity, accountability and well-being for all Illinoisans.

Here's a Closer Look at the Impactful Measures She's Led

Mental health is health. With HB3385, Rep. Hernandez strengthens the Mental Health Early Action on Campus Act by ensuring Illinois colleges and universities are equipped to meet student mental health needs. This legislation mandates a minimum of three licensed mental health profes-

sionals on each campus. It broadens accessibility by permitting services through both face-to-face interactions and telehealth options. Furthermore, it promotes inclusivity by requiring policies to be crafted by a diverse group of campus representatives, encompassing administrators, faculty, and mental health experts.

The passing of HB3160 by Rep. Hernandez is bringing greater transparency and accountability to how the state supports individuals with developmental disabilities. The bill requires the Illinois Department of Human Services (IDHS) to provide every home and community-based service provider with an updated, detailed rate sheet for each client they serve, at least once a year. Additionally,



Rep. Hernandez understands the value of student voices in shaping education policy. With SB1475, she is helping to recognize and support the contributions of students who serve on the Illinois Board of Higher Education and the Illinois Community College Board. The bill provides a \$500 scholarship award to each student board member for every semester they are enrolled in school while serving on these boards. This measure not only eases the financial burden on student leaders, but also encourages greater civic engagement and representation in state-level decision-making.

77th District of Illinois Hosts Expungement **Information Session and Workshop in Melrose Park**

This spring marked an exciting milestone for our community as State Rep. Norma Hernandez hosted her first-ever legal aid clinic in partnership with Congressman Jesús "Chuy" García. The clinic, held in collaboration with Beyond Legal Aid and the Cook County Circuit Court's Office, was a powerful demonstration of what can be achieved when elected officials, legal experts and community organizations come together with a shared goal to empower individuals and remove barriers to opportunity.

From the moment registration opened, demand was clear. All available appointment slots were quickly reserved, and the clinic team ensured that walkins were also welcomed and accommodated. Attendees represented a wide cross section of our district, young adults, families, seniors and individuals looking to rebuild after past challenges. For many, this was the first time they had direct access to legal professionals in a setting that was welcoming,




free of charge, and rooted in dignity and respect. The clinic provided services focused on record expungement and sealing, legal rights education and



navigation of public services.
Experienced attorneys and paralegals from Beyond Legal Aid and partners from the Cook County Clerk of the Circuit Court's Office were on hand to offer one-on-one consulta-

tions, assistance with legal paperwork and guidance on next steps.

The event began with a comprehensive and engaging presentation from a Beyond Legal Aid lawyer along with the clerk's office chiming in as well. They

Cook County Board Approves Frank J. Aguilar **Funding for Second Phase of Down Payment Assistance Program**

On Thursday, June 12, the Cook County Board of Commissioners approved \$8.6 million to support a second phase of the Cook County Down Payment Assistance Program, which will assist residents in the homebuying process.

Lenders that are part of the program have access to funding – and more lenders are encouraged to join the program.

"Part of the American Dream is homeownership and this program has helped that dream become reality for hundreds of Cook County households," said Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle. "I'm grateful to the Cook County Board of Commissioners for its support of a second round of funding and we look forward to helping even more people as they look to purchase a home. My administration is committed to making Cook County a viable place to live, work and raise a family."

The second phase of the Cook County Down Payment Assistance Program comes in the wake of a \$3 million pilot program that launched in 2024 and assisted in the purchase of over 200 homes countywide.

As part of the program, the Cook County Bureau of Economic Development partners with Stifel, Inc., an investment banking firm, and Club 720 Solutions LLC, which helps individuals achieve homeownership by providing access to down payment assistance programs, coaching and educational resources.

The Cook County Down Payment Assistance Program provides subsidies equal to 5% of the home's sale price, up to \$25,000. Subsidies can assist with down payments, closing costs or interest-rate buydowns for homes located in Cook County.

"For many individuals and their families, the main avenue for generational wealth and long-term financial security is home ownership," said Commissioner Frank J. Aguilar. "But not all potential homeowners are the same. Ensuring we are taking steps and supporting programs that help increase the access people have to home ownership is critical in supporting our constituents and the communities where they want to build a life."

The assistance is provided as a forgivable second loan over a five-year term. Households with an annual income at or below 120% of the area median income (AMI) are eligible. For a family of four, this is \$143,880.

For those buying in disproportionately impacted areas or qualified census tracts, there is no income limit. Applicants must also have a minimum credit score of 620.

All first-time homebuyers – which include those purchasing a home for the first time in three years – must complete a nationally accredited course through a U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development-approved housing counseling agency before closing.

Homes may include single-family homes, townhomes or condominiums.

During the pilot program, participants received an average of \$15,000 in assistance and 80% of participants were first-time homebuyers. The program allowed buyers to access homes priced from \$200,000 to \$400,000, which had previously been considered beyond their means.

The Cook County Down Payment Assistance Program is part of a broader commitment by the county to expand affordable housing access and create equity in homeownership across the region.

Club 720 will host biweekly virtual workshops that will educate homebuyers about eligibility, how to apply and how to work with participating lenders. These sessions, available in English and Spanish, will feature expert housing counselors, real estate professionals and lending partners.

Cook County's Executive Director of the Department of Emergency Management and Regional Security (EMRS) Ted Berger has announced that he is leaving his position. In his role, Director Berger helped navigate Cook County, and especially the 16th District, through multiple "once-in-a-century" weather events, including the devastating storms and subsequent flooding in the summer of 2023.

"I'd like to send my deepest gratitude to Director Ted Berger and his team for all their work in the 16th District and the entire county," said Commissioner Frank J. Aguilar. "These situations were literally life or death. The quick and decisive actions taken by the EMRS team, including the incredible cooperation between first responders and local officials on many levels, allowed us to keep residents safe and get aid delivered to those in need. Thank you, Ted!"

Director Berger was always extremely proactive, making sure that local municipalities and their leadership were equipped with the tools and resources they needed to protect their communities from severe weather. When weather events occurred, Commissioner Aguilar knew that Director Berger and the EMRS team would be immediately available to deploy whatever emergency services were needed to maintain safety for both people and property.

The quick and decisive actions Director Berger instructed his team to take, saved lives, homes and businesses, and was crucial in maintaining order in affected communities. Under his direction, the EMRS teams were deployed within the hour to clear debris, restore power and help coordinate cleanup efforts.

"Ted Berger's leadership has made Cook County stronger, more resilient and better prepared for the future," said Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle. "Whether guiding us through the COVID-19 pandemic or responding to historic natural disasters, Ted led with clarity, compassion and purpose. We are grateful for his service and proud to see him continue this important work at the state level."

Director Berger also worked closely with Commissioner Aguilar, local municipal officials, and both the Federal Emergency Management Agency and Illinois Emergency Management Agency to accurately document damages, report them to the necessary aid agencies, and ensure that municipalities, homeowners and businesses had successfully applied for the relief they needed to rebuild.

Due to the efforts of Director Berger, Commissioner Aguilar and local officials, the 16th District received over \$290 million in residential and homeowner support and over \$100 million in business support through federal agencies.

"On behalf of the Cook County Department Emergency Management and Regional Security, I want to extend my deepest gratitude to Ted Berger for his outstanding leadership and unwavering dedication," said EMRS Interim Executive Director Angela Gilkes. "Ted's commitment to public safety, collaboration and emergency preparedness has left a lasting impact on our department and the communities we serve. It has been an honor to work alongside him and we look forward to continuing to partner with him in his new role."

Although leaving Cook County, Ted Berger will still be keeping his expertise in government. Illinois Gov. J.B. Pritzker has appointed him director of Illinois Emergency Management Agency and Office of Homeland Security. While Commissioner Aguilar hopes that Cook County and the 16th District will be spared from future major weather events, he knows that Ted Berger will always support the municipalities and residents of Cook County and Illinois when they are in need.

Giannoulias Cracks Down on Unlawful Use of License Plate Reader Data

Office Conducting Audit to Ensure Use of Reader Data is Compliant with Illinois Law

Following reports that Texas police illegally accessed Illinois automatic license plate reader (ALPR) data to track down a woman for an abortion care-related matter, Secretary of State Alexi Giannoulias announced new measures aimed at preventing further abuse.

In May, law enforcement authorities in Texas performed a nationwide search of more than 83,000 ALPR cameras to locate a woman they said had a self-administered abortion. Included in the search were cameras located in states where abortion is legal – including Illinois, specifically Mount Prospect in suburban Cook County.

In 2023, Giannoulias spearheaded first-in-the-nation legislation making it illegal for law enforcement in other states to use ALPR cameras to track or penalize individuals seeking abortion care or criminalize a person's immigration status.

"License plate readers can serve as an important tool for law enforcement, but these cameras must be regulated so they aren't abused for surveillance, tracking the data of innocent people or criminalizing lawful behavior," Giannoulias said. "No one seeking legal health care services in Illinois should face harassment or jail – period."

"Illinois has taken major steps that protect immigrant rights and reproductive rights, but these policies are only effective if the law is followed," said Lawrence Benito, executive director of the Illinois Coalition for Immigrant Rights. "We thank the Secretary of State for shutting off access to out-of-state authorities and protecting all people coming through our state."

"At Personal PAC, we work hard with our partners in government, like Secretary Giannoulias, to pass laws that protect abortion in Illinois," said Sarah Garza Resnick, CEO of Personal PAC. "Patients rely on Illinois for abortion access that they need and it is on us to ensure that their right to receive that care is protected in our state. We applied Secretary Giannoulias for taking swift action in looking into the alleged violations of the ALPR data act."

In response to this breach, the Secretary of State's Office instructed Flock Safety, which operates the ALPR network in question, to immediately shut off access for the out-of- state authorities illegally using the system. The office has also contacted the Illinois Attorney General's Office to investigate the matter and is establishing an audit system with additional safeguards to ensure any law enforcement entity using an ALPR in Illinois is adhering to the law.

Under the act, which took effect in 2024, law enforcement agencies must attest that ALPR data will not be used to prosecute or enforce another state's laws pertaining to abortion care or immigration status. If a law enforcement agency violates this agreement, they jeopardize their access to Illinois ALPR data and eligibility for federal and state grants.

In the recent case, Mount Prospect's ALPR settings provided a gateway into Illinois' system operated by Flock for an unauthorized use, despite the Texas police stating that the reason for the search was related to abortion care. Any law enforcement entity operating the ALPR must adhere to the declaration in the law and deny such requests, according to the act. Between Jan. 14 and April 30, there were 262 searches for immigration-related matters in Mount Prospect, alone.

The law still allows police to use ALPR technology for investigating felonies, carjackings, vehicle thefts and missing person alerts, but it protects a person's right to abortion access and prevents attempts to criminalize a person's immigration status.

Operated by private companies, ALPRs are used in every state by most metropolitan police departments to scan license plates and provide the time and location of vehicles in real time. ALPR technology allows police to read thousands of license plates per minute from cameras placed on roadways, streetlights and squad cars.

Giannoulias Warns About the Rise in DMV Text Scams

Do Not Respond or Open Links in Unsolicited Texts

Secretary of State Alexi Giannoulias is warning Illinoisans to keep on the lookout for text message scams claiming to be from the "Illinois State Department of Motor Vehicles" that threaten to suspend vehicle registration and driving privileges.

The text messages are phishing attempts designed to trick residents into giving up personal or financial information. Recipients should not respond or open any links found in unsolicited texts and emails.

"Phishing scams are unfortunately an increasingly prevalent threat in our modern society, seeking to cheat Illinoisans out of their personal information and hard-earned money," Giannoulias said. "Please remain vigilant to avoid these scams and report them to protect yourself and others from falling victim to fraud schemes."

The office only sends text messages to remind residents about scheduled DMV appointments. It does not send text messages regarding driver's license or vehicle registration status.

Illinoisans are encouraged to report scam attempts to the Federal Trade Commission by visiting reportfraud.ftc.gov.

Giannoulias Unveils Statewide Organ and Tissue Donation Campaign Ads Highlight the Lifesaving "Ripple Effect" of the Decision to Donate

Secretary of State Alexi Giannoulias has launched a public awareness campaign encouraging Illinoisans to spark a lifesaving "ripple effect" by becoming organ donors.

The ad, which is the first in a series building on the positive ripple effects of organ donation, has began running on broadcast television, digital and social media platforms across the state.

"Some 4,000 Illinois residents are in need of a transplant, including many whose lives hang in the balance waiting for the availability of a suitable organ," Giannoulias said. "By choosing to become an organ donor, Illinoisans can catalyze a cascade of positive action, empowering recipients to pay the gift forward by helping those around them."

In the illustrative narrative, a firefighter who was granted the gift of life through organ donation saves a tutor at the scene of an accident, who in turn helps a young student earn admission into college. The story is rooted in real-world accounts of organ recipients starting a chain reaction of positive change with their second chance at life.

Illinois has one of the largest registries in the nation, averaging over 20,000 sign-ups per month across DMV facilities, with around 6.5 million total current registrants. A single donor can save or improve the lives of up to 25 people.

Approximately 4,000 people are on the transplant waiting list and tragically about 300 die waiting for a transplant every year.

Observing 529 Day, Treasurer Michael Frerichs Encourages Families to Save for Future Education Costs Through 529 College Savings Accounts

State Treasurer Michael Frerichs recognized 529 Day on May 29 by reminding Illinois families that now is always a good time to save for a child's future education by opening or adding to a Bright Start 529 account.

"When a child knows he or she has a college savings plan, that child is three times more likely to attend college," Frerichs said. "When an adult opens and contributes to a child's savings account, it sends a powerful message to the child, 'I believe in you."

Bright Start is a 529 College Savings Plan that can be used at eligible educational institutions, including public and private schools; two-year and four-year colleges and universities; technical and vocational schools; and registered apprenticeship programs. Illinois taxpayers receive tax benefits for contributing to an Illinois 529 plan and the investment grows tax-free when spent on qualified expenses. Families have the option to open a Bright Start 529 account online or, for those who prefer to work with a financial advisor, Treasurer Frerichs also administers the Bright Directions Advisor-Guided 529 College Savings Plan.

Anyone can contribute to an account, and there are no enrollment fees, minimum contributions or minimum balance requirements to open or maintain one.

While the "529 Day" designation is a light-hearted reference to the date of May 29, its purpose is serious: to spread the word about the crucial role that a 529 college savings account can play in setting up children for future success. Every dollar saved today can help families reduce or eliminate student loan debt down the road.

"You can even ask other family members and friends to help plan for a young person's future," Frerichs said. "For example, maybe grandma and grandpa could contribute to a child's 529 account as a birthday gift, instead of buying a toy. Families also might consider asking 20 relatives and friends to mark a birthday or other special occasion by chipping in \$26.45 apiece – which would total \$529 – to a child's 529 account."

Since becoming treasurer in 2015, Frerichs has significantly grown the Bright Start 529 Program and has worked to reduce plan fees, ensuring that more of families' investment dollars go directly to college savings. He also collaborated with state lawmakers to create the Illinois First Steps Program, which provides a free, one-time \$50 seed deposit for Illinois parents or legal guardians when they open a Bright Start 529 or Bright Directions 529 account for a child born or adopted on or after Jan. 1, 2023.

Last September, Frerichs announced several improvements to Bright Start 529, including lower fees, updated investment options and technology enhancements. During the past 10 years, Frerichs has negotiated fee reductions of more than \$100 million, ensuring more investment dollars go directly to college savings. Today, Bright Start is among the most affordable and highest-rated college savings plans in the country. These changes have helped the plans grow to more than 925,000 accounts with \$21 billion in assets.

Managing Bright Start 529 accounts has become easier than ever for account owners, thanks to the Bright Start 529 mobile app that Frerichs unveiled last fall. The enhanced technology improves the user experience by allowing account owners to check account balances and open additional accounts for new beneficiaries on their phones. Through the app, account owners can easily contact grandparents or other relatives to encourage contributions to a child's Bright Start account as a way to celebrate special occasions.

Frerichs' ongoing efforts to improve Illinois 529 plans have earned praise and awards. During the first few months of 2025 alone, Morningstar, Business Insider and CNBC have each named Bright Start as one of the best 529 plans in the country.

In addition, Bright Start 529 earned a Gold Rating in October 2024 from Morningstar, a financial services firm that independently evaluates and rates college savings plans annually. The firm assigns each rated plan a Morningstar Analyst Rating of Gold, Silver, Bronze, Neutral or Negative, and in 2024, it awarded just five Gold Ratings to 529 plans across the country. Morningstar described Bright Start as a "Valedictorian," and as a standout plan offering "exceptional state stewardship of investor capital and well-constructed portfolios managed by competent investment teams." Since Frerichs revamped the Bright Start Plan in 2017, it has won Morningstar's Gold Rating six times.

State Treasurer Mike Frerichs Returns Purple Heart to Family that had Four Sons Serve in WWII

Ahead of Memorial Day, Illinois Treasurer Michael Frerichs announced the return of a Purple Heart medal to the grandson of a late World War II Army veteran from Lansing, Illinois.

Army Cpl. Henry Van Der Noord was one of four brothers who fought for the U.S. during World War II, with all of them making it home. He earned the Purple Heart for wounds he suffered during the fight to liberate the Philippines in May 1945.

"Mr. Van Der Noord and his brothers served their country proudly during a crucial time in our world's history," Frerichs said while returning the Purple Heart to Van Der Noord's grandson, Christopher Reed, also a veteran. "I am proud to return this honor to his loving family."

Reed, the first male grandchild, got the medal when he was 8 or 9. He also received his grandfather's Army green dress jacket and some other medals. The Purple Heart stood out, however.

"When I first got it, I didn't know what the Purple Heart medal signified. I just thought it was really cool, coming in its own case," Reed said. "Fast forward 10 years and I'm in the Air Force. Then it was like, 'Wow, that's a big deal.' They just don't hand these things out. A lot of people's next of kin got them. It meant more as I got older. It was guite an honor."

Frerichs returned the medal as part of Operation Purple Heart, an unprecedented mission to return the military honor to its rightful owners. The iconic medal is given to individuals wounded or killed during military combat.

Henry Van Der Noord, one of eight children, was nicknamed "Babe" because he was an infant when his family came to the U.S. on a boat from The Netherlands.

Mr. Van Der Noord was in combat during the mission to liberate the Philippines. General Douglas MacArthur had lost his first attempt to take the Philippines, which was controlled by Japan. MacArthur tried again in 1945 and it was a months-long, bloody campaign.

Mr. Van Der Noord was with the 38th Field Artillery Division on Luzon, the largest island in the Philippines. On May 3, 1945, he suffered a wound when he was hit in the back with shrapnel.

"I can remember he had a hellacious scar," Reed said.

During his time recuperating, Mr. Van Der Noord discovered that one of his brothers, Private First Class Edward Van Der Noord, was in the same hospital. Edward, who was in the Army's 11th Airborne Division, injured his ankle in a parachute jump.

"The happy brothers spent four days together the first week in June," according to a newspaper clipping from the time.

Two other brothers also served their country. Seaman First Class John Van Der Noord was on a naval ship that was sunk in action off Okinawa. Technical Sqt. Gerriet "Harry" Van Der Noord worked on an Army railroad unit.

All four brothers made it back home. Henry Van Der Noord became a police officer and started a construction company with Eddie, the brother he met in the hospital. They built duplexes as well as a large apartment complex in Lansing during the 1970s that bore the family name, Van Der Noord Apartments.

"He was always kind of like a carpenter," Reed said of his grandfather. "If Henry wasn't building a picnic table, he was building a house." Today, Reed lives in suburban Atlanta, Georgia. He grew up in Lansing and Batavia, where his father was police chief.

State Treasurer Frerichs Announces New Option for Illinois Students Struggling to Obtain Traditional College Loans

Illinois students struggling to obtain traditional college loans have a new option to borrow money for in-state higher education costs thanks to a new program Illinois Treasurer Michael Frerichs unveiled today.

The new Funding U Illinois No-Cosigner Loan is part of the Student Empowerment Fund, Treasurer Frerichs' plan to provide private college loans for Illinois residents at lower rates than private competitors and help bridge the gap with federal financial aid. The No-Cosigner Loan joins ISL Education Lending's Illinois Partnership Loan and Illinois College Family Loan options.

"The costs of college continue to rise and the chaos in Washington is hurting, not helping our families," Frerichs said at a Thursday news conference at 555 W. Monroe. "Financial aid often doesn't cover all of the costs, and we are offering a solution to help students bridge the gap."

Funding U is working with the State Treasurer's Office to offer the Illinois No-Cosigner Loan. The program's aim is to focus on the dedication and achievements of students rather than their lack of a credit score or cosigner's financial status.

"Funding U's mission is to empower first-generation and low-income students across the U.S. to complete higher education by providing access to responsible, affordable financing," Funding U Founder and CEO Jeannie Tarkenton said. "Thanks to the leadership of Treasurer Frerichs, Illinois students who are often the most vulnerable to drop out can now graduate with less expensive debt."

The Illinois No Co-Signer Loan is open to Illinois residents attending an Illinois public or private not-for-profit university or college and is an attractive option for students who have maxed their grants, scholarships and financial aid, and have no access to a co-signer. The fixed annual percentage rate ranges from 7.99% to 9.49%. A no-cosigner student loan option at a competitive rate has not been available to Illinois students until now.

The Treasurer's Office is partnering with ISL Education Lending to offer the Partnership and College Family loans. Families can save thousands of dollars in interest when they choose the Illinois Partnership Loan in comparison to other private loan lenders and the Illinois College Family Loan for parents has lower APRs than the Federal Direct PLUS Loan. Borrowers or their co-signers must have a credit score of at least 660 and the fixed annual percentage rates range from 3.45% to 6.77%.

"We are proud to partner with Treasurer Frerichs to deliver lower-cost supplemental student loans to Illinois families. At a time when the high cost of college is causing some families to reconsider its value, the treasurer's program makes college more affordable," said Steve McCullough, the CEO of ISL Education Lending.

Illinois families say they're pleased with the results.

Soham Tillu saved money for college, but the Palatine father was looking to borrow some as well for his daughter Sachi, a third-year biology student at the University of Illinois Champaign-Urbana.

"The ISL loan was at a lower rate. It was very affordable. It also was very easy to apply," said Tillu, an Illinois Partnership Loan participant who has recommended the program to several friends. "The private loans we looked at were much more expensive."

How the Student Empowerment Fund works: The State Treasurer's Office makes investments with student loan providers that lend to Illinois residents. Lenders then make private loans at affordable rates and students or their families repay the loans. The lenders make interest payments to the State Treasurer's Office, which are reinvested to provide more loans for Illinois residents.

The Student Empowerment Fund has made nearly 700 loans totaling \$10.8 million since launching in 2023. The average amount borrowed is about \$21,000. Illinois State University, Augustana College, the University of Illinois, Lewis University and Southern Illinois University are the top five schools by volume.

The Rare Animal Netflix Made Famous — Only in Chicago

Brookfield Zoo Chicago is the Only Place in the U.S. to See a Pangolin Up Close — and its Leading Global Efforts to Save Them

A new Netflix documentary is bringing long-overdue attention to the pangolin – one of the world's most endangered and heavily trafficked mammals. While many viewers may be learning about this unique, armor-scaled animal for the first time, Brookfield Zoo Chicago has quietly been at the forefront of global efforts to protect and understand pangolins for nearly a decade.

Brookfield Zoo Chicago is the only place in the country where the public can see a pangolin up close. Guests can learn about the only mammals known to be covered in scales at the zoo's Habitat Africa – the forest, where this species listed as endangered on the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) calls home. Behind the scenes, the zoo's expert animal care and veterinary teams care for 13 of these elusive mammals – including babies or "pangopups" – unlocking essential insights into their care, diet, behavior and reproduction. In fact, Brookfield is one of the only institutions worldwide to successfully breed second-generation pangolins in human care.

These discoveries are helping shape pangolin conservation across the globe. Dr. Jennifer Watts, the zoo's director of Nutrition, developed the "modern pangolin diet" based on the zoo's extensive experience caring for adult pangolins and their pups. Brookfield Zoo Chicago's work is pioneering new standards in husbandry and veterinary science for a species that has historically struggled to survive in human care.

"Caring for pangolins provide valuable yet unknown insight into their natural history, health and nutrition," said Mark Wanner, Brookfield Zoo Chicago associate vice president of Animal Care and Conservation, and chair of the North American Pangolin Consortium. "As the most heavily trafficked and poached mammals in the world, pangolins face an urgent risk of extinction. This knowledge and the skills to care for pangolins are essential to help them survive and thrive, where in situ at rehabilitation contars in their pative range or at accordited institutions like Brookfield Zoo Chicago, in hones of st

tion centers in their native range or at accredited institutions like Brookfield Zoo Chicago, in hopes of staving off or ideally avoiding extinction."

While Brookfield Zoo Chicago is not affiliated with the documentary, its leadership in pangolin care is gaining international attention. As a founding member of the North American Pangolin Consortium, the zoo works closely with global partners to protect pangolins in the wild and educate the public about their species.



Dominican Literacy Center Continues to Provide English Instruction and More ...

The Dominican Literacy Center originally began in Chicago, at the request of the pastor of Our Lady of Grace Parish in 1996. In 2008, the building housing the center was deemed to need extensive repairs and could not be used. In June of 2008, the center was graciously welcomed to rent a part of Sacred Heart Convent in Melrose Park, where it has continued to provide English instruction for the past 14 years.

The goal of the Dominican Literacy Center is the empowerment of persons who experience personal and economic limitations within our Englishspeaking society. Through literacy education and personal relationships, we strive to provide a small step toward eliminating racial and cultural prejudice and stereotypes, as well as a step up for persons seeking improvement in their personal, familial and economic abilities.

The Dominican Literacy Center provides weekly one and half hour tutored sessions in which one student meets with one tutor. The center provides tutoring in speaking, reading and writing English, as well as tutoring in preparation for the Citizenship interview and exam. This individualized instruction is provided for immigrant women and men (ages 17+) who are endeavoring to reduce literacy and its consequential effects of isolation (due to their inability to communicate in English with health care providers, children's teachers, neighbors, co-workers, community leaders and/or first responders); in low-level jobs (due to lack of training or skills, or an inability to demonstrate their already achieved skills and knowledge); powerless to supervise their adolescent children or to influence systemic change; lacking confidence to enroll in traditional classes and or fear of requesting help when needed.

English Classes

English classes are provided for those who want to learn to speak, read or write in English. One student meets with one tutor, once a week.

These classes are offered at the Dominican Literacy Center, 1503 Rice Street, in Melrose Park (near Sacred Heart/St. Eulalia Parish).

Our program also assists persons studying for their Citizenship interview/exam.

We presently offer classes on Monday through Thursday, in the mornings and afternoons.

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ComEd Energy Efficiency Program Exceeds 2024 Goals of Saving Customers 13 Million MWhs of Electricity

Program is One of ComEd's Key Pillars to Helping Customers Save Energy and Money with Pending Rise in Electric Supply Costs

In 2024, the award-winning ComEd Energy Efficiency Program helped customers save over 13 million megawatt hours (MWhs) of electricity, surpassing state law requirements. Since 2012, installed energy-efficiency measures have continued to deliver savings. This resulted in nearly \$1.3 billion in electric bill savings for customers last year, according to ComEd.

The energy-saving results are based on an independent evaluation of the ComEd program conducted by Guidehouse, a global consulting and managed services provider.

With the average monthly residential customer bill in the ComEd service territory projected to increase by approximately \$10.60 in June, the result of the annual PJM Interconnection capacity auction held last year, the evaluation shows the ComEd program continues to effectively assist customers in managing their energy consumption and maintaining control over electricity costs.

"ComEd recognizes the challenge posed by rising supply costs," said Melissa Washington, senior vice president of Customer Operations and Strategic Initiatives for ComEd. "Although we can't control this increase, we offer energy-efficiency options to help customers manage their energy costs and connect them to grants and bill-support options. The fact that customers are taking advantage of these options highlights their importance."

The ComEd Energy Efficiency Program, funded in accordance with state law, offers services, incentives, and rebates to assist families and businesses in reducing costs and improving energy usage. In 2024, the program:

- Provided ComEd residential and business customers with over \$277 million in incentives through rebates and discounts on energy-efficiency measures and projects.
- Increased the comfort and efficiency of more than 53,000 multi-family units by installing insulation, air sealing, heat pumps and other measures at no cost to the residents.
- Saved business customers more than 754,000 MWhs of electricity, amounting to over \$79 million in bill savings with an estimated total savings of 9.6 million MWh over the expected life of those measures, totaling more than \$1 billion.

- Saved residential customers over 1 million MWhs of electricity, resulting in over \$170 million in bill savings, with an estimated total savings of 13.2 million MWh over the expected life of those measures, totaling nearly \$2.2 billion.
- Enabled over 161,000 income-eligible customers to save more than 730,000 MWhs, equating to nearly \$123 million in annual bill savings. Income-eligible customers are also expected to realize estimated total savings of 10 million MWhs over the life of these measures, totaling more than \$1.6 billion.

"By taking advantage of energy efficiency programs, customers can meaningfully reduce their energy bills," said Paige Knutsen, executive director of the Midwest Energy Efficiency Alliance (MEEA). "Energy efficiency programs support thousands of strong, local jobs and help make our communities' homes and businesses more comfortable and resilient."

Since 2008, the ComEd Energy Efficiency Program, one of the largest and longest-running of its kind, has saved customers over \$11 billion on electric bills and more than 99 million megawatt-hours of electricity. This is equivalent to:

- Avoiding over 74 billion pounds of carbon emissions.
- · Removing nearly 8 million cars from the road.
- Planting about 34 million acres of trees.

ComEd also provides various bill-assistance options, such as budget billing, payment arrangements and federal grants through LIHEAP. So far this year, ComEd has helped over 114,000 customers access nearly \$22 million in financial assistance and other support programs.

ComEd Statement on Rising Energy Costs

Beginning this summer, the average monthly residential customer bill in the ComEd service territory is expected to rise by about \$10.60 due to the annual PJM Interconnection capacity auction held last year. These costs go into effect this month and will be reflected in the 'supply' portion of customer bills, which ComEd passes on directly to customers with no markup. ComEd does not profit from this increase, was not part of the auction, does not supply capacity and does not retain any proceeds of the capacity charge payments. ComEd is responsible for the 'delivery' portion of bills, which pays for the work ComEd does to maintain and upgrade the system to ensure safe and reliable electric service for all customers.

ComEd Receives Approval for Beneficial Electrification Plan 2, Continuing to Advance Transportation Electrification in Illinois

Investment of \$168 Million Over Three Years Will Support EV Purchases and Charging Infrastructure Advancements

ComEd has announced that the Illinois Commerce Commission (ICC) has approved its second Beneficial Electrification (BE) Plan, investing approximately \$168 million over a three-year period beginning in 2026. The continuation of ComEd's BE funding marks a significant step forward in ComEd's commitment to advancing electric vehicle (EV) adoption and reducing emissions in northern Illinois.

Building on its current \$231 million investment in beneficial electrification, deployed from 2023 through 2025, ComEd will invest an additional \$168 million between 2026-2028 through BE Plan 2 to help residential and nonresidential customers transition to and take advantage of electric vehicles.

Since February of 2024, ComEd has incentivized the purchase and installation of nearly 5,000 public and private EV charging ports (Level 2 and Fast Chargers) and the purchase or lease of nearly 1,000 new and pre-owned electric fleet vehicles. More than 70% of the rebates awarded have gone to low-income customers or business and public sector organizations located in, or primarily serving, low-income and equity investment eligible communities (EIECs). Over this same period, Illinois has seen EV registrations grow three to four times faster than the nation as a whole.

"The shift to EVs is a major milestone on the road to Illinois' clean energy future and it is part of a broader effort to electrify more of our region's energy system," said Gil C. Quiniones, ComEd president and CEO. "Through the expansion of our Beneficial Electrification programs, ComEd is helping to reduce carbon emissions, improve air quality, and enable all communities to enjoy the benefits and opportunities that flow from the global energy transformation."

The approval of ComEd's BE Plan 2 follows the successful implementation of ComEd's first BE Plan, which was approved in 2023 under the guidance of the Climate and Equitable Jobs Act (CEJA). Signed into law by Gov. J.B. Pritzker in 2021, CEJA aims to combat climate change by leveraging Illinois' clean electricity grid and promoting beneficial electrification across the state.

"Illinois is committed to decarbonizing the transportation sector and ComEd's BE Plan 2 plays a crucial role in enabling more electric vehicle adoption in the state," said Megha Lakhchaura, state EV officer of Illinois. "By expanding charging infrastructure and providing incentives from the state and key partners like ComEd, we are making EV adoption more accessible and practical for residents and businesses alike."

Key components of ComEd's second Beneficial Electrification Plan include:

- Residential EV Charger and Installation Program \$11 million, over three years, to offer rebates of up to \$2,500 per household to support the purchase and installation of residential Level 2 electric vehicle chargers.
- Business and Public Sector EV Purchase Program \$82 million, over three years, to offer rebates for the purchase or lease of new or pre-owned fleet EVs of all weight classes.
- Business and Public Sector Make-Ready Program \$44 million, over three years, to offer rebates for covering costs associated with making sites ready for public or private Level 2 of DC Fast Charging equipment.
- Customer Education and Awareness Program \$11 million, over three years, to fund multiple efforts to empower and support customers to make informed decisions about vehicle electrification and charging infrastructure deployment. This includes free access to ComEd support tools, including Fleet Electrification Assessments, EV Toolkits and training programs for municipalities interested in achieving "EV Ready" status, and free Fleet Electrification Assessments, among others.
- Research and Development Program \$11 million, over three years, to evaluate and demonstrate the impact of new transportation and electrification technologies.
- Portfolio Program \$9 million, over three years, to fund a variety of initiatives spanning across multiple programs, to support a successful deployment of BE Plan 2 as a whole.

Projects located in, or primarily serving, low income or EIECs, will be eligible for higher rebate amounts and will receive more than 50% of the BE Plan 2 budget. Exact rebate amounts may be adjusted in response to demand over the course of the BE Plan 2 timeline.

EVs provide a variety of benefits for customers. Not only do they offer fuel and maintenance cost savings and performance benefits, but communities can experience broad environmental improvements from reduced tailpipe emissions. Additionally, electrifying transportation – especially vehicle fleets – can create tangible benefits for all communities and families across northern Illinois, including health benefits in communities which have traditionally borne the brunt of climate change and air pollution.

"Reducing vehicle emissions is one of the most effective ways to improve air quality and public health," said Brian Urbaszewski, director of Environmental Health Programs at Respiratory Health Association. "Given current uncertainty with other sources of funding that foster zero-emission transportation, ComEd's continued investment in its Beneficial Electrification Plan is now even more critical in helping cut harmful pollutants, leading to cleaner air and healthier communities across northern Illinois."

ComEd's BE Plan 2 was developed in close collaboration with multiple stakeholders, including environmental organizations, community groups and industry experts to ensure equitable access to electrification benefits. The continued efforts in 2026 will build upon the existing resources and tools ComEd has already launched to support customer education and EV adoption, including the ComEd EV Toolkit, EV Ambassador Program, EV Readiness Program, EV Load Capacity Map, Fleet Electrification Assessments, EV Service Provider Network, EV Dealership Network and more.

Energy Efficiency Resources Help Customers Save on Their Monthly Energy Bill

Nicor Gas' delivery system is designed to reliably meet customer demand, even during unpredictable weather that can bring wind, rain, hail, tornadoes and snow, all within 24-hours.

Some severe weather can bring high winds, and heavy ice and snow that could damage above ground systems or lines, but Nicor Gas' resilient and modernized natural gas delivery system and storage facilities are located below ground, allowing our teams to meet customers' heating needs, even when the weather turns.

To help your family stay safe before, during and after a storm, please remember these important tips:

• Know the location of your natural gas meter and make sure it's visible before a storm. This is crucial for safety and quick access in case of an emergency. Also, keep the area surrounding the meter free of trash and debris. Mechanical equipment used during the storm cleanup can damage an unseen meter.



- Unplug natural gas appliances. If severe lightning is predicted, unplugging these appliances can help avoid possible electrical damage.
- Leave gas meters on in homes and businesses. This helps maintain proper pipe pressure and prevents water from entering if flooding occurs. Most gas appliances have safety valves that automatically shut off the flow of gas if the pilot light goes out. Only Nicor Gas or emergency personnel should turn the valve off.
- Wait for safe conditions. If your natural gas service was interrupted due to a severe storm, restoration time depends on when water recedes in flooded areas, and homes and businesses are free of standing water before Nicor Gas personnel can safely enter.
- Check for damage. Damage to natural gas meters or exposed gas lines is dangerous. If you notice any damage, immediately leave the area and call Nicor Gas' 24-hour emergency response number at (888) 642-6748.
- Contact 811 before digging. If any cleanup and repair are necessary, including removing downed trees, remember to call 811 as they can become entangled with natural gas lines.

In addition to severe weather safety precautions, the arrival of spring is a good time to focus on energy-efficient home improvements and activities that can help save on monthly energy bills, including:

- **Program your thermostat.** Setting a programmable thermostat to a higher setting when not home can help reduce energy costs by approximately 10%.
- Use ceiling fans. Cooling homes with ceiling fans can offset up to a four degree increase in your thermostat. Ensure blades are rotating counterclockwise to push cool air down.
- Cook outdoors. Cooking with an oven heats a home, but grilling outside is a great alternative that will help reduce natural gas use.
- Caulk air leaks. Sealing cracks and openings in a home ensures that heat does not come in or escape. Weatherizing with insulation and duct sealing can further improve a home's efficiency year-round while increasing overall comfort.
- Get an equipment tuneup. Spring is a great time to have HVAC systems and water heaters inspected and tuned up. This helps prevent mechanical issues and can provide peace of mind in your equipment's reliability.

Nicor Gas Reminds Customers, Community to Call 811 During Safe Digging Month

Warmer temperatures have finally arrived, and before springing into outdoor home projects, Nicor Gas is reminding customers and communities to "call before you dig" in observance of Safe Digging Month this past April. This includes jobs, such as mailbox and fence installations, planting trees or putting in a pool. It also applies to professional excavators when performing work, such as paving, tunneling or blasting.

Contacting 811 is free and there is no cost to have underground utility lines marked. It's also a law designed to help protect both customers and communities to ensure the underground infrastructure that powers our lives is not damaged, and stays safe and connected.

Customer pre-marking is required for all locate requests, by physically marking your proposed excavation or route with white paint, flags or chalk, electronic white lining (when software is available) or possibly by providing a verbal description that is narrow and explicit enough to limit markings beyond the actual excavation area.

Nicor Gas maintains more than 34,300 miles of natural gas infrastructure across northern Illinois. In addition to those lines, there are underground communications cables, water and sewer lines, and other utility lines on every property. Knowing where underground infrastructure is before putting a shovel in the dirt helps prevent injuries, property damage and inconvenient service outages.



To protect these underground utilities and help ensure communities stay safe and connected, Nicor Gas offers the following safe digging guidelines:

- Call before you dig. Before starting an outdoor digging project, contact 811 or visit www.illinois1call.com to request having underground utility lines marked at least two days prior to digging, excluding the day of the notice, but no more than 10 days prior to the proposed excavation.
- Allow the required time for marking. After contacting 811, allow time for the underground utility lines to be marked before digging. The approximate location of the lines will be marked with color-coded spray paint, flags or stakes that correspond to the utility. The natural gas markings will be yellow.
- Respect the marks. Only use hand-digging tools in areas near the utility line markings.
- Excavate carefully. Make sure the marks remain visible during the project. If the markings are no longer visible, contact 811 to have lines remarked. If a natural gas line is damaged accidentally or the distinctive rotten-egg odor associated with natural gas is present, call 911 or the Nicor Gas 24-hour emergency phone line at (888) 642-6748 from a safe location.

Loyola Medicine Celebrates Nurses Week

Nurses Week begins on Tuesday, May 6, and concluded on Florence Nightingale's birthday, May 12, which also marked International Nurses Day. This week-long celebration is a time to acknowledge and appreciate the hard work, dedication and compassion of nurses.

"Nurses are the backbone of our hospital," said Timothy M. Carrigan, PhD, RN, FACHE, NEA-BC, regional chief nursing officer of the Illinois/Indiana region for Trinity Health. "Our nurses often go above and beyond the call of duty for their patients, not only offering exceptional clinical care, but a genuine level of concern and support for patients and their families."

At Loyola, nursing is more than an occupation; it's a calling that, for some, is instilled in them since childhood. Loyola University Medical Center's Chief Nursing Officer and Vice President Teresa Rasmussen, DNP, RN, SCRN, CNML, NE-BC, has a long-standing legacy with Loyola. Rasmussen's mother was a floor nurse for nearly three decades.

"If it were me, I'm not sure how I would have handled it, but Giuliana is a tough cookie," said Giuliana's mother Angela. "She keeps telling her doctors and nurses that she wants to become a nurse in Loyola's Burn Center to help people. Her nurses were so gentle and compassionate, and she wants to be the same way."

Much like Nagle, Andrea Hinich's inspiration came from a difficult journey. Nearly 24 years ago, Hinich was transported by air ambulance to Loyola, where she delivered her daughter, Michelle, at only 28 weeks. Michelle spent two months in the NICU and Andrea spent three weeks in the ICU. She credits Loyola for saving both of their lives and inspiring her to begin nursing school. Coming from a family of public servants, Hinich decided to enlist in the U.S. Army to obtain her degree. Hinich was first hired at Loyola in 2015. Her daughter Michelle's life has come full circle as she is an NICU nurse helping others receive the care that saved her life.

"I've made many sacrifices to obtain my nursing license," said Hinich. "I hold its value in the highest regard. As a registered nurse, I am challenged to be adaptable to ever-changing environments on different units, working with a variety of patient populations. I live up to the challenge."



What is the Daily Recommended Calcium Intake?

While most of us are familiar with the role of calcium in bone health, this essential nutrient has several other vital functions in the body. Many people don't consume enough calcium, so it's important to know how much calcium you need each day and how to ensure you reach the recommended daily amount.

What is calcium?

Calcium is a mineral needed for good health. Your body can't produce calcium, so you must get it through your diet or supplements. Almost all of the calcium in the body is stored in your bones and teeth, helping to keep them strong. The rest is found in your blood, muscles and other tissues. Calcium has several important roles in the body. It is necessary for bone health and the proper functioning of muscles, nerves and blood vessels, as well as blood clotting and hormone secretion.

How much calcium do I need a day?

The amount of calcium you need each day depends on your age and sex.

The recommended dietary allowances (RDAs) for calcium are as follows:

Am I at risk of a calcium deficiency?

Nearly 30% of men and 60% of women do not consume enough calcium, according to the 2020-2025 dietary guidelines for Americans. Certain groups of people are at a higher risk of having a calcium deficiency. These include:

- People who are lactose intolerant or follow a vegan diet.
 Adults over age 50 living in poverty.
 Children and teenagers.
- Non-Hispanic Blacks and non-Hispanic Asians. Post-menopausal women.

What foods are good sources of calcium?

Since calcium plays a critical role in your health, it's important to know which foods are rich in calcium to ensure you get what you need from your daily diet.

You're probably aware that dairy is a good source of calcium. It's true that milk, cheese and yogurt contain calcium and tend to be the primary source for most people. However, there are plenty of other food sources of calcium as well. These include:

- Almonds. Calcium-fortified foods (such as some breakfast cereals). Calcium-fortified orange juice.
- Calcium-fortified nondairy milk (such as soy, almond and oat). Canned sardines and salmon with the bones.
- Leafy greens (such as collard greens, broccoli, bok choy and spinach). Winter squash.

Calcium supplements

If you find it challenging to get the calcium you need from food, you may want to consider dietary supplements. There are several different types of calcium supplements, with calcium carbonate and calcium citrate being the most common.

Vitamin D helps the body absorb calcium and some calcium supplements may also contain vitamin D. The body can only absorb about 500 mg of calcium at a time, so it's better to spread out your calcium intake rather than trying to get your full daily amount all at once.

Before you choose to take calcium supplements, speak with your health care provider, who can help you decide if calcium supplements are right for you.

Can too much calcium be harmful?

Yes, too much calcium can be harmful. The upper limit for daily calcium intake varies based on age, as listed here:

Excess calcium can be associated with the following:

- Constipation. Imbalances in other minerals in the blood, such as phosphate.
- Irregular heartbeat and chest pain. Kidney stones. Nausea and vomiting. Poor muscle tone.
- Risk of death from heart disease. Weakness and fatigue (extreme tiredness).

Too much calcium can also block the absorption of other important dietary minerals and some medications.

It's best to get your calcium from food sources when possible. Your health care provider can help guide you on the risks and benefits of taking a calcium supplement so that you can make the best decision for your individual needs.

· Increased urination.

What are the Benefits of Calcium, Magnesium and Zinc?

Calcium, magnesium and zinc are all important minerals your body needs for vital functions. Calcium and magnesium are needed in large quantities, while zinc is a trace mineral the body only requires in small amounts. These essential minerals provide a number of benefits for the body.

What does calcium do for the body?

Most calcium is found in our bones and teeth, and it keeps them firm and strong. Calcium is also needed for other tasks, like regulating heartbeat, muscle movement, sending nerve signals and blood clotting.

What type of calcium do I need?

There are many different kinds of supplements that contain calcium, including multivitamins. You may see calcium supplements that include vitamin D, since this helps your body to absorb calcium. Or you may see different formulations of calcium supplements, such as calcium citrate or calcium carbonate

Calcium citrate can be taken with or without food and is better absorbed by people with low stomach acid. Calcium carbonate, meanwhile, should be taken with food for the best absorption. Calcium carbonate may give you better value as it contains more elemental calcium – the actual amount absorbed by the body – than calcium citrate.

How should I take a calcium supplement?

Our bodies can absorb only about 500 mg to 600 mg of calcium at one time. If you're prescribed a higher dose, your health care provider may advise you to split this into smaller ones throughout the day.

Calcium can interact with prescription drugs and reduce the absorption of other mineral supplements, such as magnesium, zinc and iron. Although combination supplements, such as a calcium supplement with magnesium, can deliver several key minerals at once, you may want to consider taking a calcium supplement separately to allow your body to absorb it more effectively. Always take prescription medications and supplements as directed by your health care provider.

What is magnesium good for?

Magnesium is responsible for hundreds of functions in our bodies, including:

- Building protein and bones. Maintaining a regular heartbeat and making DNA.
- Regulating blood pressure and blood sugar.
 Magnesium is also needed to move calcium through the body.

Magnesium deficiency

Despite the many available dietary sources of magnesium, many people don't get the recommended amount of magnesium daily. A healthy diet and supplementation may be helpful in some cases.

People who take in too little magnesium over a long time may show a magnesium deficiency. Symptoms of this may include loss of appetite, nausea, vomiting and fatigue. Some medications may also reduce the amount of magnesium people can absorb or store in the body. The risk of magnesium deficiency is higher in older adults and people with certain conditions, such as gastrointestinal (gut) diseases, type 2 diabetes and alcohol dependence.

Magnesium for sleep

There is emerging evidence that magnesium could be beneficial for sleep, especially for people with restless leg syndrome and insomnia. Low magnesium levels are associated with poor sleep quality in some populations. However, more research is needed to conclude that magnesium helps with sleep.

What is zinc good for?

Like calcium and magnesium, zinc is an essential mineral the body needs to function. However, it's a trace mineral and is needed in much smaller quantities. Zinc is necessary for hundreds of processes in the body, including:

• Building proteins and healing tissue. • Cell growth. • DNA creation.

Zinc is important for immune system health, and it also helps your body fight bacteria, viruses and other microbes. The body also needs zinc to smell and taste properly.

Zinc deficiency is rare in the United States and is most often seen in people with digestive disorders or chronic liver or kidney disease. Signs of deficiency can include loss of taste or smell, poor appetite, slow wound healing and decreased immunity.

Zinc benefits for men

Without adequate zinc intake, men may experience erectile dysfunction (the inability to achieve or maintain an erection) or hypogonadism (a problem in which the body doesn't produce enough testosterone).

Calcium, magnesium and zinc are all important minerals the body needs for good health. These minerals are available in foods.

They're also available in individual calcium, zinc and magnesium supplements, as well as combination supplements and multivitamins.

Speak with your health care provider before taking supplements.

SOURCE WATER (MANDATORY)

VILLAGE OF MELROSE PARK DRINKING WATER SOURCE

Lake Michigan is the surface water supply used to provide drinking water for Chicago and 123 suburban communities. The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has found that the quality of Lake Michigan has improved dramatically over the past 21 years. Lake Michigan, by volume, is the second largest Great Lake and the only one located totally within the United States. It serves as a source of drinking water, as a place for swimming and fishing, and as a scenic wonderland. Sources of drinking water used for both tap water and bottled water can pick up contaminants as water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground. The drinking water source is vulnerable to industrial waste and runoff from surrounding lands. Potential sources of pollution such as pesticides, herbicides, radioactive materials, and organic and inorganic petroleum and gas production by-products can impact the source water. We do not have indications of the presence of these contaminants at this time, mainly because of restrictions, which prohibit industrial effluents from entering Lake Michigan, Sewage treatment plant effluents are not discharged into the lake, thereby reducing the threat of microbial contamination. All 63 miles of shoreline within Illinois are now considered to be in good condition. The Illinois EPA Office of Groundwater will be doing a source water assessment within the next three years. When completed, all sources of Pollutants into Lake Michigan will be identified and there will be information regarding the source water's susceptibility to contaminants based on the findings of the assessment. Since the quality of the raw water source is good, conventional treatment methods of disinfection, coagulation and sedimentation, and sand filtration are adequate for producing a water that is free of harmful contaminants.

HOW IS MY WATER TREATED AND PURIFIED?

The City of Chicago Water Department provides the water treatment necessary to safeguard the water delivered to Melrose Park. Water is taken from Lake Michigan at several water inlets located about 3 miles from shore. Chlorine is then injected into the water for disinfection. The water then flows through a series of settling and filtration basins where small amounts of polymer and sedimentation chemicals are added. After this process is complete, the water is filtered to remove the sediment. At this point the water is filtered through layers of fine charcoal and silicate sand. Small particles are removed and pure clean water is ready to be re-chlorinated as a safeguard and precaution against any microorganisms.

VOLUNTARY TESTING (OPTIONAL)

The Chicago Water Department monitors for contaminants which are proposed to be regulated or for which no standards currently exist but which could provide useful information in assessing the quality of the source water or the drinking water.

Cryptosporidium – Analyses have been conducted monthly on the source water since April 1993. Cryptosporidium has not been detected in these samples. Treatment processes have been optimized to ensure that if there are cryptosporidium cysts in the source water, they will be removed during the treatment process. By maintaining a low turbidity and thereby removing the particles from the water, the threat of cryptosporidium organisms getting into the drinking water system is greatly reduced.

Asbestos – Samples are examined for asbestos fibers in the source water and finished water on a routine basis. The EPA has determined that asbestos fibers greater than 10 microns in length could potentially cause lung cancer. We did not find fibers that are in this size category.

Taste and odor compounds – MIB and geosmin are monitored both in the source water and finished water. These analyses assist the personnel to determine the effectiveness of the treatment process as they strive to reduce these compounds and provide a drinking water without detectable tastes and odors.

The City of Chicago carefully monitors the chlorine, using just enough chlorine to protect its customers, without compromising taste. Lastly, fluoride is added to inhibit tooth decay. A corrosive inhibitor is added to protect the distribution system pipes.

The finished water is pumped into the City of Chicago supply system. The water there is pumped westerly by the city's Springfield Pumping Station through a 48"-36" supply line to the Village of Melrose Park's connection at Harlem and Wabansia.

Water is stored in the Village's 2 million gallon reservoir and again pumped by a booster station at 8300 North Avenue. The water travels through a 42" supply line to 2-4 million gallon reservoirs at the 15th Avenue pumping station and a 2 million gallon reservoir at the 23rd Avenue Main Pumping Station. At those points the water is pumped into the local water distribution lines. The Village of Melrose Park once again tests the water for chlorine levels, and adds the required chlorine to insure clean and safe water to its consumers.

SUBSTANCE EXPECTED IN DRINKING WATER

Under The Safe Drinking Water Act. S.D.W.A., the U.S.A. Environmental Protection Agency is responsible for establishing national limits for hundreds of substances in drinking water. The Act also specifies various treatments that water systems must use to remove these substances.

The Food and Drug Administration regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which must provide the same protection for public health.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the USEPA's Safe Water Hotline (1-800-426-4791).

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. USEPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by Cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the USEPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (1-800-426-4791).

LEAD EDUCATIONAL STATEMENT

If present, lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. The Village of Melrose Park is responsible for providing high quality drinking water and removing lead pipes, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components in your home. You share the responsibility for protecting yourself and your family from the lead in your home plumbing. You can take responsibility by identifying and removing lead materials within your home plumbing and taking steps to reduce your family's risk. Before drinking tap water, flush your pipes for several minutes by running your tap, taking a shower, doing laundry or a load of dishes. You can also use a filter certified by an American National Standards Institute accredited certifier to reduce lead in drinking water. IF THERE WERE A PROBLEM WITH WATER CONTAMINANT, WHO WOULD NOTIFY ME?

If contaminant levels were to exceed the M.C.L. for safe use, the Village of Melrose Park Department of Public Works will notify you with newspaper, TV and radio announcements. Also, the Village's Emergency Services/Public Safety would patrol the streets of Melrose Park instructing you of what appropriate action you can use to protect your family's health. These actions might include boiling the water for a particular period of time.

TABULAR INFORMATION

This report includes tables of contaminants found in drinking water. The tables do not list contaminants that were not found in the Chicago and Melrose Park water supply. Any contaminants detected in Melrose Park's water were under maximum contaminants levels (M.C.L.) within the safe drinking water guidelines set by U.S. EPA and are not expected to cause any health risks. However, it is important for you to know exactly what was detected and how much of the substance was present in the water.

The Village of Melrose Park hopes this information helps make its water customers better informed on the water we use in our homes and businesses.

2024 NON-DETECTED CONTAMINANTS

The following table includes contaminants monitored for, but not detected in the most recent sample. The CCR rule does not require that this information be reported; however, monitoring had indicated that these contaminants were not present in the water supply. In some cases, if a contaminant is not detected in a water supply, monitoring can be reduced to once every three or six years, however, the Village monitors every year.

Turbidity

Turbidity is a measure of the cloudiness of the water. We monitor it because it is a good indicator of water quality and the effectiveness of our filtration system and disinfectants.

Unregulated Contaminants:

A maximum contaminant level (MCL) for this contaminant has not been established by either state or federal regulations, nor has mandatory health effects language. The purpose for monitoring this contaminant is to assist USEPA in determining the occurrence of unregulated contaminants in drinking water, and whether future regulation is warranted.

Fluoride

Fluoride is added to the water supply to help promote strong teeth. The Illinois Department of Public Health recommends an optimal fluoride range of 0.9 mg/l to 1.2 mg/l.

Sodium

There is not a state or federal MCL for sodium. Monitoring is required to provide information to consumers and health officials that are concerned about sodium intake due to dietary precautions. If you are on a sodium-restricted diet, you should consult a physician about this level of sodium in the water.
