Village of Melrose Park Vehicle Sticker Information

All vehicles registered in the village of Melrose Park are required to display a current year Melrose Park vehicle sticker. Stickers must be renewed every two years and must be displayed on or before Jan. 1 of the applicable year. They are valid from Jan. 1 through Dec. 31 of the following year.

Who Needs a Sticker?

- All vehicles registered to a Melrose Park address.
- All vehicles registered to businesses located in Melrose Park.
- You must buy a sticker within 30 days of moving into the village or purchasing a vehicle.

Vehicle Sticker Fees

Passenger Cars (Regular Vehicles)

· Covers two years if purchased on time.

Seniors (Age 65+)

- · Covers two years if purchased on time.
- One free sticker per household (65 and older).
 - Choose one free two-year passenger car sticker or one free oneyear B-truck sticker.
- Second vehicle for a senior in the same household is \$15 (half price).
- Bring a valid driver's license or state ID as proof of age to receive your sticker.

Dear Melrose Park Deputy Police Chief Anthony Greco ...

I am writing to you to express our appreciation for all the assistance your department has provided us within the last few months. As you know, May and June were extremely busy months for our department, including a homicide and two gang-related shootings.

During our initial response to the homicide, officers encountered a chaotic scene with an entire apartment full of potential witnesses and offenders. Our patrol sergeant requested assistance from surrounding towns. Your officers responded immediately and assisted with securing the scene and transporting the subjects back to our department. Anytime we have ever asked for assistance from other agencies, we always have an immediate response from the Melrose Park Police Department.

I also want to recognize two individual members from your department:

- Ofc. Leonard Bartemio Ofc. Bartemio's assistance was crucial to our identification of a suspect involved in both of our shootings. He was able to provide us with intelligence that led us to the suspect who was at Loyola Hospital with a gunshot wound. Charges in this case are pending for DNA and ballistic lab results.
- Det. Dennis Natale Det. Natale has been a continuing resource for our Investigation Unit. He has been able to assist us with accessing cellphone data that would have otherwise taken months to retrieve through RCFL. We are extremely grateful for his assistance in both our homicide investigation, as well as our shootings.

Deputy chief, thank you again for your assistance. You have an excellent department who are always more than willing to go above and beyond to assist. If there is anything you need from us, please do not hesitate to reach out.

Always Stepping Up ...

Congrats MPPD Chief Pitassi ... Happy Retirement!

"Congratulations on an impeccable career," said Melrose Park Mayor Ron Serpico to retiring Police Chief Sam Pitassi at the June 23 Village Board meeting.

Mayor Serpico, at right, with new Police Chief Anthony Greco (left) thanked

Sam Pitassi for a record 51 years of service with the Melrose Park Police Department.

Originally hired by the village of Elk Grove, Sam graduated from the police academy and worked for nine months before jumping at the chance to work in his hometown. A patrolman from 1974 to 1982, he never tested for a promotion; he had only hoped that one day there would be an opportunity to work as a detective. That day not only came in 1983, but Sam's passion for the position continued to pay off as he rose to the rank of sergeant. detective, lieutenant detective and detective supervisor, never imagining he would be sworn in as deputy chief in 1999 and chief in 2007.





His official title became director of Police in 2016 – few others in law enforcement have careers that span more than 50 incredible years. "I really do think it's unprecedented," said Mayor Serpico. "He has had an impeccable career, never suspended, never reprimanded and represented Melrose Park with great integrity."

Asked to look back and reflect on any accomplishments that stand out, Sam is quick to tell good stories about his police partners, mentors and heroes, but he could only sum up his career in just a few words, "I wanted to leave the department better than I found it and I think I did that." No doubt many agreed with him as the Village Boardroom steadily filled up with old friends, neighbors, retired police officers, current officers and village staff who came to wish him well. In the first row, however, was what makes him especially proud – his family. "My daughter is an amazing teacher, my son has been on the Police Department for 12 years already, and my wife and I look forward to spending time with our grandchildren," said Pitassi.

"I'm 73 now, it's time for new thinking in the Police Department and I'm an old-fashioned thinking guy. Chief Greco knows exactly what to do. As a commander for the WESTAF Homicide Task Force (West Suburban Major Crimes Task Force) and recipient of the FBI-LEEDA Award, residents can be sure that Melrose Park's officers will be well-prepared to meet the challenges of modern policing. He has the best working with him – new deputy chiefs, Rodriguez and Scudiero; watch commanders – Lt. Nocita and Rodriguez; and new Lt. Anzaldi will take the department to the next level," added Pitassi. "What a tremendous honor it has been to work in Melrose Park."



Village of Melrose Park Residental Garbage Pickup Information

Republic Services Garbage Schedule for Residential Bi-Weekly Pickup

24th Avenue to 11th Avenue – Tuesday and Friday
Winston Park Area – Tuesday and Friday
West Melrose – Tuesday and Friday
North of North Avenue – Tuesday and Friday
Republic Services is contracted to pick up your regular, everyday garbage and household items, such as couches, tables, mattresses, box springs, desks and chairs, etc.

Recycling and yard waste is collected on Tuesdays from April through November and must be placed in a 33-gallon refuse can or biodegradable paper bags. Plastic bags will not be accepted.

All items are to be put out the night before or morning of scheduled garbage pickup.

Winston Park Area and West Melrose – Once garbage has been picked up, garbage container is to be removed from curb line and placed back on resident's property.

The Village of Melrose Park Public Works Department Garbage Pickup Schedule

24th Avenue to 10th Avenue – North Side from Cortez to North Avenue – Monday
24th Avenue to 10th Avenue – South Side from Cortez to Main Street – Tuesday
Winston Park Area – Wednesday West Melrose – Thursday North of North Avenue – Thursday
The village of Melrose Park Public Works Department pickup items include
all household remodeling items (homeowner/self – not contractor),
such as kitchen and bathroom cabinets, drywall and cement.

All items are to be put out the night before or before 7 a.m. the morning of scheduled garbage pickup.

Once village trucks have passed and picked up items, the trucks will not pass again.

Any other garbage items are not to be left out and are to be put out for the next scheduled pickup.

This service is for Melrose Park residents in single and two-flat buildings only. Commercial and apartment buildings must use a private scavenger company.

Village of Melrose Park Public Works regular hours are 7 a.m.-3 p.m.

Silver Creek Restoration Project

Under the direction of Mayor Ronald M. Serpico, the Village of Melrose Park Public Works employees constructed the Silver Creek Eagles Nest Park. This is a natural preserve that includes a walking path and a pavilion/gazebo, along with a canoe/kayak launch.

Phase 5 and 6 of the Silver Creek Stabilization Project have been completed.

Phase 7 is underway.

This stabilization project restores the natural balance of the creek by restoring the embankment, and bringing back native landscape and shrubbery along with aquatic habitat. This is an invaluable stream system that provides storm water runoff, flood management and many other benefits for the residents of Melrose Park.



Silver Creek Trail Park

The Silver Creek Trail Park is located off of First Avenue. The trail is centered off the pond between Silver Creek and its tributary, the Des Plaines River. Native plants of this area were once lost to development and are

now being reintroduced to the area. With the help of these native plants, more wildlife is returning to the area – from the Bald Eagle (sighted in the area), the Northern Pike, Red Foxes, Black-Crowned Night Herons and



Cooper's Hawk, to name a few.

- 1. No littering. Please clean up after any activities.
- 2. Pets must be leashed.
- 3. Smoking or fires are prohibited.
- 4. Please clean up pet waste and dispose of it.
- 5. Do not disturb any plants, trees or wildlife.
- 6. No loitering.
- 7. No hunting.
- 8. Fishermen must clean up any cut line, bail containers and all litter.
- 9. Park opens one hour after sunrise and closes one hour before sunset.
- 10. Enjoy the park.

Public Information Regarding Resident Safety Outdoor Warning System

Melrose Park has a siren warning system at multiple locations throughout the community. The system consists of several sirens strategically located throughout the village and is intended to provide outdoor warning of impending danger. You may only hear the sirens if you are outside. Please review the following information as it explains the function, operation and procedures associated with the Village of Melrose Park Outdoor Warning Siren System.

Warning System Activation

The system is designed to notify the community by alert warning and attack warning signals. the signals are standardized for outdoor warning devices by the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

Alert Warning

An alert warning signal is a three- to five-minute steady siren. This signal is used during a severe weather emergency or funnel cloud sighting. The reporting area includes a 10-mile perimeter around the village. The alert warning signal shall indicate to all persons to "immediately seek shelter, turn on your radio or television and listen for essential emergency information." Please note, severe weather watches are reports of weather conditions in which tornados could occur. The warning system is not activated for severe weather watches.

Attack Warning

An attack warning signal is a three- to five-minute wavering siren. This signal means that an actual attack against the United States has been detected and that the Federal Emergency Broadcast System has been activated. According to federal government guidelines, this signal will be used for no other purpose and will have no other meaning. The use of indoor warning systems is essential, as most residents and businesses will not hear the warning system unless they are outside. An indoor warning system includes commercial broadcast radio, television stations, cable television override systems, tone activated radio receivers and public address systems in public buildings.

Listen for the Siren Testing the First Tuesday of Every Month at 10 a.m.

It is important that the village system be tested on a regular schedule to ensure proper operation and to assist in educating the public to recognize the different warning signals. Testing occurs the first Tuesday of each month at 10 a.m. Federal and state guidelines indicate that monthly warning system tests should occur in the following manner:

- · Alert warning signal (steady siren) will sound for one minute.
- · One minute of silence.
- Attack warning signal (wavering siren) will sound for one minute.

This testing procedure will establish a test pattern different from that used in an actual emergency when the signals are sounded for three to five minutes.

Reactivation

Once it is activated, the warning sirens will not be reactivated for the same incident. The warning sirens will be reactivated for new, confirmed incidents.

All Clear

In keeping with established policies, the village of Melrose Park will not issue the all clear for any alert or attack signals. Please monitor commercial radio and television for further information.

Sheltering In Place

Should I Shelter at Home?

Taking appropriate shelter is critical in times of disaster. Sheltering is appropriate when conditions require that you seek protection in your home, place of employment or other location when disaster strikes. Sheltering outside the hazard area could include staying with friends and relatives, seeking commercial lodging or staying in a mass-care facility operated by disaster relief groups.

To effectively shelter, you must first consider the hazard and then choose a place in your home or other building that is safe for that hazard. For example, for a tornado, a room should be selected that is in a basement or an interior room on the lowest level away from corners, windows, doors and outside walls.

The safest locations to seek shelter vary by hazard. Be Informed about the sheltering suggestions for each hazard.

There may be situations, depending on your circumstances and the nature of the disaster, when it's simply best to stay where you are and avoid any uncertainty outside by sheltering in place.

The length of time you are required to shelter may be short, such as during a tornado warning, or long, such as during a winter storm or a pandemic. It is important that you stay in shelter until local authorities say it is safe to leave. Additionally, you should take turns listening to radio broadcasts and maintain a 24-hour safety watch.

During extended periods of sheltering, you will need to manage water and food supplies to ensure you and your family have the required supplies and quantities. **Guidelines for Staying Put (Sheltering In Place)**

Whether you are at home, work or elsewhere, there may be situations when it's simply best to stay where you are and avoid any uncertainty outside.

There may be circumstances when staying put and creating a barrier between yourself and potentially contaminated air outside, a process known as "sealing the room," is a matter of survival.

Use common sense and available information to assess the situation and determine if there is immediate danger. If you see large amounts of debris in the air, or if local authorities say the air is badly contaminated, you may want to take this kind of action.

The process used to seal the room is considered a temporary protective measure to create a barrier between you and potentially contaminated air outside. It is a type of sheltering in place that requires preplanning.

Additional Sheltering in Place Guidelines

- · Bring your family and pets inside.
- · Lock doors, close windows, air vents and fireplace dampers.
- Turn off fans, air conditioning and forced air heating systems.
- Take your emergency supply kit, unless you have reason to believe it has been contaminated.
- Go into an interior room with few windows, if possible.
- Seal all windows, doors and air vents with 2-4 mil. thick plastic sheeting and duct tape. Consider measuring and cutting the sheeting in advance to save time.
- Cut the plastic sheeting several inches wider than the openings and label each sheet.
- Duct tape plastic at corners first and then tape down all edges.
- · Be prepared to improvise and use what you have on hand to seal gaps so that you create a barrier between yourself and any contamination.
- Local authorities may not immediately be able to provide information on what is happening and what you should do. However, you should watch TV, listen to the radio or check the internet often for official news and instructions as they become available.

Garage Sale Notice

Garage Sales are Back ... It's Time to Sell All Those Treasures

The rules on garage sales held in the village of Melrose Park are as follows:

Garage sales will be held on the third weekend only during the months of May, June,

July, August and September. Sales are to be conducted on Thursday, Friday and Saturday of the designated weekends. No sales are allowed on Sundays.

The remaining dates for 2025 are Aug. 21-23 and Sept. 18-20.

Garage sales shall be conducted only during the hours of 9 a.m.-5 p.m.

No permit is needed for garage sales, however the following rules must be followed:

- No garage sales may be conducted in apartment buildings.
- No garage sales in the frontyard, i.e., on the grass.
- All garage sales to be conducted in backyard, garage or on driveway.
- All sale items to be displayed on tables, not on the ground.
- No sale items shall be located and no sale activity shall be conducted in the frontyard area, on the premises of any public sidewalk, parkway area or other public property.
- No sale signs, handbills or other advertising material shall be located or posted upon public parkway or on public property, signs, poles or light poles within the village of Melrose Park.
- Signs advertising the sales shall not exceed 3-by-5 feet and may be located only in the frontyard (private property) of the address having the garage sale, and must be removed immediately after the sale.
- The sale will be conducted without the use of outdoor loud speakers, amplification equipment or illuminated advertising devices.

Any person violating these rules shall be subject to a fine not to exceed \$500. A copy of garage sale rules is available at www.melrosepark.org.





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

Triton Helps Students Build Skills for Academic and Career Success

Sometimes, we all need a little bit of help — a little assistance here and there to get our ducks in a row, catch up on our work, and prepare for the next task. But asking for help and getting the guidance you need is often easier said than done, according to Danielle Flores, coordinator of the Center for Access and Accommodative Services (CAAS) at Triton College.

That's why Flores is working to break down barriers and improve access for students, helping them foster and strengthen the skills needed to achieve their academic goals and set themselves up for success when they enter the workforce.

Flores specializes in executive function coaching, which helps individuals develop and strengthen the cognitive skills needed for organization, planning and task completion. Coaching focuses on improving everyday skills like time management, organization, planning, working memory and emotional regulation.

"Executive function coaching isn't a novel concept," Flores said. "But it's something that frequently flies under the radar. And asking for help is something that has become highly stigmatized," she added.

"We're supposed to be people who can do everything and anything, but that's just not how it is," she said. "I think we learn from our mistakes and I think it's always important to ask for help because there's always someone else who can do something better than you — and that's OK."

"You can't always be the best. I think it's important that we normalize asking for help."

Flores has provided executive function coaching at Triton College since the spring of 2024. Since then, she's helped roughly 30 students. Most students who seek her assistance need help with time management, turning in assignments on time, focusing, studying and improving their grades.

Flores said the coaching process involves identifying specific challenges, setting goals and implementing strategies to attain better outcomes. Because no two people are the same, each case is individualized and the frequency with which she meets with students varies. Students work with her to identify where they need help and make a plan to reach their objectives.

First-year student William Malinowski has been attending coaching sessions with Flores since starting at Triton. Malinowski, who's pursuing an associate degree in business, said he was falling behind in his classes and struggling to keep his grades up, prompting him to seek guidance from Flores.

"When I had an issue with a class and my grades, I always talked to Danielle about them and she would help me understand what I should do," he said.

After meeting with Flores, Malinowski began using Otter.ai, a speech-to-text software that allows users to record conversations and lectures, and convert them into written text for later reference.

"By using Otter, it really helped me study for my exams, tests and also my assignments," said Malinowski, who urged other students to seek academic coaching if they think they might need it.

Flores, who holds a bachelor's degree in psychology, previously worked in special education for 15 years and later in the private sector, coaching stu-

dents and working adults from across the country and beyond in executive functioning.

"These aren't just students that need a helping hand," she said. "These are doctors and lawyers, and they just couldn't quite manage their schedules or they didn't have the best planning resources. These are everyday people."

Flores emphasizes that her work at Triton College is about much more than helping students improve their grades. It's about working with them to build skills that will allow them to excel in their future careers.

"The cool part is that in finding the tools that work for you now, when you go into the workplace, you can be successful. You can complete your tasks efficiently, and then you can have time for a balanced life, a family and friends."

Triton College's Ava Connerty Named USTFCCCA Scholar Athlete of the Year

Mere months after making school history at Triton College, recent graduate Ava Connerty was selected the 2025 NJCAA Division III Women's Outdoor Track & Field National Scholar Track Athlete of the Year by the United States Track & Field and Cross Country Coaches Association (USTFCCCA).

The USTFCCCA recognized top scholar athletes from all collegiate levels, including Connerty, for standing out in all areas of the student-athlete experience.

Connerty, a two-time NJCAA All-American who wrapped up her monumental athletic career as a Trojan in May, has been a trailblazer for Triton's Track & Field Program. Her recent accolade marks the first time in program history that an athlete from Triton has been named National Track Scholar Athlete of the Year in outdoor track & field.

"It's an honor to be recognized (by the USTFCCCA) for both my work on the track and in the classroom," said Connerty, of North Riverside. "This award is a reminder that my dedication in all areas paid off."

Connerty won the 100-meter hurdles and was a member of the third-place 4x400 relay team at the 2025 NJCAA DIII Outdoor Track & Field Championships in Utica, New York, on May 10.

Her championship run made her the first women's track athlete representing Triton to win an individual national title. In a thrilling finish, Connerty captured the national title by two-tenths of a second.

"I honestly never thought that I would be a national champion," Connerty said in May about her win. "It's so amazing seeing all of my training pay off in the best way possible. Knowing that I'm the first female track national champion in Triton history is unbelievable."

Connerty's drive on the track was matched by her zeal in the classroom, enabling her to achieve a cumulative 3.9 grade-point average during the 2024-2025 academic year. Two weeks after winning her national title, Connerty walked the stage of the Rosemont Theatre as a Triton graduate, leaving with an associate degree in psychology.

In June, Connerty committed to attend Nova Southeastern University, an NCAA Division II institution in Davie, Florida, on an athletic scholarship where she'll continue to run track and pursue her four-year degree.

"Having Ava run for Triton College has been a great experience," said Trojans head track & field coach Jason Guevarra "Not only is she a tremendous athlete, but she values education and success. I am so proud of Ava and what she has accomplished on and off the track. She will be a great addition to her new team when she transfers to Nova Southeastern in Florida."


insights gathered from the meetings they attended and other students they convened with.

This past June, the Cook County Board of Commissioners approved \$8.6 million to support a second phase of the Cook County Down Payment Assistance Program, which will assist residents in the homebuying process.

"Part of the American Dream is homeownership and this program has helped that dream become reality for hundreds of Cook County households," said Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle. "I'm grateful to the Cook County Board of Commissioners for its support of a second round of funding, and we look forward to helping even more people as they look to purchase a home. My administration is committed to making Cook County a viable place to live, work and raise a family."

The second phase of the Cook County Down Payment Assistance Program comes in the wake of a \$3 million pilot program that launched in 2024 and assisted in the purchase of over 200 homes countywide.

As part of the program, the Cook County Bureau of Economic Development partners with Stifel, Inc., an investment banking firm, and Club 720 Solutions LLC, which helps individuals achieve homeownership by providing access to down payment assistance programs, coaching and educational resources.

The Cook County Down Payment Assistance Program provides subsidies equal to 5% of the home's sale price, up to \$25,000. Subsidies can assist with down payments, closing costs or interest-rate buydowns for homes located in Cook County.

"For many individuals and their families, the main avenue for generational wealth and long-term financial security is home ownership," said Commissioner Frank J. Aguilar. "But not all potential homeowners are the same. Ensuring we are taking steps and supporting programs that help increase the access people have to home ownership is critical in supporting our constituents and the communities where they want to build a life."

The assistance is provided as a forgivable second loan over a five-year term.

Households with an annual income at or below 120% of the area median income (AMI) are eligible. For a family of four, this is \$143,880.

For those buying in disproportionately impacted areas or qualified census tracts, there is no income limit.

Applicants must also have a minimum credit score of 620.

All first-time homebuyers – which include those purchasing a home for the first time in three years – must complete a nationally accredited course through a U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development-approved housing counseling agency before closing.

Homes may include single-family homes, townhomes or condominiums.

During the pilot program, participants received an average of \$15,000 in assistance, and 80% of participants were first-time homebuyers. The program allowed buyers to access homes priced from \$200,000 to \$400,000, which had previously been considered beyond their means.

The Cook County Down Payment Assistance Program is part of a broader commitment by the county to expand affordable housing access and create equity in homeownership across the region.

Club 720 will host biweekly virtual workshops that will educate homebuyers about eligibility, how to apply and how to work with participating lenders. These sessions, available in English and Spanish, will feature expert housing counselors, real estate professionals and lending partners.

Giannoulias Launches Driving Change Campaign for Auto Insurance Fairness

Campaign Seeks Input from Illinoisans Through New Website and Statewide Town Halls

Illinois Secretary of State Alexi Giannoulias is launching a statewide advocacy campaign aimed at preventing insurance companies from using socio-economic data – such as credit scores, ZIP codes and age – to charge Illinoisans higher auto insurance rates.

As part of his "Driving Change" Campaign, Giannoulias is seeking input from Illinoisans, asking them to share their stories about unfair and discriminatory ratemaking practices employed by auto insurance companies. Giannoulias launched the campaign recently in Chicago's Bronzeville neighborhood, joined by supporters, including AARP Illinois and legislative sponsors State Sen. Ram Villivalam (8th District-Chicago) and State Rep. Rita Mayfield (60th District-Waukegan).

"As secretary of state, I strongly believe that an individual's driving record should serve as the primary factor that's analyzed when setting auto insurance rates," Giannoulias said. "Insurance companies need to implement a ratemaking process that's fair and transparent. The current system results in fewer Illinoisans being able to afford insurance and fewer opting to pay for it, making our roads less safe for everyone."

"Older drivers in Illinois are the safest drivers and their auto insurance rates should reflect this," said Philippe Largent, state director for AARP Illinois. "On behalf of our 1.7 million members across the state, we applaud Secretary Giannoulias for his interest in finding a ratemaking process that does not discriminate against drivers for their age. And we look forward to working with his office, the insurance industry and the general assembly to develop criteria that ensures Illinois' safe drivers are not penalized for non-driving related factors. They deserve rates that are as low and fair as possible."

A new Secretary of State website – www.ilsos.gov/drivingchange – enables Illinoisans to learn more about the issue and easily share their stories about unfair and discriminatory ratemaking practices by insurance companies. The site also allows users to email their state representative and senator, and urge them to support reforming the current system.

Over the next several weeks, the Secretary of State's Office is also conducting a series of town hall meetings across the state to gather local input and help inform legislation to be filed in the next general assembly session. Locations and times of the town hall meetings will be posted on www.ilsos.gov/drivingchange.

Upcoming town hall meetings: Aug. 26 – South Suburbs; Sept. 3 – Metro East; Sept. 17 – Champaign; Sept. 22 – Chicago, West Side; Sept. 24 – Peoria; Oct. 1 – Rockford; and Oct. 15 – Springfield.

Illinois-focused studies have revealed ratemaking inequities and disparities, including insurers on average increasing rates on senior drivers and charging consumers with a safe driving record and poor credit hundreds of dollars more than someone with a DUI conviction and excellent credit. As a result, drivers from disadvantaged neighborhoods and communities of color disproportionately suffer.

The launch of the campaign comes as insurance rates for both homes and automobiles are skyrocketing. According to Insurify, Illinois auto insurance rates increased 18% in 2024 and are projected to increase another 4% in 2025, bringing the projected annual cost of full coverage to \$2,050. Meanwhile, new tariffs are expected to cause auto part prices to climb and result in insurance rates soaring even higher.

Along with factors like credit reports, address and age, insurance companies are using third-party site data from sources like social media and common cellphone apps, which can be used in a discriminatory way to unfairly determine rates.

In addition, State Farm announced recently that it would start hiking homeowners insurance rates by more than 27%, prompting Gov. JB Pritzker to call on the legislature to find a solution.

Like most states, Illinois requires every vehicle owner to buy insurance, but it is one of only two states – along with Wyoming – that doesn't require prior rate review to protect insurance customers from excessive or unfair rates.

Giannoulias Legislation to Enhance Protections for Illinois Libraries and Librarians Signed into Law

Libraries Can Use State Funding Grants to Increase Safety

Bipartisan legislation drafted by Illinois Secretary of State Alexi Giannoulias designed to improve security at libraries and enhance safety for librarians was recently signed into law.

The measure, which was approved in the general assembly this spring, allows the Secretary of State's Office to issue funding grants to increase security measures at public, school and academic libraries.

"I firmly believe that libraries should serve as welcoming places for lifelong learning and community engagement, but unfortunately, they have faced increased threats of violence and acts of intimidation in recent years," Giannoulias said. "Meanwhile, the personal safety and welfare of many librarians has been placed at risk for simply doing their jobs. Their personal safety at work should not be their primary concern."

The legislation, which was signed into law recently by Gov. JB Pritzker and takes effect on Jan. 1, 2026, was sponsored by State Sen. Laura Murphy (28th District-Des Plaines) and State Rep. Michael Coffey Jr. (95th District-Springfield), and had strong support from the Illinois Library Association and the Illinois Municipal League.

The legislation comes after several libraries across the state received bomb threats in recent years, including the Illinois State Library. There have been more than 25 bomb threats with multiple libraries responding to repeat threats during the past two years.

While state law contains penalties for threats targeting schools, public officials and human services providers, it does not include the same protections for all libraries and librarians.

Under the legislation, state library grant applicants will have the ability to use funding to install things like security cameras, silent alarms or security check points for which funding is not always available and until now grants were not authorized to support.

State Treasurer Michael Frerichs Returns Record \$303 Million to People, Businesses, Nonprofits in Fiscal Year 2025

Illinois State Treasurer Michael Frerichs returned a record \$303.8 million in missing money to nearly 312,000 residents, businesses and organizations through the I-CASH Program during Fiscal Year 2025.

Frerichs marked the record-breaking total by presenting a check for more than \$200,000 to the Orphans of the Storm animal shelter in Riverwoods. The money comes from a late Lake County woman who named the shelter as a beneficiary of her life insurance policy.

"We made common-sense changes to I-CASH to return more money to more folks and we are proud to set records," Frerichs said. "But we're even more proud of helping people. One of my biggest fights was to take on insurance companies to make sure life insurance benefits rightfully end up with the people and organizations they were left to."

This gift represents a meaningful and impactful contribution to Orphans of the Storm and comes as the shelter approaches its 100th anniversary and is actively planning for the next century of compassionate animal care.

"We are deeply grateful for this generous gift and for Treasurer Frerichs' leadership in making sure it reached us," said Michelle Shields, volunteer president of the board of directors at Orphans of the Storm. "For nearly a century, our shelter has been part of the fabric of this community. We have connected people and animals through love, care and second chances. This support honors that legacy and helps us build toward a future where every animal has a safe place to land and a family to call their own."

I-CASH is one of Illinois' oldest consumer protection initiatives. The Illinois State Treasurer's Office is tasked with safeguarding and returning unclaimed property, including the contents of overlooked safe deposit boxes, unpaid life insurance benefits, forgotten bank accounts and unused rebate cards. The

Illinois Treasurer is legally required to return unclaimed property to its owner or heirs, no matter how long it takes.

The record-setting \$303.8 million Treasurer Frerichs returned in missing money broke last year's mark, which was \$301 million.

"It's not just people we return money to, but businesses and organizations as well," Frerichs said. "We encourage business owners and nonprofit groups to check the I-CASH site to see if we have money waiting for them to claim."

The Enhanced Money Match Program is a key driver in this success, taking the "claim" out of unclaimed property by automatically returning money without the need to file a claim after some information is electronically verified. This summer, a record-breaking 600,000 people will receive \$45 million in money they didn't even know they had coming.

Most of the matched claims in this Enhanced Money Match round equal \$50 or less, though some people can have multiple claims and their checks will amount to much more. Frerichs' office founded the Enhanced Money Match Program in 2018 and has since returned more than \$130 million to more than 870,000 people.

All told, Frerichs has returned more than \$2.3 billion in missing money during his time in office. When Frerichs first became treasurer, there were 60,000 claims paid a year. Today, more than 300,000 claims are paid a year, owing in no small part to Frerichs' complete restructuring of the missing money process. The State Treasurer's Office added electronic claims and eliminated red tape that slowed small-money claims.

Frerichs also added a Friends and Family "share" feature. When visitors to the I-CASH website come across the name of someone they know, they can select the "share" icon and provide the email address of their friend or relative. Frerichs' office will notify the individual by sending an email that mentions the missing money along with the name of the friend or relative who spotted it. Then, that individual can start the process of retrieving their missing money.

Last year, Treasurer Frerichs unveiled a Spanish-language missing money website. The site works the same way as its English-language counterpart. People enter a name and city or ZIP code into the search box, and if there's a match, they can start filing a claim online.

When the Treasurer's Office's safe deposit boxes fill up, unclaimed items go up for auction after 10 years of private and public attempts to locate the owner or heirs.

Illinois is a national leader in the unclaimed property space and is frequently consulted by other states' leaders who are seeking to reform their unclaimed property laws, rules and procedures.

The Illinois State Treasurer's Office recommends that people check at least twice each year at icash.illinoistreasurer.gov to see if missing money is waiting for you.

Illinois Treasurer Michael Frerichs Returns Lost Purple Heart to Family of D-Day Survivor

Operation Purple Heart Finds 15th Family Whose Military Honors Were Missing for Years

Ahead of Independence Day, Illinois Treasurer Michael Frerichs returned a lost Purple Heart medal to the brother and granddaughter of a World War II veteran who earned it while fighting to liberate Europe.

Frerichs reunited Army Private John L. Moore's medal with Jerry Moore, his youngest brother, and Angie Holliger, Private Moore's granddaughter, during a ceremony at the World War II Memorial in Decatur, where Jerry lives.

It is the 15th lost medal Frerichs has returned as part of Operation Purple Heart, an unprecedented mission to return lost medals with the rightful owners. The iconic military honor is given to individuals wounded or killed during military combat.

"Private Moore defended democracy during some of the fiercest battles of WW II," Frerichs said. "It is an honor to finally return his Purple Heart to his loving family."

John Moore survived the 1944 D-Day invasion only to be wounded weeks later by shrapnel in his right wrist, left knee and lower right leg. The 20-year-old later returned to battle on the front lines, including in Rhineland. However, nerve damage diminished the use of his hand, which led to additional hospitalizations.

Private Moore returned to Illinois in 1946, going back to Peoria where he grew up. He and wife Grace had five children.

The war injuries caused Moore chronic pain, especially in his legs, according to family members. Nevertheless, he worked in the trades doing carpentry and roofing. He also spent time as a truck driver, postal worker and maintenance supervisor before retiring in 1986.

He enjoyed the outdoors, especially hunting and fishing, and was very active in military organizations in Peoria Heights and East Peoria. He died at 78 in 2002 after suffering a heart attack.

"My brother was very proud of his military service, and it is very nice to have this Purple Heart back in the family," said Jerry Moore, who also served in the Army.

"I cannot believe I am holding my grandfather's Purple Heart," granddaughter Holliger said. "He was very proud of his service and it showed through all of his work with the veterans back home."

The Purple Heart was in a safe deposit box submitted to the State Treasurer's Office in 2001. The 15 Purple Heart medals Treasurer Frerichs has returned is an unparalleled record in Illinois and the nation. Information about Operation Purple Heart, including a full list of Purple Heart medals returned and awaiting return, is available at operation purple heart.org.

Military medals are among the most difficult items to return because neither the Armed Forces nor the federal government maintain a comprehensive list of awardees. In most of these cases, the conflict in which the Purple Heart was awarded, such as World War I, World War II, Korea, Vietnam or Desert Storm, is unclear or unknown.

Each of the Purple Heart medals was inside a bank safe deposit box. Each bank determined the safe deposit box abandoned because the owner(s) of the box had not touched it in several years. As a result, the contents were turned over to the Illinois State Treasurer's Office I-CASH Program.

Safeguarding unclaimed property until it can be returned to its owners or heirs – no matter how long it takes – is a core function of the State Treasurer's Office. Other examples of unclaimed property include bank accounts, unpaid life insurance benefits and uncashed rebate checks.



Dominican Literacy Center Continues to Provide English Instruction and More ...

The Dominican Literacy Center originally began in Chicago, at the request of the pastor of Our Lady of Grace Parish in 1996. In 2008, the building housing the center was deemed to need extensive repairs and could not be used. In June of 2008, the center was graciously welcomed to rent a part of Sacred Heart Convent in Melrose Park, where it has continued to provide English instruction for the past 14 years.

The goal of the Dominican Literacy Center is the empowerment of persons who experience personal and economic limitations within our English-speaking society. Through literacy education and personal relationships, we strive to provide a small step toward eliminating racial and cultural prejudice and stereotypes, as well as a step up for persons seeking improvement in their personal, familial and economic abilities.

The Dominican Literacy Center provides weekly one and half hour tutored sessions in which one student meets with one tutor. The center provides tutoring in speaking, reading and writing English, as well as tutoring in preparation for the Citizenship interview and exam. This individualized instruction is provided for immigrant women and men (ages 17+) who are – endeavoring to reduce literacy and its consequential effects of isolation (due to their inability to communicate in English with health care providers, children's teachers, neighbors, co-workers, community leaders and/or first responders); in low-level jobs (due to lack of training or skills, or an inability to demonstrate their already achieved skills and knowledge); powerless to supervise their adolescent children or to influence systemic change; lacking confidence to enroll in traditional classes and or fear of requesting help when needed.

English Classes

English classes are provided for those who want to learn to speak, read or write in English. One student meets with one tutor, once a week.

These classes are offered at the Dominican Literacy Center, 1503 Rice Street, in Melrose Park (near Sacred Heart/St. Eulalia Parish).

Our program also assists persons studying for their Citizenship interview/exam.

We presently offer classes on Monday through Thursday, in the mornings and afternoons.

ComEd Opens Applications for Customer Relief Fund, \$10 Million in Bill Relief Now Available

One-time Grants of Up to \$500 are Available for Income-Eligible Customers and Up to \$1,000 for Nonprofit Organizations While Funds Last

ComEd has encouraged customers to begin applying to the Customer Relief Fund, which offers one-time grants of up to \$500 for qualifying low- to moderate-income residential customers and \$1,000 for nonprofit organizations to help those struggling with rising energy costs in Northern Illinois. Supported by Exelon, ComEd's parent company, the Customer Relief Fund has allocated \$10 million in bill assistance grants, provided on a first-come, first-served basis to eligible customers, while funds last.

To administer the funds, ComEd is partnering with trusted community organizations, Neighborhood Housing Services (NHS) of Chicago and The Salvation Army (TSA), the latter of which hosted the announcement at its Red Shield Office in Chicago's Englewood neighborhood. To apply, qualifying customers can find online applications through either organization at ComEd.com/Relief or through one of the following partner organizations, both of which will have a list of locations for customers to submit applications in person:

"As energy costs rise from summer heat and increasing capacity charges, we understand the financial strain this can place on families and community organizations," said Melissa Washington, senior vice president of Customer Operations and Strategic Initiatives at ComEd. "That's why ComEd is working with community partners to deliver the Customer Relief Fund, reflecting our ongoing commitment to providing affordable energy and supporting customers during trying times. These grants do not need to be paid back and they are designed to provide immediate relief to those who need it most."

To be eligible for this bill assistance offer, residential customers must currently have past due electric bills and be at or below 300% of the Federal Poverty Level. For a family of four, that is equal to an annual household income of \$96,450.

Nonprofit customers must provide documentation of active 501(c)(3) status to apply. For residential customers who received LIHEAP assistance within the last 18 months, no documentation is required during the application. Residential customers who have not received prior assistance must provide documentation to confirm their income level.

"The Salvation Army believes that every family—throughout the city of Chicago or across Northern Illinois — should be able to live in a home where basic necessities, such as electricity, do not create undue financial hardship," said Lt. Colonel Jonathan Rich, divisional commander of The Salvation Army North and Central Illinois Division. "The Customer Relief Fund is a timely and critical resource for households facing financial hardship, and we are proud to partner with ComEd to help provide immediate support while working together toward long-term, sustainable solutions that foster dignity and stability for those we serve across northern Illinois."

After applying, TSA and NHS will notify customers that their application has been approved or denied and the grant will appear on the customer's electric bill within one to two billing cycles.

"The recent dangerous heat wave reminded us how critical reliable electricity and air conditioning are – especially for our elders and the most vulnerable in our communities," said Anthony E. Simpkins, president and CEO of Neighborhood Housing Services of Chicago. "With many more hot days ahead this summer, the need for support is only growing. That's why NHS Chicago is proud to partner with the Salvation Army and ComEd to help deliver financial assistance to those in need. We're committed to strengthening neighborhoods and supporting families and this partnership is another way we can keep our communities safe, healthy and connected."

The Customer Relief Fund also aims to serve as a financial-support bridge from the end of LIHEAP's funding season late this summer to the launch of ComEd's forthcoming Low-Income Discount Program in January 2026. The fund complements ComEd's existing menu of bill assistance and energy management options, which last year alone connected more than 229,000 customers to \$133 million in various bill-assistance options.

Operations and Strategic Initiatives, where she has led the company in reshaping its customer experience, creating new customer tools to provide energy billing relief and to boost customer participation in clean energy technology and energy management solutions, including growing the impact of ComEd's industry-leading energy efficiency programs.

Washington is active in service to her community, serving in leadership roles with several local boards, including the Metropolitan Planning Council, the Civic Consulting Alliance, the Chicago Children's Advocacy Center board, and the Leadership Greater Chicago board. She is also a member of several professional groups, including serving as board secretary of Smart Electric Power Alliance (SEPA), a member of the American Association of Blacks in Energy (AABE) and the Association of Edison Illuminating Companies (AEIC). She earned her bachelor's degree in finance from Lewis University and her MBA from Keller Graduate School of Management.

"This is an exciting time to join the GREA team as we continue to bring clean energy solutions to communities in Northern Illinois," said Washington. In total, the ComEd Powering the Holidays Program has awarded nearly \$170,000 to 70 unique holiday projects that celebrate diverse cultures and traditions while fostering a sense of togetherness in our communities. Applications will be reviewed by an external panel of judges, with final awardees expected to be announced in October.
