Tinsel was invented in Germany in 1610 and was initially made of real silver.



VILLAGE OF MELROSE PAK VEHICLE STICKER INFORMATION FOR 2026-2027

All vehicles registered in the village of Melrose Park are required to display a current Melrose Park vehicle sticker.

New stickers (valid from Jan. 1, 2026-Dec. 31, 2027) can be renewed now and must be displayed on or before Jan. 1, 2026.

All 2025 Vehicle Stickers Expire on Dec. 31, 2025.

 New stickers for 2026-2027 are available at the Melrose Park Village Hall.

Who Needs a 2026-2027 Sticker?

- · All vehicles registered to a Melrose Park address.
- All vehicles registered to businesses located in Melrose Park.
- You must buy a sticker within 30 days of moving into the village or purchasing a vehicle.

Vehicle Sticker Fees

Passenger Cars (Regular Vehicles)

· Covers two years if purchased on time.

Seniors (Age 65+)

- · Covers two years (2026-2027) if purchased on time.
- · One free sticker per household (65 and older).
 - Choose one free two-year passenger car sticker or one free oneyear B-truck sticker.
- Second vehicle for a senior in the same household is \$15 (half price).
- Bring a valid driver's license or state ID as proof of age to receive your sticker.

A Message from Rick Beltrame, Director of Fire Department

The Melrose Park Fire Department and Director of Fire Department Rick Beltrame want to ensure the safety of our residents and their families by providing these candle and portable space heater safety tips on behalf of the National Fire Protection Association.

Please follow these tips to ensure your family's well-being!



Candles may be pretty to look at but they are a cause of home fires — and home fire deaths. Remember, a candle is an open flame, which means that it can easily ignite anything that can burn.

"CANDLE WITH CARE"

- Blow out all candles when you leave the room or go to bed. Avoid the use of candles in the bedroom and other areas where people may fall asleep.
- Keep candles at least 1 foot (30 centimetres) away from anything that can burn.

Think about using flameless candles in your home. They look and smell like real candles.

IF YOU DO BURN CANDLES, make sure that you...

- Use candle holders that are sturdy, and won't tip over easily.
- Put candle holders on a sturdy, uncluttered surface.
- Light candles carefully. Keep your hair and any loose clothing away from the flame.
- Don't burn a candle all the way down put it out before it gets too close to the holder or container.
- Never use a candle if oxygen is used in the home.
- Have flashlights and battery-powered lighting ready to use during a power outage. Never use candles.

Candles and Kids

Never leave a child alone in a room with a burning candle. Keep matches and lighters up high and out of children's reach, in a locked cabinet.



FACTS

- 1 December is the peak month for home candle fires.
- ! More than **one-third** of home candle fires started in the bedroom.
- ! Three of every five candle fires start when things that can burn are too close to the candle.







When the weather turns cold, it can bring a chill into our homes. Portable space heaters have become a popular way to supplement central heating or heat one room. If you plan to use portable electric space heaters, make sure to follow these tips and recommendations:

HEATER CHECKLIST

- Purchase a heater with the seal of a qualified testing laboratory.
- Keep the heater at least 3 feet (1 metre) away from anything that can burn, including people.
- Choose a heater with a thermostat and overheat protection.
- Place the heater on a solid, flat surface.
- Make sure your heater has an auto shut-off to turn the heater off if it tips over.
- Keep space heaters out of the way of foot traffic.
 Never block an exit.
- Keep children away from the space heater.
- Plug the heater directly into the wall outlet.
 Never use an extension cord.
- Space heaters should be turned off and unplugged when you leave the room or go to bed.

Types of electric space heaters

Oil or water-filled radiator

Heated oil or water travels through the heater.

Fan-forced heater


A fan blows warm air over metal coils.

Ceramic heater

Air is warmed over a ceramic heating element.

Infrared heaters

Heat is created by infrared bulbs.





Winter Holiday Safety Tips

This holiday season, don't let the spirit of giving lull you into giving burglars, muggers and pickpockets a better chance to do their dirty work. Crooks love the holidays as much as everyone else, especially because it's an opportune time for crime. Homes jam packed with glittering gifts. Stores, malls and downtown streets teeming with unsuspecting shoppers. People rushing around, stressed out and careless, looking for last-minute gifts, trying to get everything done. It's enough to make a crook giddy with holiday joy.

Here are some tips on how to celebrate safely this holiday season.

If You are Traveling

- · Get an automatic timer for your lights.
- Ask a neighbor to watch your home, shovel snow and park in the driveway from time to time.
- Don't forget to have mail and newspaper delivery stopped. If it piles up, it's a sure sign you're gone.

If You are Out for the Evening

- Turn on lights and a radio or TV so it looks like someone's home.
- Be extra cautious about locking doors and windows when you leave, even if it's just for a few minutes.
- Don't display gifts where they can be seen from outside.

If You are Shopping

- Stay alert and be aware of what's going on around you.
- Park in a well-lighted space and be sure to lock the car, close the windows, and hide shopping bags and gifts in the trunk.
- Avoid carrying large amounts of cash, pay with a check or credit card whenever possible.
- Deter pickpockets and purse-snatchers. Don't overburden yourself with packages. Be extra careful with purses and wallets. Carry a purse close to your body, not dangling by the straps. Put a wallet in an inside coat or front pants pocket.
- Shopping with kids? Teach them to go to a store clerk or security guard if you get separated.

Protect Your Vehicle

- Loading up on all those gifts is a sign of progress in the holiday shopping. But if those packages are left out in the open after they're in the car, your car has become a likely target for thieves. Remember the old cliché "Out of sight, out of mind?" The same idea applies to items in your car.
- Always lock your vehicle and store all items out of sight. Breaking into an empty car isn't worth a thief's time. However, anything left in plain view from your holiday gifts to spare change, sunglasses, CDs, cell phones or briefcases may tempt a thief.
- Help prevent your vehicle from being stolen by always locking your car and using anti-theft devices. And, although it's cold, never leave your vehicle running while you run inside your home or a store even if it's for only a minute or two.

If a Stranger Comes to Your Door

- Criminals sometimes pose as couriers delivering gifts, so be cautious when accepting a package.
- It's not uncommon for people to try to take advantage of others' generosity during the holidays by going door-to-door for charitable donations when there's no charity involved. Ask for identification and find out how the funds will be used. If you aren't satisfied, don't give. Help a charitable organization you know and like instead.



After You've Opened the Gifts

• Burglars know that many households have new, and oftentimes expensive, items in their homes following the December holidays – especially items such as new computers and peripherals, stereo components, televisions, cameras and other electronic equipment. In too many cases, residents make it easy for burglars to figure out which homes to target by putting boxes that identify their new gifts in plain view with their other garbage. Avoid becoming an easy target for post-holiday burglars by not leaving boxes for new electronics and other items in the alley or other garbage pickup locations for several days at a time. Instead, break down any boxes you are throwing out, put them in garbage bags and place them inside a trash can. (In many cases, especially with computer equipment, you might consider keeping the boxes for safe storage, shipping or moving in the future.) Think about keeping broken-down boxes inside – in a garage, for example – until the evening before your regular garbage pickup. Some burglars actually look inside garbage cans for evidence of holiday gifts. And, of course, if you see someone suspicious casing your alley or if you see a burglary in progress, call the Melrose Park Police Department on 911.

Take a Holiday Inventory

- The holidays are a good time to update or create your home inventory. Take photos or make videos of items, and list descriptions and serial numbers. If your home is burglarized, having a detailed inventory can help identify stolen items and make insurance claims easier to file.
- Make sure things like TVs, VCRs, stereo equipment, cameras, camcorders, sports equipment, jewelry, silver, computers, home office equipment and power tools are on the list. Remember to check it twice!

Celebrate Responsibly

• The holiday season is a time of celebration and revelry. Drinking and driving is a danger to everyone on the road. Anyone with a BAC of .08 or higher is in violation of Illinois law and may go to jail. Remember that the risk isn't worth it – if you choose to drink alcohol at a party, don't drive. Take a cab, use public transportation or a designated driver. Have fun, but remember to celebrate responsibly.

Holiday Package Theft

- Track deliveries online and confirm delivery has occurred. You can sign up for email notifications to track your packages from initial shipment to its arrival at your home or the recipient's address if you have the gift delivered directly.
- If you know a family member or neighbor will be home, ask them to pick up the packages as soon as they are delivered. Reward them with fresh baked cookies.
- Switch delivery location to work where it can be received by someone and not left on the porch.
- See if the post office or store the product is being shipped from can hold the package for pickup.
- The post office will allow your package to remain safe and secure for up to 30 days.



Silver Creek Restoration Project

Under the direction of Mayor Ronald M. Serpico, the Village of Melrose Park Public Works employees constructed the Silver Creek Eagles Nest Park. This is a natural preserve that includes a walking path and a pavilion/gazebo, along with a canoe/kayak launch.

Phase 5 and 6 of the Silver Creek Stabilization Project have been completed.

Phase 7 is underway.

This stabilization project restores the natural balance of the creek by restoring the embankment, and bringing back native landscape and shrubbery along with aquatic habitat. This is an invaluable stream system that provides storm water runoff, flood management and many other benefits for the residents of Melrose Park.



Silver Creek Trail Park

The Silver Creek Trail Park is located off of First Avenue. The trail is centered off the pond between Silver Creek and its tributary, the Des Plaines River. Native plants of this area were once lost to development and are

now being reintroduced to the area. With the help of these native plants, more wildlife is returning to the area – from the Bald Eagle (sighted in the area), the Northern Pike, Red Foxes, Black-Crowned Night Herons and



Cooper's Hawk, to name a few.

- 2. Pets must be leashed.
- 3. Smoking or fires are prohibited.
- 4. Please clean up pet waste and dispose of it.

- 6. No loitering.
- 7. No hunting.
- 8. Fishermen must clean up any cut line, bail containers and all litter.
- 9. Park opens one hour after sunrise and closes one hour before sunset.
- 10. Enjoy the park.



Republic Services Garbage Schedule for Residential Bi-Weekly Pickup

24th Avenue to 11th Avenue – Tuesday and Friday
Winston Park Area – Tuesday and Friday
West Melrose – Tuesday and Friday
North of North Avenue – Tuesday and Friday
Republic Services is contracted to pick up your regular, everyday garbage and household items, such as couches, tables, mattresses, box springs, desks and chairs, etc.

Recycling and yard waste is collected on Tuesdays from April through November and must be placed in a 33-gallon refuse can or biodegradable paper bags. Plastic bags will not be accepted.

All items are to be put out the night before or morning of scheduled garbage pickup.

Winston Park Area and West Melrose – Once garbage has been picked up, garbage container is to be removed from curb line and placed back on resident's property.

Winter Storms ... The Deceptive Killers

Winter storms can range from a moderate snow over a few hours to a blizzard with blinding, wind-driven snow that lasts for several days. Some winter storms are large enough to affect several states, while others affect only a single community. Many winter storms are accompanied by dangerously low temperatures and sometimes by strong winds, icing, sleet and freezing rain.

Regardless of the severity of a winter storm, you should be prepared in order to remain safe during these events.

Know the Difference

Winter Storm Outlook - Winter storm conditions are possible in the next two to five days.

Winter Weather Advisory – Winter weather conditions are expected to cause significant inconveniences and may be hazardous. When caution is used, these situations should not be life threatening.

Winter Storm Watch – Winter storm conditions are possible within the next 36 to 48 hours. People in a watch area should review their winter storm plans and stay informed about weather conditions.

Winter Storm Warning – Life-threatening, severe winter conditions have begun or will begin within 24 hours. People in a warning area should take precautions immediately.

How to Prepare for a Winter Storm

- Winterize your vehicle and keep the gas tank full. A full tank will keep the fuel line from freezing.
- Insulate your home by installing storm windows or covering windows with plastic from the inside to keep cold air out.
- Maintain heating equipment and chimneys by having them cleaned and inspected every year.
- If you will be going away during cold weather, leave the heat on in your home, set to a temperature no lower than 55° F.

Put Together a Supply Kit

- Water at least a three-day supply; one gallon per person per day.
- Food at least a three-day supply of non-perishable, easy-to-prepare food.
- · Flashlight.
- Battery-powered or hand-crank radio (NOAA Weather Radio, if possible).
- Extra batteries.
- First aid kit.
- Medications (seven-day supply) and medical items (hearing aids with extra batteries, glasses, contact lenses, syringes, etc.).
- · Multipurpose tool.
- Sanitation and personal hygiene items.
- Copies of personal documents (medication list and pertinent medical information, proof of address, deed/lease to home, passports, birth certificates, insurance policies).
- Cell phone with chargers.
- Family and emergency contact information.
- Extra cash.
- Baby supplies (bottles, formula, baby food, diapers).
- Pet supplies (collar, leash, ID, food, carrier, bowl).
- Tools/supplies for securing your home.
- Sand, rock salt or non-clumping kitty litter to make walkways and steps less slippery.
- Warm coats, gloves or mittens, hats, boots, and extra blankets and warm clothing for all household members.
- Ample alternate heating methods such as fireplaces or wood- or coal-burning stoves.

Winter's Impact

Storms with Strong Winds

Sometimes winter storms are accompanied by strong winds creating blizzard conditions with blinding wind-driven snow, severe drifting and dangerous wind chill. Strong winds with these intense storms and cold fronts can knock down trees, utility poles and power lines. Storms near the coast can cause coastal flooding and beach erosion as well as sink ships at sea. In the west and Alaska, winds descending off the mountains can gust to 100 mph or more damaging roofs and other structures.

Extreme Cold

Extreme cold often accompanies a winter storm or is left in its wake. Prolonged exposure to the cold can cause frostbite or hypothermia and become life-threatening. Infants and elderly people are most susceptible. What constitutes extreme cold and its effect varies across different areas of the United States. In areas unaccustomed to winter weather, near freezing temperatures are considered "extreme cold." Freezing temperatures can cause severe damage to citrus fruit crops and other vegetation. Pipes may freeze and burst in homes that are poorly insulated or without heat. In the north, below zero temperatures may be considered as "extreme cold." Long cold spells can cause rivers to freeze, disrupting shipping. Ice jams may form and lead to flooding.

Ice Storms

Heavy accumulations of ice can bring down trees, electrical wires, telephone poles and lines, and communication towers. Communications and power can be disrupted for days while utility companies work to repair the extensive damage. Even small accumulations of ice may cause extreme hazards to motorists and pedestrians.

Heavy Snow Storms

Heavy snow can immobilize a region and paralyze a city, stranding commuters, stopping the flow of supplies and disrupting emergency and medical services. Accumulations of snow can collapse buildings and knock down trees and power lines. In rural areas, homes and farms may be isolated for days, and unprotected livestock may be lost. In the mountains, heavy snow can lead to avalanches. The cost of snow removal, repairing damages and loss of business can have large economic impacts on cities and towns.

Winter Precipitation

Snow

- FLURRIES Light snow falling for short durations. No accumulation or light dusting is all that is expected.
- SHOWERS Snow falling at varying intensities for brief periods of time. Some accumulation is possible.
- SQUALLS Brief, intense snow showers accompanied by strong, gusty winds. Accumulation may be significant. Snow squalls are best known in the Great Lakes region.
- BLOWING SNOW Wind-driven snow that reduces visibility and causes significant drifting. Blowing snow may be snow that is falling and/or loose snow on the ground picked up by the wind.
- BLIZZARD Winds over 35 mph with snow and blowing snow reducing visibility to near zero.

Sleet

Raindrops that freeze into ice pellets before reaching the ground. Sleet usually bounces when hitting a surface and does not stick to objects. However, it can accumulate like snow and cause a hazard to motorists.

Freezing Rain

Rain that falls onto a surface with a temperature below freezing. This causes it to freeze to surfaces, such as trees, cars, and roads, forming a coating or glaze of ice. Even small accumulations of ice can cause a significant hazard.

Winter Storm Facts: What Makes a Winter Storm?

Cold Air

Below freezing temperatures in the clouds and near the ground are necessary to make snow and/or ice.

Moisture

To form clouds and precipitation. Air blowing across a body of water, such as a large lake or the ocean, is an excellent source of moisture.

Lift

something to raise the moist air to form the clouds and cause precipitation. An example of lift is warm air colliding with cold air and being forced to rise over the cold dome. The boundary between the warm and cold air masses is called a front. Another example of lift is air flowing up a mountain side.

Aspen Institute Names Triton as a Top 200 U.S. Community College Eligible for the 2027 Aspen Prize

Triton College is proud to announce that it has been named one of the 200 institutions eligible to compete for the \$1 million Aspen Prize for Community College Excellence – the nation's premier recognition of high achievement and performance among two-year colleges.

The 200 colleges were selected based on their student outcomes data, including retention, completion, transfer and bachelor's attainment rates. Started in 2010, this is the ninth cycle of the Aspen Prize.

Together, these 200 colleges represent the breadth and diversity of the community college sector. They are located in urban, rural and suburban areas across the country and serve anywhere from a few hundred students to tens of thousands. Some of these colleges focus primarily on workforce programs, while others focus on transfer and bachelor's attainment or a combination of the two.

"The Aspen Prize rewards colleges that achieve the kind of outcomes that actually matter to students – completing college degree programs that, in turn, lead to lifelong success," said Josh Wyner, executive director of the Aspen Institute College Excellence Program. "Aspen Prize winners offer a powerful message: Community colleges can deliver the kind of life-changing education that makes the American Dream real."

Community colleges educate nearly 6 million students. Yet community college student outcomes fall short in both the rate at which students graduate and the percentage of students who achieve success after graduation. The Aspen Prize process identifies and celebrates community colleges that demonstrate that achieving stronger outcomes is possible, providing a roadmap of effective practices and strategies for other colleges to follow.

The 200 eligible colleges have been invited to submit an application and participate in a rigorous review process that will culminate in the naming of the Aspen Prize winner in spring 2027. Over the coming 20 months, the colleges that apply for the Aspen Prize will be assessed based on (1) student outcomes data, ranging from student transfer and completion rates to employment and wages after graduation, and (2) whether they have engaged in scaled practices that led to high and improving student outcomes.

"Among these 200 colleges are some really special places that deliver strong and improving outcomes for students across the board," Wyner said. "Our job over the coming 20 months is to gather a lot more data and work with a deep

bench of field experts to assess which of these 200 stand out so we can not only honor them with a monetary award, but drive attention to the most effective field practices that other colleges can replicate."

This is the first time since the inception of the Aspen Prize that 200 colleges are eligible to apply, growing from 150. This year, in addition to publicly available federal data, over 600 colleges authorized the use of National Student Clearinghouse data on their institution's degree completion, transfer, and bachelor's attainment rates for full- and part-time students.

Since its founding in 1964, Triton College has remained steadfast in its mission of educating and serving the community. Through its welcoming learning environment, affordable tuition and open admission policy, the institution has expanded the accessibility of post-secondary education for residents across its district. "The students wanted to do it, and I made it happen with the participation of our fellow faculty and admin team," he said. "There's a need out there, and that was something felt by the students and myself."

Chef Manny especially thanked the Triton College Faculty Association for its significant contribution to the initiative, as well as Triton College President Mary-Rita Moore and others across the campus community who supported the effort.

Chef Manny said he and his students felt it was important to support the student body and address food insecurity. Emphasizing Triton College's role as a community college and servant of the community, he added that they also felt it imperative to feed Triton's neighbors as well.

"For many, Thanksgiving is a time to look forward to a home-cooked meal with friends and loved ones," he said. 


District 89 Partners with Local Libraries for Family Storytime


Students Explore Engineering and Technology Through WozEd Club





State Rep. Norma Hernandez Returns to Springfield For Veto Session

Illinois State Representative

During the fall Veto Session, State Rep. Norma Hernandez advanced a series of impactful legislation focused on lowering costs for families, protecting vulnerable residents, and strengthening fairness and accountability across Illinois. She supported major affordability initiatives like the Clean and Reliable Grid Affordability Act (SB 25) to reduce energy bills through clean-energy investments and the Low-Income Senior Citizens Assessment Freeze Homestead Exemption (SB 642),

which raises income eligibility to help more seniors stay in their homes. Rep. Hernandez also backed the landmark Transit Reform Package (SB 2111), safe-guarding public transit across the state without raising taxes on everyday services. In addition, she championed HB 1312, a comprehensive immigration omnibus that enhances civil rights protections by limiting intrusive enforcement practices in sensitive locations. Together, these measures reflect Rep. Hernandez's commitment to equity, safety, economic stability, and expanding opportunity for all Illinoisans.

Here's a closer look at the impactful measures she's led:

Veto Session Legislation Updates

SB 25: Clean and Reliable Grid Affordability Act

Seeks to reduce energy costs for families facing recent sharp rate increases. This is achieved through significant investments in clean energy capture, enhanced battery storage and improved energy efficiency.

SB 642: Low-Income Senior Citizens Assessment Freeze Homestead Exemption

This measure strengthens existing legislation for older adults by increasing the income eligibility cutoffs for the senior property tax assessment freeze. This adjustment, made to reflect inflation, allows more seniors to manage their finances, reduce their property tax burden and remain in their homes.

SB 2111: Transit Reform Package

Aims to reform and save public transit across Illinois, including Chicago. The bill achieves this without introducing new taxes on food delivery, real estate or streaming services, and without increasing funding for bureaucratic mismanagement.

HB1312 Immigration Omnibus

What is HB1312? This robust initiative, championed by Rep. Hernandez, Illinois leaders and advocates, is designed to enhance accountability in civil immigration enforcement. This legislation aims to prevent intrusions into sensitive locations like hospitals, daycares and institutions of higher education, while also establishing a civil cause of action for violations of constitutional rights.

The legislation allows Illinois residents to sue individuals who violate their constitutional rights during noncriminal, civil immigration enforcement, particularly when agents or police conceal their identities (e.g., hiding license plates or faces) to avoid accountability. It mandates that colleges, daycares and hospitals create policies for interacting with law enforcement. It also establishes court-


houses as safe zones, ensuring victims and witnesses can access justice without fear of noncriminal, civil arrest.














Court Access Safety, and Participation Act

This measure establishes a prohibition on civil arrests occurring within or in the immediate vicinity of Illinois courthouses. The purpose of this protection is to safequard and ensure unimpeded access to the judicial system for all individuals, allowing them to attend to legal matters without fear of detention.



Safe Licensed Daycare Centers

This provision prohibits daycare providers from permitting immigration enforcement agents to enter a licensed daycare center unless the agents present a valid judicial warrant or court order signed by a judge. The intent is to establish a legal safeguard protecting the children and staff within the daycare center from unwarranted immigration enforcement actions on the premises.

Amending the Public Higher Education Act

This policy establishes clear, accessible, and protective guidelines for all public universities and community colleges in Illinois to safeguard every student, regardless of their immigration status. It affirms the principle that these campuses are, and must continue to be, inclusive environments dedicated solely to learning and opportunity for all students within the state.



Officials, Accompanied by Musical Guests, Honored Notable Hispanic and Latine Residents for Their Contributions to Cook County and Honored Three Individuals with Awards

On Wednesday, Oct. 15, Cook County commissioners and the Office of Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle celebrated Hispanic and Latine Heritage Month in the lobby of the Cook County Building.

The event began with a performance by Mariachi Los Jinetes of Morton East High School from Cook County's 16th District. After the performance, remarks were given by President Preckwinkle and commissioners Frank J. Aguilar, Alma Anaya and Jessica Vasquez.

"Latine and Hispanic Americans have made contributions throughout every corner of Cook County. We are proud of our heritage, of our culture, and the communities we have built and sustained in America," said Commissioner Frank J. Aguilar. "This is an opportunity to celebrate our shared history. It is a celebration of our lives and culture in the present. It is a promise to continue honoring our culture and contributions in the future. This was also an opportunity to celebrate, to listen to the music of our communities and honor Hispanic and Latine Americans who have contributed so much to our county."

After the musical performance, President Preckwinkle honored local leaders for their dedication to serving their communities and empowering Latine families across Cook County with the Latino Community Leadership Award. Awardees included commissioners Anaya, Vasquez and Aguilar; Jorge Perez, executive director of Ensemble Español; Billy Ocasio and Veronica Ocasio of the National Museum of Puerto Rican Arts and Culture; and José Ochoa of the National Museum of Mexican Art.

To close the press conference and ceremony, a performance was given by the Ensemble Espanol Music and Theater dance group.

"Growing up as the proud daughter of Colombian immigrants, I learned that Colombian liberation was won by a broad coalition of indentured servants, enslaved Africans, Indigenous people, and mestizos," said Commissioner Jessica Vasquez. "The lessons I learned growing up about Colombian history remind me that the same truth holds here in Cook County today – our liberation depends on one another. As we celebrate Latine Heritage Month, let's not only honor our culture and our roots – let's also carry forward the revolutionary spirit that unites us."

National Hispanic Heritage Month was founded to celebrate the heritage and culture of Hispanic and Latine communities, and was first recognized by Cook County on Sept. 15, 2014. Hispanic and Latine individuals have long been part of the fabric of Cook County, first being reported on the Illinois census in 1850 and reaching a reported population of 25,211 by 1930. Cook County is proud to celebrate the diversity of its residents and the richness of culture – the Hispanic and Latine population has now increased to 1,382,778 and represents the largest minority group in Cook County.













There are more than 50,000 Hispanic- and Latine-owned businesses across Cook County, and this entrepreneurial vibrancy has helped revitalize numerous communities in Chicago and suburban communities. Cook County's economy has always been a magnet for immigrant laborers from all over the world and immigrants from Mexico, the Caribbean, Central America and South America in particular, and Cook County continues to welcome and value the contributions of immigrants. In addition to their economic impact, Hispanic and Latine individuals of every generation have made immense contributions through their courageous service in the United States Military, the arts, education, mathematics, science, literature, technology, and philanthropy in this county and the world.

Cook County and City of Chicago Officials Celebrate Día de Los Muertos

Officials Remember Deceased Cook County Residents at Ofrenda in the Cook County Building

On Thursday, Oct. 23, Cook County and city of Chicago officials came together to celebrate Dia de Los Muertos ("Day of the Dead"). In attendance was Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle, commissioners Frank J. Aguilar, Alma Anaya, Tara Stamps, Bridget Degnen, Maggie Trevor and Chairman John Daley.

Joining from the City of Chicago was Alder Anthony Quezada and the Department of Immigrant, Migrant and Refugee Rights Director of Policy and Strategic Initiatives Jesus Del Toro.

After remarks from elected officials, singer Zamari Parra performed the song La Llorano, before the Ocelotl-Cihuacoatl Calpulli Dance Group blessed the altar with a dance and song performance. To close the ceremony, Zamari Parra performed the song La Bruja.

"The celebration of Día de Los Muertos acknowledges that we still have a relationship with our ancestors and loved ones that have passed away. Today, we invite those Cook County residents who have left us to come back into our lives, if only for a moment, and remember the impact they had on all of us," said Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle.

Held annually on Nov. 1 and 2, Día de los Muertos is a traditional Meso-American holiday dedicated to the ancestors, it honors both death and the cycle of life. It is observed as a day to honor deceased family members and loved ones by "welcoming them back" through various customs, including making dedicated altars (ofrendas), laying out special food offerings and visiting their graves.

"The Día de Los Muertos ofrenda represents a memorial to remember and honor the lives of loved ones who passed on. It's remembering the good times we've had spent with them, keeping their memory alive in our hearts," said Cook County Commissioner Frank J. Aguilar.

An ofrenda is a traditional altar with a collection of objects placed on a ritual display during the annual Día de Muertos celebration. An ofrenda is created for individuals who have died and is intended to welcome them to the altar setting.

This is the fifth consecutive year that county officials have celebrated Dia de los Muertos with an ofrenda in the Cook County Lobby. This is the first year featuring the artwork of local Chicago artist Oscar Romero. The artwork merged Mexican, Mexican-American and Chicano culture to show the rich history and traditions that have carried from Mexico to Cook County, Chicago and throughout the world.

"Dia de Los Muertos calls us to come together and remember those who are no longer with us," said Chicago Deputy Mayor of Immigrant, Migrant and Refugee Rights Beatriz Ponce De Leon. "Through the music, artwork and food we reunite with loved ones and share this moment with our community. The city of Chicago and Cook County are proud to stand together in remembrance of our past, and to honor our histories, both personal and shared."

News from Illinois Secretary of State Alexi Giannoulias

New Year, New Laws: Giannoulias Rolls Out New Measures to Improve Government Efficiency, Increase Road Safety and Protect Libraries

Several initiatives spearheaded by Illinois Secretary of State Alexi Giannoulias will take effect in the new year.

"This past legislative session delivered some big wins for Illinoisans that will make a real difference in their everyday lives," Giannoulias said. "These laws move us closer to our goals of making our roads safer, ensuring our libraries have the tools they need to serve their communities and creating a more efficient and responsive government."

They include:

Road Safety and DMV Modernization

New multi-pronged legislation provides clarification on cheating on DMV exams, allows the office to administer written tests online and enhances bicycle safety.

The measure clarifies that any attempt to have someone else provide answers to an individual taking a DMV exam, including attempts to use a hidden microphone or cellphone, constitutes cheating.

It also enhances the office's *Rules of the Road* publication to include information about the laws and best practices for safely sharing the road with bicyclists and pedestrians. In addition, it requires that before passing a cyclist, a driver of a vehicle must make a lane change.

HB 2983 was sponsored by State Rep. Edgar González Jr. (23rd District - Chicago) and State Sen. Steve Stadelman (34th District - Rockford).

Enhancing Library Security

Amid an alarming increase in threats of violence to libraries and librarians across Illinois, the Secretary of State's Office can now issue security grants for libraries throughout the state, ensuring their ability to provide a safe environment for patrons, employees and the community.

Under the new law, grant applicants have the ability to request funding to install equipment, including security cameras, silent alarms or security checkpoints.

SB 1550 was sponsored by State Sen. Laura Murphy (28th District – Des Plaines) and State Rep. Michael Coffey Jr. (95th District – Springfield).

Cracking Down on Rogue Towers

This legislation, which the office supported, strengthens oversight of towing companies to protect Illinoisans from predatory practices.

The law empowers the Secretary of State's Office to suspend tow truck registrations for companies that fail to pay Illinois Commerce Commission fines or penalties. It also improves consumer protections during towing and vehicle impoundment, including clarified rules around personal property left in towed vehicles.

SB 2040 was sponsored by State Sen. Celina Villaneuva (12th District – Chicago) and State Rep. Will Davis (30th District – East Hazel Crest).

· Enabling Court of Claims E-Filing

A new law will modernize the way the Illinois Court of Claims operates, transforming it from a court currently reliant on paper filings and in-person sessions that can cause delays.

The measure will save time and create new conveniences for Illinoisans by enabling the court to hold sessions remotely and allowing the public to file claims, provide evidence or testimony, and pay fees electronically.

HB 1576 was sponsored by State Rep. Terra Costa Howard (42nd District – Lombard) and State Sen. Michael Halpin (36th District – Rock Island).

Avoid the Fee, Get REAL ID: Giannoulias Leads Push to Spare Illinoisans from TSA's \$45 Penalty

With the Transportation Security Administration's (TSA) new \$45 penalty set to catch travelers off guard starting Feb. 1, Illinois Secretary of State Alexi Giannoulias is taking action to reduce the Time Tax by making it easier than ever for Illinois residents to get their REAL ID.

"With costs rising across the board, Illinoisans shouldn't have to pay a \$45 penalty just to get on a plane, especially when that fee is higher than some flights themselves," Giannoulias said. "We're doing everything possible to remove barriers, save people time and make getting a REAL ID simple and stress-free. With a REAL ID in your wallet, you avoid TSA's penalty entirely and skip a massive travel headache."

To expand access, the office has extended the lease on its REAL ID walk-in supercenter located in Chicago's Loop through the end of 2026. It also continues to offer REAL ID services at DMVs throughout the state. Most located in Chicago and the suburbs require an appointment.

Giannoulias is also launching a new partnership with Cook County Clerk Monica Gordon aimed at cutting time, reducing hassle and ensuring that Illinoisans can secure their REAL IDs before the TSA penalty takes effect.

"Our office is committed to making it as convenient as possible for residents to access the vital records they need," Gordon said. "By teaming up with the Secretary of State's Office, we're expanding options and streamlining the process so Cook County residents can get their REAL ID required documents quickly, conveniently and without added stress."

Those initiatives include:

- Helping residents obtain key identity documents such as birth certificates and marriage licenses, which many residents don't have readily on hand more easily and efficiently.
- Designating cashiers at each Clerk's Office location to expedite REAL-ID-related document requests.
- Establishing an appointment system to accommodate REAL-ID-related document requests.
- Dedicating a telephone helpline at (312) 603-6278 and email address at Clerk.RealID@cookcountyil.gov exclusively for customers who need help getting appointments for REAL-ID-related requests.

The Secretary of State's Office has also streamlined its REAL ID portal – realid.ilsos.gov – allowing residents to quickly identify which documents they need, schedule an appointment and come prepared. A dedicated call center helpline – (800) 252-8980 – is available to assist customers in confirming they have the necessary paperwork before they arrive.

With TSA's new penalty looming, securing a REAL ID – or traveling with a passport – is the smart move that saves Illinoisans from paying more each trip. For example, a flight from Midway to Boston on Southwest can cost less than TSA's \$45 Confirm.ID Fee. A REAL ID keeps travelers covered for years, helping them avoid added costs, long lines and last-minute airport stress.

It's Here: Giannoulias Launches Mobile ID, Add Yours Today

Illinois Secretary of State Alexi Giannoulias announced a major technological milestone: Illinois residents can securely add their Illinois-issued driver's license or state ID to Apple Wallet and present their ID using their iPhone and Apple Watch. This marks a new era of convenience and digital innovation for the state, enabling residents to present their driver's license and state ID in Apple Wallet in person, online and in apps at select businesses and organizations, including at TSA checkpoints at over 250+ airports in the U.S, including O'Hare, Midway and Lambert. The Illinois Mobile ID Program will soon expand to Google and Samsung Wallets, ensuring that every Illinois resident with a mobile phone has access to secure, digital identification.

"Mobile ID in Apple Wallet is now live for Illinois residents," said Giannoulias. "This is just the start, our office will continue to work with businesses to expand where it's accepted in order to make everyday life more seamless, secure and convenient."

"The launch of Illinois' Mobile ID in Apple Wallet gives United customers a faster, easier and more secure way to verify their identity at TSA check-points," said Dan Lynch, vice president, State and Local Government Affairs at United Airlines. "As an airline committed to putting tools directly in our customers hands with the touch of a button, we're excited that Illinois travelers can move through the airport with even greater convenience."

This is not a replacement for a physical ID and for now residents must continue to carry their physical ID.

With the launch, Illinois joins 12 other states and the territory of Puerto Rico that offer driver's licenses and state IDs in Apple Wallet to their residents.

How to Add an Illinois Driver's License or State ID to Apple Wallet

Adding a license or state ID to Apple Wallet can be done in a few easy steps. Residents can tap the Add (+) button at the top of the screen in Wallet on their iPhone, select "Driver's License or State ID," and follow the onscreen instructions to start the setup and verification process.

The resident will be asked to use their iPhone to scan their physical driver's license or state ID card and take a selfie, which will be securely provided to the issuing state for verification. As an additional security step, residents will also be prompted to complete a series of facial and head movements during the setup process. Once verified by the issuing state, the resident's ID or driver's license will be added to Wallet.

Using an Illinois Driver's License or State ID in Apple Wallet

Users can securely present their IDs in Apple Wallet in person, online and in apps to show proof of age or identity.

To present an ID in person, users can go to Apple Wallet and select their Illinois driver's license and state ID in Apple Wallet. From there, they can hold their iPhone or Apple Watch near an identity reader, review the specific information being requested and use Face ID or Touch ID to authenticate. Users can present their ID in Apple Wallet at select TSA checkpoints, businesses and venues, in addition to Apple Store locations across the U.S. for order pickup, Genius Bar appointments and more.

To present an Illinois driver's license and state ID in Apple Wallet in apps and online, users can select the Verify with Apple Wallet or Continue with Apple Wallet button. From there, they can review the specific information being requested and authenticate with Face ID or Touch ID before information is shared.

Presenting an ID in a Secure, Private Way

IDs in Apple Wallet use the privacy and security features that are built into Apple devices to help protect a user's identity and personal information. When adding an ID to Apple Wallet, the state-issuing authority receives only the information it needs to approve or deny the request.

Once an ID is added to Apple Wallet, the information is encrypted on a user's device, so others – including Apple – cannot access it unless a user chooses to present it. Apple and the state-issuing authority do not know when or to whom a user presents their driver's license or state ID. A user's presentment history is encrypted and stored only on their device, and Apple cannot see or access this information.

When presenting an ID in Apple Wallet, only the information needed for the transaction is presented, and the user has the opportunity to review and authorize the information being requested with Face ID or Touch ID before it is shared. Users do not need to unlock, show or hand over their device to present their ID.

A Boost for Businesses

Alongside the launch of Illinois driver's licenses and state IDs in Apple Wallet, the Secretary of State's Office is launching a free mobile ID verifier app for businesses that checks proof of age for restrictive purchases, such as the sale of alcohol. The app streamlines age verification checks, all while protecting customer privacy. This app is currently available in the Apple App Store.

Future Enhancements

Giannoulias emphasized that the Illinois Mobile ID Program will soon expand to Google and Samsung Wallets, ensuring that every Illinois resident with a mobile phone has access to secure, digital identification.

Treasurer Frerichs Clinches Seventh Gold Rating for Bright Start College Savings Plan

Bright Directions Receives Sole Morningstar Upgrade

Illinois State Treasurer Michael Frerichs has announced that Illinois' Bright Start 529 College Savings Plan has earned its seventh Gold rating from independent analyst Morningstar, firmly placing the plan among the best in the nation.

"To be touted as one of the nation's best by Morningstar for the seventh time under my watch confirms from an independent source that Illinois' 529 College Savings plans are a great investment for Illinois families," Frerichs said. "Since taking office, my priority has been to ensure Illinois families have access to the highest quality savings plans in the nation with low fees and a high-quality range of investment options. We are proud to earn this honor and help families save for their children's future."

Morningstar independently evaluates college savings plans each year and assigns each one a rating of Gold, Silver, Bronze, Neutral or Negative. Bright Start is one of only five Gold-rated 529 plans in the country. In its review, Morningstar identified Bright Start 529 as a "Valedictorian" and a standout plan that "offers compelling investment options that are also highly cost effective."

"Notably, the state offers a wide range of high-quality investment options across multiple firms, compared with some peers whose offerings are restricted to a single asset manager," Morningstar wrote. "The state's investment team keeps a close watch on the portfolios and effectively negotiates better terms for its participants."

Morningstar's medal ratings represent composite scores of each plan's performance across the key performance pillars of Process, People and Parent, with Price also considered.

Morningstar's recognition is the latest high praise for Bright Start 529, which also has been recognized as among the nation's best 529 college savings plans by *Forbes*, *Business Insider*, Kiplinger, and the Motley Fool.

In addition, the adviser-guided Bright Directions Plan received an upgrade to a Bronze rating, the only 529 plan in the nation to get a higher rating than last year. Morningstar has consistently identified Bright Directions 529 as one of the nation's best options for families who prefer to work with a financial adviser.

Under Frerichs, Morningstar has awarded Bright Directions 529 with five Silver and three Bronze ratings. Other evaluators, such as Saving for College, awarded Bright Directions with "High Honors" in 2025.

Since entering office in 2015, Frerichs has worked consistently to upgrade Bright Start and Bright Directions through improvements to the investment menu, lower prices, and better account holder tools and education. In 2025, Bright Directions 529 lowered fees and launched a range of new tools for account holders. In 2024, Bright Start 529 lowered fees, enhanced the investment lineup and introduced a new phone app. Since 2015, Frerichs has negotiated more than \$100 million in fee reductions, ensuring more investment dollars go directly to college savings. The investment grows tax-free when spent on qualified expenses. Illinois taxpayers also receive a deduction on their Illinois income taxes when they contribute to an Illinois 529 plan. The "529" designation refers to the specific part of the federal tax code that authorizes plans to encourage savings for future education costs.

Illinois Treasurer Michael Frerichs Returns WW II Purple Heart Medal to Family of Late Veteran at Ceremony in Oak Lawn Ahead of Veterans Day

On the day before Veterans Day, Illinois State Treasurer Michael Frerichs returned a lost Purple Heart medal to the niece of a World War II veteran who was injured while fighting in France and Germany.

Frerichs reunited Army Rifleman James R. Bennett's medal with niece Patti Knies during a ceremony at VFW Post 5220 in Oak Lawn.

It is the 17th lost medal Frerichs has returned as part of Operation Purple Heart, an unprecedented mission to reunite the military honor with the rightful owners. The iconic medal is awarded to individuals wounded or killed during military combat.

Bennett was wounded twice during his service – on Aug. 13, 1944, in France and again on Dec. 13, 1944, in Germany. He returned stateside to his wife Ann, a year later, in December 1945, and they made Oak Lawn their lifelong home.

"Rifleman Bennett served his country honorably. He frequently wrote his wife, assuring her of his safety and downplaying his sacrifice," Frerich said. "It is never too late to honor the men and women of the Greatest Generation."

A few years after the war, the Bennetts had their only child, a daughter named Susan. She suffered from encephalitis and developed disabilities so severe she was not expected to survive beyond early childhood. Susan lived into her 50s.



James Bennett died in 1990 at age 76. Ann Bennett died seven years later. Patty Knies, Mr. Bennett's niece, became Susan's legal guardian. Frerichs presented the Purple Heart to Patty during a ceremony at the Johnson-Phelps VFW Post 5220 in Oak Lawn.

"He was such a wonderful man and it is an honor to hold his Purple Heart," said Knies, who lives in northwest Indiana. "So many soldiers and families suffered and sacrificed so much. It is important that they be remembered."

James Bennett served as a volunteer firefighter and part-time member of the Police Department, and he repaired toys for children with disabilities.

The Purple Heart and other items were in an Oak Lawn bank safe deposit box in Ann's name. Knies said her aunt never mentioned it. The box's contents were surrendered to the Illinois State Treasurer's Office as unclaimed property in 2022. Safeguarding unclaimed property until it can be returned to its owners or heirs no matter how long it takes is a core function of the State Treasurer's Office. Other examples of unclaimed property include bank accounts, unpaid life insurance benefits and uncashed rebate checks.

This is the 17th Purple Heart medal Treasurer Frerichs has returned to the soldier or the soldier's family, an unparalleled record in Illinois and the nation. A list of unclaimed Purple Heart medals in possession of the Illinois State Treasurer's Office is available online.

"If you recognize a name, please reach out to their family. This is an honor that deserves to be in their loving hands, not the cold, dark vault of my safe," Frerichs said. "You also can contact my office through operation purpleheart.org."

Military medals are among the most difficult items to return because neither the Armed Forces nor the federal government maintain a comprehensive list of awardees. In most of these cases, the conflict in which the Purple Heart was awarded, such as World War I, World War II, Korea, Vietnam or Desert Storm, is unclear or unknown.

Treasurer Michael Frerichs' Office Publishes Annual Report on Small Business Spending

Illinois State Treasurer Michael Frerichs' office increased its small business spending by more than 37% from Fiscal Year 2024 to Fiscal Year 2025, a new report states.

During Fiscal Year 2025, the Treasurer's Office spent a total of \$1,346,772.54 on contracts and other purchases with small businesses, which represents more than 5% of the office's overall contract and purchase spending of \$24,386,667.87. For comparison, spending during Fiscal Year 2024 totaled \$978,370.74. The information is included in the *Illinois State Treasurer's Office Annual Report* on the office's utilization of small business vendors.

The Treasurer's Office shares the state's goal, as stated in the procurement code, of increasing opportunities for small businesses. As a result, the office has taken steps during the past several years to increase small business participation. These efforts are outlined in the report and include procurements set aside for small businesses, as well as pricing preferences for small businesses.

The annual report, which covers the period from July 1, 2024, through June 30, 2025, was published recently. It is posted on the office's "Procurement Notices" webpage at https://illinoistreasurer.gov/home/office-of-the-treasurer/procurement/procurement-notices/. The report is required under Section 1400.4560(g) of the Office of the Treasurer Procurement Rules (44 III. Adm. Code 1400). It consists of two parts: (1) Policies and Procedures Relating to Small Business Contractors and (2) Utilization Data and Implementation.

Walther Alumni Spotlight

Dr. Anitra (Bolden) Crockett, Walther Class of 1995, is the associate superintendent of Schools in Bourbonnais, Illinois. After graduating from Walther, she attended Northern Illinois University, where she earned a Bachelor of Science in family studies. She later completed her Master of Social Work degree at Aurora University, with a concentration in school social work.

Anitra began her career in education in District 89, which serves Maywood, Melrose Park and Broadview. During her 12 years in District 89, Anitra served as a social worker and special education supervisor and, after earning a second master's degree in educational leadership, became an assistant principal at Irving Elementary School. She then moved to Proviso Area for Exceptional Children (PAEC), where she served as special education supervisor for six years.

In 2009, Anitra entered the doctoral program at Chicago State University, where she earned an EdD in educational leadership-superintendency. Dr. Crockett moved to Bourbonnais District 53 in 2019, where she became the director of Student Services, overseeing the district's special education, residential and early childhood education programs for 2,300 students. Under her leadership, the program for students with severe autism or severe health and ambulatory conditions has grown from three to seven classrooms and has become the model program in that area. Dr. Crockett was recently promoted to associate superintendent, adding board negotiations and some HR duties to her job responsibilities.

Anitra is also committed to preparing high-quality educators and supporting inclusive practices in schools. She currently serves as an adjunct professor at National Louis University (NLU), where she teaches Methods of Teaching Students with Disabilities, a foundational course for graduate students in the College of Education. In this role, Anitra blends practical district-level experience with research-based instructional methods to equip educators with the knowledge and skills needed to support diverse learners.

In addition to teaching at NLU, Anitra serves on the university's Teacher Preparation Advisory Board. As part of this advisory group, she offers guidance to specific programs within the College of Education and contributes insights on essential issues in teacher preparation.

"I didn't think, 25 years ago, that I would be in this kind of a role. But, I knew that I wanted to effect change," shared Dr. Crockett. "I recall in high school having Dr. Dawkins come to our classroom. We did a career assessment and my results pointed toward the helping professions. I have always had a heart for people. Growing up in the church, I see this as my life's calling."

"Of all the classes I took at Walther, I would say Algebra 2 with Mr. Koehne has helped me the most. I learned I could do math and loved it. I also realized math could support the work I wanted to do. It prepared me well for my BS, MSW and EdD programs, and I feel confident now while writing grant proposals, creating budgets and reading expenditure reports."

While at Walther, Anitra was part of the cheerleading team for football and basketball, and ran track in the spring. She was also part of the Gospel Choir. Her favorite memories include lunch with friends and attending cheer camp with Ms. Opel. Her favorite class was US History with Mr. Korntheuer. It is the reason she visited Pearl Harbor with her daughters on a recent vacation.

Most of all, Anitra appreciated the Walther community. "It was just big enough that I didn't know everyone, but small enough to feel a sense of belonging," Anitra explained. "Whichever club or sport I tried, I felt accepted. I knew my teachers and they knew our family. For several years, my dad recalled talking with Mr. Schultz in the bleachers at a football game. That kind of community meant so much to my family. I enjoyed walking around the school at our recent reunion and connecting with classmates, some I had not seen since graduation. If we lived closer, I would definitely send my daughters to Walther."



Spotted: Amur Leopard Cubs Make Their Public Debut at Brookfield Zoo Chicago

The World's Rarest Big Cats Explore New Habitat, Ready to Meet Zoo Guests

There's double the reason to roar with excitement at Brookfield Zoo Chicago. Two Amur leopard cubs, the world's rarest big cats, are now out and about for guests to see. Born on July 14 to first-time mom Mina (MEE-nuh), the playful sisters are explor-

Each day brings new adventures for the 4-month-old sisters, who were spotted pouncing on each other in piles of leaves and climbing branches under Mina's watchful eye. Amur leopards are agile and stealthy climbers, often resting on rocky ledges or in trees to keep watch for prey and stay hidden from potential threats.

ing their outdoor habitat and ready to delight zoo goers with their playful personalities.

"The cubs are bold, curious and love to climb, already getting comfortable on the upper rocks in their new habitat," said Racquel Ardisana, associate director of Carnivore Care and Conservation at Brookfield Zoo Chicago. "There are a lot of new sights, sounds and scents for them to take in. When one initially came to explore the habitat's ground level, she hissed while pawing at the grass – a texture she's seeing for the first time!"

Prior to their public debut, the cubs have been growing, tumbling and pouncing behind the scenes under the care and close observation of the zoo's dedicated animal care staff. Their comfort and confidence with climbing new structures was an important development milestone to prepare them for their debut.

The cubs mark a rare and important addition to the species' global population, which is believed to be less than 100 animals total in the wild. The cubs are the first litter for 6-year-old Mina and a significant milestone in the zoo's ongoing efforts to help save one of the world's most endangered big cats from extinction. This supports the Association of Zoos and Aquariums' (AZA) Species Survival Plan working to maintain healthy and genetically diverse populations of threatened and endangered species in accredited facilities.

Native to the forests of eastern Russia, their ultra-thick coats and long tails help them stay warm in winter, making Chicago feel a lot like home. The cubs may be visible intermittently throughout the day this winter as they continue to explore and adjust to their new environment at the zoo's Big

Cats Walkway, near the entrance to Desert's Edge. During the zoo's upcoming evening hours for Holiday Magic, guests will have an opportunity to see the cubs' father Sasha, who was born at Brookfield Zoo Chicago in 2020 and is known to hide amongst the habitat's rocky facade.

ComEd Announces Upcoming Low-Income Discount as Latest Program to Assist with Rising Energy Costs

Newest Affordability Measure Offers Income-Eligible Customers Percentage-Based Discounts on Monthly Electric Bills

ComEd has announced the upcoming launch of its Low-Income Discount (LID) Program as part of efforts to help customers manage increasing energy costs. The LID Program, available Jan. 1, 2026, is intended to provide qualifying income-eligible customers with a percentage-based discount on their monthly electric bill based on income level.

LID is created in alignment with the Illinois Climate and Equitable Jobs Act, and is part of ComEd's commitment to affordability and customer support. With energy costs increasing up to 15% for the average residential customer, the aim of LID is to offer bill relief to income-eligible customers to help make energy costs more manageable.

"The launch of ComEd's LID comes at a time when customers are feeling the burden of this past year's bill increases," said Gil Quiniones, president and CEO of ComEd. "This new program brings long term relief for those who can least afford to pay and it will help them afford service as energy costs continue to rise."

Discounts under ComEd's LID will be divided into five tiers to give the greatest savings to those most in need. This system is designed to reduce the energy burden for these individuals to 3-6% of household income. Bill savings per customer will be based on average use within a residential service delivery class and will vary by income tier.

"ComEd understands that rising energy costs affect many of the 9 million people we serve in northern Illinois territory. That's why we constantly look to enhance solutions for customers who are behind or at risk of falling behind on their energy bills," said Ajit Apte, senior vice president, Customer Operations, ComEd. "Since October 2024, customers have been preapproved for LID by visiting local action agencies (LAAs) across Illinois and applying for and receiving state energy assistance programming, like LIHEAP and PIPP."

The announcement was hosted by the Community Action Partnership of Lake County which is one of the many LAAs across Illinois that administer LIHEAP.

"Over the decades, Community Action Partnership of Lake County has collaborated with ComEd to ensure that income-eligible customers receive electricity bill payment assistance through LIHEAP and other energy cost savings programs," said Mary Lockhart White, executive director and CEO of Community Action Partnership of Lake County, "We encourage every eligible household to take advantage of this new Low-Income Discount Program opportunity."

For ComEd customers to be approved for one of the first four tiers of LID, they must also have been approved for LIHEAP dating back to October 2024. For customers who haven't enrolled in LIHEAP, ComEd encourages them to visit their LAA to begin the enrollment process for LIHEAP and/or LID.

Customers with incomes up to 300% of the Federal Poverty Level (those who do not qualify for LIHEAP) are still eligible to participate in LID. These customers can enroll by visiting their local LAA now or, starting Jan. 1, 2026, self-enrolling through ComEd's Smart Assistance Manager tool at ComEd.com/SAM.

Upon qualifying, customers will receive LID for up to 24 months, based on their enrollment date, without the need to reapply. Those approved for LID will see a line item on their ComEd bill labeled "Low-Income Discount" as early as January 2026.

"Families are facing affordability issues for everyday essentials, from groceries to electricity bills. That's why we, as leaders with Community Organizing and Family Issues (COFI) and POWER-PAC IL, organized around the creation of the Low-Income Discount Program and are excited for the relief it will give eligible ComEd customers," said Michelle Morton, a parent leader with COFI and POWER-PAC IL. "Having this discount means families and neighbors in my community will have some extra cash to help them cover the rising costs of food, rent and more. We urge all electricity utilities within the state of Illinois, regardless of size, to take note and implement programs like this that help families keep the lights on in their homes."

Over \$803 Million Coming to ComEd Customers

Payment Created by Climate and Equitable Jobs Act to Protect Customers

ComEd has announced that over \$803 million will be returned to customers under the framework established in Illinois' Climate and Equitable Jobs Act (CEJA) enacted in 2021, which requires nuclear plants to pay customers when prices are high. ComEd residential and commercial customers can expect to benefit from these funds in the form of bill credits, with the average residential customer expected to receive approximately \$13 a month, depending on usage, over the first five months of the year.

The funds are being returned as part of the CEJA's Carbon Mitigation Credit (CMC) Program that provided price support to select Illinois nuclear units that were scheduled to be closed. Importantly, that statute protected ComEd customers from over paying in the event that federal policymakers also stepped up to support nuclear generation.

The 2021 CEJA law created the CMC Program to support carbon-free nuclear generation facilities and in return, provide an adjustment to ComEd customers if energy prices exceed the agreed-upon price determined in CEJA. The CMC Program is in effect for five years, through 2027, and can result in a credit or a charge depending on energy prices.

"ComEd will always advocate on behalf of our customers and we are encouraged to see significant savings being passed through to them as a result of Illinois' leadership in clean energy policy," said Gil Quiniones, president and CEO of ComEd. "Thanks to the foresight and leadership of Gov. Pritzker and the Illinois General Assembly, CEJA puts our customers on a path to a cleaner future while upholding our commitment to ensuring sustainability and affordability."

The savings from the \$803 million in credits reported on the nuclear generators' tax returns will automatically reduce what customers pay and no action is required by customers to receive the credit.

While future prices cannot be forecast with certainty, the CMC Program is expected to continue providing credits, based on market prices, for at least another year, helping to offset supply cost increases and support families during periods of economic uncertainty.

ComEd Partners with Clean Energy Developers on \$10 Million Utility Low-Income Grant Program

New, Five-Year Collaboration Offers Bill Credit Grants to Qualified Low-Income ComEd Customers from Community Solar Projects

ComEd, BAP Power LLC (operating as Cenergy) and ESP Solar LLC (ESP) has announced a landmark, five-year collaboration on a low-income grant program valued at up to \$10 million for income-eligible ComEd customers. The grants will be delivered as utility bill credits to preselected ComEd customers who meet specific criteria, including qualifying for a Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) Grant.

"Everyone should have access to safe, reliable, and affordable electricity, which is why ComEd remains committed to supporting all our customers, particularly those who are struggling most," said Gil Quiniones, president and CEO of ComEd. "By working with renewable energy leaders like Cenergy and ESP, we can expand access to solar benefits while providing substantial, targeted relief to income-eligible customers who have past-due balances. This long-term commitment is an outgrowth of our mission to power lives and strengthen communities across northern Illinois."

Funding for the grants will be derived from Cenergy and ESP's community solar projects located primarily within the ComEd service territory. For instance, a few initial projects are located in Kankakee County, Dekalb County and Livingston County. The program structure ensures that a significant portion of the projects' financial value is directly passed through to low-income participants in the form of utility bill credits.

"Cenergy is deeply committed to ensuring that the benefits of clean power generation flow through to local communities in meaningful ways, and we are excited to collaborate with ComEd and ESP on this low-income grant program," said William Pham, CEO of Cenergy.

"This partnership with ComEd is a blueprint for how renewable energy developers can make a direct, tangible impact on energy equity," said Rodolfo Hernandez, manager of ESP. "This program is consistent with our mission to benefit low-income households with our projects."

ComEd will receive the grant funds annually from Cenergy and ESP, reach out directly to eligible customers on the qualifications to apply and apply bill credits to the accounts of customers who consent to participate. This streamlined process ensures maximum impact and efficiency in delivering the assistance.

ComEd's participation in Cenergy and ESP's Low-Income Grant Program is the energy company's latest effort move to provide relief to customers dealing with high energy bills. In June, ComEd launched a \$10 million Customer Relief Fund that is expected to help more than 30,000 eligible customers who are behind on their energy bills. This fund acts as a bridge low-income discount (LID), which will enable qualifying income-eligible customers to receive a percentage-based discount on their monthly electric bill determined by income level. So far this year, ComEd has helped connect over 144,000 customers with more than \$74 million in grants and other bill support. ComEd No. 1 in U.S. in Providing Reliable Electric Service to Customers, Benchmarking Shows

Investments in Grid Produce Nation's Top Reliability

In a benchmark study of ComEd, compared to similar utilities, the utility was ranked number one in terms of how low the frequency and duration of outages were for customers. Recent metrics that reflect the frequency of outages for ComEd customers have improved by more than 50% compared to 2012 and earlier. Additionally, metrics that reflect the duration of outages have improved by approximately 20% over the same timeframe, meaning customers experience shorter interruptions when service is disrupted.

"Our customers count on ComEd to deliver world-class reliability to meet their growing electrification needs," said ComEd President and CEO Gil Quiniones. "Our performance on reliability and resilience is the result of targeted investments, tailored to address the growing challenges the grid faces from extreme weather, increasing load demands and cybersecurity. We will continue to take the steps necessary for the 4.2 million customers we are privileged to serve."

ComEd customers have seen continuous improvement in grid reliability performance in recent years. Since ComEd started smart grid improvements in 2012, it has improved overall reliability by more than 57%, helping customers avoid nearly 24.7 million customer interruptions and save more than \$4.3 billion in outage-related costs.

The panel of peer companies in the study consists of publicly held utilities that primarily serve 1 million or more customers and have transmission and distribution operations. The primary sources of data come from multi-utility panel surveys conducted by reputable companies, regulatory reports and the U.S. Energy Information Administration.



Loyola Medicine Burn Center Provides Tips on Burn Prevention During Holiday Cooking

The holidays are a time for gathering with friends and family, giving thanks and enjoying a meal together. It can also be a time of stress and distractions in the kitchen, which can lead to burns and fires. Over the holiday season, many people test out new recipes or cooking methods that can quickly turn dangerous, like deep frying a turkey.

John Kubasiak, MD, regional director of Loyola Medicine's Burn Center, warns cooks to be extra cautious around the holidays to prevent burn injuries. Loyola's Burn Center is the largest in Illinois and a regional leader in treating adult and pediatric burns.

"During the holiday season, we see an increase in patients with burn injuries in our Emergency Department," said Dr. Kubasiak. "Even competent chefs can become overwhelmed in the kitchen around the holidays, with more people in the home causing distractions, cooking for a larger group, trying out an unfamiliar recipe or even cooking in loose clothing can lead to an accident."





Deep-frying a turkey presents an even higher risk. "I'm not convinced it can be done safely based on the number of experienced chefs we see each holiday," said Dr. Kubasiak. "Boiling oil gets much hotter than water and when moisture from a frozen turkey hits the oil, it can splatter in all directions."

Visit a Hospital with a Burn Center for a Serious Burn

If you experience any burns this holiday season, Loyola Medicine's Burn Center can provide guidance on how to properly care for the injury to prevent lasting damage. "Some signs that a burn might be serious include skin discoloration (especially if the skin turns white or black), swelling, loss of sensation and burns covering a large area of the body," said Dr. Kubasiak. "If burns cover more than a hand-sized area or affect the face, eyes, hands or feet, definitely seek medical treatment."

Most physicians are not trained in advanced burn care and treating serious burns requires a multidisciplinary approach, which is why it's best to visit a hospital or care center with a dedicated burn unit. Severe burns can cause problems that affect other parts of the body, some requiring specialized nursing or surgical care. Burn centers can also provide the physical and occupational therapy and psychosocial support needed when recovering from serious burns.

Accidents, especially burns, can happen quickly and leave lasting effects. It's important to remember that everyone can play a role in preventing burns and keeping loved ones safe this holiday season.

Illinois Energy Companies and BBB Provide Practical Tips to Help Prevent Utility Scams

In mid-November, northern Illinois energy providers, in cooperation with the Better Business Bureau (BBB), shared practical guidance for customers to safeguard against fraudulent individuals impersonating utility representatives in an effort to obtain money or personal information.

On Utility Scam Awareness Day, Wednesday, Nov. 19, ComEd, Nicor Gas, Peoples Gas and North Shore Gas, in partnership with the BBB, were endorsing the Utilities United Against Scams (UUAS) initiative to "Slow Down, Verify, Stop the Scam."

The aim was to encourage people to "slow down" before sharing personal or account details, "verify" the caller's identity by contacting the company directly and "stop the scam" by reporting the activity to local authorities.

"Scammers are constantly changing tactics and often use threats or urgency to pressure customers," said Ajit Apte, senior vice president of Customer Operations at ComEd. "The 'Slow Down, Verify, Stop the Scam' framework helps customers pause and confirm suspicious requests before acting."

The Better Business Bureau also reminds individuals and businesses to stay vigilant to imposters who will show up at homes and businesses, then threatening to turn off utility service if payment to them is not immediately made.

"The BBB is honored to partner with ComEd and other energy providers to raise awareness about utility scams. As leaders in consumer protection, we have a responsibility to ensure people know how to protect themselves," said Steve J. Bernas, president and CEO of the Better Business Bureau. "The 'Slow Down, Verify, Stop the Scam' message is more than a slogan – it's a strategy for safety. Together, we're empowering consumers to recognize red flags and take action. Education is the first line of defense."

"Scammers are always trying new ways to trick people, but you can keep yourself safe by always slowing down and taking a moment to think," said Maria Bocanegra, president – Peoples Gas and North Shore Gas. "If what the person is saying doesn't feel right or if you're being pressured in any way, end the conversation. Hang up the phone, close the door, don't respond to the email. If you have any further concern, contact your utility directly."

"Scammers are getting creative and in recent years have expanded their schemes into digital spaces like social media," said Rich Asiyanbi, vice president of Operations at Nicor Gas. "Slow down, verify and stop scams – it's up to all of us to be vigilant to keep our personal and financial information safe."

Tips to Help Identify Scam Attempts

Illinois energy companies also remind customers that they will never call or visit a home or business to pressure you into making an immediate payment using aggressive or threatening tactics; threaten to disconnect service if payment is not made within a short timeframe; ask for direct payment with a prepaid cash card like Green Dot, or a third-party payment app like Zelle, Cash App, QuickPay and Venmo; ask for personal information such as Social Security or driver's license numbers or advise banking information is needed for a refund.

If a utility field representative visits your home or business, they will wear logoed uniforms and provide identification. If contacted by phone, verify the legitimacy of the call by requesting the caller to confirm information only you would know, such as date, amount or method of last payment.

If ever in doubt about the validity of the person calling or at your door, hang up or shut the door and call the energy company using a phone number from a trusted source like your latest bill, or the company website or mobile app.
